## Football Practice Gets Underway

Coach Joe Van Breeman reports 34 boys have reported for football practice by the middle of the week, and their conditioning period is working out rather well. The boys are having two sessions daily, one at 8:00 a. m. and one at 5:00 p. m. Each session is for a two hour period.

The group of boys will go to Eastland Friday evening for a two-hour scrimmage with the Eastland team and other scrimmages are being planned for next week.

It is too early for the coach to determine what kind of lineup he will have this year. He seems to have plenty of heavy material, but is lacking in speed and at the present time he is unable to say just what else.

The opening game of the year will be on the local field Friday night, September 9, with the Junction Eagles.

## Telephone Cooperative Stakes Lines For New Rural Telephone System

Work started the first of this week staking out some 450 miles of new telephone lines in the south part of the county in preparation for installation of the new dial telephone system that is to be installed in the rural communities surrounding Santa Anna. Eventually it is expected that most of the rural part of Coleman County will be operated with a central system being located here.

Directors of the co-op met in regular session last Thursday to lay plans for gaining more rural applicants and to give the green light for staking the southern part of the county. The new system will be built to serve 900 to 1000 customers outside the Santa Anna area.

Raymond McElrath of Coleman, president of the co-op, said the first class dial service will be set up in the rural areas of the county. Subscribers can dial Santa Anna or other rural areas in the county without charge. Santa Anna subscribers can also call the rural areas without charge. The ultimate plans call for all the rural areas of the county to have a primary toll center in Santa Anna, with free calls from over the county to Santa Anna.

George M. Johnson, manager, said all the rural citizens in the south part of the county who plan to have telephones within the next few years should make application to the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative as soon as possible. After the

lines are staked and construction is started the co-op does not plan to make any changes in their lines, and those who do not make application now might not be able to get telephone service for several years.

When the customer makes application, he will be charged \$50. This money is divided two ways. \$10 is for membership in the organization and \$40 is for an equity in the co-op. Eventually the \$40 will be refunded and the subscriber will continue to hold his equity in the co-op, and if and when the subscriber has his telephone removed, the \$10 will be refunded.

Mr. Johnson requested anyone interested in Telephone service to contact him at the local telephone office for complete details. He said this should be taken care of immediately.

Telephone lines now being staked will run to Trickham, Rockwood, Valera, Fisk, Gouldbusk, Leaday and Voss. The Shields and Whon areas will be served from the Rockwood switchboard.

Directors of the co-op are: President, Raymond McElrath; Coleman; Vice President, R. A. Powell, Fisk; Frank Gillespie, Secretary, Coleman; S. S. Squyres, Gouldbusk; Uless Maness, Rockwood; Emory Brown, Santa Anna; and J. D. Gorman, Novice. George M. Johnson of Santa Anna is the local manager and Jack Covington of Abilene is the engineer.

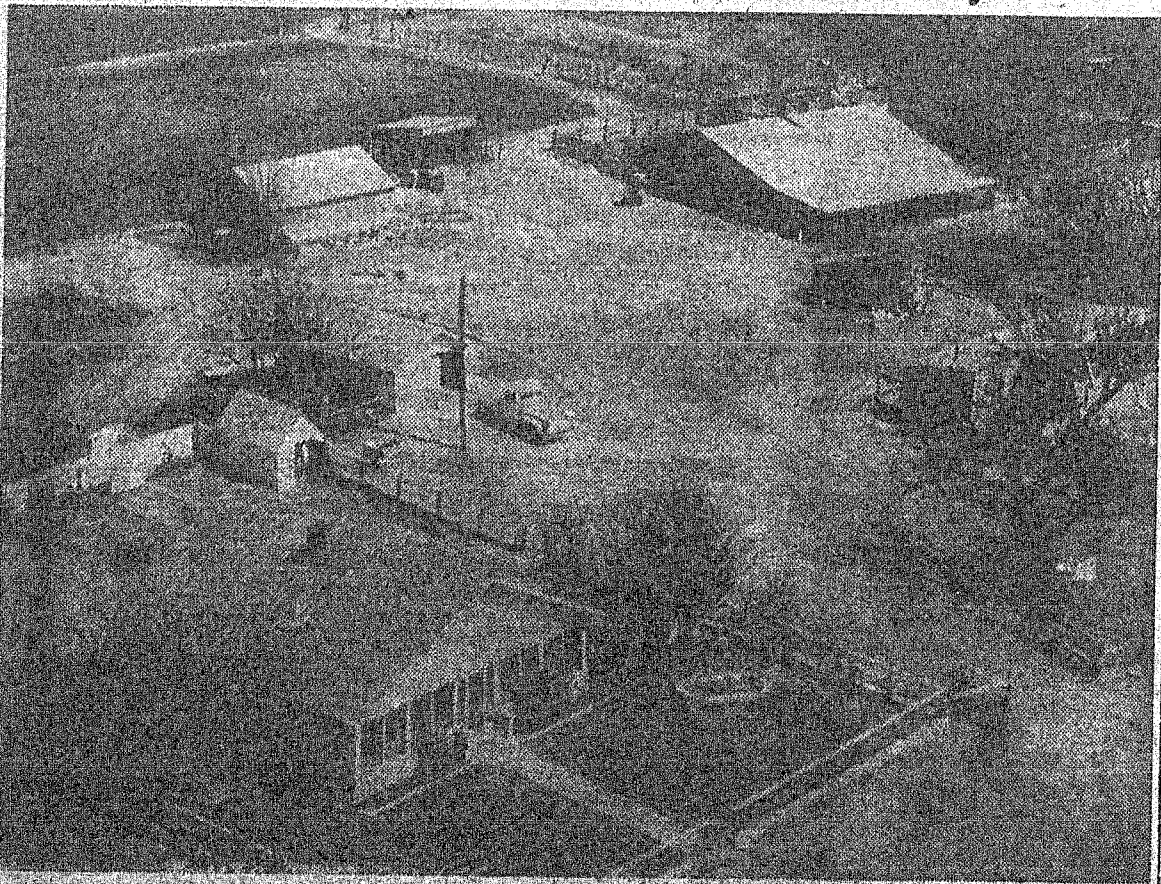
Various committees are working now and as the time draws nearer for the meeting, several more will begin working.

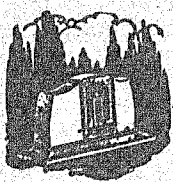
When it came time to leave, this fellow must've felt a pang of conscience. He turned to the host-

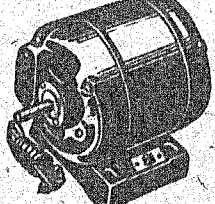

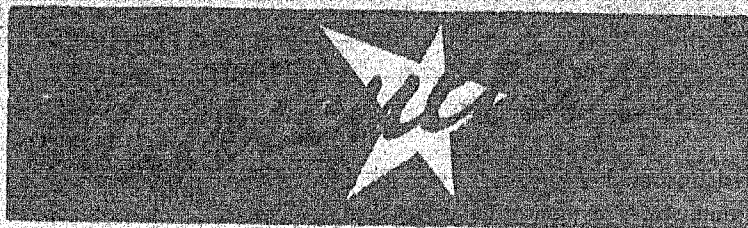

**CUTTING FARM LABOR COSTS**

The need for whittling down labor requirements in livestock production is a problem facing farmers — particularly small ones — today.

Since the start of World War II, farm wages have quadrupled, and the resultant necessity of cutting back labor requirements has been met, in some areas of farming, by mechanization and modernized methods.

However, livestock labor input has been shortened by only seven per cent during this 14-year period, contrasted with a 34 per cent crop labor reduction.

Large livestock producers have managed to keep in many areas with improved, efficient but expensive methods. Unhappily, the small farmer who has relied in the past on a reserve profit from a sideline in dairying, poultry raising, or some other livestock project finds himself in something of a bind over the labor situation.

By the old hand-milking method, it requires an average of 61.7 man-hours to produce \$100 worth of milk. That labor cost can be cut by 20 per cent if milking machines are used.

In hog production, size of the herd makes the big difference in

labor required. That's because a large herd can use automatic feeders and waterers economically, whereas small herds can't. In Texas, labor input per \$100 of pork products amounts to 25 man-hours. And there's quite an investment involved in hog-raising.

Probably more has been done to mechanize the poultry industry in recent years than any other single phase of livestock raising. Production-line broiler raising takes 5 to 15 hours of labor per 100 birds, whereas the less-routinized raising of chickens to the same age for laying flocks take 25 to 35 hours.

Very few of these labor-saving devices are practical unless they can be applied to large numbers because of initial cost. And many small farmers have neither the space required nor the capital for investment in a large number of animals.

Our agricultural researchers are working to find a solution to the problem, for only as a farmer is assured of an income on such assured commodities can he feel safe in continuing his perpetual game of chance with nature; a crop success or failure.

**KEY DATA FOR  
HUNT SEASONS**

Major fall hunting regulations are summarized for ready reference:

**MOURNING DOVES:** North Zone: September 1 — October 15; South Zone: October 15 — November 28, noon to sunset, ten doves per day or in possession.

**WATERFOWL:** Ducks, November 2 — January 15; Geese, November 17 — January 15; one half hour before sunrise to sunset; five ducks per day, ten in possession in the aggregate.

**ANTELOPE:** West of the Pecos, four periods, October 1 through October 10; limit one buck or doe; Panhandle, three periods, October 12 through October 20; limit, one buck antelope; participants to be determined by drawing in early September.

**DEER:** Under General State Law, November 16 — December 31; West of the Pecos, November 20-25; Panhandle, November 19-23. Several special local seasons. Limit varies from two buck deer under General Law to one buck deer in Panhandle and in some other areas with special antlerless seasons in Gillespie, Llano, Mason, and possibly other counties.

**TURKEY:** November 16 — December 31 under General State Law; November 12-21 in Panhandle; Limit three gobblers under General Law; two gobblers in Panhandle. Special dates and limits govern several counties.

**QUAIL:** December 1 — January 16 under General State Law; West of Pecos, month of December on all species except Mearns, which are protected. Limit, twelve quail per day, not more than thirty-six in one week or in possession under General State Law; Panhandle, ten per day and not more than twenty in possession at any one time. Special regulations in several areas and individual counties.

**Fewer Deaths  
Expected On Hiways  
Over Labor Day**

New York — The lowest nationwide traffic fatality estimate for the Labor Day weekend since 1950 was announced here today by the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies.

The Association, which attributed the reduction to the current "Slow Down and Live" traffic safety campaign, estimated that 410 persons will die on the highways during the coming 78 hour holiday weekend.

Specifically, the Association forecast ascribed the 410 expected deaths to these causes: 135 fatalities due to excessive speed; 65 deaths from driving on the wrong side of the road; 42 from reckless driving; 39 from failure to yield the right-of-way; and 29 from falling asleep at the wheel.

The remaining 100 deaths will include 35 pedestrians who attempted to cross the street between intersections, 10 who stepped into the street from behind parked cars and 55 fatalities from miscellaneous actions of drivers and pedestrians.

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

### God In History

Lesson for August 28, 1955

WHAT is it that makes the world move?—the world of men, of events, the wide world of history? What is the most powerful factor in history? Some say geography, some say climate (which is still geography), some say great men, some say ideas, some say the progress of inventions. The religious answer is strikingly different from all these: it is GOD.

The reason why historians seldom mention God (even when they believe in him) is that they limit themselves to what can be seen and heard. True, sometimes historians are concerned with thoughts, as for instance, what were Stalin and Roosevelt and Churchill thinking of at Yalta? But thoughts are facts that scientists all admit; while God is not the kind of fact with which science can deal. So "historical science" as it is called confines itself deliberately to the kind of fact that science describes. Now God—let it be repeated—is not in that class of things at all. He is not a thing, he is not in a class. He works in history, but not in the way a man works, still less like a force such as that of wind or rainfall or volcanic eruptions. God can be seen, but only with "eyes of faith." He can be known, but by no means as simply as your cat be known. God works in history, not separately from events and men, but in men and forces. As Paul says, God is over all, through all and in all.

### King's Intention

According to the Bible, God can work in and by mean of the acts of men who do not know him at all. There is a mystery here which no writer in the Bible undertakes to explain, a mystery which perhaps no human mind is capable of understanding. But the fact is




believed by men of faith. Take for instance the famous king Cyrus, known to history outside the Bible as well as inside it. He was one of the great conquerors and administrators of all time. At a peak of his career he made himself master of what had been the Babylonian Empire. He knew that many a temple had been plundered and destroyed by the Babylonian kings, and he knew that the many displaced persons from all the conquered cities where those temples had been, would be grateful for the restoration of those temples. So King Cyrus, in order to make himself "solid" and popular with this mass of subject peoples, adopted the policy of returning the "gods" of those peoples and authorizing the restoration of their temple worship. It used to be thought that Cyrus was a worshipper of the Jews' God, but archaeologists have discovered the original edict or announcement of Cyrus, explaining what he was doing, and asking that all these gods, whose worship he was restoring, would pray to Marduk, whom Cyrus regarded as the king over all the gods, on Cyrus' behalf. Isaiah says plainly that Cyrus did not know the true God,—but God knew him, and wrought out his purposes through him, ignorant of God though he was.

### People's Devotion

The Bible shows also that God works through the devotion and service of men who do know him. We may doubt whether the proclamation of a Cyrus would have done any good if there had not been men who were eager and ready for just such a chance to return to Jerusalem and restore the worship of the true God. We have had in American history one of the many other illustrations of this same point in the freeing of the slaves. The emancipation proclamation of 1863 was not made altogether from charitable motives. There was a strong political-military purpose in it; the immediate object of the proclamation was not to free the slaves everywhere, but to win the war and restore the union. Later, when slavery was abolished by the Constitution, the freeing of the slaves would have done more harm than good if it had not been for the devotion of men and women of both races who made it their life-work to educate and uplift those who were like sheep without a shepherd. God does work in history; but he needs the service of those who understand his ways and work with him.

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# State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Whether a special session of the legislature is called on school integration apparently hinges on a Texas Supreme Court decision still to come.

Filed by the anti-integration Texas Citizens Council in a district court at Big Spring, the suit seeks to bar payment of state funds to bi-racial schools.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd says the court decision holds the key to whether Texas laws must be changed immediately or already-integrated schools must back-track. Decision by the district court can be carried directly to the Supreme Court and possibly be settled by the time school starts.

Should the court hold payment to integrated schools can be made under existing laws, there apparently would be no urgent need to change them, at least in that regard.

Shepperd said he welcomed the Big Spring suit since it promises to clear up the difficult legal situation.

Gov. Allan Shivers says he will call a special session "if necessary." He apparently was awaiting three developments:

He asked his newly formed citizens' advisory council on school integration to investigate and report to him on several questions, including the need of a special session.

He asked Shepperd to prepare an official ruling on legal questions.

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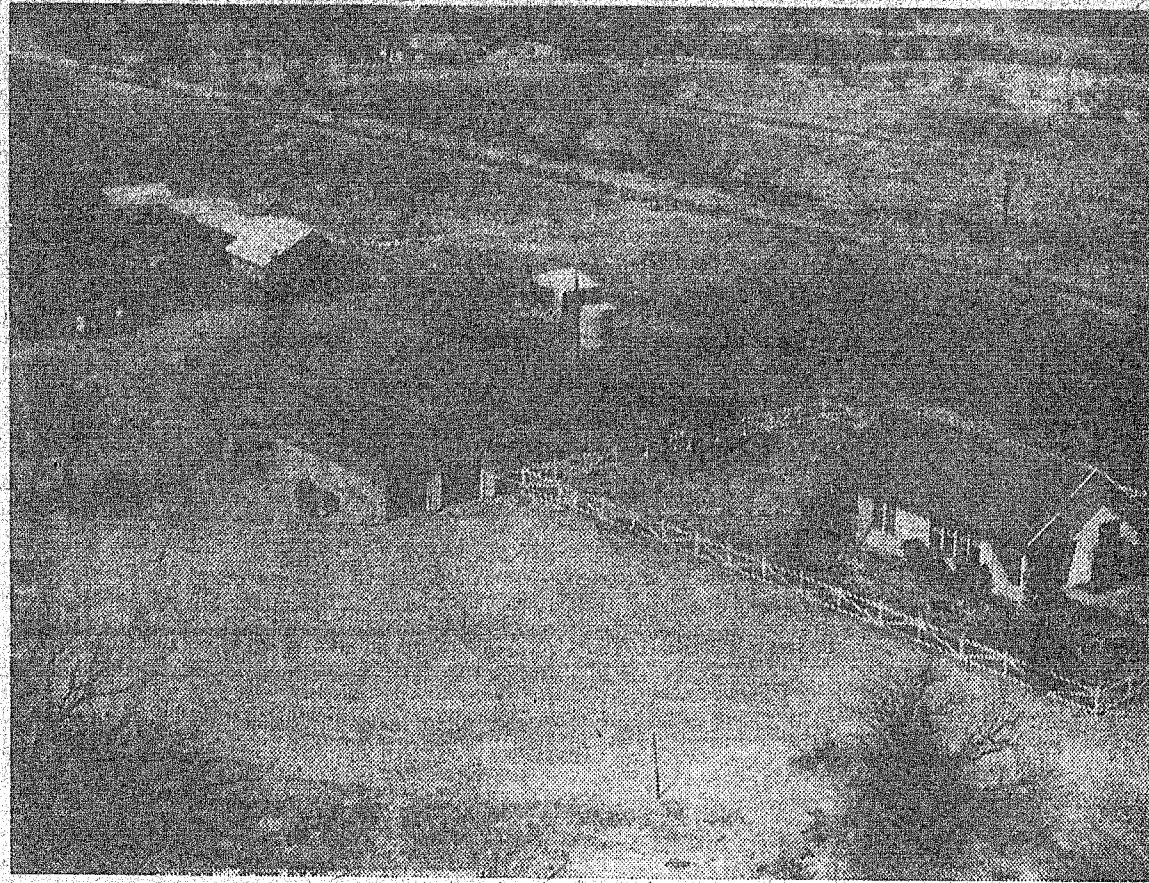
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## THE HOME OF MR. AND MRS. F. B. HILL

## SEED LAWS AIMED AT PROTECTING FARMER

College Station — Read the label or tag which is attached to every sack of planting seed before making a purchase, advises Associate Extension Agronomist Lee C. Coffey. The information carried on the tag is for the protection of the buyer and must list the content of noxious weeds if any.

With the small grain planting season at hand, the specialist offers tips which may aid in keeping your farm free of weed enemies. Among the weeds often found in small grains are cheat or chess, jointed goatgrass, wild morning glory, field bindweed, curled dock, Johnson grass and wild oats.

Once a field is infested with primary noxious weeds, the job of cleaning up may require years and considerable expense. Crop damage results from lower yields

He is also working the Harper farm on Home Creek and at the beginning of the year had both places sowed in small grain. However, he was unable to harvest any grain from either place, but now has some good looking crops. He said if nothing happens to his cotton he will make a bale or more to the acre on some of it and should average well over one-half bale to the acre on all of it. He also said his row crops look much better than they have in a number of years.

and perhaps dockage because of the presence of some weed or from soil made unproductive through the use of chemicals for control.

Coffey says much of the trouble can be avoided by planting certified seed. They are not only pure as to variety but must be free of noxious weeds. Under Texas laws every sack of planting seed sold, whether certified or not, must be tagged or labeled. The tag carries information which should be read. The State Department of Agriculture administers the seed laws of the state and make a diligent effort to protect the buyers of seeds by testing and inspection programs.

Planting seed containing nutgrass or field bindweed cannot be sold in Texas. Neither can seed containing more than 100 dodder, curled dock, blueweed, Canada thistle or Johnson grass seeds per pound of seed. Seed containing more than 100 Johnson grass seeds per pound can be sold if marked — pasture mixture.

Read the tag before you buy, advises Coffey and especially check for noxious weeds in planting seed.

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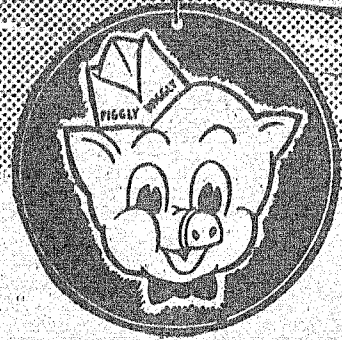
