D.B. Warren, long time farmer of Gorman, Texas has been elected Chairman of the Southwestern Peanut Grower's Association Board of Directors. His selection as association president occurred at the Annual SWPGA Meeting in Okla-

homa City on July 25. The primary responsibility of the Association is the carrying out of field and supervisory functions of the peanut price support program for USDA. SWPGA performs this function by contracting with peanut shellers and independent warehousemen throughout Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas and Arizona to receive store and deliver loan peanuts. The Association offers loan farmers stock for sale into the various markets and discharges the accounting and record keeping activities for USDA in regard to such sales. Association personnel also supervise the processing of loan peanuts sold for purposes other than domestic edible.

SWPGA also engages in many non-price support activities including legislative, educational, research and administrative negotiations with USDA.

Warren and sons Jerry and Wesley produce some 750 acres of peanuts. They also are major producers and distributors of watermelons. They also produce livestock and hay crops.

Warren will serve as SWPGA President for the 1980-81 year. He and wife, Idell, reside on the family farm near Gorman.
