The Panthers met the Chilton Pirates in the first round of the playoffs at Glen Rose on Saturday afternoon and were overwhelmed by the margin of 49 to 20 by the very strong Pirates. The Pirates scored on their first 5 possessions for a 36-0 margin at the halftime and added 13 more points in the last half for 49 points. The Panthers got their points in the final period.

On the first possession the Panthers fumbled the ball and set the Pirates up at the Gorman 33. From there the Pirates scored in 4 plays with Dominguez getting the score from 1 yard out with 9:22 left. Salazar added the point after and Chilton led 7-0.

After holding the Panthers on a long drive the Pirates took the ball on their own 21 and scored in just 2 big plays with the score coming on a 39 yard pass to Vincent Bell. Salazar booted the point after and Chilton was up 14-0.

On their next possession the Pirates took the ball on the Gorman 49 and scored in 6 plays with Eric Bradley getting the final 6 yards on a run with 8:35 left in the second period. Salazar added the point after and Chilton led 21-0.

On their next possession the Pirates got the ball on their own 9 and scored in just 2 plays with the score coming on an 8 yard run with 5:24 left in the half. Salazar kicked the extra point and the score stood at 28-0.

With 1;20 left in the half the Pirates added another score going 50 yards in 5 plays with Cedric Carter getting the score on an 18 yard run. A run added 2 points and the halftime score was 36-0.

The Panther Marching Band put on a nice performance and the Cheerleaders performed a good routine.

Chilton scored again on their second possession going 56 yards in 6 plays with Bradley scoring on a 15 yard run with 2:00 left in the third. The try for point failed and Chilton led 42-

Gorman came back on their next possession and drove 78 yards in 5 plays with B. J. Ramirez breaking free on a beautiful 50 yard run with 11:44 left. Drew Flanary added the point after and the score stood at

However the Pirates came right back and scored again on a 53 yard drive in just one big blast with Bradley getting 53 yards on a run with 11:23 left. Salazar booted the point after and the score was 49-7.

Gorman got a fumble on the Pirate 26 and scored in 5 plays with Brandon Velasquez getting the honors on a 3 yard run with 4:05 left. Flanary add-

Gorman got another fumble recovery on the Pirate 6 and Ramirez got the score on a 2 yard run with 2:16 left. The kick for point failed and the final score was 49-20.

Ramirez led the Panthers with 130 yards on 26 carries. Velasquez had 30 on 15. Josh Ryan got 12 on 4 and Matt Fox had 6 yards on 1 try.

This ends the season for the Panthers with a 5-5 record. The Big Red did well despite several key injuries. Great Job Big Red!!!!

"On The Wilder Side"

Recently while I was reading 1 Samuel I noticed something that made me stop and think. 



Their boy was dead, "Why did God let this happen?"

Meanwhile the ER team kept pumping his chest; he began breathing. Alive again. But what a life! He stared unknowing, cursing his family. The brain had been without oxygen too long. Now what to tell the lad's parents? "No! God! Not this."

And the coach. Sitting alone, desolate, sobbing. Ignored even by the boy's frantic family. I put my arm across his shoulder. More sobbing, I turned, "Lord we are breeding a race of heroes become bullies become victims - and dead. What shall I say?"

Baby Boomers: Don't Let Osteoarthritis Slow You Down

(NU) - Osteoarthritis affects cans and is the most common type of arthritis. Women over the age of 50 have a greater risk of suffering from osteoarthritis than men of the same age. In fact, women overall are more likely to experience a decrease in their activity level.

With osteoarthritis, the tissue that serves as a 'cushion' between joints breaks down and causes the joints to rub together. This can result in chronic pain, stiffness, and decreased mobility. Chronic pain can be one of the most difficult parts of dealing with osteoarthritis, and it can get in the way of routine activities that make life rich and fulfilling such as working, driving, shopping or even hugging a grandchild. A majority of people with osteoarthritis say it is difficult to be physically active. This puts them at risk for other medical problems, such as heart disease, diabetes and weight gain.

"For many individuals, the main goal is to effectively treat the symptoms of osteoarthritis and stay active," says Society for Women's Health Research spokesperson Carmen Green, M.D., Professor of Anesthesiology and Obstetrics and Gynecology, and Associate Professor of Health Management and Policy at the University of Michigan. "Treatment may include a mix of physical therapy, acupuncture, massage and prescription pain medications, including over-thecounter products, anti-inflamma-

tory drugs and opioid medica-

Experts believe the sooner osteoarthritis is diagnosed and treated, the better the chances are of preventing it from getting worse. Those battling osteoarthritis should see a doctor about managing their pain. They - and their caregivers - should also learn as much as they can and be actively involved in their own treatment

Keep Pests From Crashing Your Holidays

(NU) - For many Americans, colder weather means seasonal decorations and holiday baking but if you're one of those who set out gourds and holly or cookies for Santa, you might be opening your home to some unwanted guests. "Mice, rodents, spiders and

other pests find their way into homes by hiding in boxes of holiday decorations that have been stored in attics, basements and garages since last season," says Missy Henriksen, vice president of public affairs for the National Pest Management Association (NPMA). "They create homes in these undisturbed items and then find new places to infest once these boxes are moved into family living quarters."

The holiday season may also bring out pantry pests, which make themselves at home in pantry foods like flour, cereal, dry pasta, spices, nuts and dried fruit, as well as in decorations made from dried flowers and potpourri. The most common pantry pests are beetles, ants, weevils and Indian meal moths.

So, what can you do to deter unwelcome holiday guests? The NPMA offers the following tips: · Store seasonal decorations in airtight containers. Items like dried foliage, potpourri and Indian corn should be carefully stored in the off-season. Keep them in a dry environment, such as a closet or office, and unpack them outside.

Inspect fresh decorations before you bring them indoors.




You might have more than ornaments in your Christmas tree.

Look over wreaths, Christmas trees and garlands to make sure you're not bringing insects into your home.

Store food properly. All food should be stored in plastic or glass containers with sealed lids. Keep cabinets, pantries and countertops clean and free of crumbs. · Examine pantry items be-

fore you use them. Check packages before you bring them home from the store. Never buy any item that appears damaged. Throw out expired ingredients. If you have any ingredients that haven't been used in the past year, inspect them before use.
