Courthouse security to improve

EASTLAND - Eastland County commissioners took steps Monday to ensure the courthouse will be a safer place.

Commissioners agreed County Auditor Ken Parker should obtain a copy of a contract the 11th Court of Appeals has with the state that will result in a \$27,000 grant for the court.

The Court of Appeals, with grant money, will allow a metal detector to be bought, along with a special telephone. The detector will be installed on the third floor at the district courtroom. A key will be necessary to move the elevator up to the fourth and fifth floors where the court is located.

Eastland County Sheriff Ronnie White will hire a certified officer to operate the metal detector and serve as bailiff to the county and district courts. His salary will come from the current bailiff's budget and special fees collected by county and district courts when documents are filed.

The charges will be waived if sufficient money is returned to the bank from the \$725,000 in district trust funds now deposited with TexPool.

As in the past two years, the Cisco bank is depositor for county money while Eastland keeps the trust fund accounts.

Nominations Sought For Gifted Education Services

The Gorman School District is accepting nominations for students who require gifted education services. Who are these students and why do they require services different from what is offered in the regular classroom? The following chart provides a look at the difference between bright children and gifted learn-

Bright Child

Knows the answers. Is interested. Is Attentive. Has good ideas. Works hard.

Learns with ease.

Answers the questions. Top Group. Listens with interest.

6-8 repititions for mastery. Understands ideas. Enjoys peers. Grasps the meaning. Completes assingments. Is receptive. Copies accurately. Enjoys school. Absorbs information. Technician. Good memorizer.

Enjoys straightfoward, sequential presentation. Is alert. Is pleased with own

Gifted Learner

Asks the questions. Is highly curious. Is mentally & physically involved. Has wild, silly ideas. Plays around, yet test well. Discusses in detail, elabortes. Beyond the group. Shows strong feelings and opinions. Already knows. 1-2 repetitions for mastery.

Construct abstractions. Prefers adults. Draws inferences. Initiates projects. Is intense. Creates a new design. Enjoys learning. Manipulates information.

Inventor. Good guesser. Thrives on complexity.

Is keenly observant. Is highly self-critical.

Note, especially, that bright children learn with ease and that gifted learners already know. Gifted learners will know 35%-50% of what is taught in a grade level on the first day of school. This fact along with the knowledge that gifted learners master new information after only 1 or 2 repetitions, while bright children need 6-8 repetitions, are reasons why gifted learners require a different kind of education.

Gifted learners are often self directed and have goals they set for themselves. Gifted services address these characteristics by offering time for research and independent study. If they know most of what books and teachers cover or can understand information after seeing or hearing it 1 or 2 times, what will they do while bright children are learning? What they can do is be involved in a gifted program which gives them other learning options.

The Gorman ISD provides appropriate learning environment for gifted children in K-12. If your child or one you know shows these characteristics, contact Ruby Lee Kinser at Gorman Elementary School by March 3, 1995.


Cain, who is currently employed by the Texas State Bank of San Angelo, will assume the district manager's duties on April 1.

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House Passes Stenholm's Budget **Amendment**

The U.S. House of Representative today passed H.J. Res. 28, Congressman Charlie Stenholm's bipartisan legislation calling margin of 300 to 132, Stenholm's legislation received more than the two-thirds (290) votes required to amend the U.S. Constitution.

"Having committed much of my career to the passage of this amendment, I am thrilled that my colleagues, in true bipartisan spirit, have heeded my call to safeguard our children and grandchildren's futures by supporting my version of a balanced budget amendment," said Stenholm.

Stenholm's legislation is the product of years of careful review and refinement by Constitutional scholars and budget experts, and has been championed by Democrats and Republicans in both the House and Senate. Identical companion legislation, S.J. Res. 1, was introduced in the U.S. Senate by Majority Leader Robert Dole (R-KS).

A brief summary of this legislation follows:

*Acutal outlays may not exceed actual receipts unless three-fifths of Congress votes to authorize a deficit.

*A three-fifths vote of Congress is required to raise the debt limit.

*A Constitutional majority (218 in the House, 51 in the Senate) is required to raise taxes. (Current, law requires only a simple majority of those present and voting, and permits voice votes.)

*The Amendment is automatically waived in case of war. Congress may vote to waive the Amendment in case of a military Conflict that poses an imminent threat to national security.

*Effective in 2002 or two years after the date of ratification, whichever is later.

During floor debate, Stenholm referenced the words of Thomas Jefferson, who said "The question whether one generation has the right to bind another by the deficit it imposes is a question of such consequenceas to place it among the fundamental principals of government.

"Our bipartisan, bicameral (House/ Senate) consensus balanced budget amendment is based on exactly the same principle as the rest of the Constitution," noted Stenholm. "It will protect the fundamental rights of the people by restraining the federal gov-

KEEP NUTRITIOUS FOOD SAFE

Serving nutritious food that is safe for you and your family members is a real challenge. While the United States food supply is one of the safest in the world, nearly 30 million Americans suffer from some type of foodborne illness each year. Farmers, food processors, supermarkets and restaurants follow strict rules and regulations to help ensure safe and wholesome food for consumers. Government officials closely monitor them to ensure food safety practices as well. But what happens to the food once taken from the grocery cart to the car and then on to the home. Most of the reported "bad food" and foodborne illnesses are due to bacterial contamination. And nearly all the cases can be linked to improper food handling, which means they could have been avoided.

Just how can you avoid mishandling of food at home. One of the best ways is to be aware of the ten most common food safety mistakes which are as follows:

- leftovers left out at room temperature - room-temperature marinating - barbecue blunders - same platter for

This legislation will next be considered in the Senate, where it must receive a two-thirds majority for passage. It will then have seven years to be ratified by three-quarters of the nation's state legislatures before becoming the 28th Amendment to the U.S.

STENHOLM INTRODUCES "FRANKED MAIL" REFORM LEGISLATION

Congressmen Charlie Stenholm (D-Tx) and Mike Castle (R-DE) announced the introduction of "The Franked Mail Savings Act," bipartisan legislation which overhauls the Congressional mail system by slashing the budget and banning mass mailings to constituents in election years.

"If we are going to ask the American people to be willing to accept cuts in federal programs, we must be prepared to lead by example," said Stenholm. "I am working for a 25% reduction in the size and costs of Congressional operations, and I believe this reform proposal is an important move in that direction."

The Franked Mail Savings Act would:

*Cut funding allowed for franked mail by more than half.

*Ban unsolicited mass mail in election years until after the general elec-

*Create separate accounts to fund unsolicited mass mail and constituent

*Lower from 500 to 250 pieces the definition of mass mailings.

"I answer my letters and telephone calls by using a fraction of the mailing allowance that is currently available for such purposes," said Stenholm. "I believe this reform proposal will cut Congressional mailing costs and help to ensure that folks are not bombarded with unnecessary information during election years."





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Report Changes In For SSI Purposes

Do you know that is you receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI), you have a responsibility to report changes in your living arrangements to us? This is not difficult at all. All you need to know is what to report, when to report, and how to report.

The changes in your living arrangements you need to report include:

If you move or change your address;

If someone moves into or out of your household, someone in your household dies, or if someone in your household has a baby;

If you get help with food, utilities, rent, or mortgage; or

If you enter or leave a residential institution, hospital, skilled nursing

You must report a change in your living arrangements within 10 days after the month it happens. You should report a change even if you're late. If you don't report a change, you may miss out on money you need if the change will mean you can get a bigger check, or you may get too much money and have to pay it back.

If you don't report a change or if you make a false statement and get money you aren't supposed to, Social Security will make you pay back the money. You may also have to pay a fine, face imprisonment, or both.

You can make your report by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, from 7 a.m. any business day. The best times to call are later in the week and later in the month to avoid busy telephone lines.

You can also report by mail or in person. If you mail your report, be sure it shows:

The name of the person the report is about;

The Social Security number of the person who gets the SSI checks;

The change being reported; The date the change happened; and

Your signature, address and phone number.

Postal Job Scams Don't Hire On To A Con Game

"The U.S. Postal Service is hiring for full time and part time employment. Hourly salaries start at \$25 an hour. For Employment Information, call 800-555-5555".

Have you seen advertisements like this one in your local newspapers? Postal Inspector Linda Kirksey warns that is you should call thses promoters for "Employment Information," you are progably going to get clipped. In most instances, you find out that you are going to have to pay about \$30 to receive information of dubious value. They may lead you to think you are talking to someone from the U.S. Postal Service, but no Postal Job will be offered.

Frequently, the Con Artists promoting this service offer to provide you with training which is supposed to help you pass a required entrance examination. Further, graduates are often promised placement in postal service jobs upon successful completion of the training. Naturally, this Training will cost you money for tuition and books.

Postal Inspectors say that other promoters offer job opportunities that guarantee that you will be placed on a register with the U.S. Postal Service from which new hires will be selected. Inspectors say beware of any "Opportunity" to get Postal Job information which is going to cost you money.

Inspector Kirksey also warns the public to beware of the enticement of fantastic salaries and benefits which seem too good to be true. For accurate information about application procedures for jobs with the U.S. Postal Service, call your local Postmaster. It won't cost you a dime.

Bank of America **Introduces Secured Credit Card**

Bank of America today introduced a secured credit card for consumers with little or no credit history, such as young people and those recently divorced or widowed.

The new BankAmericard Secured Card is available through the bank's 243 branches in Texas.

The card is secured -- or backed -by a BofA savings account in an amount equal to the credit line, which can range from \$500 to \$5,000. The principal balance can't be withdrawn while the customer has the card. If a card member fails to repay the debt, the bank collects from the savings account.

"The new BankAmericard Secured Card enables us to meet the credit needs of our customers who may not otherwise qualify for our credit card."

According to Biagi, the card is competitively priced and enables the bank to strengthen customer relation-

The rate on the new secured card, currently set at 18.65%, is a variable rate, which is adjusted quarterly and based on the prime rate as published in the Wall Street Journal plus 10.9%. The annual fee of \$18 is waived if the customer has a BofA checking account. Accounts have a 25-day grace period on purchases before interest is charged.

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To applyfor the secured card, customers must be at least 18 years old, have a U.S. address, never have filed for bankruptcy, and all credit accounts must be current. After 18 months of continuously making payments on time, customers will be eligible for a BankAmericard without the required savings deposit.

Bank of America Texas is a subsidiary of BankAmerica Corporation, which has more than 1,900 branches in ten western states. At December 31, 1994, BankAmerica had assets of approximately \$215 billion and deposits of approximately 154 billion.

Farm Bureau News

delegates narrowly adopted a farm Wednesday, callprogram policy ing for a 1995 Farm Bill that will continue to move the U.S. toward a farms. market oriented, export competitive agriculture.

Texas Farm Bureau President Bob Stallman's comments regarding the new Republican controlled Congress helped defeat an amendment that would have prohibited farmers from receiving deficiency payments on non-program crops grown on flexible base acres.

The provision finally approved by delegates was written to allow farmers more flexibility in responding to market forces, while providing a food security "safety net."

"This amendment goes to the heart of the philosophy and changes that are taking place in Congress and in agriculture, Stallman said.

The amendment to which Stallman ojected was proposed by the South Carolina Farm Bureau, and would not have been much different from existing policy.

The Texas Farm Bureau president quoted new U.S. House Agriculture Chairman Pat Roberts of Kansas, who spoke at the Farm Bureau convention Tuesday.

"Chairman Roberts told us that the status quo does not live in Washington any more," Stallman said.

In adopting the farm program resolution, delegates said:

*American farmers need target price protection to offset limited access to world markets because of existing trade barriers and internal farm policies in foreign countries.

*There should be no modifications in the farm program that would interfere with the market oriented goals of competitive loan rates, voluntary stock reduction programs and income supplement as farmers move toward a market oriented agriculture.

*Farm program payment eligibility should not be tied to a means test.

*Tenants or landowners are entitled

American Farm Bureau Federation to benefits of federal legislation on any farm that is in compliance with the provisions of the farm program, regardless of the status of their other

*Participation in any federal or state water projects shall not adversely affect a grower's participation in any USDA farm program.

*There should be no environmental mandates for participation in the federal farm program.

*The current system of commodity specific crop acreage bases should remain intact. Base acreage should be determined on a five-year moving average of planted or considered planted acres. There should be a conversion to a "whole farm" base or similar system which consolidates all program and allowed non-program crops. These crops would include oilseeds (soybeans, sunflowers, safflower, canola, sesame, castor beans and guar). Some experimental and industrial crops would be allowed under the Farm Bureau plan.

*Producers should be allowed to plant any combination of program and permitted non-program crops on whole farm bases.

AFBF delegates said they want proven yields used in calculating deficiency payments and target prices maintained at the current levels.

They also stated a preference for maintaining the farmer owned reserve as it is presently structured.


