LUSK WELL BADLY DAMAGED

Premature Explosion of Nitro-Glycerine Wrecks Upper Works and Rig.

ONE MAN KILLED AND THREE OTHERS INJURED

One of the worst blow-ups in the history of our oil fields occurred at the Lusk well five miles south of Gorman Tuesday evening.

The facts as we are able to learn them, are centered about the shooting of the well. One hundred quarts of nitro glycerine had been successfully placed in the well and the experts in charge of the work were placing the primer. In some manner the anchor was swung against the two-quart can of explosive used in the primer and it was exploded. This explosion set fire to the waste oil and materials about the well and derrick was soon in flames. They spread rapidly and soon set fire to the car containing the other mixture, consisting of 250 quarts of nitro glycerine. This exploded and completely destroyed the derrick, engine house and boiler. Pieces of the car and timbers from the works were strewn for a half mile from the scene of the explosion. The home of Fate Lusk, upon whose land the well is located, was partially demolished, windows and doors being broken and portions of the side torn loose.

The man by name of Mulligan, the crew handling the work, was killed and three others seriously injured. The initial explosion killed Mulligan and injured his helper. The second explosion got the other two. The force of the blow-up was felt all the surrounding country and windows were smashed in Sipe and five miles away. Mr. Homer Mootman reports the well is uninjured and as soon as new rigging is procured it will be put back into operation.

The original charge of one hundred quarts is still at the bottom of the well and is in good condition.

\$200,000 DEAL IS CLOSED

The Gorman Home Refinery this week purchased all the Warren Waggoner interests in this territory including in this purchase M. Waggoner's production in the Desdemona field, a four-inch pipe line from the plant to their plant, with all its gathering lines in the territory, a 55,000 barrel tank practically filled with oil, and a 600-foot loading rack. They are now running about 1,500 barrels daily through their plant, and finding rapid sale for all their products. The consideration of this sale was \$200,000. This means much to the Home Refinery and to Gorman. These progressive people are on the move, and as soon as material arrives they will increase their plant to its full 7,000 barrel capacity.

GORMAN HAS SHOOTING BEE

As we go to press we learn that officer Aaron Bryant shot and fatally wounded a man by the name of Chasteen. It seems from all reports that Chasteen had been arrested earlier in the day by one of the day men for being intoxicated. He had procured his release on bond and had promised to go home. Instead he secured a gun and went after the first officer he saw demanding his gun. Officer Bryant replied by hauling it to him hot end first. Only one shot was fired that wounding Chasteen. It is not expected that he will survive, the wound being in the abdomen.

Chasteen is a driller working out of Gorman in the local oil fields.


