Labor Day Accident Involves Four Cars, No Injuries

Damage estimated at \$325 to four automobiles was the result of a collision at 12:00 o'clock on Labor Day. So far as is known, this is the only accident in this vicinity during the long weekend.

The collision occurred as Mr. William E. Jones, 60, of Santa Anna, was backing from the curb in front of the Vinson Grocery. He was driving a 1946 Nash, owned by J. H. Brusenhan. James B. Mullins, 31, driving south on Second Street, collided with the Jones car, skidded 22 feet across the street and collided with the 1954 Ford belonging to E. E. Blanton. The Blanton car was skidded four feet into the 1954 Chevrolet belonging to Walker Tatum. The Blanton car and Tatum car were parked against the curb and no one was in them.

Jones' damage was estimated at \$50; Mullins' at \$125; Blanton's at \$100, and Tatum's at \$50. No one was seriously injured in the accident.

The accident was investigated by City Marshal Bud Simmons and charges were filed against Jones for improper starting from a stopped position.

Lots of Good Bargains Offered In Monthly Community Bargain Days

Santa Anna Gets First Bale Of Cotton

J. D. Franklin, who lives right under the hill on the Coleman-Brown County line received the honor of bringing the first bale of 1955 cotton to Santa Anna last week. The bale was ginned on Thursday morning, September 1 and weighed 401 pounds. It was ginned from 1540 pounds of seed cotton, gathered from 5 to 6 acres of land. Mr. Franklin brought in a second bale the following day.

The cotton was graded 15/16 middlin and was sold at auction Wednesday morning to the Santa Anna Coop gin for 40 cents per pound. Market price for the cotton was 32 cents per pound.

Ford Barnes, Chamber of Commerce secretary, made up the annual merchant's premium, which amounted to \$80.00 and Mr. Franklin also received \$100.00 per ton for his cotton seed from the gin. Total premium on the bale amounted to \$140.00 above market price.

The premium list and picture of the cotton will be published next week.

In the elementary school the enrollment increased from a total of 326 at the end of school last semester. Enrollment the first day last year there was 316 students. In the high school enrollment dropped from a total of 142 last year to the present enrollment of 124 students.

Divided into class groups, the enrollment is as follows: 12th grade, 30; 11th grade, 33; 10th grade, 28; 9th grade, 33; 8th grade, 43; 7th grade, 53; 6th grade, 35; 5th grade, 47; 4th grade, 42; 3rd grade, 41; 2nd grade, 36; and 1st grade, 44.

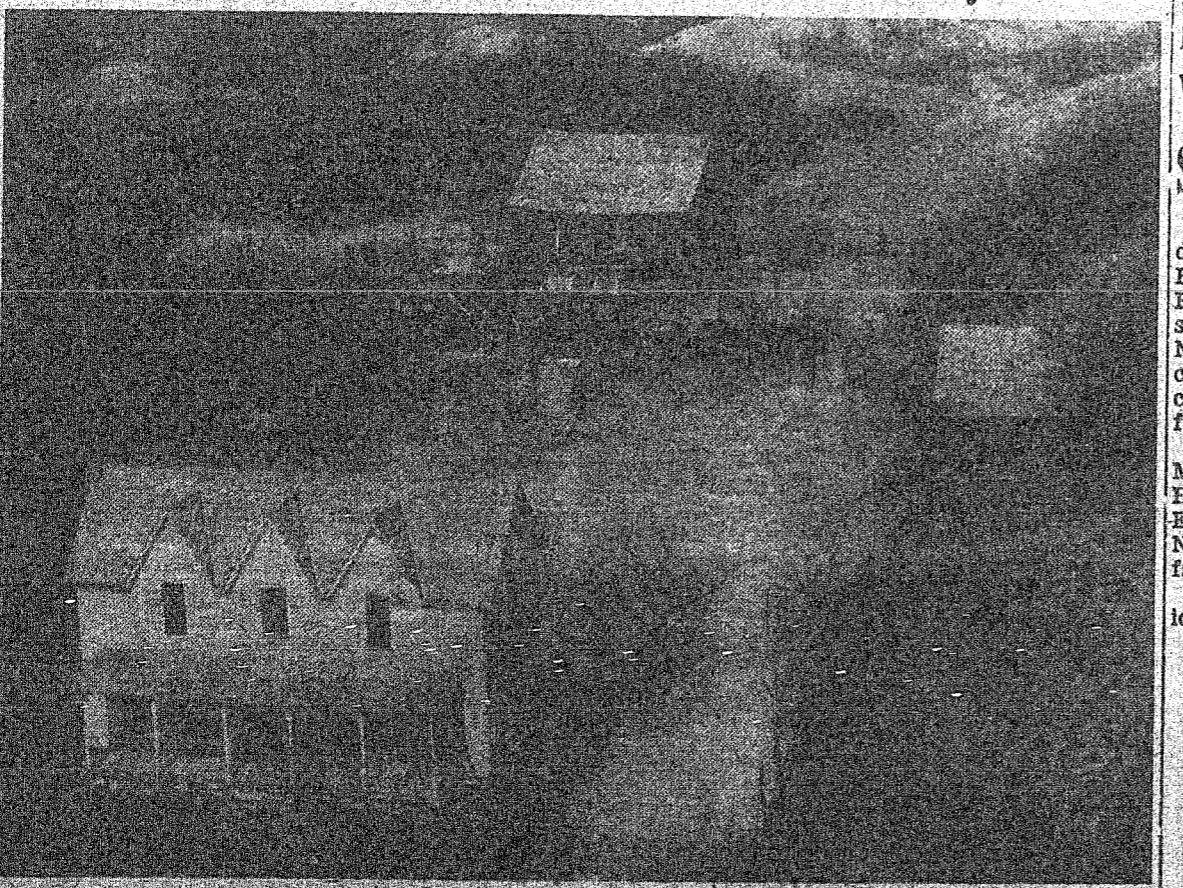

Some Wheat Will Be Discounted 20% On Price Supports

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced on August 12, 1955, a discount of 20 cents per bushel in 1956 price support rates for 23 wheat varieties designated as undesirable because of inferior milling or baking qualities.

The following varieties are the only varieties grown in Texas for which discounts are being made: Red Chief, Red Jacket, Kanking, Chiefkan, Early Blackhull, New Chief, Yogo and Blue Jacket. Early Blackhull is the most common variety grown in Coleman County.

USDA officials state that this change in the wheat price support program for 1956 is designed to encourage production of the more desirable wheat varieties and discourage planting of wheat with inferior milling or baking qualities.

Because the proportion of the wheat crop to be discounted is relatively small, the reduction in price support rates for specified varieties will have only a minor effect in raising the level of individual support rates.

Some Vets May Renew Insurance

Dr. George T. McMahan, Manager of the Veterans Administration Center, Waco, Texas, states that a law approved by the 84th Congress on July 29, 1955, offers an opportunity to some veterans to renew their National Service Life Insurance or United States Government Life Insurance.

If the insurance expired after April 25, 1951, while the veteran was serving on active duty or within 120 days after his release from active duty, the veteran now has an opportunity to replace it. Application by the veteran must be made for replacement within 120 days from date of release from active duty or by November 26, 1955, whichever date is later. Remittance for premium and evidence of good health must accompany the application.

Veterans affected by this new legislation may go to the nearest Veterans Administration Office where they will receive assistance in replacing this insurance.



Reporter-News' Second Annual Soil Conservation Day Set For September 13

Abilene — The second annual Abilene Reporter-News Soil Day will be staged September 13 on the J. P. Howle farm, 8 miles northwest of Abilene in Jones County.

Theme of the day's program and objective of demonstrations will be "soil conditioning."

Experts will discuss the planting and management of cover crops in preventing erosion, building fertility and restoring organic matter in the land. Others will discuss the use of native and introduced grasses and management practices in range improvement.

One of the acknowledged masters of soil conditioning, Clinton Harbers of West Point, Texas, will be the principal speaker.

The South Central Texas farmer who has won recognition on his soil conditioning cropping system will outline the legume growing program that he inaugurated in 1947 that increased the productivity of his land several fold in eight years.

A number of West Texas farmers have already pledged the Soil Conservation Service and the Reporter-News that they will follow the "Harbers Plan" in their 1955-56 farming operations. Abilene farm equipment dealers will assist in the Soil Day event with demonstrations of their tools in the mechanical phases of soil conditioning.

The board of supervisors of the Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation District will have its Harbers conservation tool on hand for demonstration in the planting of a winter legume and fertilizer application.

Among those who will discuss the use of tools, crops and grasses in farmland and rangeland conditioning will be H. C. Stanley, Taylor County agriculture agent; J. B. Harlan, conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service; Hugh Magers, range specialist of the SCS; J. K. Justice, soil specialist and professor in the agriculture department of Abilene Christian College; and Dr. F. M. Churchill, head of the ACC agriculture department and range specialist.

The food and cold drink concession at Soil Day will be in charge of the Taylor County Home Demonstration Council.

Objective of the Reporter-News Soil Day is to stimulate interest among farmers to do a better job of soil and water conservation, soil conditioning and improvement of fertility.

Farmers from all sections of the Southwest are invited to attend Soil Day.

Major General K. L. Berry, internationally famed Texas soldier and veteran in the fight against polio, has been reappointed as the State Chairman for the 1956 March of Dimes in the State of Texas. It was announced today by Basil O'Connor, President of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

"General Berry has provided the leadership vital to continuation of the polio programs of aid to patients, research and education," Mr. O'Connor said. "Under his leadership the Texas March of Dimes reached an all-time high last January. We are indeed grateful that he has agreed to direct the polio appeal for another year."

In accepting his appointment, General Berry said, "The Salk Vaccine represents a major victory in the war against polio." He added, "The battle against polio has been long and hard and will go on for some several years to come. Likewise, the fight of individuals and children personally afflicted with this disease is long and costly, and I will always be interested in entering combat in the fight against this disease as represented by the program of the National Foundation, which is supported by the March of Dimes."

"We will win this contest and in doing so, it is a privilege to serve the people and the youngsters of Texas so that they will not have to bear much longer the ravages of this disease," General Berry said.

General Berry recently flew to Manila to receive the Philippine Legion of Honor. He commanded the First Division of the Philippine Army in the defense of the islands in 1941-42. Imprisoned by the Japanese for 40 months after the fall of Bataan, General Berry retired from active service in 1947 and has since served as Texas Adjutant General and Commander of the Texas National Guard. He holds numerous decorations for military valor and leadership.

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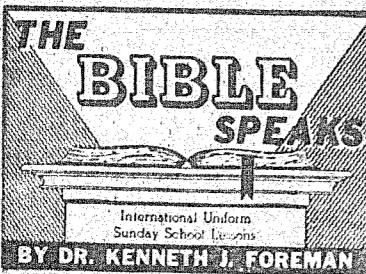

Executive Task

Lesson for September 11, 1955

THE city of Jerusalem was a slum. There is no other good word for it. The people, poor and few and scared, were existing in the midst of rubble. Today in Korea the cardboard shacks are coming down, more permanent houses are being built; but in Jerusalem there was no rebuilding. Everything was left just as it was after the war. How long had that been? One hundred and forty-one years! Four generations — as far back from Nehemiah's time as 1814 is from us. Suppose the city of Washington had never been rebuilt, since the British burned it in the "war of 1812"? Nehemiah was amazed and shocked when he heard about it. Like all prosperous Jews who lived in Persia, he had supposed everything was all right back in the motherland. When they told him how things actually were, he first cried; but then he acted.

Competition
Nehemiah, armed with a royal commission — for Palestine was now a part of the great Persian Empire — turned out to be one of the most remarkable executives in history. He went to Jerusalem as governor; but he saw it was no real city. In those days you could no more have a city without a wall around it than you can have a city today without paved streets, or telephones. The wall was an absolute number one Must. No doubt previous governors had seen as much; but they had done nothing about it. Nehemiah at once went to work on this problem. In 52 days the wall was completed; 52 days to do what for 93 years (since the first "Return") every one else in charge of Jerusalem had failed to do. How did Nehemiah succeed where so many oth-

ers had failed—or not even tried? The answer, in one sentence, is: Nehemiah was the kind of executive who can make hindrances and handicaps work for him instead of against him. One of the handicaps obviously was the many jealous divisions among the people. The class-spirit can be shown just as easily in a group of castaways on a desert island, as it can in New York. Nehemiah knew all about this; and he organized his wall-builders by groups according to their occupation. The goldsmiths built here, and the priests built there, and so on. No group wanted to be outdone by any other group, so they all pushed on till it was done. It takes healthy competition to bring out what people can really do.

Fear Can Be Useful

Perhaps the big reason why the wall had never been built was that the people, ill-equipped and leaderless, knew that their watchful enemies would not want Jerusalem to rise again. They were afraid of "reprisals" or raids from one place or another, if they really set to work to build a real city again. Now Nehemiah did not wait till they got over being scared. They never would. So he (so to speak) tied that scare to their coat-tails, like a pack of fire-crackers. He ordered the citizens, as far as it was practical, to build the part of the wall nearest to where they lived. Every man and woman (yes, there were women) working on the wall would think: If this section of wall goes down, my own home will be the first one pillaged! So of course these scared people worked like mad, each one determined that if the wall gave way anywhere, it wouldn't be near his house.

Putting Human Nature To Work

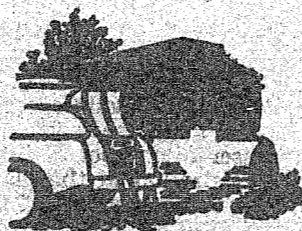
All that business about the spears, and other army equipment—ordering half the people to stand by in battle dress while the rest worked on the wall—may have scared off the enemy raiders; but it did something else: It got the wall built in an amazingly short time. Just the sight of those spears would put everybody into high gear. They wanted to finish that wall before the battle started. It never started; but Nehemiah's dramatic mobilization kept those amateur wall-builders going from dawn till dark. So Nehemiah showed in his time what the best executives have always shown: the skill to use human nature as it is, on the hoof. Executives—governors, presidents, heads of corporations, bishops—could doubtless get better results with better people.

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State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Many Texas public schools are holding integration plans in abeyance pending action by the State Supreme Court. But there is no indication the high court will rush to consider the Big Spring test case ahead of its normal schedule.

District court there ruled invalid that part of Texas law which requires public schools to be segregated. Appeal is being made by the Texas Citizens Council in an effort to prevent payment of state money to non-segregated schools.

Both sides had expressed hope for an early decision before the Supreme Court's October term.

Meanwhile, towns such as Waco and Laredo, which had planned to begin desegregation this fall, backed off rather than take a "legal risk." Others, like San Antonio, decided to go ahead, but reserved the right to review the policy in the light of new state-level decisions.

Charter Request Studied
Application of the anti-integration Texas Citizens Council for a state charter bumped into a delay in the Secretary of State's office.

Sec. of State A. M. Muldrow, questioned whether the council's organization is for a "lawful purpose" in view of the Supreme Court decision outlawing segregation.

Muldrow said he might ask the attorney general's department for a ruling.

White Distrusts Red Visitors
State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White took a dim view of the visiting Russian farm delegation.

Farming methods are America's greatest strength, White said, but Russia's weakest. "We might as well sell them guns," he declared.

In Washington officials were undecided whether the Texans who sold some 65 head of Santa Gertrudis cattle to the visitors would be allowed to export them to Russia.

Touring Soviets expressed a desire to buy farm machinery seen in other parts of the country, but the Texas cattle deal was the only actual purchase. At present there is only a trickle of trade between the two countries.

State, Commerce and Foreign Agriculture officials pondered the decision, suggested that public opinion would be a strong factor.

Record Employment Expected
Harvest and reopening of schools are expected to bring Texas new employment records during September.

Public school cafeteria workers will add thousands to the payrolls, said the Texas Employment Commission. A continued rise is forecast through the fall.

A new high in the average paycheck was hit in July, according to TEC. Holiday overtime plus wage increases brought the boost.

Druggists Receive Vaccine
Texas druggists are having their first experience in dispensing Salk polio vaccine.

State Health Department officials reported 50,000 doses sent to Texas last week by Wyeth Laboratories of Pennsylvania. Of these, 42,000 go to drug stores,

8,000 to the Health Department for public agencies.

Some stores had already received vaccine; others were still awaiting their shipments.

Patients have been asked to contact their doctors who will buy through the retail outlets.

Texas free immunization program for first and second grade school children is expected to be completed by Oct. 1. Eli Lilly Company of Indiana sent 144,000 more shots to Texas for that purpose.

Health Department statistics showed polio coming to its seasonal slackening-off period. Only 80 new cases were reported last week, compared to 98 the week before. Total for the year is now 1195.

Business Peak Passed
Texas business expansion has apparently passed a peak, but no severe decline is expected.

Crest of the current rise was in March, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. In July the business index dropped two per cent from June.

Three factors, the UT economists believe, bar the possibility of a major recession. They are population growth, the rising standard of living and the high proportion of new investment being made in Texas.

Retail sales, already at record levels, are expected to soar further, making this the largest sales year.

Building boomed also, with a January-July total almost one-third greater than for 1954. A two per cent drop in construction during July was considered "seasonal."

Parr Trial Postponed
Trial site of George Parr on charges of income tax evasion awaits action by the US Supreme Court.

South Texas Political Boss Parr last week won an indefinite postponement of the case scheduled to begin Sept. 6 in federal district court in Austin.

Contending that he would receive a fairer trial in Laredo than in Austin, Parr seeks to have the case moved to the southern federal district. He was originally indicted in Houston on charges of failing to pay some \$85,000 in income taxes. This indictment was dismissed and an identical one entered in Austin.

Appealed by Parr, the change was upheld by Circuit Court in New Orleans. A continuance was granted in Austin when Parr's attorneys filed in the Supreme Court.

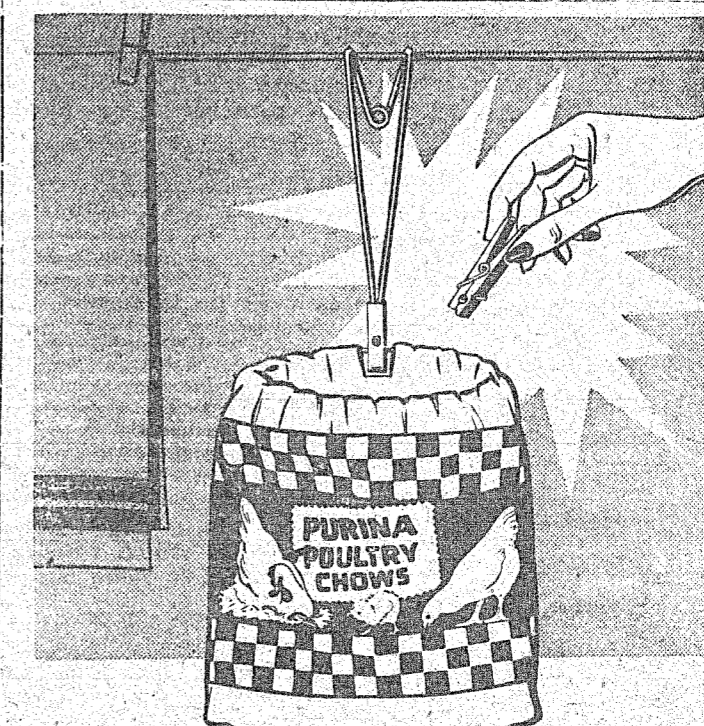

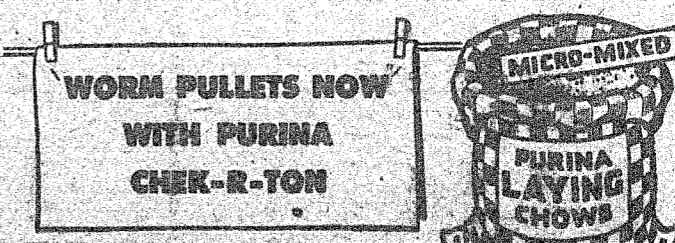

BLUEJACKET ADDED TO UNDESIRABLE WHEAT VARIETY LIST

College Station — Because of its inferior milling or baking qualities, bluejacket wheat has been added by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to the previously announced list of undesirable wheat varieties. This brings to 24 the varieties designated for a 20-cents-per-bushel discount in 1956 wheat price support rates.

The USDA announcement said the variety was added to the list as a result of strong recommendations from state agricultural leaders. It is the Hard Red Winter Class and is grown in Texas and 12 other states.

The 20-cent-per-bushel discount is designed to discourage the planting of 24 varieties, and

thus lessen the possibility of U. S. wheat of inferior quality finding its way into domestic and export channels. The 24 varieties listed as undesirable accounted for an estimated 45 million bushels of 1954 production or about 5 percent of the 1954 acreage.

USDA officials said that because of the nearness of the planting season for winter wheat, no further additions will be made to the list.

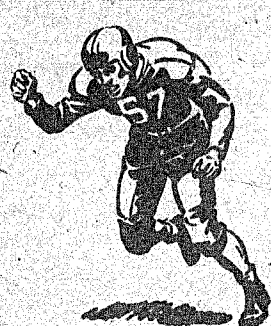
