## SMOKE

FROM THE MOUNTAIN

The citizens of Santa Anna more than ever before should show their appreciation to the fire boys who fought so gallantly Friday morning at the fire because many of them fought through dense smoke, water and fire without any smoke mask protection or protection for their clothes. A few citizens have made the unjust remark (we think) of saying the fire boys did not do all they could to save the property. Every one of the men whose property was damaged has publicly praised the fire department and marvel that they were able to conquer the flames as well as they did with no more equipment than has been furnished them. They stood hours in water and mud, inhaling smoke, which they are probably still tasting. None of us envy their job and we think they did their work very creditably. Several merchants have reported they want to get the boys smoke masks—Ed Purdy pleads guilty to not appreciating the boys as much as he should and was the first to volunteer to contribute to this equipment. It is something that is needed and would certainly save the health of our volunteer boys.

Rev. Dunham, just returned from a state B. T. U. convention at Beaumont reports that some of the delegates slept in the jail while they were there. It was a case of having to, too, but not because of misconduct but because the convention crowd was so much larger than expected, that all homes, hotels were full and so a portion of the women's jail house that was vacant was used and the visitors treated royally.

The Lung will remain at the News through Saturday of this week and then will be moved to the new room at the hospital. Several hundred people have viewed the lung.

The additional funds will be kept on deposit at the bank to be used for repairs, according to hospital authorities. Any repairs for the first year, however, will be paid by the Boston factory.

## Fire Destroys Grocery Store, Damaging Others

### Porter's Completely Destroyed; Hill and Purdy Dry Goods Firms, Corner Drug Damaged Friday

Fire of unknown origin Friday completely destroyed Porter's Grocery Store and damaged the building and stock of D. R. Hill and Bro. Dry Goods Store and Purdy Mercantile Co. The upper story of Corner Drug Store was also damaged. Total damage of the four stores amounted to approximately \$15,000.

The alarm was turned in at 4:30 a. m. by George May, night watchman who noticed a blaze in the rear of Porter's Grocery. Firemen and other citizens fought the blaze three hours before the fire was extinguished.

Jud Porter, owner of the grocery, was in San Antonio getting a load of supplies for the store when the loss occurred. Mr. Hill was on his way to Dallas to buy new stock but was notified at Comanche of the fire and hurried back to Santa Anna.

Water and smoke damaged the stock in the Hill store, but only smoke damaged the Purdy Mercantile stock.

T. M. Hays owned the building which was destroyed. Mr. Porter announces he will re-open his store at some location as soon as possible.

CITATION BY PUBLICATION

The State of Texas to the Sheriff or any Constable of Coleman County-GREETING:

YOU ARE HEREBY COMMANDED, that by making publication of this Citation in some newspaper published in the County of Coleman once in each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, you summon Cecil May Burke whose residence is Texas, but who is now absent from the State of Texas, and her present whereabouts are unknown, to be and appear at the next regular term of the 119th District Court of Coleman County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in the City of Coleman, on the first Monday in January A. D. 1938, the same being the 3d day of January A. D. 1938, then and there to answer Plaintiff's First Amended Original petition filed in said Court on the 4th day of November A. D. 1937, Plaintiff's Original Petition filed herein on the 7th day of September, A. D. 1937, in a suit numbered on the Docket of said Court, No. 5721-B wherein F. M. Burke is plaintiff, and Cecil May Burke, Dr. I. W. Jenkins and Mrs. I. W. Jenkins, are Defendants; the nature of plaintiff's demand being substantially as follows, to-wit:

Plaintiff's suit and the nature of his cause of action is for divorce against the defendant, Cecil May Burke, and for the care, custody and control of their minor daughter, Barbara Dell Burke; plaintiff alleging in substance that he is a bona fide inhabitant of Texas and has been for more than one year next preceding the filing of his petition and a resident citizen of Coleman County, Texas, and has been for more than six months next preceding the filing of his petition; plaintiff also alleging in substance that the defendants, Dr. I. W. Jenkins and Mrs. I. W. Jenkins, have exercised an undue influence over the defendant, Cecil May Burke, in withholding from plaintiff any knowledge of her whereabouts and the whereabouts of the said Barbara Dell Burke, and prays for an injunction restraining all of the defendants from removing said child from the State of Texas or from secreting her so that her whereabouts may be kept unknown to the plaintiff herein; and in said petition plaintiff prays the court to order and direct the defendants to produce said child into court to show cause why she should not be awarded to plaintiff. Plaintiff alleges his marriage to the defendant, Cecil May Burke, and their separation and that she and the other defendants, to-wit: Dr. I. W. Jenkins and Mrs. I. W. 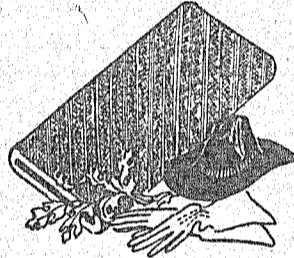

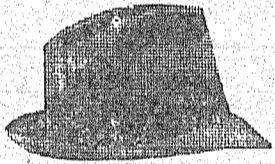

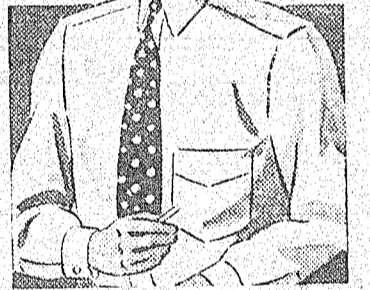

Farmers Here In Favor Of Farm Program

That a vast majority of the farmers in Coleman County are in favor of the regulation of crops by the Federal government may be seen in the activities of those farmers this year, S. E. Rosenberg, assistant county agent, points out.

This year there were 1,611 Coleman County farmers and ranchmen to take part in the voluntary farm and range program. Of that number 79.4 per cent qualified, 332 farmers in the group did not qualify.

In District A (Coleman, Glen Cove, White Chapel, Silver Valley, Novice and Goldsboro) a total of 384 work sheets were distributed and of that number 20.6, or 79 farmers, were unable to comply with the government's regulations. Main reason for failure to comply: Farmers had planted too many acres of small grain, oats and barley.

In District B (Buffalo, Santa Anna and Trickham) a total of 351 work sheets were distributed and all but 69, or 19.6 per cent, of the farmers complied. Most of the farmers in that district grow cotton.

In District C (Whon, Rockwood, Fisk and Brown Ranch) work sheets were distributed to 289 farmers and of that number 84.8 percent qualified while 44 farmers in the area were unable to do so.

District D (Gouldbusk, Voss, Valera, Talpa and Leaday) 302 farms, all but 18.2 percent, or 55 farmers, qualified.

Diversification Area
Districts C and D include the southern and southwestern parts of Coleman County, where there is more diversification than anywhere else in the county. It is seen where there is a larger percentage of diversification there also is a larger percentage of the farmers to qualify in the Federal government's soil program.

In District E (Cross Roads, Echo, northern part of Coleman County, and Burkett) 244 work sheets were distributed and all of the farmers but 28.8 per cent qualified for the government's program. Too much small grain, oats and barley, had been planted by some of the farmers.

In a supplementary district, composed of farmers in all parts of the county who are usually late in filling out papers, it was found that 36.6 per cent did not qualify. Most of the farmers in that category "just didn't get around to making out the papers."

Since about 70 percent of the county's farm land is included in the 1937 soil conservation program, it is evident that most of the farmers are in favor of the government program.

It is expected that Coleman County farmers and ranchmen will receive \$200,000 for taking part in the 1937 soil conservation program.

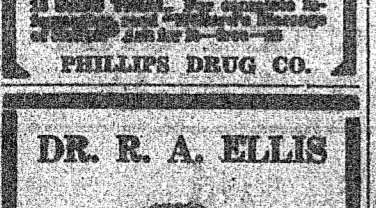

### HPC Will Meet H-S University in Conference Tilt

Abilene, Tex., November 22.—The shadow of the Howard Payne Yellow Jackets, Texas conference, leaders, and a traditional Cowboy nemesis, fell across the Hardin-Simmons path, today as the final hurdle to be cleared to complete an undefeated and untied season. The 1937 record gives the Cowboys an edge, but the long-time records favor the Jackets, and Coach Frank Kimbrough took nothing for granted as he put his Ranchers to work for the December 4 homecoming fray in the corral here.

The H-SU Cowboys have won sixteen in a row, including eight straight this year, and a win over Howard Payne would complete the first undefeated and untied grid year in the university's history.

Since 1917, when Hardin-Simmons resumed intercollegiate football after a lapse of several years—following a fatal injury to Johnny Airhart, Cowboy gridder—H-SU and Howard Payne have met twenty times.

The Yellow Jackets from Brownwood have won twelve times. The Cowboys of Abilene only five. Three games were ties.

Under Coach Kimbrough, the Cowboys won in 1935 and 1936. But, never in the history of the rivalry between the Baptist foes, has Hardin-Simmons won three in a row.

These precedents, plus the Howard Payne record of seven wins in eight games, and the speed and deception of Captain Rogers, Jimmy Minor and other Jacket backs, gave Coach Kimbrough, Burns "scouter" McKinney, H-SU triple threat ace, and supporting cast, plenty to think about as they drill-

### Turkeys Bring About \$30,000 to Housewives

COLEMAN — Wives of Coleman County farmers are approximately \$30,000 richer today than they were at the first of the month.

For those wives have sold many of their turkeys to local poultrymen for delivery to northern and eastern points for Thanksgiving. In most instances money derived from the sale of turkeys goes to the farmer's wife.

In Coleman County some 10 carloads of turkeys, averaging about \$3,000 to the car or a total of approximately \$30,000, were shipped during Thanksgiving season. Many dollars were spent by the local produce men in having the turkeys dressed, iced and shipped.

The Christmas turkey market is expected to open here within the next two or three weeks.

### Payments Under 1937 Agricultural Program To Begin in December

College Station, Dec. 2.—The Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee expects payments under the 1937 Agricultural Conservation Program to start shortly after the first of December, according to George Slaughter, Wharton, chairman of the group.

The committee, in the course of its monthly meeting at Texas A. and M. College, indicated that most of the payments would be made in December, January, and February.

The state AAA office here at College Station is equipped to check applications and to pass

them on to the General Accounting Office at the rate of some 3,000 a day," Slaughter said. "This means that the limiting factor in paying farmers and ranchmen is the number of applications which we receive from the counties."

No payments can be made to any county until it has sent in at least 75 percent of its total applications, according to Mr. Slaughter. This minimum has been set as the lowest figure from which the county expenses of administering the program can be calculated. The county expenses are deducted from the payments.

The committee took steps to urge counties to send in their applications for payments as soon as possible. Meanwhile the committee pointed out that farmers had until December 31 to earn payments under the 1937 program by sowing soil building crops, especially winter legumes, and by carrying out other conservation payments.

"Texas farmers earned only about four and a half million dollars in payments out of the more than six million allotted to the State under the 1936 program," Slaughter said.

### Purchasing Power of Cattle is Affected By Cattle Numbers

College Station, Nov. 21.—Cattle numbers and the purchasing power of cattle follow cycles varying from 14 to 16 years in length, according to W. E. Morgan, economist of the Extension Service division of Texas A. and M. College.

When the purchasing power of cattle is high, production is stimulated, and cattle numbers increase, Morgan points out. On the other hand, when purchasing power is low, production is curtailed.

People were nice and promised cakes. Mr. John Parker told Mrs. Parker to make two. We found one gate locked with a note saying "this gate is forever locked against the anti preacher." We crawled under the fence and got the cake. Election day came and gal-

lons of "lemonade were made in the shade and stirred with a spade" and stacks of cookies. Some circulated a report that no anti's could have cake and lemonade. The anti's were invited in immediately. Mr. D. Beakley, a brother of Mrs. E. P. Readleman, bought a big sack of good things. He stayed quite a while. He said "no Pro ladies should be nicer to the Anti's than he could be to them." He was an Anti.

That night our crowd dug up a lot of Roman candles and went on top of the mountain and fired them. The state went Anti. There were never any hard feelings between the Pros and Anti's here—we were all neighbors and friends.

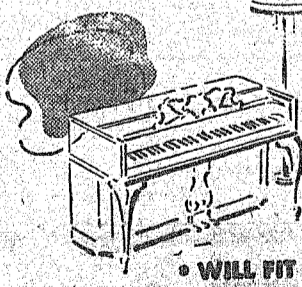
