Panthers Overpower Wildcats; Play At De Leon Friday

The Panthers continued their winning ways on Friday night as they hosted the Santo Wildcats in another District Contest and outscored the Wildcats 49-6. The big Red scored 14 in each of the first 2 quarters and led 28-0 at the halftime mark. They added 14 in the third and 7 in the final quarter for the margin.

The Big Red Defense held the Wildcats on the opening possession and got the ball on the Wildcat 43. They scored in 4 plays with Matt Underwood rambling in from 15 yards out with 6:08 left. Tyson Swanner added the point after and Gorman was up 7-0. The drive featured 2 runs of 15 and 4 by Underwood and a 4 yard run by Drew McCreless.

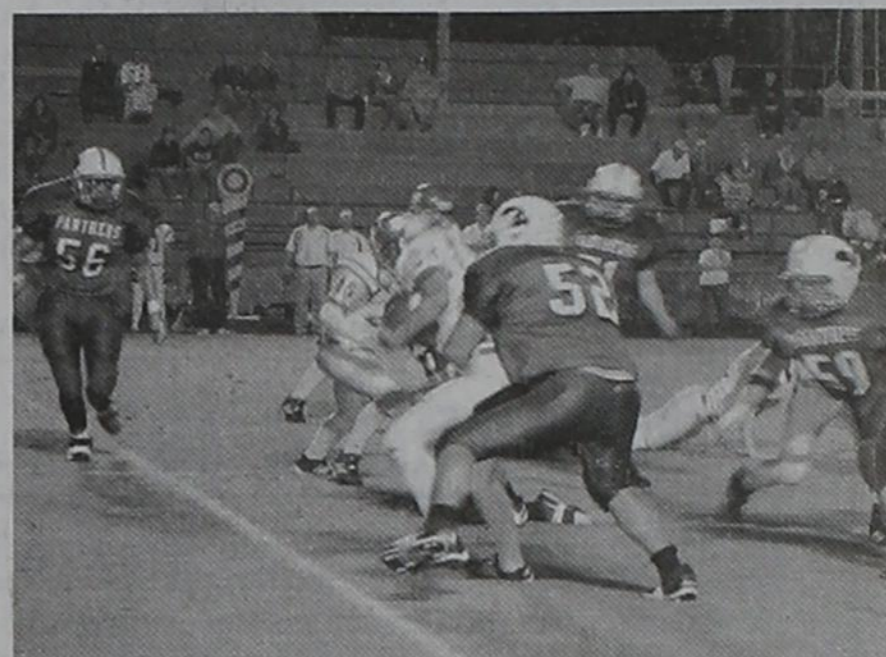
After holding the Wildcats for the next possession the Panthers got the ball on the Santo 45 and scored in 3 plays with Ben Burgess catching a beautiful pass for the final 20 yards from Swanner. Swanner added the point after and the score rose to 14-0. The drive featured runs of 15 and 1 by Underwood and 9 yard pass to Underwood.

The Big Red Defense again held the Wildcats and took the ball on their own 44 and scored in 3 plays with Drew McCreless getting the honors from 25 yards out on a run with 10:08 left in the second. Swanner added the point after and Gorman was up 21-0. The drive featured a pass of 15 and a run of 11 by Underwood.

The Panthers got the ball again on the Wildcat 43 and scored in just 3 plays with Underwood getting the score from 14 yards out with 5:42 left in the second quarter. Swanner again added the point after and Gorman led 28-0. This score held up till halftime.

Following the homecoming festivities at halftime for GHS and the great job by the Santo Band the crowd was thrilled by all.

Following the halftime the Panthers took the kickoff on their own 42 and went the dis-

tance in only 2 plays with Swanner rambling through the Wildcat defense for 45 yards and the TD with 11:00 left in the third. Swanner also ran for 11 on the drive. Swanner added the point after and the score rose to 35-0.

Then after stopping the Wildcats on their next possession the Panthers got the ball on their own 26 and scored in just one big blast as Underwood broke loose through the defense and behind some good blocks rambled 74 yards with 9:24 left in the third. Swanner kicked the point after and Gorman was up 42-0.

The Wildcats finally got a drive started and from their own 13 they scored in 17 plays with Matt Hubbard going in from 30 yards out with 10:25 left. The kick for point failed and Gorman led 42-6.

With a bunch of reserve players in the game the Panthers got the ball on the Santo 48 and scored in 9 plays with Cameron Clark getting the honors from 2 yards out with 4:59 left. Swanner added the point after and Gorman led 49-6. The drive featured runs of 7 by A. J. Vaughn, runs of 12 and 2 by Justin Little, 11 and 3 by Trevor Williams, and runs of 4, 6, 1 by Clark.

Underwood led the Panthers with 10 runs for 179 and 2 passes of 9 & 15. Swanner had 59 on 2 carries, Drew McCreless had 44 on 3. Clark got 13 on 4 and Williams, Little and Vaughn each carried 1 time.

The Big Red Defense did a great job with the Wildcats and will need to do yeoman service this week as the Panthers travel to De Leon in the final game of the regular season. So follow the Panthers to De Leon on Friday and show them we are behind them all the way.

Liz Caraway's Children Sermon: All of the children agreed that they know what rules are, and that they are supposed to follow the rules. Now let's go support our Panthers at De Leon on Friday night.

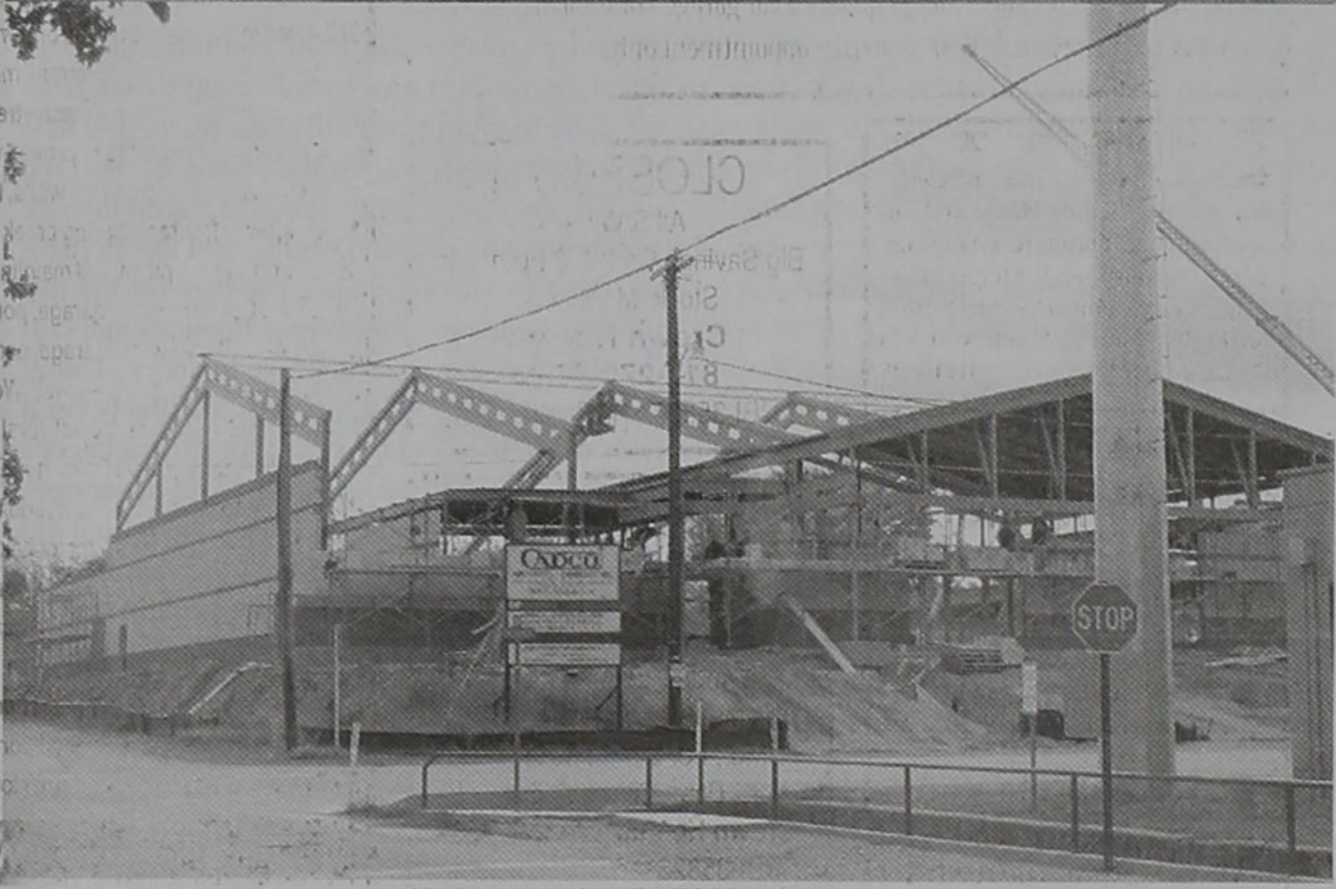
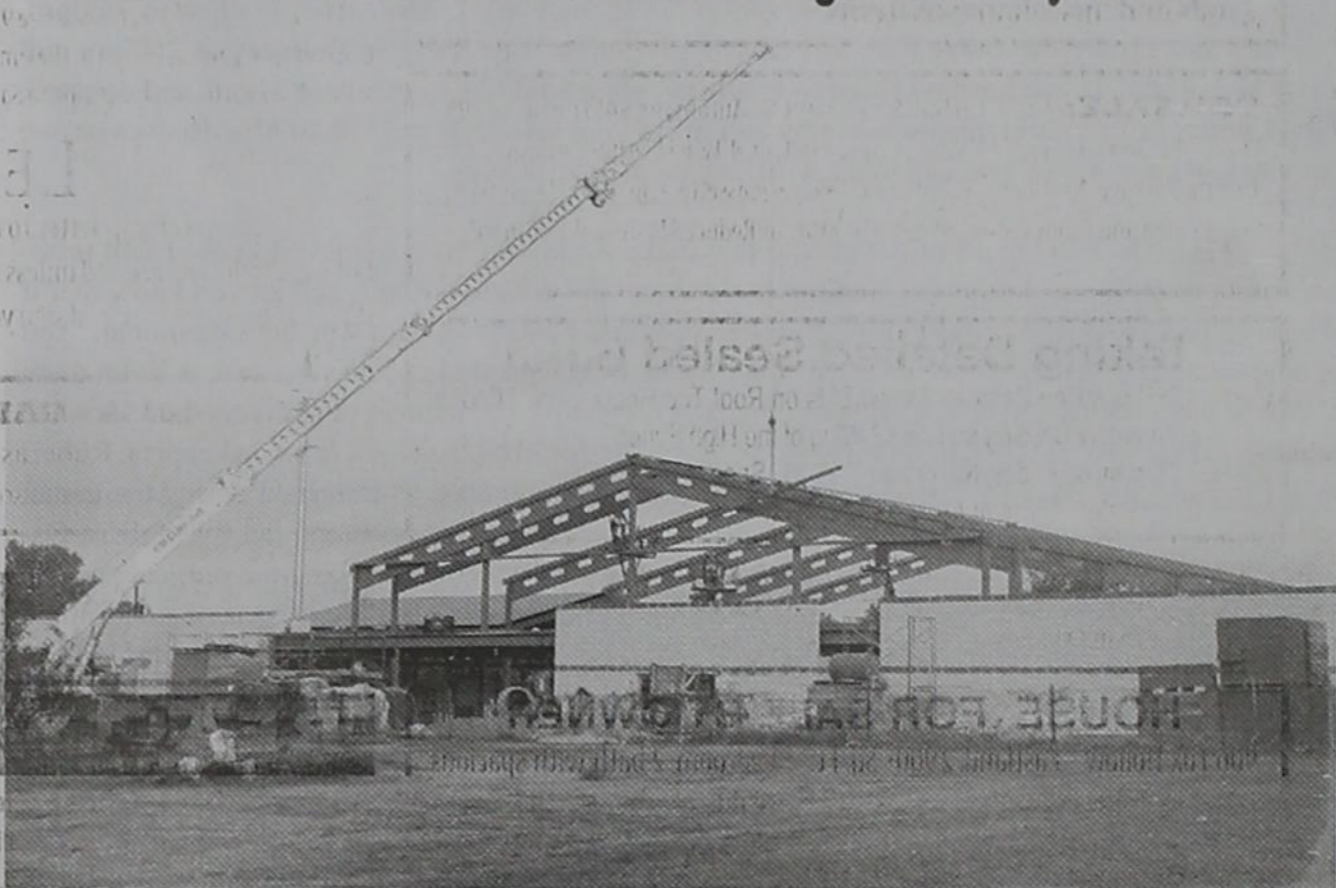

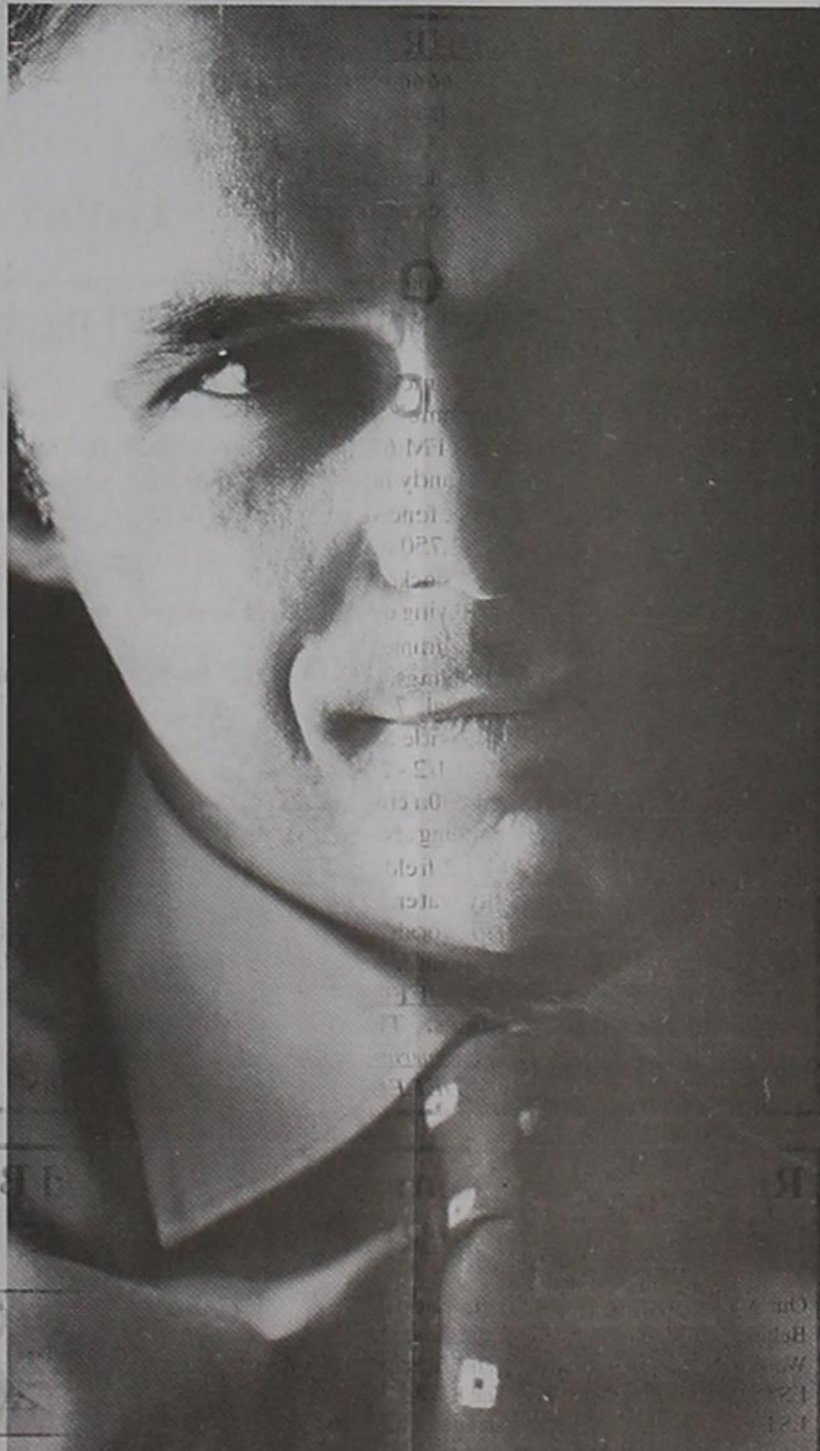

You might refer to this part of the article as my call to arms for all of you folks that care enough about the public school system in Texas to take the time right now to either call, write, or e-mail your state representative and state senator and ask them to introduce a bill at the upcoming 81st Legislative session to increase funding to our schools. Gorman ISD has for the most part received the same amount of money for the last three years with absolutely no increase to accommodate mandated raises for teachers on the state salary scale, inflation, the rise in fuel cost, and the increase in utilities, not to mention other transportation costs. The new school finance package for the last session is sucking the life out of most of the schools in Texas and may force consolidations and closures in the near future if something is not done this Legislative session to improve finances. Under the present system, all of the increased income from increased property values goes into the general fund for the Legislature to do with as they see fit. It does not help our kids. If a school district needs to raise maintenance and operations school taxes above \$1.04, just to maintain the level of services being offered the previous year, the school district must hold an election. Previously, the school did not have to go to the expense of an election to maintain the level of service offered the year before. Previously this was referred to as the effective tax rate. The last legislature did not penalize cities, counties, or themselves with this limitation, only independent public school districts. Now is the time legislators develop bills! Now is the time we need for you to contact them. The following names and addresses are for those legislators serving this area:

Eastland County Sheriff's Office Report

The Eastland County Sheriff's Office statistical information for July 1, 2008 to September 30, 2008 (92 days) and the year to date totals:

The Sheriff's Office received 209 Civil Process Documents and served 175 documents with 37 documents pending service.

YTD: The Sheriff's Office received 615 Civil Process Documents and served 509.

The Sheriff's Office received 203 Arrest Warrants and served 223 warrants with 389 warrants on hand.

YTD: The Sheriff's Office received 648 Arrests Warrants and served 671 warrants.

The Sheriff's Office transported 57 prisoners and traveled 8,530 miles, also transported 8 MHMR clients and traveled 2, 141 miles. The Sheriff's Office escorted 80 prisoners to court actions during this time.

YTD: The Sheriff's Office has transported 223 people and traveled 31,281 miles.

The Sheriff's Office issued 11 class "c" citations, 9 warnings and generated 81 offense/incident reports.

YTD: The Sheriff's Office has issued 72 citations, 15 warnings and generated 243 offense/incident reports.

The Eastland County Jail processed 338 people through the booking system for an average daily intake of 3.38 people.

YTD: The Eastland County Jail has processed 978 people through the booking system for an average daily intake of 3.27 people.

The Eastland County Sheriff's Office executed one drug search warrant during this time. On August 14, 2008 the Sheriff's Office, assisted by Cisco Police Department and the Texas Department of Public Safety executed a warrant on a residence in Cisco, Texas. Which resulted in the arrest of one suspect.

On July 26, 2008 Sheriff Wayne Bradford and Deputy Wendell Light answered a call of a residence being damaged South of Eastland. Several items of evidence were collected and photographs taken of damage to the residence. The Sheriff's Office developed suspects from the evidence left at the scene and several juveniles were questioned about the crime. After speaking with the suspects in this offense, Deputy Light was able to connect the suspects to the damage of the Mangum Baptist Church that had been reported on July 20, 2008. The Sheriff's Office referred the cases to juvenile probation and approximately seven juveniles have been processed by juvenile probation in connection with these offenses.

On August 1, 2008 the Sheriff's Office assisted a local business that had been experiencing the theft of fuel from vehicles parked in front. The Sheriff's Office assisted by a local utility company installed a camera system to record the front of the business. On August 3, 2008, only two days later, the camera paid off by recording the suspect stealing fuel from two vehicles parked in front of the business. A search warrant affidavit was prepared and presented to District Judge Steve Herod. Chief Deputy Robert Rains and Deputy David Stanley executed the warrant on the suspects place of business. When deputies arrived the suspect was in the process of off loading the stolen fuel. Deputies seized several items used in the crime and the suspect was arrested to next day for theft and burglary of a motor vehicle. The suspect posted bond and the case has been sent to the District Attorney's Office.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by severe storms, tornados, and flooding are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Farm Loan Manager Richard G. Young said today.

Eastland, Jones, and Stephens Counties are among several Counties in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from Drought that occurred on January 1, 2008 and continuing. Richard G. Young, said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan", Richard G. Young, said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 10, 2009, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season".

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.

The FSA office in Anson is open from 8:00am to 4:30pm, Monday through Friday.
