Nancy Robinson Masters Sunday, July 22: "Writing FOR Children" WordLaunch Workshop

Harry Potter. Beatrix Potter. What do these two share? Both are icons in children's literature, one as daring protagonist, the other as Peter Rabbit's beloved creator. Children's lit embraces both.

"If writing for children interests you," says Ruth York of the Cisco Writers Club, "run, don't walk, to our WordLaunch Workshop this Sunday afternoon. Nancy Robinson Masters of Abilene will show you how to reach young readers, with fiction stories and nonfiction articles, with picture books and research books. You won't leave with unanswered questions."

Seventh in a series of eight exciting workshops this summer, it is held in the American State Bank, 418 Conrad Hilton Avenue in Cisco, 2 - 4 p.m. Sunday, July 22. Answers to your questions and individual help follow.

Cost is \$15, or \$10 for students, teachers and "anyone brave enough to admit they're over 60," says CWC's Karen Donoho with a twinkle.

This is Nancy Robinson Masters' third WordLaunch workshop, following a three-part series on books and one on short stories. Nancy's direct, knowledgeable presentation is laced with humor and encouragement. She draws examples from her own experiences. She can, with 24 books and 3,000 articles in print.

One enthusiastic WordLaunch student commented, "I'd like to hear everything Nancy has to share on writing!"

It's easy to understand why. Besides her career in writing, Nancy is a popular inspirational speaker at schools, businesses, organizations, and religious events. She has spoken to more than 200,000 students in schools across America through her visiting author programs.

"But my most important work in life," Nancy says, "is teaching children in Sunday School."

Nancy grew up on a cotton farm in Jones County during the drought of the early 1950s. She credits much of her success today to the values, patriotism, and work ethic instilled in her during those difficult years. Now she lives on a farm in the Elm Dale community near Abilene, adjacent to the airport built by her husband and writing partner, veteran aviator Bill

TDA Market Recap July 16, 2007

AUSTIN - (July 16, 2007) The Texas Department of Agriculture market recap for the week ending July 14, 2007, showed cash cattle markets higher than the previous week's light holiday trade. Feeder cattle prices were up slightly from the previous week, but lower than those seen at this time last year. Texas cash cotton prices closed the week sharply higher and wheat was up while corn and grain sorghum finished lower than the previous week. Drier and warmer weather across much of the state last week helped move along wheat harvest and provided a boost for the cotton crop. However, in some areas wet conditions and localized flooding continued to cause problems. Hay harvest was in full swing in some locations, but continued to be hampered by wet fields in others. Pasture and range remain in mostly good to excellent condition. As for futures markets, cattle futures closed the week lower. Cotton finished sharply higher, corn was up, and wheat closed slightly lower.

AGRICULTURAL VIEWPOINT

MOLD AFTER A FLOOD

When the power goes off for several days in hot, humid climates, it is difficult to avoid a mold explosion. Molds produce spores that spread easily through the air and form new mold growths (colonies) under the right conditions: moisture, nutrients (nearly anything organic) and a place to grow. Mold growth is common after flooding or water damage.

Mold can damage materials and your health. The longer you allow mold to grow, the greater the risk and the harder the cleanup. So as soon as it is safe to return home, begin cleanup and drying.

Mold testing is not usually needed and is rarely useful to answer questions about health concerns. Some insurance companies and legal services may require sampling for documentation.

The best way to avoid mold hazards is to hire a reputable firm that is licensed and trained in dealing with water damage and mold remediation. But that may be difficult after a disaster. You may have to do the cleanup yourself. If so, follow the steps below:

Mold cleanup guidelines:

1. Minimize your exposure during cleanup. People are exposed to mold by breathing spores or fragments. You can also be exposed through skin contact. Wear gloves and a mask or a respirator to filter mold spores (N-95 or better). If you are sensitive to mold, wear splash goggles to help protect your eyes. Wear long sleeves, long pants and sturdy shoes.

2. Isolate the work area and ventilate it to outdoors. Disturbing mold colonies can cause a massive release of spores, so seal off the contaminated area from the rest of the house. If the power is on, use a fan to send air to the outdoors. If you have no power, ventilate the area if the outside humidity level is not above 60 percent.

3. Remove and discard moldy materials. Porous moldy or sewage-contaminated materials should be removed, bagged and thrown away. This includes gypsum wallboard, insulation, plaster, carpet/carpet pad, ceiling tiles, processed wood products and paper. To minimize the spread of spores, cover moldy material with plastic to contain spores before removal. Items that can be cleaned in a washing machine likely can be saved, depending on how long the mold has been growing on the items. Extended periods of mold or mildew growth may stain them. Upholstered fabric furniture should be discarded if it has been in a flood. If it has only surface mold on it, you might be able to clean it outdoors by letting the mold dry in the sun and then cleaning it with a HEPA-filtered vacuum.

4. Surface mold on non-porous materials such as hard plastic, concrete, glass, metal and solid wood can usually be cleaned. Cleaning must remove, not just kill, the mold because dead spores can still cause health problems. After cleaning, you may choose to use a disinfectant to kill any mold missed by the cleaning. In the case of sewage contamination, you must disinfect. Use 1 cup bleach to 1 gallon of water solution. Do not use it in the air system. Milder, less corrosive disinfectants include alcohols, disinfecting cleaners and hydrogen peroxide. Always handle bleach with caution. Never mix it with ammonia; test on a small area before treatment. You may wish to consult a specialist if you are unsure about how to clean an item, or if the item is expensive or of sentimental value. Phone books often have listings of specialists in furniture repair, restoration, painting, art restoration and conservation, carpet and rug cleaning, water damage, and fire or water restoration. Look for specialists who are affiliated with professional organizations. Be sure to ask for and check references.

Remain on mold alert

Continue looking for signs of moisture or new mold growth. If mold returns, repeat the cleaning and consider using speed drying equipment and moisture meters.

Regrowth may signal that the material was not dry enough or should be removed. Rebuilding and refurbishing should wait until all affected materials have dried completely.

Sanitize Dishes, Pans After Flood Waters

Dishes, pots and pans that have been covered by flood water should be carefully inspected, washed and disinfected before they are used again, advises Mary Years, Iowa State University Extension Housing Specialist.

First, inspect all items, she says. Discard any items made of porous material, such as wood, plastic or rubber. Any dishes with deep cracks should be thrown away as well. These items cannot be sanitized. Wash the remaining items in hot detergent solution, using a brush, if necessary, to remove dirt. If handles from frying pans and saucepans are removable, clean them separately. Equipment that can be taken apart should be cleaned in pieces. After sudsing and brushing, rinse in clear hot water. Then immerse in a chlorine solution to sanitize. Use a solution of two tablespoons of liquid household bleach to a gallon of water.

To sanitize metal items, boil them in water for at least two minutes. Let all items air-dry, Years recommends. Do not dry them with a dish towel. Kitchen items made of iron probably will be rusted. Remove rust by scouring with steel wool. After scouring and sanitizing iron items, season them before use to prevent food from sticking to them. Lightly coat the cooking surfaces with cooking oil and place them in an oven at 250 degrees F for two to three hours. The oil will seal the pores of the metal so food will not stick easily. If cupboards and food preparation surfaces were in contact with flood water, clean and sanitize them before storing the clean dishes, pots and pans, Years says. Wash the surfaces with hot detergent solution. Then sanitize them using a solution of two tablespoons of liquid household bleach to a gallon of water.

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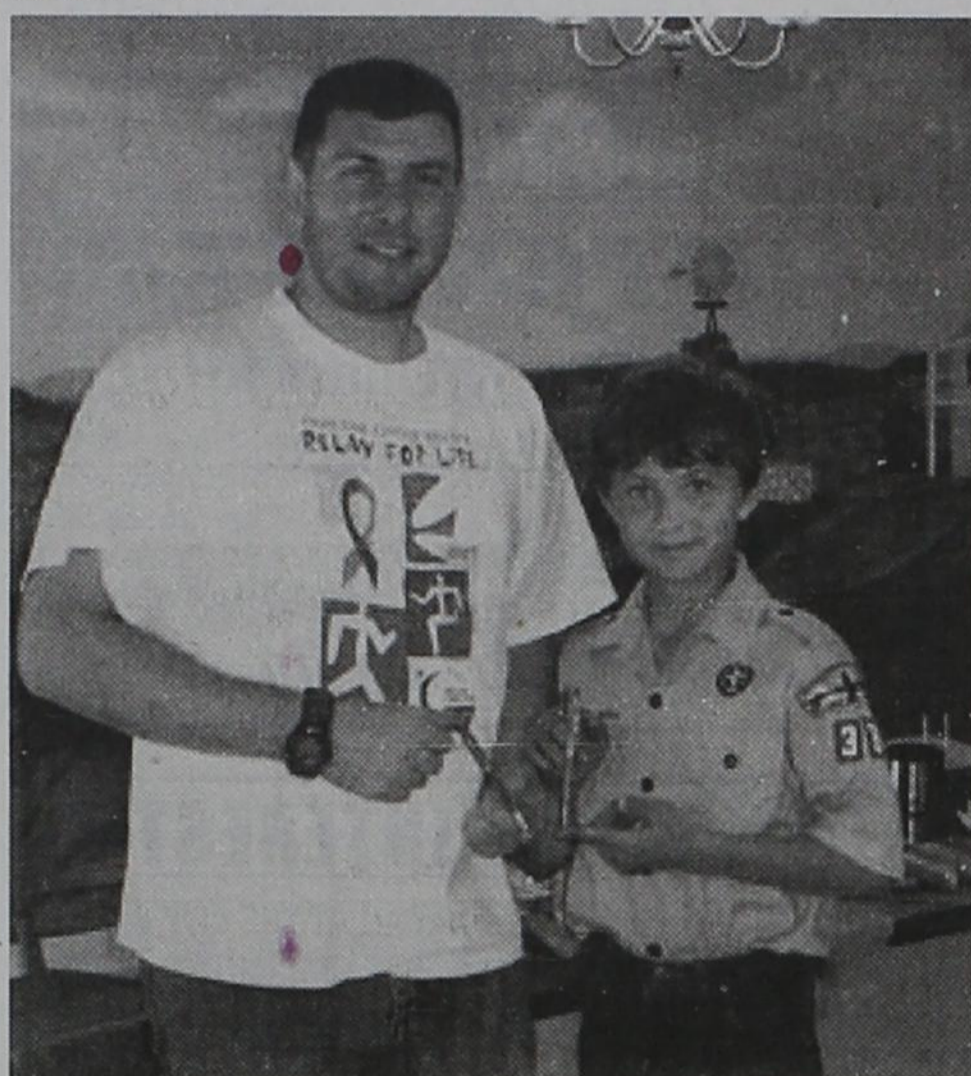

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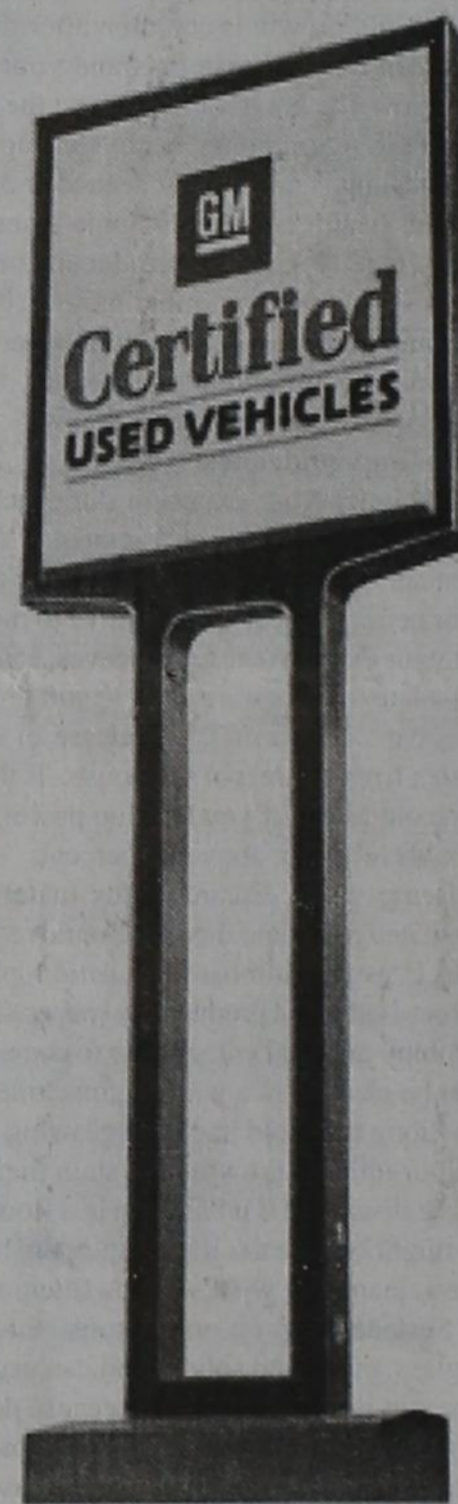
