



Panthers Split Games With Gustine and May

The Gorman Panther Varsity Team lost a close game (42-40) to the Gustine boys on November 19th and then won their next game over May by a 50 to 48 score. These were outstanding games.

In the Gustine game, first game of anykind this year for the Panthers, the Big Red were nervous in the first half as they trailed 11-6 at the end of the first and 23 to 11 at the halftime mark. Then in the third period the Panthers outscored the Tigers 20 to 11 and also scored 9 more in the final quarter, missing an several opportunities and came up 2 points short. Coach Harley stated the Panthers did not shoot well (36%) but the hustle and effort was there. We came from 12 points down at halftime but just couldn't get even. We also look forward to playing them in our Tournament in December.

Jason Posey led the Panthers with 15 points, 12 rebounds, 1 assist and 3 steals; Adan Rodriquez had 11, 2, 2 and 0; Ireal Rodriquez was 4, 3, 0, 1; Margo Sanchez had 3, 7, 2 and 2; and Robert Seaton had 3, 1, 0 and 0. Posey had two 3 pointers and Seaton 1.

In the May game the Panthers broke out to an 18 to 9 lead in the first and held a 31-24 margain at halftime. In the third Gorman had 10 and May 12 and in the final period May outshot the Panthers 12 to 9 but the Panthers took the win 50 to 48.

Coach Harley said "we had a strong first half offensively, followed by a strong second half defensively which helped to get out first win. Hot shooting got us off to the quick 18-9 lead. Our press forced six May turnovers. I think we tired a lot in the second half as all of our shots seemed to be short. We must improve our shooting percentage to be successful. (33% vs May and 35% for the year).

Admission requirements include a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education, a 2.5 grade point average, passing scores on the TASP, a minimum of 25 clock hours of observation in as many special education classrooms as possible (also requiring a 2.5 GPA), and completion of an interview process.

Those who are interested in applying for the training program must have passed the TASP (Texas Academic Skills Program). The applicant needs

to register to take the supplemental administration of the TASP that will be offered January 11, 1996.

The teaching certificate enables recipients to teach anywhere in Texas in special education in grades pre-K through 12. Reciprocity is available in some other states.



A CER-TAIN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY THE STATE OF TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND USE OF SAID MAINTENANCE PROJECT; AND DECLARING AN EMER-GENCY AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHOULD BE EFFECTIVE FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE.

Attending the awards ceremony in College Station were Floyd Gilbert and Floydene Gilbert of Gorman and Vicki Campbell of Brownwood.

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
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

Governor Bush's Citizens' Committee

The president of Texas' largest farm organization is satisfied with the now completed work of Governor Bush's 'Citizens' Committee on Property Tax Relief."

The committee completed its work Friday, voting 19-0 to present the completed report to the Governor. Several ex-officio members of the committee voted under the rules. The committee has 17 members.

Bob Stallman, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, and a member of the Governor's committee, said, "I think it's a very fair representation of what the Committee heard across the state and it reiterates Texas Farm Bureau's own position that it's time for property tax relief."

The committee, chair by Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer, voted to deliver a 23-page document to the Governor that said, in part, "...Citizens' Committee on Property Tax Relief can unequivocally state that substantial public sentiment exists for school property tax relief." This essentially answered Bush's charge to the

The document also stated, "Based on the information we have received and evaluated, the Citizens' Committee on Property Tax Relief finds that the current high level of school property taxes both hampers investment in Texas and hampers the ability of Texans to buy and keep their own homes."

The Texas Farm Bureau favors the business activity tax, one of three options proposed by Bush and his staff as replacements for the school property tax. Stallman said, however, that the final solution would probably blend several options.

"I doubt that the solution will include one single option," Stallman said. "There will probably be a hybrid approach utilizing several revenue-raising options."

The Columbus rice farmer said a solution that involves some changes in the sales tax, some business tax and leaving some property tax at the local level might get favorable attention from legislators. Such an approach, he said, Chairman of the House Appropriations would be preferable to the current sys-



Texans Tune Out Trash TV

any Texans are concerned that their children are exposed to too much violence and suggestive programming on TV. The average American child sees 100,000 acts of violence and 8,000 murders on television before leaving elementary school.

In my annual questionnaire, which your newspaper was kind enough to publish late last summer, I asked Texans, "Do you support efforts to encourage the entertainment industry to provide more family oriented television programs, especially during the early evening hours?"

A definitive 82 percent answered yes, they do support such efforts. "We have to bring back morality to the television screen," one person wrote. "High moral values should be encouraged 24 hours a day, every day."

Many of you had some harsh things to say about television programming: "We are tired of smut on every show," "There is too much violence and battering," and, "Unfortunately, the family-oriented programs that are on are not up to par."

One person wrote, "I would support such efforts, but let's worry more about violence than sex," but another said, "We have to cut the filth out."

A number of you expressed concern about government censorship, pointing out that it is a legitimate function of the government to encourage wholesome television programming, but not to mandate what is broadcast. One person wrote, "Encourage is the key word here, the government can't insist. And we shouldn't use taxpayer money to pay for this." Another said, "Encourage, yes. But this should not be a regulatory function of the government. We've got enough of that already."

Any hint of censorship must be avoided. Individuals should control their TV sets, not Big Brother," one reader said.

There are too many mindless, ridiculous programs offered now. However, it is not the government's job to police or mandate programming style or content," another wrote.

Many others agree with this general theme: "I don't need the government to do this - I have an off switch on my TV, and I'm getting a lot more reading done," one person wrote. Others said, "This is my responsibility as a parent. It's up to parents to monitor what their kids are viewing."

Other thoughtful readers responded, "The industry can, and sooner than later will, police itself. There is no need for further government involvement," and "I despise anti-family programming, but feel the free market should rule."

Yet another strict constitutional constructionist wrote emphatically, "Get the federal government out of unconstitutional meddling!" One reader echoed that sentiment, saying, "The government should stay out of the entertainment industry. All the government will accomplish is to complicate the issue without being really effective. Government already tries to regulate more than it can manage."

Finally, this question elicited a couple of answers I found to be sad commentaries on television programming at the end of the 20th century. One mother wrote, "I strongly support such efforts to encourage wholesome programming, but I don't think it will do any good. 'Married with Children' is on here at 6:30 in the evening, prime family viewing time." Another observed, "I really wish the industry would voluntarily concentrate on high quality family programming without any government urging."




