Saul Pullman, 40 year old local attorney and lifelong, resident of Eastland County. is seeking election to the office of Judge of the 91st. District Court of Eastland County, Texas in the May 3rd Democratic primary.

Pullman has over 15 years' experience practicing law in the vaious courts throughout the Big Country. He also has the distinct honor of having the endorsement of both the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives, the leaders of the Texas Democratic

He is the son of a pioneer Eastland County family, having been born and raised in Eastland, where his mother and father (Tillie and Henry Pullman) have long been prominent and successful business people, operating Eastland Iron & Metal Company and Pullman's Supply Company. Henry died in 1967, while Tillie continues to operate the business today.

Saul Pullman received his schooling in the Eastland Public School system, where he was both an outstanding student and athlete. He attended T.C.U. on a football scholarship and received his degree. He then attended the University of Texas Law School, and Upon completion of his law course, received his L.L.D. and was admitted to the Texas Bar to practice

Pullman served his country as an attorney, being a member of Headquarters, 1st Juge Advocate General Detachment, 8th U.S. Army Corp., and acheived the rank of Captain. Upon discharge, he was appointed legal advisor to registrants for the Eastland County draft board and in 1976, received a certificate of merit from the President of the United States for outstanding service. He is currently Post Commander of the American Legion Post, No.





apply to city hospitals - even though urban hospitals work with a larger pool of physicians, registered nurses

and the latest technology. For examply, rural hospitals in the Medicare program would have been required to supply 24-hour nursing care for patients. Hospitals in smaller communities have nursing shortages; however, they do keep registered nurses on 24-hour call.

Congress a few years ago recognized the problems and waived the rule. But the waiver expired at the end of 1978. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare delayed enforcing the waiver on rural hospitals, hoping that Congress would pass such a corrective amendment. The Senate has now taken such action and, hopefully, the House soon will agree.

Rural hospitals give quality health care to their areas. If they couldn't take part in Medicare, they effectively would be destroyed. In one area of Texas, such a closing would leave people in a 90 mile radius without hospital




