We have managed to piece together the following update on the '95 Farm Bill activity, including the Peanut Program.

The House Agriculture Committee convened on Wednesday, September 18th to adopt its recommendations on the 1995 Farm Bill Commodity Titles. The Committee failed to pass a Bill after working late Wednesday night.

A Compromise bill offered by Congressmen Combest and Emerson at the urging of Cotton industry leaders would have been generally favorable for Peanut growers. That Bill included all Commodity Titles including Peanuts and was essentially the same as the Cochran Bill in the Senate. That Bill failed by a vote of 26 to 33.

The Freedom to Farm Act authored by Agriculture Committee Chairman Pat Roberts was debated intensely with strong opposition from southem crop Representatives and was ultimately defeated by a vote of 27-22, with 4 Republicans join Democrats in opposition.

The Peanut Title in the Freedom To Farm Act was offered by Subcommittee Chairman Tom Ewing. It includes the following provisions some of which differ dramatically from the proposals of the National Peanut Growers Group:

- \$610 per ton quota level for 7 years
- · Deduction of 15% of support level for peanuts going under loan -- if commercial market at support price is available in grower's trade area.
- 100% (unrestricted) sale and lease across county lines
- · Cross Area Pool Compliance (same provision in current law to use pool profit in one area or area to pay pool loss in other areas)
- NPGG language on seed which permits quota pounds to be allocated
- to producers for pounds of seed planted Priorities in reductions of quota to first affect municipalities, schools,
- airports, etc. and "non-residential quota holders". Non-residential has not been defined.
- · Use of Budget Reduction Assessment currently in effect to offset Pro-
- Disaster Transfer Program at 70 percent of support price with limit of 25 percent of farm's basic quota peanuts

The House Agriculture Committee did not reconvene after Wednesday of last week, but is scheduled to reconvene on Wednesday (September 27)

It was reported to us last week while in Washington that House Majority Leader Dick Armey told a gathering of Farm Bureau members in Washington that he was pleased with the Peanut Program reforms in the Roberts Bill and that the Ewing Peanut Title would be protected under the Reconciliation process. This could be significant, or may mean nothing, depending on the final results in the House Agriculture Committee deliberations.

If the Chairman fails to get the votes needed to pass Freedom To Farm, one option is for the Chairman to submit the Bill to the budget Committee and ask that the Bill be a part of the Budget Reconciliation process.

In the Senate pro NPGG members continue to hold the NPGG Peanut provisions but they are getting tremendous pressure from Agriculture Committee Chairman Lugar and Senator Sanatorum (R-PA) who are sponsoring a Bill to phase the Program out along with sharp and unreasonable price support cuts.

The Senate Agriculture Committee will also meet this week for its markup. Many feel that the Committee may not be able to agree on a Bill leaving the battles to be fought on the Senate floor.

Peanut allies did win a battle of sorts in the Senate last week when they forged a compromise with Senator Hank Brown who had introduced an amendment in Appropriations to force growers to pay \$2.3 million Program Administrative costs. With hard work by Peanut consultants, NPGG members and Senator Heflin, strong opposition to the Brown Amendment resulted in a sense of the Senate resolution recommending that the Administrative costs could be paid from the Budget Reduction Assessment.

Growers and business people are encouraged to continue communications with House and Senate members. This is important!!!!

The running of Margarito Sanchez sparked the Panthers offense to an 18 to 7 victory on Friday night at Ranger. This was the first win of the season for the Panthers. Sanchez rushed for 159 yards on 25 carries.

The Big Red Defense got the Panthers on the scoreboard first when the Ranger quarterback was caught in the end zone for a two point safety with 4:15 left in the first quarter.

Gorman got on the scoreboard again with 10:53 left in the first half when Nick Guthery hit Ronald Majors with a beautiful pass for the final 20 yards. The drive started on the Gorman 34. The drive featured first down runs of 14 by Sanchez; 10 by Paul Petree; 11 by Sanchez and another 9 yards by Sanchez. Apass try for 2 points failed and Gorman led 8 to 0.

The Panthers scored again with just 30 seconds left in the first half when Sanchez ran in from 1 yard out to cap a 68 yard drive. The Panthers were set up with an interception on the Gorman 32 by Paul Petree. The drive featured runs of 12 yards by Petree; 33, 9 and 11 by Sanchez. Snider booted the point after and Gorman was up 15-0 at the halftime intermission.

The Panther Marching Band and the Ranger Band both performed great routines for the fans at intermission.

Ranger got on the scoreboard with 9:30 left in the game when Cody Fore caught a pass and raced for 54 yards for the score. The drive covered 73 yards in 6 plays and was assisted by two costly penalties on the third down by the Panthers. Juan Pantoja booted the point after and the score was 15 to




