## Watermelon Feed, First Football Meeting Scheduled Friday Night at H. S.

Coach Joe Van Breeman, new head coach for the Santa Anna High School, said early this week actual football practice would get underway Monday, August 22. He is expecting about 35 boys out for practice, 12 of which have at least one letter for previous participation in the sport.

A watermelon feed will be held at the high school Friday night, August 19, at 7:30 o'clock and all the boys planning to come out for football and their fathers are urged to attend and get acquainted with the new coach and take part in working out practice periods for the next two weeks.

Kenneth Bowker, secretary for the Quarterback Club, said all members of that organization was invited to be present at the football meeting. All members of the baseball teams, and both ward school and high school football teams are urged to be present with their fathers. There will be plenty of ice cold watermelons for all and plans are being made to show a football film.

Van Breeman said he was planning to have two workouts each day during the two weeks period between Monday and the time for school to start. The first games of the season will be played on the local field on Friday night, September 9, with Junction.

He plans to have at least two

scrimmages during the first two weeks and the public will be invited to watch them if they are on the local field. There is a good possibility the boys will have more than just two scrimmages.

The coach said he was well pleased with the attitude of the boys at the present time. He has been getting equipment ready the past few days and some new equipment has been purchased. Equipment will be issued to the boys Saturday afternoon.

The coach plans to spend most of the first two weeks getting the boy's physical condition in the best possible condition. They will be doing lots of exercises, running and practice blocking and tackling.

The coach expressed the desire to have the cooperation of all the parents of the football boys in getting them in good physical shape for the coming football season.

Members of the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees voted Tuesday night to continue the operation of the Santa Anna schools in the same manner they have been operated in the past few years and to continue the operation of the Negro Elementary school and to transport the high school Negro students to the Coleman Negro High School.

Three local Negroes and two Negroes from the Mozelle School District were present at the called meeting Tuesday night. They were asked if they would like for all their students to attend the Coleman school, but they declined the invitation. The school board voted to do considerable repairs to the Colored School building, purchase them some playground equipment and continue the operation of the school.

Thus the entire local school system will remain on a segregated basis this year. The board also voted to purchase a new school bus, if it can be obtained in a reasonable length of time, to have an extra bus. It will be used for transporting members of the band and other students to school sponsored activities. The Rockwood bus was also transferred to Santa Anna. Mr. and Mrs. Tom Rutherford were employed to drive the Whon bus and Eugene James was employed to drive the Trickham bus.

Hubert H. Busse of Hillsboro, Texas, was employed as the assistant coach and he will also

teach in the high school. He is a graduate of Bynum High School, attended Hillsboro Junior College, the University of Texas and received his BS degree from Baylor University. At present he is working on his Masters degree at the University of Texas. He has some experience as the Junior High Coach at Lewisville, Texas, and also taught there one year.

Miss Minnie Alexander of Groesbeck, will be the teacher in the Colored school.

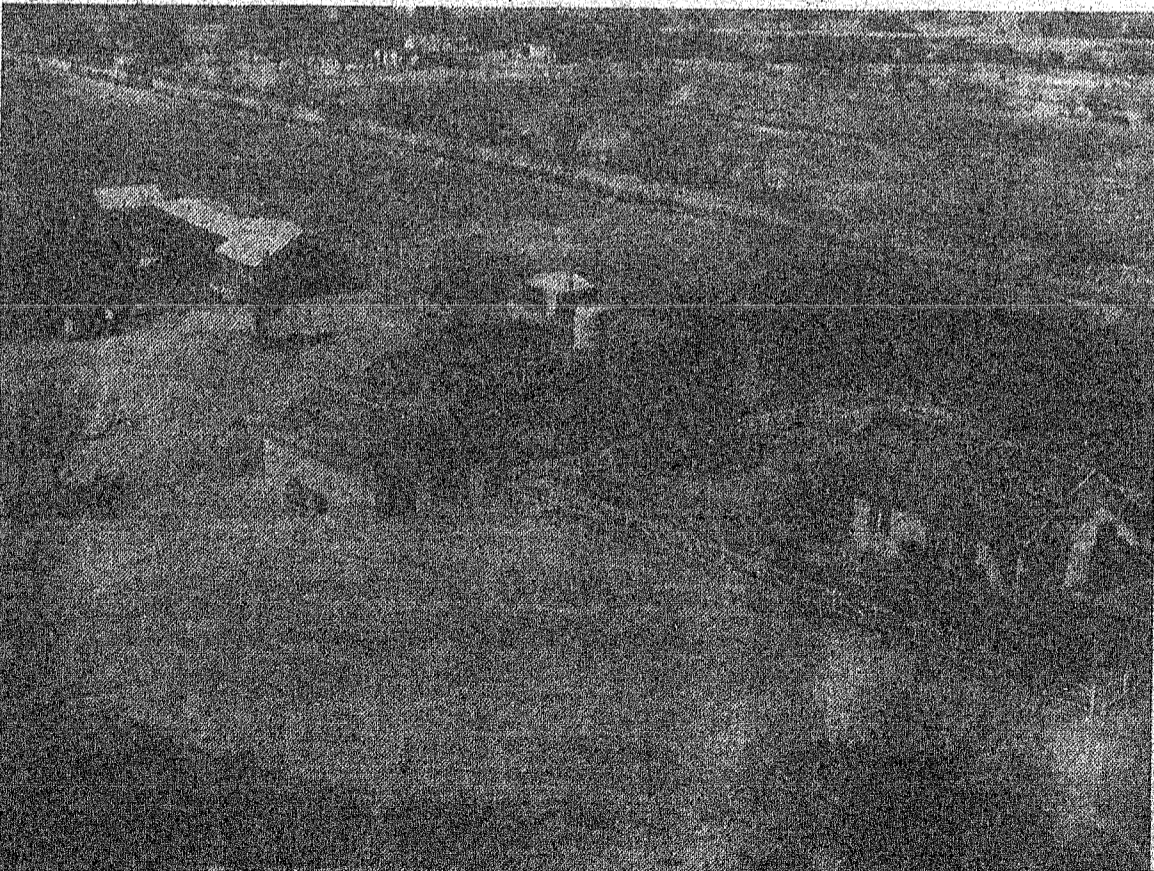
## Ward School Football Practice To Start Monday

**Promises of God**

Lesson for August 21, 1955

MANY Christians today become confused when they read the prophecies of the Old Testament. They do not seem to be either plain or profitable, because they are written in a strange style and the reader has no way of knowing, without help, just where and why and when and to whom these words were first spoken or written. This column is much to short a space for straightening out the tangles in even one chapter. The thing to bear in



Dr. Foreman mind is that there is enough in Scripture that is plain to any man, enough to give him all he needs to know about God and his will for us. This column this week will consider one general thought: the promises of God, as they are found in the pages of the prophets particularly.

**The Prophet**

The promises of God are never made directly, as by a loudspeaker in the sky. The same promise may be made to many persons; but not all at once. The message first takes shape under the skull of one man, a holy, sensitive man, with spiritual insight, generally with great courage and persistence: in short, a prophet. We do not know for certain just what the process is by which a divine truth gets into the human mind of the prophet; but when first the divine truth enters the human sphere, it comes as an idea, a thought, in some prophet's mind. Sometimes more than one prophet may say the same thing, as when Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel were all predicting the return of the Jews to Jerusalem. Sometimes the prophet stands entirely alone. But the prophet is like the lookout in the crow's nest of a ship, sighting the dim landfall before any one on deck can see it.

Sometimes the signal the prophet's keen spirit caught from on high spelled disaster; sometimes it was like "news behind news," a commentary on the why of events in past or present. But often, indeed more often than anything else, the message of the prophet is a promise. You can sum up all the promises there are into one sentence: God is good; he desires the good of all his children; and he will bring good to pass. One writer in the New Testament suggests that the prophets did not always understand their own messages; they were like radio receivers crossed by static. Be that as it may, we know from reading the Gospels that the people who read the prophets, even the professional interpreters, did not always understand what they read. The promises were set in obscure language, often in poetry. One feature however is clear. The focus and center of the prophet's hope and dream was the Messiah. It is true, their descriptions were so misread that when Jesus Christ came, most of his fellow-countrymen, measuring him by the literal words of these promises, did not recognize him. But there were those who did. The Christian discovers that all the best good that God desires for his children is summed up in Christ and what he does for men.

**The Present**

What can a Christian today do with the promises passed on by the prophets? Some of them refer no doubt to events long since past, as when Ezekiel and Jeremiah predict the destruction of Babylon. The Christian can take such promises to support his faith that God does rule in the history of men; that his decrees are certain, his foreknowledge sure. Some of the promises are still unfulfilled, as when a prophet predicts the utter destruction of evil from this earth and the coming of a time of universal peace. A Christian can live by such hope even when (just as in the prophet's own days) the hope seems out of reach entirely. Where the prophet speaks of God's Servant the Coming One, we can use such promises to deepen our understanding of what Christ is to mean to the world. But every once in a while, in reading the prophets, one discovers that spans past, present and future. It was a promise made good long ago; it will come true in centuries to come; it is true this present hour. Such a promise is to be found, for instance, in Isaiah 55:6-7.

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## Mrs. E. W. Moore Owner Of Mystery Farm No. 18

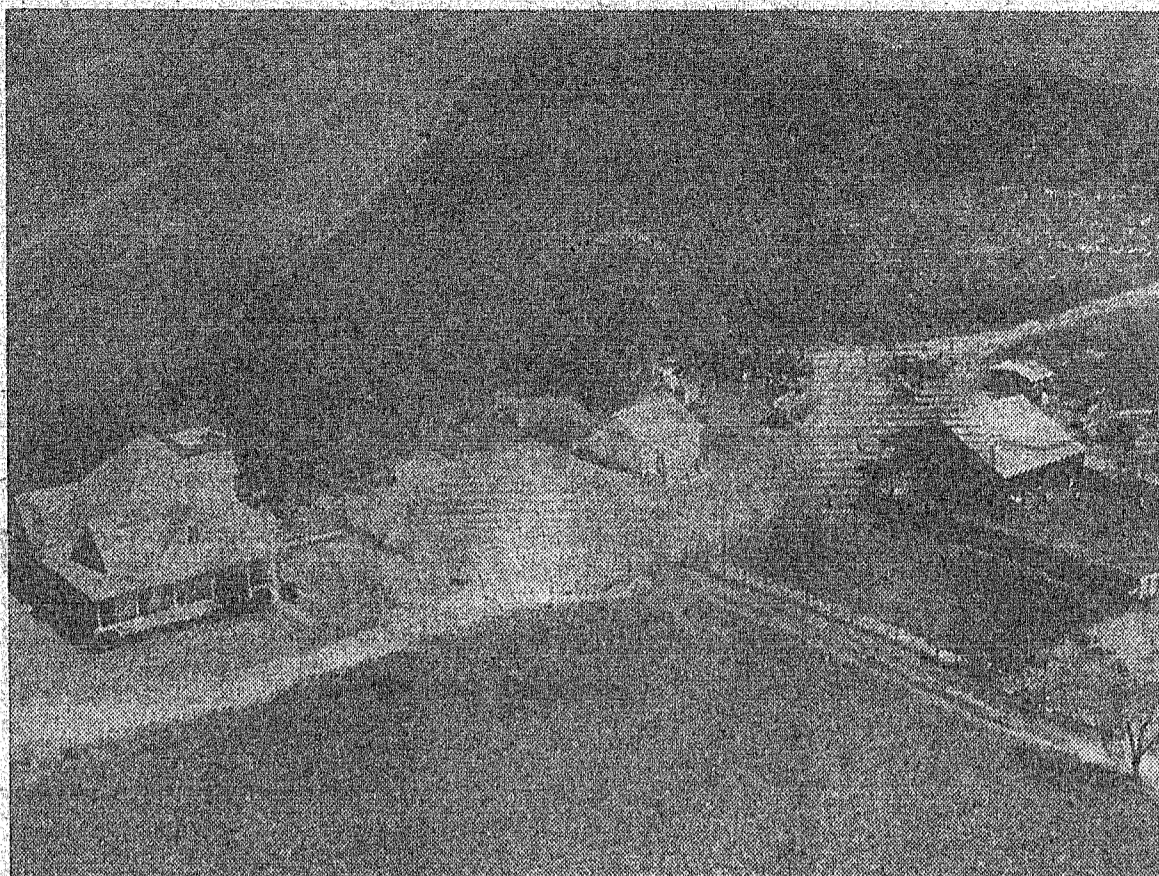
Mrs. E. W. Moore, who lives 6 miles south of Santa Anna on The Whon Road, is the owner of Mystery Farm No. 18, as appeared in the Santa Anna News last week. The farm is known as the Quarter Circle M Farm, the Quarter Circle M being the brand for cattle raised on the place.

Mr. and Mrs. Moore purchased the 438 acre farm from V. L. Grady and W. R. Kelley about 13 years ago and have lived there since. Mr. Moore passed away on July 19, just one month ago.

During the time the Moore's have owned the place, they have completely redecorated the house inside and out, built a new garage, new barn, wash and pump house, added hot and cold running water in the house with modern bath room facilities and landscaped the grounds around the house. They also have terraced the 167 acres in cultivation, and built one new stock tank.

The farm, known as the Kirkpatrick Farm, now has two oil wells on it and the Moores raise a number of head of Herefords for market each year. At present Mrs. Moore has 55 head of cattle on the place. They have followed a more or less diversified method of farming the cultivated land, rotating with cotton, maize and oats. Mr. Moore had decided to put all the land in oats for this year, but the drought and freeze got them. Now most of the land is planted in row crops, with 25 acres being in cotton. She said she had already poisoned for boll worms once this year and was going to poison again early this

week.

Her favorite crop is cotton. Mr. Moore's favorite and hobby was raising Hereford cattle. He enjoyed working with his cattle and spent most of his time seeing after them. They do not use any fertilizer on the land, but try to raise most of the feed for the cattle. Usually in the winter months they have to buy some cubes for feed.

of Lott. The Moores came here when they purchased this farm. They have two children: a son, J. D. Moore, who is in the grocery business in Rotan, and one daughter, Mrs. Edgar Duncan, who is also in the grocery business in Hamlin. She has five grandchildren. Mrs. Moore is a member of the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna.

Mrs. Moore is well in favor of most of the soil conservation practices being put into effect, and thinks all land should be conserved in every way possible. Mrs. Moore said she had not made any definite plans for the future as yet. Since the death of her husband, her plans have had to be changed and she is just waiting to see at the present

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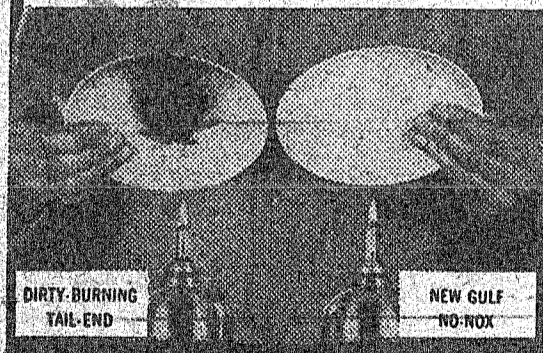
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
