

VA Explains

Veterans Administration this week spelled out what the recent removal of credit controls on GI loans means to the homebuying World War II or Korean

The action, effective April 25 1953 and authorized by the Housing and Home Finance Agency, removes the last vestige of credit controls which were applied to GI loans under the Defense Production Act.

In addition, VA said it has removed restrictions on how the four per cent gratuity payment made to veterans who obtain GI loans may be applied.

The gratuity payment made by VA equals four per cent of the guaranteed portion of the GI loan up to a maximum of \$160. Previously under credit controls, the gratuity had to be applied to reduce the principal amount of the loan.

Now, the lender and the veteran may also apply the gratuity in other ways, for example to pay the first two of three installments on the loan, or to pay all or part of the first year's taxes and insurance.

The removal of credit controls means that under VA regulations it is now permissible for veterans to obtain GI home loans with no down payment and with a repayment term up to 30 years.

VA emphasized, however, that since VA guaranteed loans are made by private lending institutions, the lender makes the decision as to the terms of the

It is worth while to think-What if this year 1953 really is the last chapter in history?

may quarrel about: The end of the world will be brought about by God, not man. It is quite possible, as the most distinguished scientists tell us, that any one H-bomb will totally and instantly destroy

The civilized nations, so-called, may blow each other off the map; but there will be a lot of uncivilized ones left that don't have money for H-bombs and couldn't even spell the word. "Civilization as we know it' can be destroyed by man; but not the heavens and the earth. This is not to call the H-bomb a trifle; its use would be the most colossal evil ever devised at one stroke by mankind. But while the use of it might well be the last chapter for all readers of

The big question is not the nearness or the farness of that day. The question is: What are you going to put into the time between now and then? If you will look around you, you will see many evidences that those who went before you made wise plans and did good deeds not only for their own time but for yours as



"Notice of such election," says the law, "shall be given by posting a substantial copy of the election order in each of the election precincts of such county, city or town, and also at the county courthouse if for a county election and at the city hall if for a city election. Such notice shall also be published on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said county, city or town, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election. The provisions of this article shall control over any city charter provisions to the contrary '

The statutes specifically require publiculate of notice in connection with county road bond elections as follows: "If the proposed issue of bonds and levy of taxes is for the entire county, notice of the election shall be given by publication in a newspaper published in the county for three successive weeks, if there he one."




