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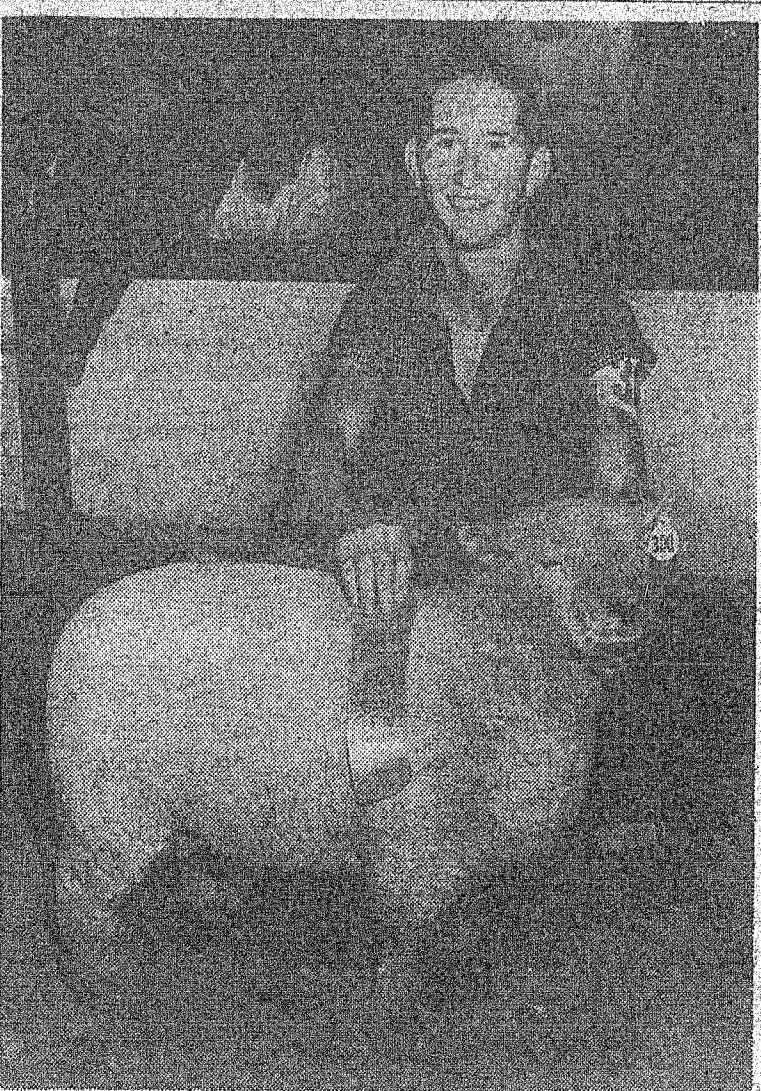
## Wess Wise Shows Reserve Champion At State Fair of Tex

Wess Wise, a senior student in the Santa Anna High School, showed the Reserve Champion Mutton Type Lamb at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, on October 19, in the Junior Lamb Show. The Grand Champion lamb of the show was shown by Roy Dee Gregg of Plainview.

Santa Anna lambs were entered in five classes at the fair and classes and places won are as follows:

Class 1 — Fat Lambs (Delaine, Rambouillet, purebred or grade, or cross of these two): Wess Wise, 7th; Wilburn Anderson, 12th; Sue Wise 13th and 39th places. Class 2 — Fat Lamb (Southdown, Shropshire or Cheviot, pure bred or grade, or cross of these breeds): Wess Wise, 2nd; this is the lamb that took the reserve Champion of the mutton type show. Class 3 — Fat Lamb (Hampshire or Suffolk, purebred or grade, or cross of these breeds): Bobby Densman, 9th; Kenneth Herring, 10th; Densman, 15th; Peggy Fleming, 21st.

In Class 4 — Fat Lamb Crossbred, Roy Dean Haynes took 18th place and in Class 5 — Fat Lamb Cross, Eugene White took 25th place and Wilburn Anderson took 30th place.

During the first quarter, the local boys did not have an opportunity to run an offensive play, as May dominated the ball until the last play in the quarter when they fumbled and the Mountaineers recovered on their 20 yard line. On the second play of the second quarter, Roy Payne, behind excellent blocking, ran 80 yards for the first touchdown. Try for extra point was missed and the half-time score was Santa Anna 6, May 0.

During the third period May broke into the open and raced 60 yards for the tying score. During the fourth period Payne passed to Kenneth Haynes for about 30 yards in the air and a 20 yard run for the Mountaineers' second TD. Payne passed to Freddie Walker for the extra point. May took the kickoff and after several plays had worked the ball down to the Santa Anna 30 yard line, where they fumbled and Santa Anna took over. After a series of several running plays, Eddie Hartman passed from the May 30 yard line to Haynes who took the ball on the 10 yard line and crossed the goal for the final score.

Coach Donham said the tackling was not as good in this game as it had been, but otherwise all the boys played an excellent game. They play Blanket on the home field next Tuesday night.

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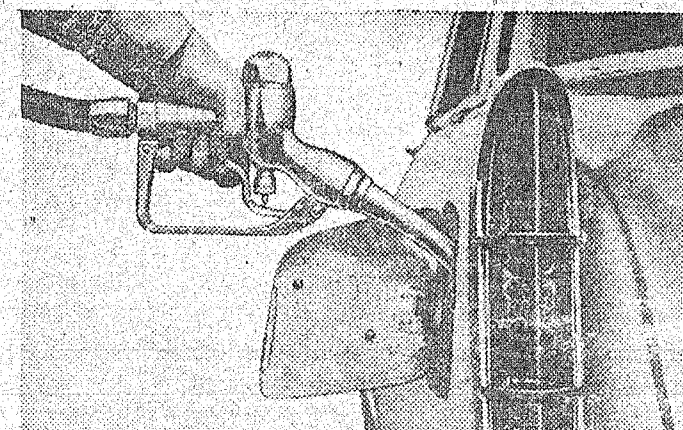

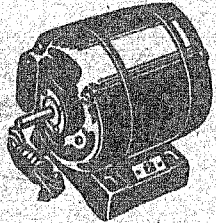

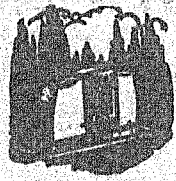

## Calvin Fuller, Jr. Owner Of Mystery Farm No. 28

Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Fuller, Jr., are the owners of Mystery Farm No. 28, as appeared in The Santa Anna News last week. The farm is located 6½ miles northeast of Santa Anna and is part of the old Wynn Ranch.

The Fullers purchased the 300-acre farm from R. G. Hollingsworth of Coleman in 1940 on a FHA loan. The loan was to run until 1960, but the Fullers paid for the farm in 1953, completing the payments 17 years before the maturity date. They have lived on the farm for 17 years.

Soon after they purchased the farm they built a new home with all the modern conveniences and took the lumber in the old house and built their present barn, brooder house and other out buildings. Other improvements include terracing of all the land that needed it and building a new fence completely around the place.

Mr. Fuller and the former Miss Addie Evans, daughter of Mr. Jack Evans and the late Mrs. Evans, were married in Santa Anna in 1926. They have one daughter, Bobbie, who lives with her parents and is partners with her father in raising cattle. She is also employed at the local Piggy Wiggly. Mrs. Fuller was born on a farm about ½ mile from her present home. They are members of the Methodist Church.

The Fullers usually run about 25 head of Whiteface cattle and have a registered bull. They sell calves off about weaning time, and keep some heifers to replace old cows. Along with their stock farming, they raise about 400 layers each year and have about 175 acres in cultivation. Small grain is Mr. Fuller's favorite crop and he has about 60 acres already sowed for fall and spring grazing. If he receives enough moisture to bring it up and make a crop. He has

25 acres in cotton and estimates he will make about ¼ bale to the acre, but he has not gathered any yet.

Mr. Fuller said he bought the land at a fair price in 1940 and is really proud of the fact they have managed to pay it off several years in advance. He said he would like to see more folks be able to purchase land this way.

Mr. Fuller is at present employed at the Santa Anna Tile Co., and takes care of his farming duties during his off hours.

As a feeding program, he tries to graze as much as possible, but during the winter months he feeds some rans cubes, and if he has any steers that looks like it, might be profitable to feed out, he does so.

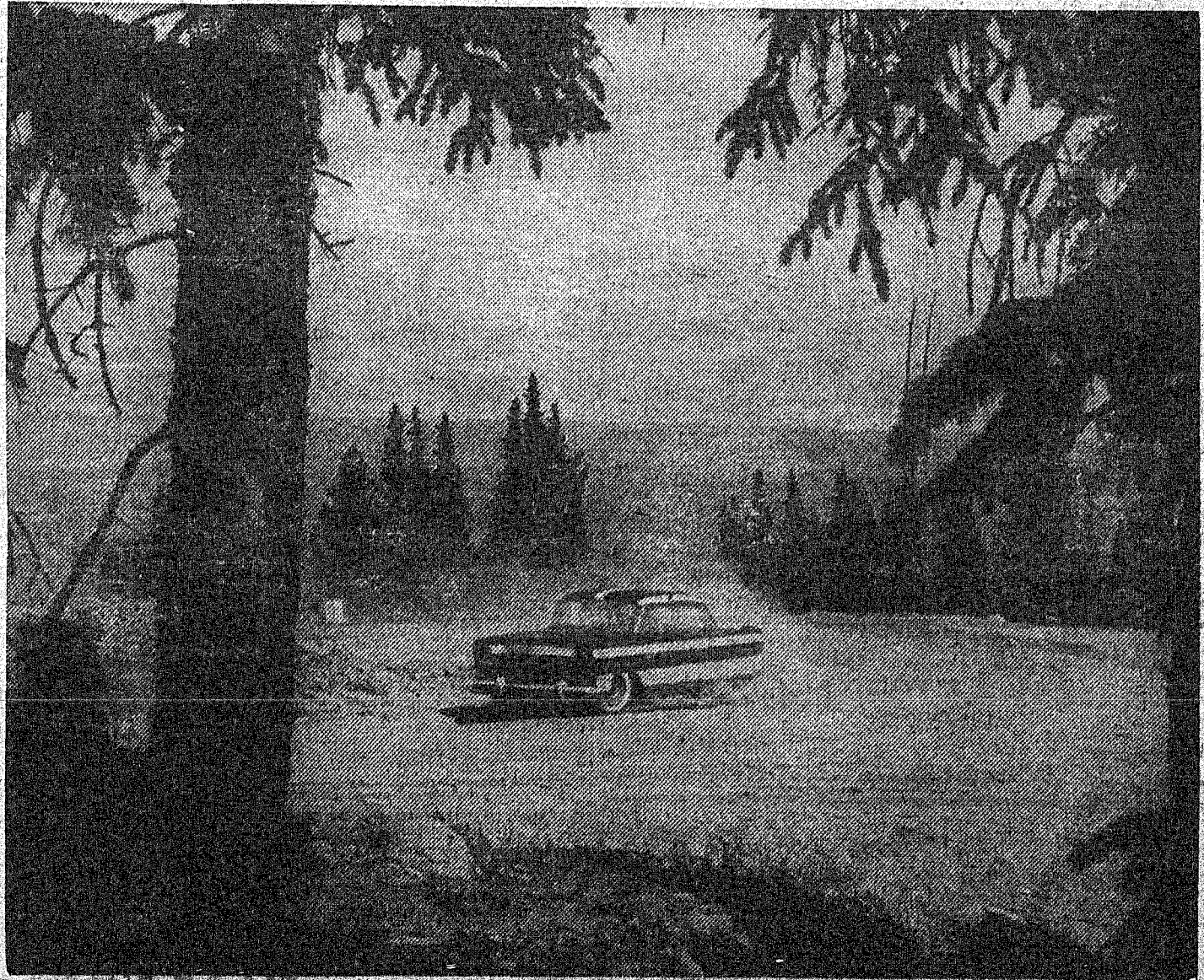

International Union Sunday School Lessons

Background Scripture: Luke 4:16-44

## Self-Portrait

Lesson for October 30, 1955

THERE are people who don't care how they look to other people; they have no particular long-range plans or pattern of life, they live (as they might say) by ear. We call such persons extroverts; they never stop, so to speak, long enough to look into a mirror. There is an opposite kind of person who is painfully interested in himself. He is forever looking into a mirror, as it were. He makes the most careful and detailed plans and is quite upset when a detail goes wrong. We call such persons introverts. In between these types is a more balanced sort of person. If one could "type" Jesus of Nazareth he would be the balanced sort, by all means. He was self-conscious enough to know and care what he was doing, but not in the least self-centered.

**Action Portrait**  
Jesus once had the opportunity, which to some young people is a rather frightening thrill, of speaking to a crowded audience in his own home town. He knew what was in nearly everybody's mind: "Give an account of yourself. Who do you think you are and what do you think you are doing?" To them he was just a home-town boy; but they had heard of strange things he had said and done, and they wanted to hear him talk. So he had the opportunity on a Sabbath Day of speaking in the synagogue. As he read the Scripture for the day, from Isaiah 61, Jesus stopped in the middle of a sentence, and sitting down (as teachers did in those days) he said, "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled. . . . In other words, as Americans would put it. This is it. This is my plan of life. This prophecy, hundreds of years old, describes what I am and what I am doing. In short, Jesus took

this prophecy to himself, as a self-portrait. It is more like a motion picture than a still picture; it expresses what he was, in terms of what he did.

### For Others

That, by the way, is typical of the Bible way of describing people. Adjectives like "good," "merciful," "truthful," always have verbs behind them. Adjectives describe actions. A man does not have one kind of character and another kind of action. His actions are his character, not his external actions alone, but together with the motives and intentions which are a true part of every act. Now Jesus describes himself and his plan for life not only in terms of action, but of action in relation to other persons. John Wesley says somewhere that when Christianity ceases to be social it is not any longer Christian. The idea that any one can become a higher type of Christian by retiring permanently from the world, devoted exclusively to prayer and contemplation, is a notion not derived from Jesus. For him, the meaning of life is in contact with other persons. But note the sort of person Jesus mentions: the poor, the captives, the blind, the bruised. . . . the very people so many of us avoid. Most people jump at the chance to get their pictures taken with famous people. Jesus' self-portrait was a picture of him with obscure people, people in trouble. What would happen in a community if every church member became more interested in doing something for people than in "doing" people?

### For All Others

What really enraged those churchgoers of Nazareth was not that Jesus was dedicated to helping others. That was fine, they were all in favor of it. The thing that raised them to murder-heat was that he drew no lines. He was for helping one and all, yes even Gentiles. What Jews of that day thought of Gentiles is expressed in a passage from a popular book written about the same time as the New Testament: "For our sakes you (God) made this first-born world. But as for the rest of the nations which are sprung from Adam, you have said they are nothing and are like spittle." (II Esdras 8:56). So when Jesus made it clear that he (like Elijah and Elisha before him) would draw no race or national lines, that he intended to carry God's love to the last and least of men, these race-proud Nazarenes threatened to lynch him. 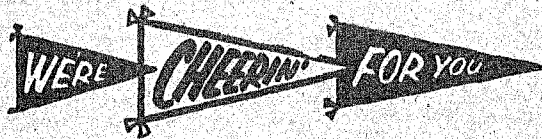
