## Bangs Game Changed To Thursday Night

Officials of the Santa Anna High School received a request from the Bangs High School last week to change the date of the Santa Anna-Bangs Football game to Thursday night of this week, because of a circus that is appearing in Brownwood on Friday night. After giving the change careful consideration, it was decided it would be best for all concerned to make the change. Thus, the Santa Anna-Bangs Football Game will be played at the Dragon Stadium on Thursday night, October 6, at 8:00 p. m. All Mountaineer boosters are urged to attend the game and urge the Mountaineers on.

The Rising Star Wildcats took good advantage of two Santa Anna fumbles Friday night and beat the Mountaineers by a 12-7 count. Rising Star made 10 first downs during the evening while Santa Anna made 9.

The Mountaineers fumbled a Rising Star punt on their 36 yard line and the Wildcats recovered it in the second quarter. Robert Needham, Wildcat halfback carried the last 17 yards for the first score shortly after. Try for the extra point was missed.

The Mountaineers took the kickoff on their 38 yard line and 10 plays later Hilary Rutherford went the last three yards for the Mountaineer touchdown. Eugene White passed to Donnie Clifton for the extra point and the local boys led 7-6 at the half.

During the third period the Wildcats recovered a Santa Anna fumble on the Mountaineer 32 yard line and three plays later Howard Walker went the last nine yards for the TD.

As in previous games, the local boys just never could get their offense to clicking. Their defense seemed to work fairly well through most of the game.

**CONFERENCE BEGINS**  
Most of the teams in the district will begin their conference play on Friday night of this week. The first conference game for the Mountaineers will be with the Bangs Dragons Thursday night at 8:00 p. m. on the Bangs field.

Thus far in the season Bangs has won three games and lost one. They won over Eden by a

25-18 score, lost to Sonora 31-59, won over Baird 7-0, and last week they won over Richland Springs 14-0. Bangs has scored 77 points this season against 77 for their opponents. The Mountaineers have scored 20 points through the season to their opponents 102 points.

**DISTRICT GAMES**  
Llano and Burnet won games over the past weekend and Goldthwaite lost their third game in four starts. The top team in the district, Mason, rested over the weekend. Goldthwaite lost to Grambury by a 32-7 score; Burnet won over San Saba by a 13-6 count and Llano took a 50-0 win from Rochelle. Bangs won over Richland Springs and Santa Anna lost to Rising Star.

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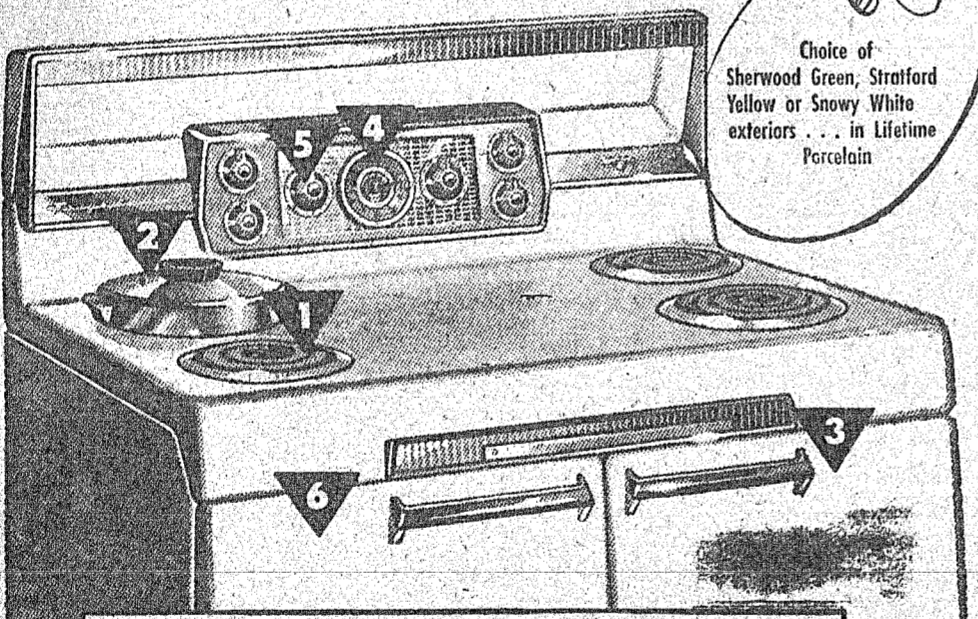
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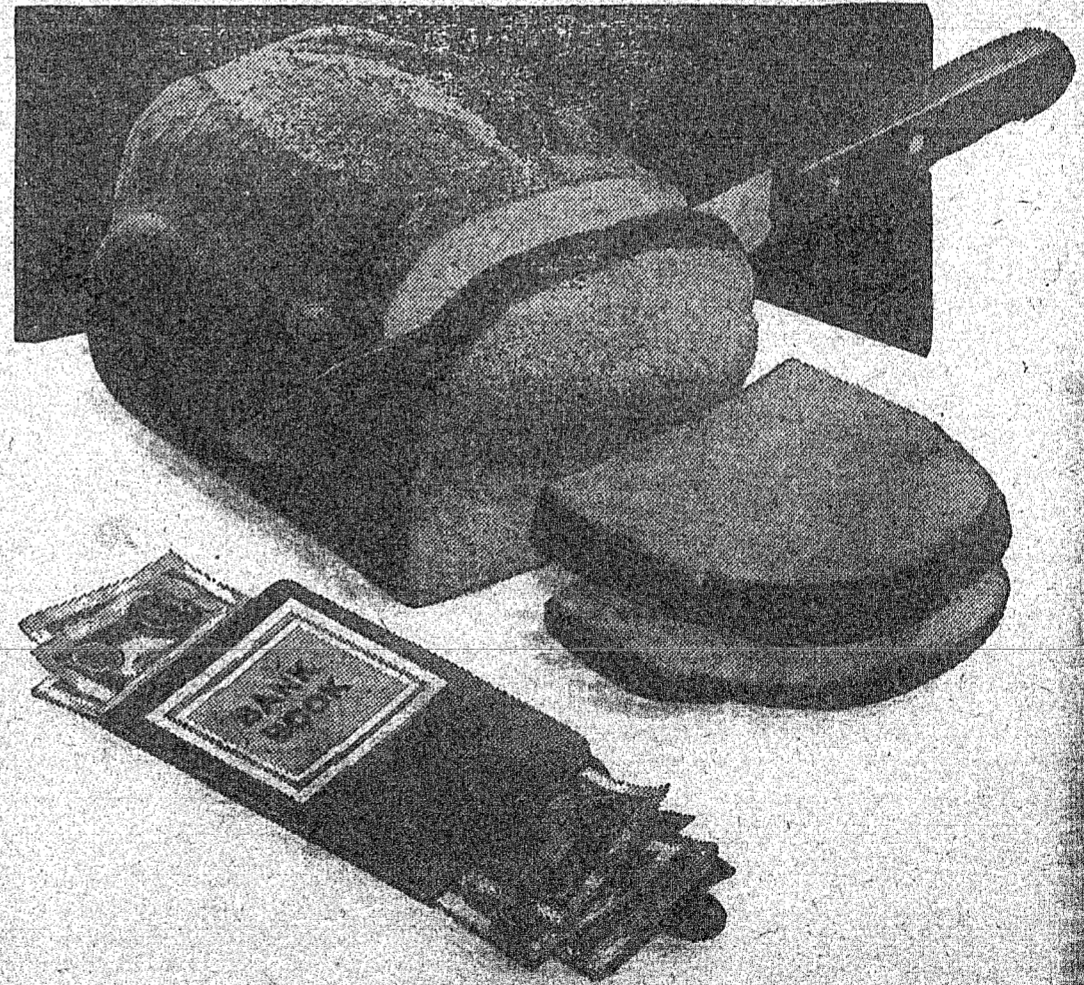
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### Central Colorado Soil Conservation District News

Many cooperators of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District plan to plant winter legumes for soil improvement and protection from winter erosion. Local seed dealers report that legume seed sales have reached 10,000 pounds with a continued steady demand.

Legumes are valuable in increasing crop production and in improving soil condition. They accomplish this desirable double purpose, in combination with the work of associated soil bacteria, by taking nitrogen from the air and fixing it in the soil. The ability of legumes to do this can be increased many times by inoculating the seed with the proper bacteria before planting. Legumes and grasses improve soil condition by increasing the organic content of the soil and by their deep fibrous root system which penetrate plow-pans providing millions of small channels for moisture penetration and storage. Organic matter is increased by the abundant growth attained and returned to the soil

and by the mass of roots produced. Soils high in organic are able to take up and store more moisture per foot of soil depth.

The type of farming operation may determine the kind of legume used and the method of planting. For the crop farmer, vetch or winter peas planted in rows may be used or vetch or winter peas broadcasted with oats or rye. Madrid sweetclover planted in rows and used in a crop rotation will also fit this farm operation. Madrid sweetclover is a biennial which produces roots and leaves in the first year and flowers and seed the second.

Vetch or winter peas planted with oats or rye will fit the grain farmers operations.

Cover crops adapted for this area for livestock farming are Madrid sweetclover and blue panic grass, planted in rows. Madrid sweetclover may be planted on a smooth firm bed in the fall or early spring. Plant three pounds per acre in regular width rows at a depth of 1/2 inch. Proper stocking on this plant will enable it to furnish excellent grazing from about May 15 through December. Blue panic grass, though not a legume, is excellent for soil improvement and furnishes abundant high

protein grazing. Plant blue panic grass in April on a well prepared seed bed at the rate of one and one-half pounds per acre at depth of 1/4 to 1/2 inch. This grass is especially valuable to ranchers in that it furnishes abundant summer and fall grazing which permits the rancher to defer his range during the summer months when grasses are reseedling and improving in vigor. Surplus range forage may be utilized during the winter thereby cutting down on feed bills. Blue panic is a perennial grass and therefore when well established requires cultivation only in the spring and early summer each year to control weeds and other competition.

Hayden and Herman Mercer of Talpa have purchased 2000 pounds of winter peas for planting this fall. H. D. Cary of White Chapel has purchased 2500 pounds of winter peas.

Joe Hudson and Oliver Calk of Novice have already planted hairy vetch.

Milton Coker, north of Coleman; Bailey Whittington, Glen Cove; Elgean Harris, Santa Anna; and Lee Abernathy of Whon have preparations made to plant vetch.

C. F. Sappington of Glen Cove and Hubert Hamon of Goldsboro plan to plant about 100 acres of winter peas. H. A. Hagler of Santa Anna plans to plant several acres of winter peas. Roy Blackwell of Rockwood plans to plant 100 acres of winter peas to be followed in the spring by blue panic grass. This practice is expected to give the blue panic a faster more abundant growth during the first year of growth.

Local dealers report sales of winter peas and vetch seed totaling 10,000 pounds or more. The demand is steady. Seed dealers throughout the District are well stocked on winter pea, vetch and clover seed.

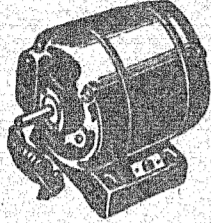

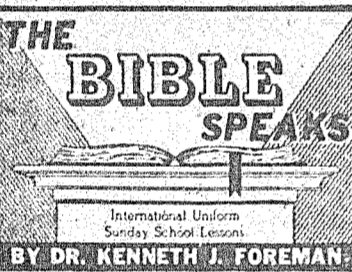

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons  
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Luke 2:41-52  
Devotional Reading: 1 Timothy 4:12-16

**Jesus Is Real**

Lesson for October 9, 1955

IT IS hard to say what is the most important doctrine of the Christian religion. Probably you would get more votes for the doctrine we call the Incarnation than for any other; because so many other doctrines hinge on this one. If you do not believe in the Incarnation you haven't much left of the Atonement, and (if you really face it) you have lost what is most valuable in your doctrine of God. Be that as it may, if you asked for a vote among people who have given this some serious thought, as to what is the most distinctive Christian doctrine, you would have a practically unanimous answer: The Incarnation. This is expressed in various ways both in the Bible and in Christian theology. About the simplest way of putting it in Bible language is that "God was in Christ" (11 Corinthians 5:19). The simplest way of putting it in theological language may be that Christ was both human and divine.

**Jesus Was a Real Person**  
You wouldn't think it necessary to hammer on the point that Jesus was a real person, that is to say that he really was, and didn't just seem to be, a child and a boy and a grown man. Yet the church has often had to call a halt to men and movements that explained away the real humanity of Jesus till there was really nothing left of it. The great church council held at Chalcedon (the Evanston of that era) in 451 A. D. found it necessary to say—in their own way of course—that Christ is as much divine as God is divine, and as much human as you and I are human. For some strange reason, however, the reality of Jesus as a human person is forgotten or denied by men. Again and again we have to be

brought up with a start by the gospel story, the story of a real man. Like all real men, Jesus grew from a real boy. The modern interest in childhood and the realization that "the child is father of the man."

**The Child Grew**  
Legends, tales without foundation, have made the boy Jesus into a smaller-sized adult. According to some of these legends, when Jesus went to school, the very first day, he not only knew the alphabet already but he delivered a philosophical discourse that astonished the teacher. Luke does not give us any such picture of an already-grown mind in a tiny body. He gives us a glimpse of a real child really growing. At first he grew without trying, of course, as every one does. What he ate and drank made him taller and stronger. He learned the Aramaic language, spoken in his village and in his family, just as children learn their mother-tongue everywhere in the world, just by hearing it and trying to speak it, till it becomes as natural as breathing. His mind grew by what was put into it, because it was a really human mind. Dolls are all the same no matter what goes on around them; human beings on the contrary grow or shrink, depending on their surroundings. It is not too much to say that if (for instance) Jesus' mother Mary had been a different kind of person, he would have been different too. To think otherwise is to fancy Jesus a kind of doll.

**The Boy Moved Forward**  
As has been often noted, Luke uses a different word for Jesus after his twelfth year. Before that, he "grew,"—the same word used for flowers and buildings, elsewhere in the Bible. After that, he "increased"—and the word always implies will, effort. Up to a certain age a child can't help growing; he doesn't even give it a thought. But after a certain age, not the same in every one to be sure, if a person grows he has to put his mind on it; and he can choose the direction in which he will grow. Jesus could choose his friends; he could do what he would with his spare time. He grew by his work in the carpenter shop, we may be certain; but what about the hours when he was not working? When Jesus was fully grown, we know how familiar he was with the Scriptures. We know how well he understood people. Could he have achieved any of this without trying, without growing?
