## Rites For J. F. Goen Held Friday A. M.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church at 10:30 a. m., on October 14th, for John Franklin Goen, more familiarly known to his friends as Frank.

He had died of a heart attack at his home before 1:00 a. m. on October 12th. He had been in failing health for several months and a hospital patient a good part of the time.

Services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. G. Purvis.

Mr. Goen was born May 25th, 1886, at Baird, Texas, being 69 years, 4 months and 17 days old at the time of death.

He was married to Lenora Lafferty on October 21, 1906, in McCullough County. They moved to Coleman County in 1918, living for a time on the Turner Ranch and later moving into Santa Anna, where he was an employee of the Santa Fe Railroad until his retirement a few years ago.

Mr. Goen had been a member of the Baptist Church since boyhood and of the W. O. W. since he was 18 years old.

He is survived by the wife of Santa Anna, two sons, Johnnie E. Goen of Downey, Calif., and Jesse Goen of Austin. Also surviving are 6 granddaughters and 3 great granddaughters.

Mr. Goen was an only child, but he is survived by other relatives and many friends.

Pallbearers were: Clifford Stephenson, Emzy Brown, Ford Barnes, Seybold Rowe, Lester Newman and Virgil Newman. All of these except Stephenson were selected from the Brotherhood Class of the church, of which the deceased was a member.

### Mountaineers Continue On Bottom Of List

The Mountaineers lost their second conference game Friday night, 6-29, to the Goldthwaite Eagles before a Homecoming crowd of approximately 1000 persons. It was a perfect night for football and the crowd was really rooting for the Mountaineers to win the game.

During the first quarter the Mountaineers looked good and looked like they might be going to put the game on ice for the local fans. Late in the period Ray Haynes went over the goal line from four yards out to score the only Mountaineer score, after the local lads had recovered an Eagle fumble on the Mountaineer eight yard line.

To begin the quarter, Santa Anna kicked to the Eagles and on the 4th play from scrimmage, the Mountaineers recovered an Eagle fumble on their 48 yard line. They worked the ball down to the 21 yard line and fumbled and the Eagles recovered, ran three plays and kicked to the Eagle 48 yard line. The Mountaineers worked their way down the field to the six-yard line, where the Eagles held for downs. On the next play the Eagles lost five yards, then attempted another play and fumbled on the eight yard line where the Mountaineers recovered. In two plays the Mountaineers scored.

Mid-way in the second period the Eagles had worked their way down to the two yard line, where the Mountaineers held for downs and took the ball. Attempting to kick out of the hole, Gilbert got a bad pass from center and the ball went out of the red zone for an automatic safety and two points for the Eagles. It was their game from then on, as the Eagles run, passed and recovered fumbles throughout the remainder of the game.

The Eagles scored 8 points in the second period, seven in the third and 13 in the fourth period to completely dominate the game.

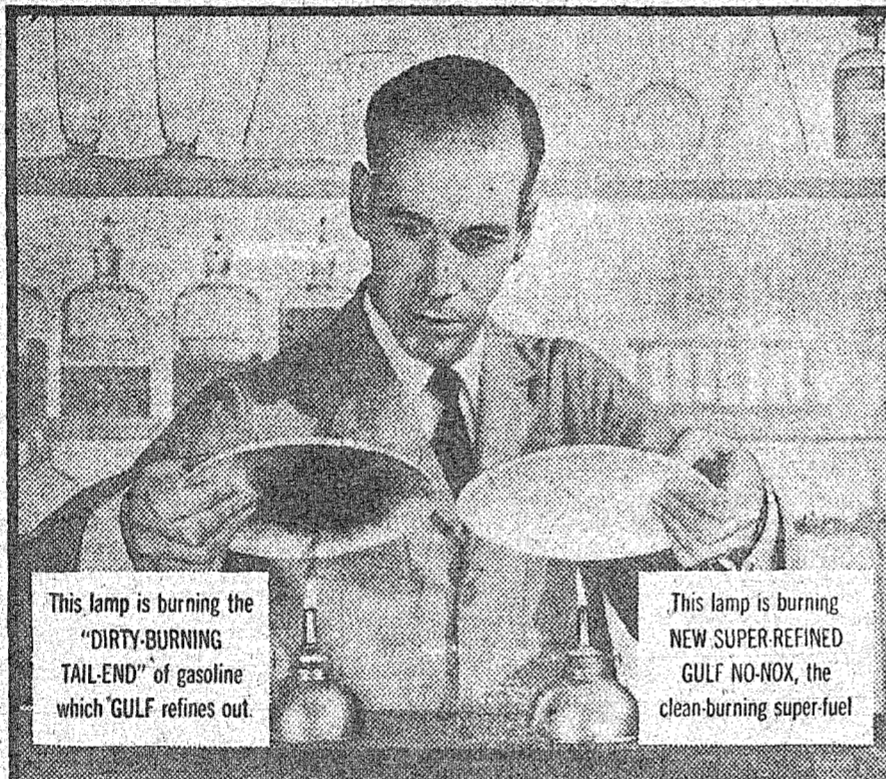

# Pierre Rowe Owns Mystery Farm No. 27

Mystery Farm No. 27, as appeared in The Santa Anna News last week, belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Pierre Rowe, and is located 3 1/2 miles northeast of Santa Anna on the Buffalo road. The Rowe's purchased the farm from the George Evans Estate in 1944 and moved on the place in 1945.

They completely remodeled the house that was built in 1929, putting in all the modern conveniences, built a garage, concrete cellar, walks, yard fence and all the out buildings. The Rowe's also built two large stock tanks on the farm and put running water, natural gas and electricity in the house.

Mr. Rowe said he did not know when the farm was settled, but the Evans' purchased the place in 1904 and he put most of the land in cultivation.

Principally a small grain farmer, Mr. Rowe had 110 acres in small grain this year and has 31 acres in cotton. He said he did not know how to estimate how much cotton he would make, as it was rather spotted and might make a bale to two or three acres in some places and it might take 10 or more acres to make a bale in other places. He expects to have most of his cotton harvested during the next few days.

Asked what his favorite crop and livestock were, Mr. Rowe said small grain and Hereford cattle. He usually runs about 25 Hereford cows and creep feeds the calves until they are taken off the cows and sold. He said his cattle were the only thing he made any money off of since 1949 and it was his opinion that in the very near future all farmers were going to have to depend more on livestock and less on cultivated crops for their livelihood.

Santa Anna Co-op Gin, and along with this and his farming business he says he just doesn't have time for hobbies.

He was married to Mrs. Nora Wood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Wood, deceased, in 1920, at the Wood home southwest of Santa Anna. Mr. Rowe is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Rowe.

The Rowe's have one son, Wyndell, who is employed with a large food manufacturing concern, and lives with his family in San Mateo, California. The Rowe's have two grandchildren, Denny, age 11, and Cindy, age 5. They also helped raise a niece, Frances Brusenhan, who married recently and lives in San Francisco, California.

Texas Cotton Ginners Association.

Mr. Rowe said he had never used any fertilizers on his land and was not using any feed supplements now. He said he had given some thought to using fertilizer and might try it sometime in the future.

### ANOTHER FIRST

Another "first" comes to Rockwood; for the first time in some 67 years there is no cotton gin operating in Rockwood this fall. There is a gin owned by Mr. Charles Ing, but isn't in operation. Rockwood is harvesting one of the biggest cotton crops in several years — barring storms.

Most farmers have poisoned their cotton 5 or 6 times, but are making a half bale to the acre or better.

As Mr. Bob Steward, who worked around gins for so many years, recalls the first gin in Rockwood was owned by W. L. Wainwright and was put up about 1888. It was a one-stand gin; cotton was ginned out onto the floor and men picked it up, by hand, and crammed it into the press. They used cottonseed and river driftwood for fuel.

This gin was moved to Waldrip about '92 and Shields and Byrd came in and put up a 2-stand steam gin. Cotton was still ginned out on the floor and was put in the press by hand but packed by a steam packer — not stomped with the feet.

Shields and Byrd sold to Baird Brothers of Coleman who operated to 1903. At that time Mr. Bob Steward, Dr. Newsom, J. B. Harrison, and M. R. Cheatham bought the gin and operated it for about 3 years. Mr. Steward became sole owner and was a ginner for some 31 years more before selling to the Co-op.

For about a year cotton and seed were hauled to the railroad at Winchell over the rough road through Hull Pocket, with wagons and teams.

At one time about '31 and '32, two gins were in operation in Rockwood. Four gins were burned during our gin history of 67 years.

From 1-stand gin it grew to a 6-stand, 70 saw gin operated on Diesel fuel. The one used last year was operated on gas.

Rockwood citizens are hoping for good rains and crops and a return of prosperity and the biggest of gins.

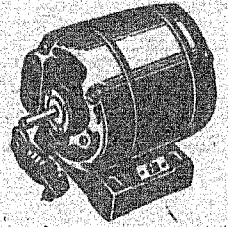

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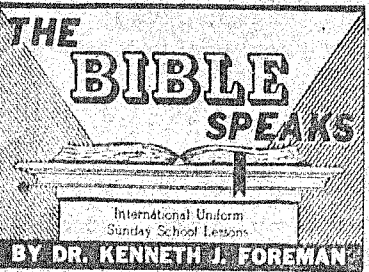
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Devotional Reading: Hebrews 4:12-16

### How to Win

Lesson for October 23, 1955

NOBODY can be tempted to do what he can't do. Nobody can be tempted to do what he doesn't want to do. Of course somebody can say to you, "Do this," but if you can't or don't want to do it, the words are only words in your ear, they are no temptation, and you can't be said to have "resisted" what did not appeal to you at all. Furthermore, nearly always temptation means the pull of desire, not for something evil in itself but only a good out of place, or a lesser good in place of a possible greater. If a child takes the money he was going to put into Sunday school and spends it for candy on Saturday night, that does not mean that candy is bad in itself, or that eating it is a sin. But the child is tempted to a lesser good when a greater good was possible.



### Questions About Temptation

The higher in the scale of life you go, the more this is true. Persons who live on a low level may easily be tempted to gross sins, because they don't have any strong desire for good, or to do good. Persons who live on a high level are much more likely to be tempted with good than with evil, for they habitually desire good. The temptation consists in seeing the lesser good so clearly that one forgets to look around and see the greater good. Now the temptations of Jesus were of this sort. There is no evidence that he ever felt an urge or even a slight inclination to do what is wrong in itself. There is evidence that he was tempted to do some good things that were not the best things. Take Luke's story of the temptations in the wilderness: One was to turn stones into bread—surely no sin! In a hungry world, to produce more bread

would be a good thing. Another temptation was to get control of the kingdoms of the world. Was that not what he came to do? Or the third temptation again,—to trust in the protecting care of God: who would call that a sin? Yet each of these, under the circumstances and conditions, was not the right thing for Jesus, because not the best thing; and so he knew all these for what they were—temptations of Satan. We can ask many questions about temptation: where it comes from, what kind of persons are tempted, how to recognize it, and so on. But the question most of us want to know is, How can I win?

### How to Lose

There are two sure ways of losing the fight against temptation, whether in its lower or its higher forms. One is by sheer resistance, just saying No. If your temptation is liquor, for instance, it won't do you a particle of good to stand in front of a tavern door or to sit in a chair with a glass in your hand, just shutting your eyes and shaking your head and saying "No, I won't." Because, before long, you will. Mere stubbornness will go a long way; but not even Jesus tried to meet temptation with a simple empty No. Another way to lose your fight is to debate the question. In the vivid story of the first temptation (see Genesis 3) the serpent just gets Eve's mind to thinking about how fine that fruit was.

### The Sword of Spirit

Every Bible reader knows how Jesus won his victory over temptations; by using the "sword of the Spirit," the Word of God. But there is a right and a wrong way to use a sword. There are two ways of using the Bible as a defense against Satan. One of these ways works, the other does not. It will not do simply to quote the Bible. The Bible is not a sort of magic wand which you just wave in Satan's face will make him go away. Just repeating Bible verses is not enough. The only Scripture which is any good in temptation's struggles is Scripture which you have first "hid in your heart," that is to say committed to memory, and what is more important, Scripture which has become part of you. It is not quite enough to say, "God says —" Take the next step: "God says—and I believe it." You've got to make God's word your own, not just with the top of your mind but down to the bottom of your heart. So believed, the Word becomes life invincible.

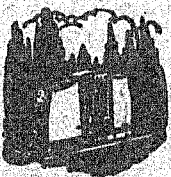

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**State Capital NEWS**

Austin — Texas public schools will get state aid this year whether integrated or segregated.

Right of both to state aid was upheld last week by the Texas Supreme Court. It says the U. S. Supreme Court decision overturns Texas' school segregation laws but does not force immediate integration.

Apparently the court action removed need for a special session of the legislature.

Litigation originated in Big Spring. Suit was brought by the Texas Citizens Council in district court to prevent payment of state funds to mixed schools. High court judges, in effect, upheld District Judge N. Sullivan's ruling that portions of state law requiring segregation are unconstitutional.

Gov. Allan Shivers was quick to point out that neither the state nor U. S. courts set a deadline for desegregation, but both leave it to local school authorities.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepherd, who had sided with the Citizens Council, merely said the decision "settles the law in Texas on a statewide basis." He added that timing will be a "district-by-district matter."

**Texas Farm Income Down**  
Texas farm income for the first eight months of the year dropped six per cent below 1954.

Decreases in prices of 10 of the 19 major farm commodities account for the slump, said the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Reported down were cotton, cottonseed, wheat, oats, flax, rice, calves, hogs, wool and poultry. Corn prices remained about the same. Increases were noted for grain sorghum, peanuts, cattle, sheep and lambs, mohair, eggs, milk and fruits and vegetables.

Though cotton prices are down, prospective production is up. U. S. Department of Agriculture forecasts put the 1955 Texas crop at four million bales, 150,000 bales more than was expected a month ago. This would be two per cent more than in 1954, 18 per cent above average.

**Ramsey Choice Explained**  
Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey was chosen national Democratic Committeeman, at the suggestion of U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, the Senator explained. The suggestion was made to Governor Shivers, when the latter paid a visit to the Senator's home where he is recuperating from a heart attack.

Johnson explained that when Shivers returned to Austin, he mentioned the discussion to Ramsey. The Lieutenant Governor then called Johnson to talk over the matter. Ramsey said he wasn't asking for the job, but would take it if it would help solve a difficult situation.

Further discussion between Johnson and House Speaker Sam Rayburn resulted in the choice which surprised many Texans.

Mrs. V. F. Carpenter of Houston, formerly of San Antonio, visited with the home folks at the weekend and attended the Homecoming. Mrs. Carpenter is the former Miss Lottie Hosh.

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**GOLFER FACES LEGAL HAZARDS, TOO**

Most golfers are only too familiar with sand and water hazards. However, the game involves some legal hazards as well. These won't add strokes to your score, but can be far more costly.

The courts have held that a golfer has a legal obligation to exercise ordinary care to prevent injury to others. Before hitting, it is a player's duty to give a "timely warning" to persons he knows are in line, or close to the line, of intended flight of the ball. Therefore, a healthy yell of "fore" is of far more importance than most golfers realize.

The courts have recognized that the average golfer cannot control the direction or destination of his ball. They have therefore held that a golfer assumes the risk that he might be hit by a ball which is sliced or hooked into the fairway on which he is playing. A golfer injured by such a hit could not recover for his injuries.

Courts have also held that if it is impossible to anticipate that a fellow golfer might be injured by a shot, there is no liability. A situation such as this might arise when a ball is hit at right angles to the intended line of flight as would happen if the ball were hit off either the toe or shank of the club.

A person standing at right angles to the person hitting is in a position of relative safety, and it is not possible for the hitter to anticipate his ball will take such a line of flight.

Generally, to avoid the legal hazards of golf for injury to others, study the rules and customs of the United States Golfers Association. Above all be courteous on the course. Give the players in front of you a fighting chance to get out of the range of the ball. Wait until other players are completely out of line or have left the green which is your objective before

you hit. If there is anyone in line or your shot always yell "fore" before you hit.

Insurance is available from many companies at a relatively low cost to protect you from liability and provide anyone you might injure with the necessary funds to secure proper medical treatment.

Legal hazards are the costly ones, and common sense and a study of the USGA rules and customs will help you avoid them.

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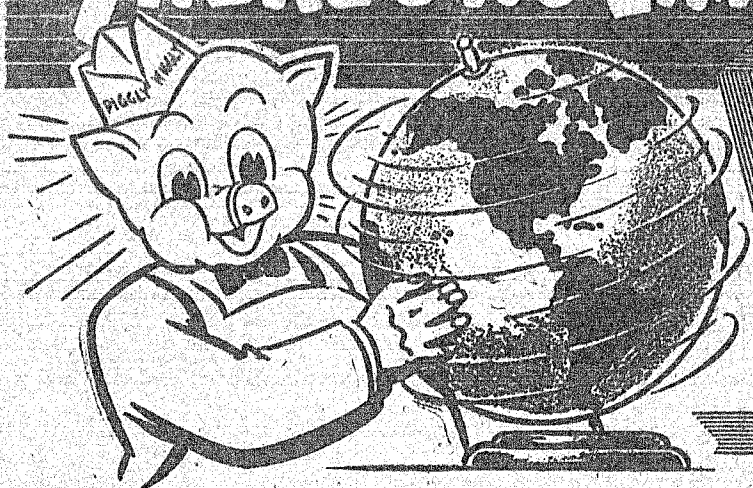
