Bank Assets Show Good Increase

In the quarterly report of the Santa Anna National Bank, as published elsewhere in this issue of The News, a considerable increase is noted in the assets of the bank.

The last report of the bank was made as of April 11, 1955 and this report is made as of June 30, 1955. It shows an increase of \$2,429.65 in loans and discounts. An increase of \$38,855.49 is shown in the actual deposits with an increase of \$6,552.83 in undivided profits.

The resources of the Santa Anna National Bank are \$1,888,302.02, as shown at the close of business on June 30.

Water Line To New Football Field Completed

C. N. Perry, Superintendent of the Santa Anna Schools, announced this week that a new water line has been completed to the site of the proposed new football field. Approximately 1000 feet of pipe was laid.

Perry expressed his and the School Board's appreciation to the Coleman Gas Company for their help in getting the line in. The gas company dug all the ditches for the new line and did not charge the school for the service. Without the help from the gas company, this project would have taken much longer to complete.

The line runs through the center of the proposed site with underground hydrants for easy access for watering the field. The hydrants will be covered with sand at a safe depth during the time games are being played on the field.

They do not plan to get the field ready for use this year. However, it will be used for a practice field and as time permits, work will be done with the hope of getting the new field ready by next year.

It is planned to have an underground sprinkler system when the field is completed.

Connected on the new water line is the Band Hall and the Vocational Agriculture Buildings, where water has been needed every since they were built.

Two Teachers And Board Member Resign; 1 Employed

Two teachers in the local school system have resigned during the past few days and one teacher was employed at the last regular meeting of the Santa Anna Independent School District Trustees. One member of the board also resigned.

James E. Pollard, who has been the assistant coach and a teacher in the Junior High School, resigned by letter the first of this week. He stated he was accepting a teaching position under R. K. Green in the Post Schools, but would not be connected with the coaching staff. Blake Williams of Rockwood, who was employed by the local school when the Rockwood District transferred their students to Santa Anna, resigned Monday afternoon to accept a elementary principal's position in a school system near Houston. Williams was to teach in the Junior High School.

Tony Rehm of Rockwood, also resigned from the Board of Trustees, effective at the time he offered his resignation.

Mrs. Johnnie Ethel (Steward) Horton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Rehm of Rockwood and a graduate of the Santa Anna High School, was elected to the faculty to teach one section of the First Grade.

The board also re-employed all the lunchroom workers in the same positions they held last year, as follows: Mrs. Christine Smith, supervisor, Mrs. Barney Lewellan, Mrs. Eddie Hall and Mrs. J. A. Dunn.

The board also voted to pay \$350 on the projected street paving from the high school gym to the Rockwood Highway, provided the projects develop. They also offered the old Whon and Mayo school busses for sale. One will be subject to bids, as its value will exceed \$75.00. They also voted an allowance to each coach to attend the State Coaching School, which will be held in San Antonio this year.

Eudora Garrett Dies In Mexico City

Miss Eudora Garrett, Santa Anna reared, aged 50, died on Tuesday, July 5th, in Mexico City of a heart attack, according to the United Press. She had made her home in Mexico for many years. The week before her death she was operated on at the Cardiology Hospital for a rare heart condition. She willed her body to the hospital to be used in its study of heart disease.

Known as a writer of ability, Miss Garrett was at one time general reporter for the Dallas Morning News. At the time of her death she was a feature writer for the News, an English language daily in Mexico City. She was a graduate of Trinity University then at Waxahatchie. She did graduate work at the University of Texas. She was the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Garrett of this vicinity, both long deceased. She is survived by a brother, Bob Garrett of Santa Anna and other relatives.

When we visit with old-timers like Mr. Estes we know it is the twinkle in his eyes that carried him through the lean years and frontier hardships. The years have dulled his eyes but not his mind; Mr. Estes is as "bright as a dollar", as we visit together.

Mr. J. A. Estes has marked his 95th birthday. He was born at Murfreesboro, Tenn., June 19, 1860. He and Miss Fanny Dunaway were married in 1883 and came to Texas in 1891, settling near Waco.

When asked about the "urge to go West" he grinned and said a brother who had been in Texas two years wrote he had a riding plow and Mr. Estes had nothing but a walking plow in Tennessee, so he put Mrs. Estes and the kids on the train and headed West.

After about 4 years around Waco he heard of the cheap leases on land and came to this section. The family came in 2 wagons, the trip from Waco taking 12 days. They scraped snow off the ground to make down beds to sleep on.

Mr. Estes has been a Methodist some 70 odd years. He and Mrs. Estes had been married almost 70 years when she passed away. Fourteen children were born to this union. He has lived on the present home place since 1900. Mr. Estes doesn't hear so well and has only recently quit driving his car because his eyes aren't what they used to be.

The Estes family had their 15th reunion at the Coleman park the second Sunday in June. There were 80 present. Ones from greater distance were Sam Lee and Mr. and Mrs. John Lee and daughter of Auburn, Calif., and Mr. and Mrs. Loy Dunn and family of Lubbock.

When we think of our friends like Mr. Estes and what he and his family have meant to our community, we all say we wouldn't trade our Home Town.

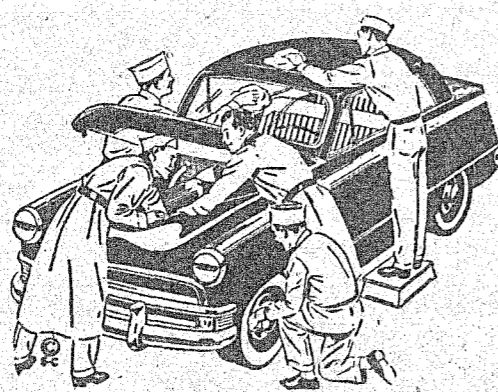

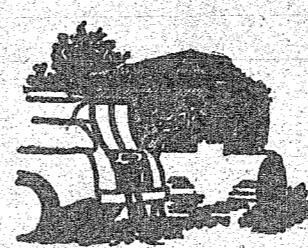

Mrs. J. R. Pearce Proud Owner Of Mystery Farm

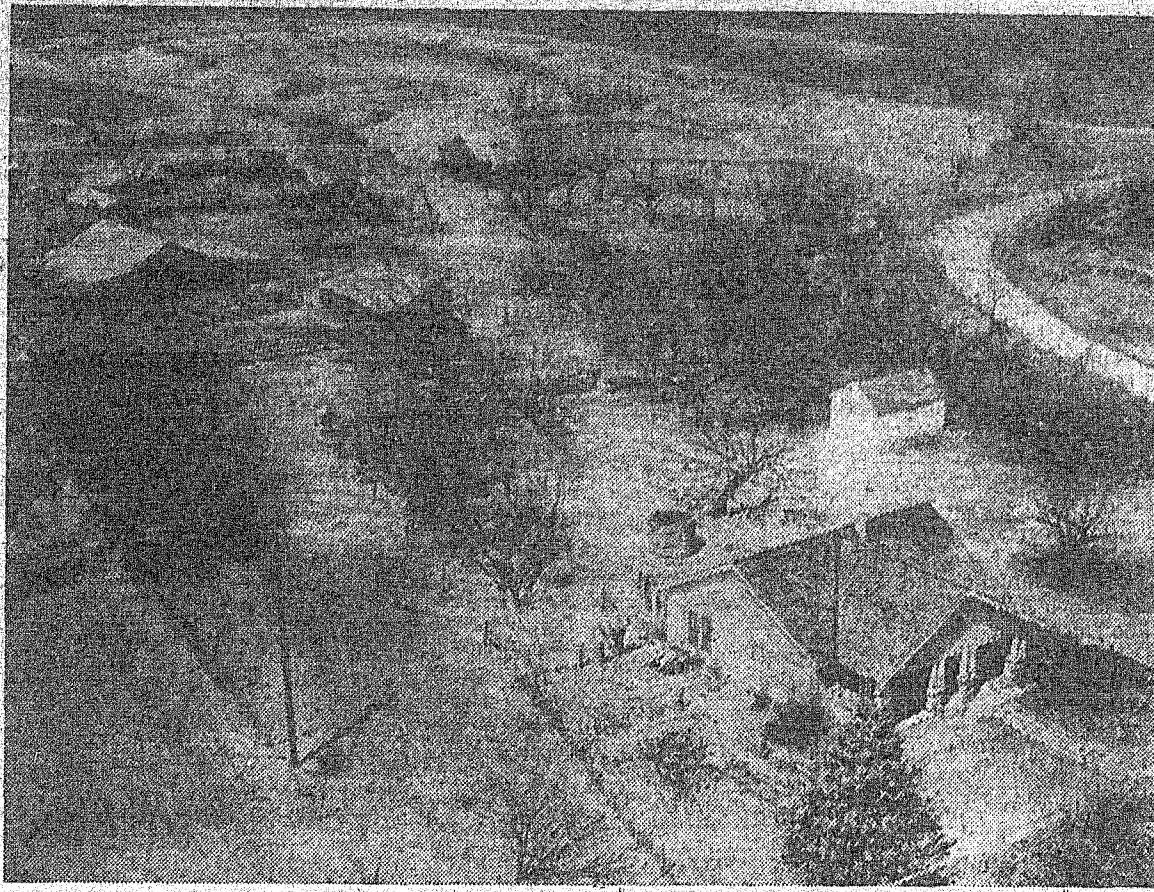
Mrs. John R. Pearce, who has lived on her 382 acre farm 4 1/2 miles north of Santa Anna 32 years, is the proud owner of Mystery Farm No. 13, as appeared in the Santa Anna News last week.

John R. Pearce purchased the farm from his father, L. C. Pearce, in 1932 and he and wife moved on the farm shortly after that time. His father had bought the farm in 1903 and during a part of that time Mr. Pearce had rented the farm from his father. Mrs. Pearce said she guessed the farm had been in cultivation for about 80 years, but was not sure of it. Three generations have lived on the farm since the Pearce's purchased it.

John R. Pearce and Leora Barnard were married November 5, 1899 in the Kirk Community of Limestone County, near Groesbeck, Texas. Soon after they moved to Coleman County, Mr. Pearce died June 20, 1951. They were members of the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna, where Mrs. Pearce still retains her membership.

Six children were born to the Pearce's, one of whom died in 1926. They are: Hazel Spence of Trent, Texas, mother of George Havens and Mrs. Ora

his father in death in 1926. Lyle Pearce, father of three children, David, who is in the Marines and Marjorie and Upton Pearce. Mrs. Johnny Mosely is the mother of one daughter, Mrs. Ann Ferguson of Houston. Bob Pearce, the youngest of the children, lives

on the farm and works it. He has two children, Kit and Dick. Mrs. Pearce has 10 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Oil was discovered on the farm soon after Mr. Pearce's death, and now Mrs. Pearce has seven producing wells. During recent

years she has redecorated her home and painted a number of the out buildings on the farm.

About 340 acres of the farm is in cultivation. Bob does most all the farm work and is raising 125 acres of Guar this year. This is a relatively new crop for this part of the country and Bob is well pleased with the apparent results from it. It grows similar to okra and is combined similar to maize. Insulin is one of the biggest products made from Guar.

On the other lands they raise some small grains and lots of row crops to feed to cattle they raise for market purposes. They recently sold 23 head of cattle and at present have about 15 head. They always use a little fertilizer when planting and Mrs. Pearce says they get good results from its use, especially when moisture comes at the right times.

They also plant some of the land for grazing purposes.

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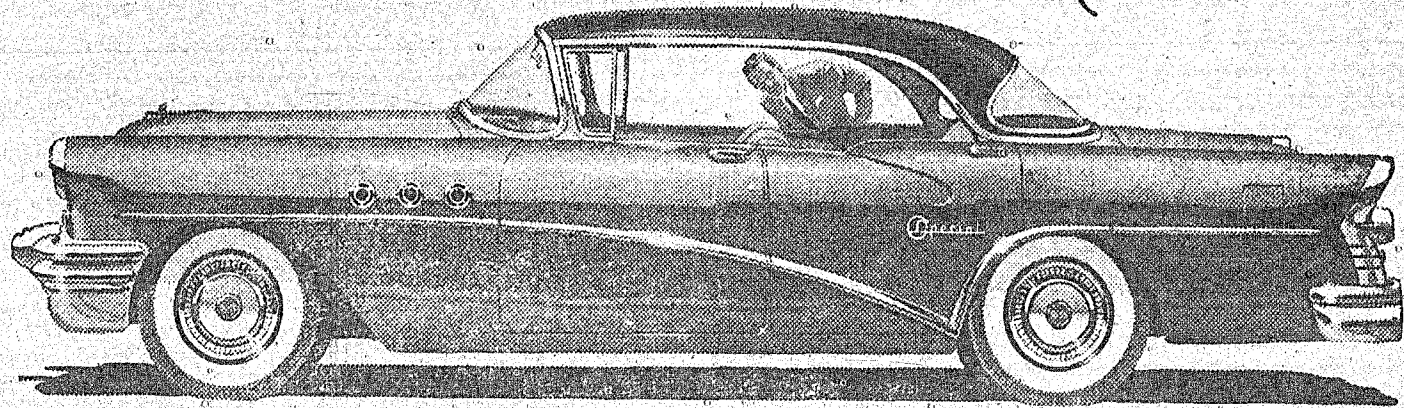

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Union Sunday School Lessons

Devotional Reading: Deuteronomy 30:15-20.

Obey God's Laws

Lesson for July 17, 1955

LAWs are of various kinds. Some laws are arbitrary, some are made by the nature of things, or rather express the nature of things. To take an example of an arbitrary law: What is the fine, where you drive for exceeding the speed limit or for parking in the wrong place? Let's say it is ten dollars for going too fast, and three for illegal parking.



If the alderman, or whoever it was that made the law, should decide next Tuesday to change those fines to fifteen and four dollars, respectively, they would have a right to do it. There is nothing in the nature of things that makes parking on the north side of Main Street wrong, and nothing that makes three dollars the exact amount to charge the offender, practical though it may be.

Some Laws Cannot Be Broken

There are other laws which are not on the statute books but are much more rigid, and rigidly enforced, than regulations about parking or school attendance. We sometimes call these laws of nature; but they are really laws of God. There is no law printed in a book anywhere that says that if a person neglects the care of his teeth he will get a toothache; but that is a law nevertheless. It is, so to speak, written into the physical constitution of every man. There is a higher sort of law still, called Moral Law, which is likewise rooted in the nature of things. Examples of moral laws: To every man belongs his due; whatever a man soweth, that shall he also reap; hate and you will be hated, love and you will be loved. Such laws can be disregarded; they are disregarded every day; but they cannot be broken. They are not at all the arbitrary laws. There is a ghost town where parking spaces can still be seen marked on the

pavement. But you can leave your car there now for a month and never get a ticket. The town government has just folded up and gone away. But God never folds up nor goes away. There is a corner in a city where once a left turn was permitted; now it is against the law. The traffic department changed its mind. But God does not change his mind.

How Nations Break Laws

Now, every nation, every community, every club or organization of people, has the right to make up its own constitution and by-laws, its rules, ordinances, regulations, laws and statutes. And it has the right to change these. Most nations, however, do not like to admit that there are laws which bind them. They do not like to feel that there are unchanging and unchangeable laws which govern them and all nations. Nevertheless there are such laws, laws of God; and nations have been broken for trying to break them. Consider the case of the country of Judah. Prophets had been warning that country, its leaders and its people, for years, that disobedience would bring disaster. Ezekiel, whose book makes fascinating though often puzzling reading, did make one thing quite plain: that Judah's sins had reached the breaking-point, that God's axe would fall, that Jerusalem would be destroyed. Scarcely any one believed him. But when Jerusalem actually and finally fell, then "they knew that a prophet had been among them."

Crime and Punishment

What were some of the divine laws, rooted in the nature of things, which Judah as a nation had been breaking? We can name the two most important: Love and Justice. The nation lived by hate, fear, distrust and selfishness. As a nation, they hated other nations. They tried to build a little iron curtain around themselves. They would not trust other nations and they would not keep treaties they had made themselves. They let down their moral standards to the point where the typical Judahite (to judge from the pictures the prophets paint) was loose in his relations with women, un dependable and dishonest in his business dealings, irreligious even in his "religious" acts, irresponsible in his civic duties. . . you can fill out the discouraging list from the pages of Ezekiel, or other prophets. You cannot build a good country with bad citizens, that is another law that cannot be broken, though Judah tried hard enough to break it. When disaster finally struck, the citizens were astonished; but God's prophets were not.
