Sheriff H. F. Fenton, Jr., and Deputy Sheriff Raymond Graves investigated and Dr. Charles M. Henner was the medical attendant. Irick rendered a verdict of death by self inflicted wounds.

Central Colorado Soil Conservation District News

Recent rains benefitted the soil in accordance with the conservation measures that had been applied to the land, report district cooperators to Soil Conservation Service technicians.

Archie Bryson, who ranches south of Goulbusk, reported a 2-inch rain gave 18 inches of soil moisture on pitted range land while an adjoining bare area not pitted was wet only two inches on the same rain. Bryson has pitted 75 acres and plans to continue on additional acreage as time permits.

H. Gardalner, who ranches south of Whon, reported contour furrowed range land "bogged a horse" following recent rains in that area while an unfurrowed area adjoining was wet only on the surface.

Increased storage of moisture, increased profits and erosion protection provided by terraces, have stimulated terrace construction throughout the district. Ford Barnes of Santa Anna has 100 acres presently being terraced. R. V. Rogers of Mozelle has terraces on 50 acres completed.

Bill Vaughn of Trickham plans to terrace 185 acres. Bill Bryan of Rockwood has plans made to terrace 95 acres. Plans are being made to terrace 150 acres on the S. S. Spain place south of Goulbusk. Pete Armor of Novice plans to terrace 135 acres. Milton Coker west of Coleman plans to begin terrace construction on 65 acres.

District cooperators are planting large acreages of guar from which they expect a cash crop and soil improvement. Guar, a summer legume, can be planted with maize plates with the same land preparations as maize. A seeding rate of five to six pounds per acre is recommended.

District cooperators who are planting or plan to plant guar are Lynn Riley of Coleman, 80 acres; Paige Mayes of Santa Anna, 60 acres; Casey Herring north of Trickham, 20 acres; Cecil Gray of Coleman, about 20 acres on his Rockwood farm; J. P. Hodges of Rockwood, 20 acres; M. M. Couch south of Goulbusk, 20 acres and W. F. Deal west of Goulbusk. Aubrey Nichols east of Coleman has planted about 10 acres of guar.

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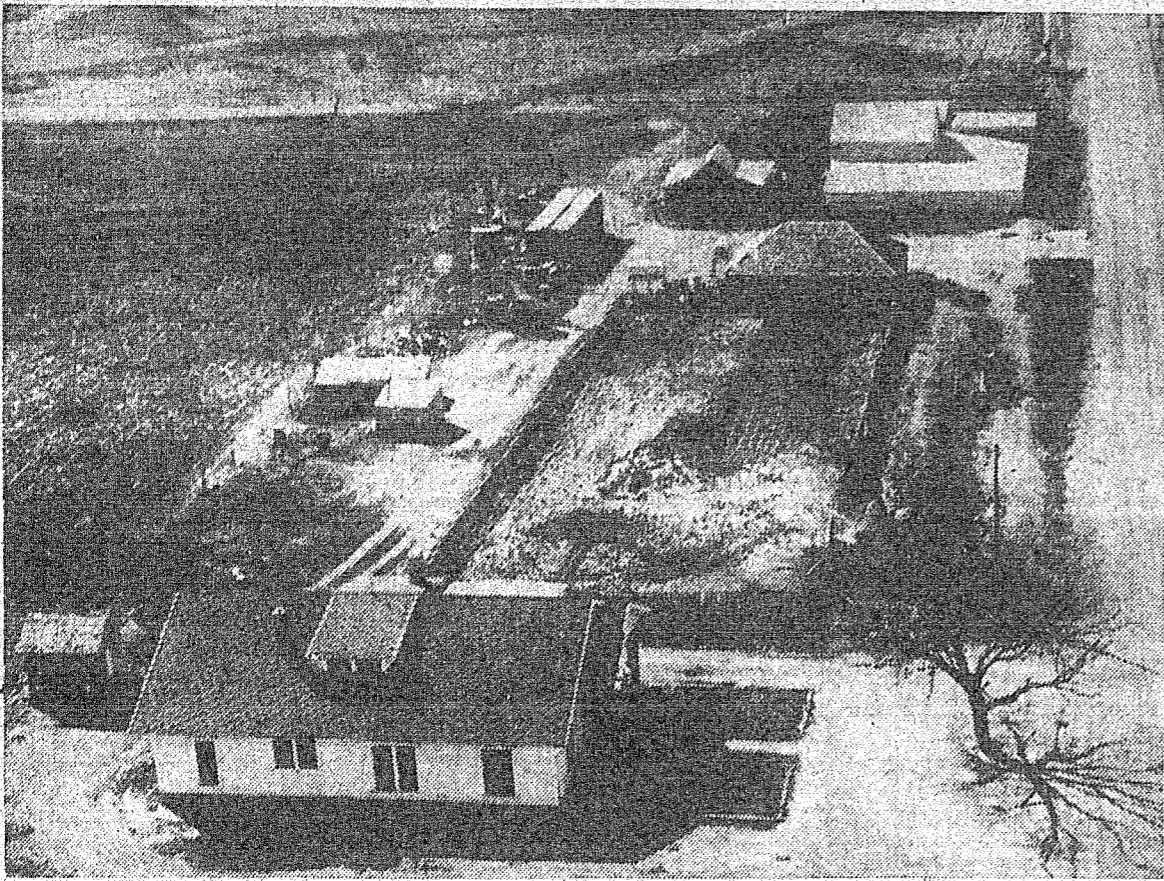

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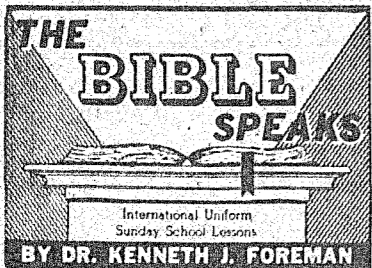

Teen-Age Faith

Lesson for June 12, 1955

WE do not expect teen-agers to have the same outlook on life, or the same kind of clothes, or looks, or digestion, or habits, or occupations, as their grandmothers. Why should we expect them to have the same kind of religion? This is not saying that young people should have one religion and old people another. It is saying rather that the way a teenager thinks and acts is enough different from the way his

elders think and act, so that we might reasonably expect that he will take the same religion with a different slant. Not all grown-up Christians are made in the same mold; and certainly it is a mistake to try to force the religious expression and ideas and beliefs of growing boys and girls into the precise pattern of Grandma, let alone St. Paul.

Teen-agers Make Top-notch Christians

Most people who are converted are converted in their teens. Most young people who have been brought up in Christian homes and have since childhood never thought of themselves as anything else but Christians, join the church (or are confirmed) during their teens. Most ministers first felt the call to the ministry before they were 20 years old. Most missionaries first thought of being missionaries during their teens. The fact is, the teens are just the time when religious reception is good. Just as there are days when radio reception is good and other days when it is bad, so it is with what we can call religious reception; there are times in life when it is better than at other times. As the teen-age is the waking-up time all along the line, so it should not be surprising that the heart of boys and girls, just at the time

when they begin not to be boys and girls any more, but men and women, should be specially open to the vision and the voice of God. Teen-agers can make top-notch Christians.

But They Need Help

We have a case in point, in the story of the young king Josiah. He was eight years old when he came to the throne. His father, King Amon, had been a bad man and a bad king, so bad that his own servants had a palace revolution and killed him. There must have been something promising about little Josiah, because we read that the people of the land "made him king,"—as we would say, elected him. This was remarkable, because in the ancient Near East it was just as it is in some of our neighboring countries today: if a king or a president is assassinated, one of the plotters is generally the next king. But the people picked out little Josiah and made him king. Boy-like, he did nothing particularly worth mentioning for eight years. Then, when he was 16 years old, he "began to seek after the God of David." Now whenever a boy with worthless parents turns out to be a fine character with a sincere faith, it is safe to guess that some one has been there influencing the boy for good. Boys and girls seldom develop into mature Christians without help. Later we read that Josiah was acquainted with the best and "most God-fearing men of his time, and we can be reasonably sure that this young king's wise and steady leadership, his growth in faith, his constructive reforms, were "sparked" by some of these priests and prophets who were his close friends.

Teen-agers Are the Church of Tomorrow

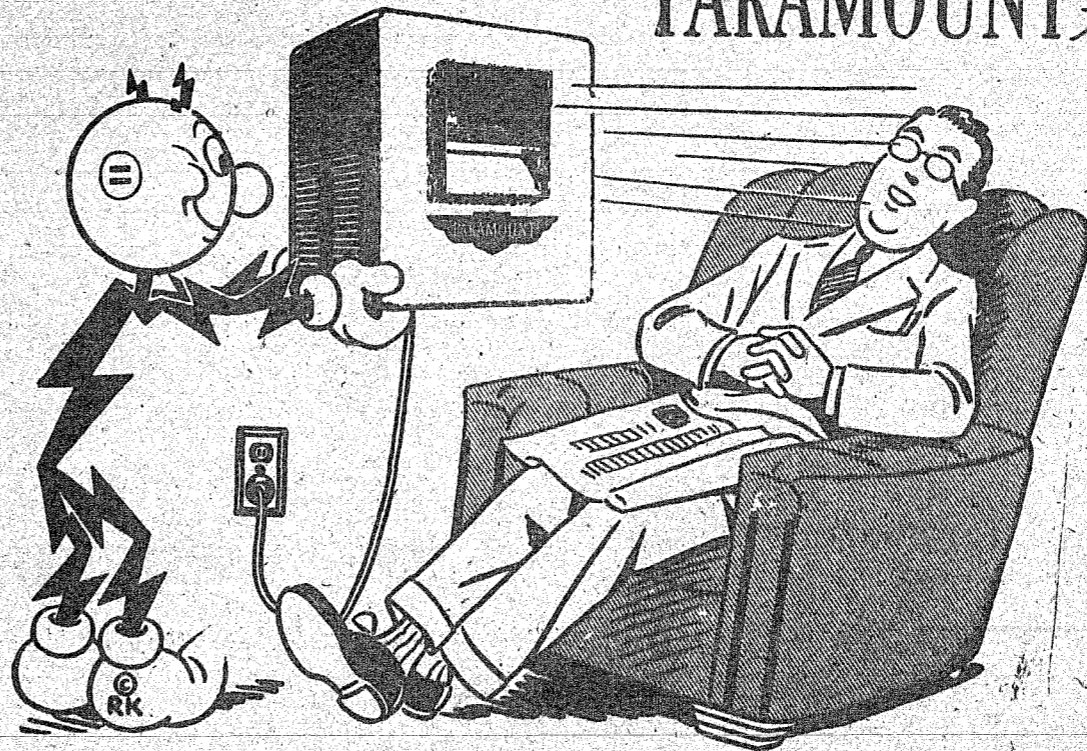

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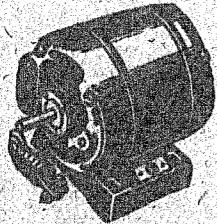
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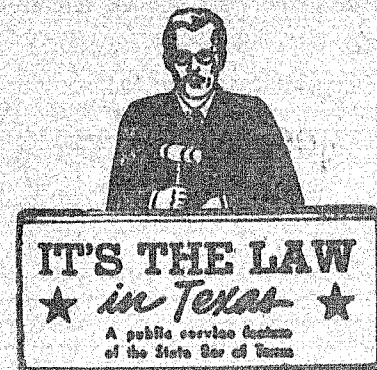
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"WITH ALL MY WORLDLY GOODS . . ."

Our WASHINGTON Letter

Within A Short Time the Salk polio vaccine will be just as safe as other vaccines, according to Dr. Leonard A. Scheele, Surgeon General of the U. S. Public Health Service.

This well-known authority spoke to the Texas delegation at the weekly luncheon at the Capitol last week and described in some detail the laboratory processes now taking place by scientists to perfect the new discovery, at least as nearly as it is possible to do.

Dr. Scheele pointed out that the post-vaccination cases have totaled 125 out of nearly six million vaccinations administered. He blamed the vaccine-caused cases on inadequate mixing of the material or on other unknown factors which, he thinks, can be eliminated or reduced to a minimum.

The Doctor emphasized that those who have received one shot at the vaccine will have strong resistance to the disease for some time even though the second and third shots may be delayed for a while.

Department Of Agriculture has announced that mohair production is making a come-back after declining 45% between 1945 and 1952. Last year growers shipped 13.7 million pounds, which was 1.1 million over 1953 or a 9% increase. Total goat population, 2.5 million, from which 96% of the mohair is produced in Texas.

"With about 8% more goats in Texas early this year than at the beginning of 1954," the report concludes, "some further increase in mohair production appears likely."

parate property. The separate property of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired by either after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Aside from the ordinary community estate, there is a class of property known as the wife's "special community," which includes all the income from her separate real property, and probably the interest on bonds or notes, and dividends on stocks owned in her separate right. While the husband may have similar assets, the law accords them no particular distinction from ordinary community property.

Although the history of the matter is somewhat confusing, it appears that under present day law the husband has control of ordinary community property; but control of the wife's special community property is reserved to her.

Certain restrictions are imposed upon both husband and wife in exercising such control. For instance, the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defraud the wife, nor can he sell the homestead without her signature and acknowledgment. And the wife's sale or mortgage of her separate real estate, stocks or bonds is not valid unless her husband joins with her in the transaction — he must sign and execute the necessary legal papers along with her.

There are laws exempting the wife's separate and special community property from liability for debts incurred by the husband. Such liability is restricted to his separate property and the ordinary community property.

On the other hand, debts incurred by the wife in obtaining necessities for herself or the children bind all property belonging to either party, including the husband's separate property. For other debts which she has power to incur, only her separate and special community property are liable.

All of these distinctions emphasize the advisability of keeping proper records. By doing so the various classes of community and separate property owned by a married couple will always be easily distinguishable. Each category will then receive the special protection afforded to it by our laws.

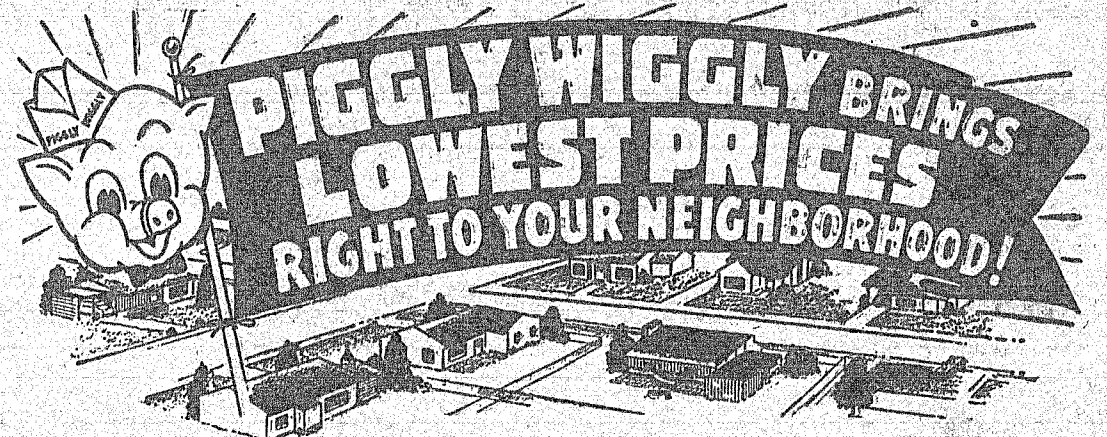
