MAKING SENSE OF THE **NUTRITION LABEL**


Compiled by: Berette Hart, Intern Since May 8, 1994 all packaged foods have been required to present the "Nutritio Facts" label. This label is regulated by the Food & Drug Administration. The label must use a specific format for presenting this information, it must list the serving size and the number of servings per container. All information contained on the label refers to this serving size. as a serving size. The new label is required to list the amount that the average person would consider a serving of that particular food. If your serving is more or less than the serving size listed, the other information must be adjusted accordingly in order for you to benefit from it.

While this new label is generally easier to understand than the old label, there are still some questions about it. The column labeled % Daily Value seems confusing to some. This value is based on FDA guidelines for a 2,000

calorie diet which is made up of 60% carboghdrayes, 30% fat, and 10% protein. These levels are recommended by the National academy of Science. As we all know, we do not all live on a 2,000 calorie diet. Some eat far fewer calories, while others consume many more in a day. The percent Daily Value tells the percent of that particular nutrient which would be provided by oen serving of that food for a person on a 2,000 diet.

Does this mean that we must all eat 2,000 calories a day in order to the use the information contained in this column? No it does not. If we know about how many calories we consume in a Old food labels could chose any amount day, we can adjust this amount to compare with a 2,000 calorie diet. For instance, if a person eats 1,500 calories a day, then the percent daily value contained in one serving of the food would be 1-1/4 times the amount listed for each nutrient. If another person were to eat 4,000 calories, the percent daily value for one serving would be only half the amount listed.
