The Gorman Panthers took the ball game to heart on Friday night as they got out to a first half lead of 8-0 then came back after getting tied at 14 and scored two times in the fourth period to pull away from the Elks by a margin of 30 to 14.

The Elks took the ball on their second possession on their own 3 yard line after a Panther fumble and moved to the Panther 6. From there the Big Red defense held and the Panthers moved 94 yards in 14 plays featuring runs of 29 and 22 yards by Jimmy Johnson before Jimmy got the touchdown from 2 yards out with 6:47 left in the second period. A pass from Dane Gressett to Mark Swanner added the two pointer and Gorman led 8-0.

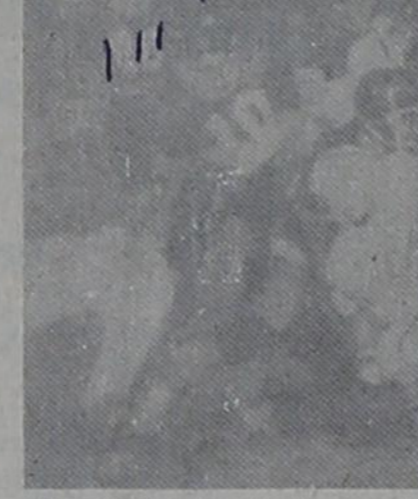
This score held up until the

first half.

Following the intermission the Elks came out and with a break on a Panther fumble took the ball on the Gorman 44 yard line and Mark Kyle took little time getting Evant on the boards as he raced 44 yards with 9:20 left in the period. The run for points failed and Gorman still lead 8-6.

The Elks got another break as the Panthers moved the ball to the Elk 2 yard line before giving the ball up on a fumble. And again Mark Kyle used only one play to go the distance as he shocked the Panther defense with an amazing 98 yard scamper as he outran the Big Red secondary and scored with 1:31 left in the period. A pass to John Hitt added the two pointer and the Elks led 14 to 8.

But the Panthers never say die as on the ensuing drive the Panthers got the ball on their own 40 yard line and Jimmy Johnson took a page from the book of Kyle and raced the 60 yards on one beautiful run for the TD with 1:20 left. The pass try for points failed and the score was knotted at 14-14.

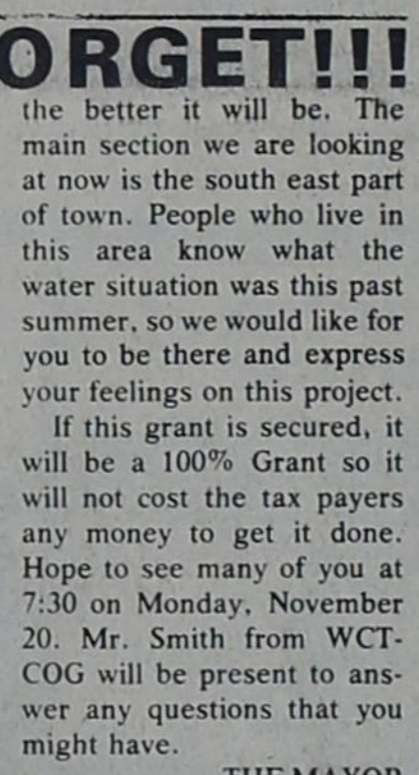

The Panthers added another tally with 4:29 left on the clock as they moved the ball 52 yards in 9 plays, featuring a 20 yard scamper by Jacky Johnson to set the Big Red up with first and goal at the 4. Jimmy Johnson got the final 2 yards for the score and a pass from Gressett to Scotty Mauney added the two pointer and the Panthers had defeated the Elks again, a feat they had accomplished for the past several years.

The Big Red defense faltered a little at different times in the game but really came to life when they had to and other than the two long runs they held the Elks to about

## SWEET POTATO BREAD

With such a variety of breads available at today's supermarket, there's no need for monotony at any meal. But if you want to impress the family or guests with something distinctively your own, the accompanying recipe for Sweet Potato Bread is a good candidate. It looks and tastes different, with a hint of sweet potato flavor that goes well with ham, turkey or pork. Toasted sesame seeds add a slight crunchiness and a fragrance that is apparent after toasting. This is a substantial bread, a very economical way to add important nutrients at relatively low cost.



**SWEET POTATO BREAD**  
Makes 2 loaves

7-7 1/2 cups unsifted white flour  
1-1/2 cups unsifted whole wheat flour  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1-1/2 teaspoons salt  
2 packages Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast  
2 cups very warm water (120 F.-130 F.)  
1-1/2 cups mashed cooked sweet potatoes  
1/4 cup toasted sesame seed  
1 egg white  
1 tablespoon water

In a large bowl thoroughly mix 2-1/3 cups flour mixture, sugar, salt and Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Add Fleischmann's Margarine. Gradually add very warm water to dry ingredients and beat 2 minutes at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl occasionally. Add sweet potatoes and 1/2 cup flour mixture; beat at high speed 2

Punch down dough; turn out on lightly floured board and knead in 3 tablespoons toasted sesame seed. Divide dough in half. Roll each half into a 14 x 9-inch rectangle. Shape into loaves. Place in 2 greased 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pans. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Mix egg white and 1 tablespoon water and brush over tops of loaves. Sprinkle with remaining toasted sesame seed. Bake at 375 F. for 35 to 40 minutes, or until done. Remove from pans and place on wire racks to cool.

## NEWS OF SAFETY

### TIPS ON WOOD BURNING STOVES

There's been a "back to wood" movement among many homeowners in recent years as soaring costs and shortages of fuel oil and natural gas prompted the comeback of a primary 19th century heating source—the wood burning stove.



As recently as 1974, only about 310,000 wood or coal burning stoves were made in or imported into the United States. By 1978, the figure had climbed to 1.1 million. They are especially popular in the Midwest and the Northeast, where winters are cold and other fuels may be expensive.

But wood burning stoves sometimes carry a different, hidden price tag—the hazard of fire that can produce death and destruction. A 15-state survey by the National Fire Protection Association showed wood and coal burning stoves cause between 8,000 and 9,000 fires and 100 to 130 deaths each year. The Consumer Product Safety Commission says about 5,700 persons were injured through contact with such stoves in 1979.

State Farm says most wood burning stove fires are caused by either faulty installation or improper maintenance. The company offers these safety tips:

- It's best to buy a new stove from an experienced, reliable dealer. If you buy a used one, check it carefully for defects. Get one that's listed by Underwriters Laboratories Inc. or a similar organization.
- Check local fire and building codes. If you're not completely sure of in-

stallation requirements or procedures, get a reliable contractor to do the job. --Because these stoves produce large amounts of radiant heat, there must be adequate clearance (at least 36 inches) between the stove and its piping and combustible materials. --Place the stove on a fire-resistant base.

--If you use an existing fireplace or chimney, it should be clean. To keep toxic gases from seeping into the room, seal off the fireplace or chimney openings after the stove pipe connector has been installed.

--Stove pipe should run straight and be as short as possible. Avoid 90-degree angles; use gentle 45-degree turns instead.

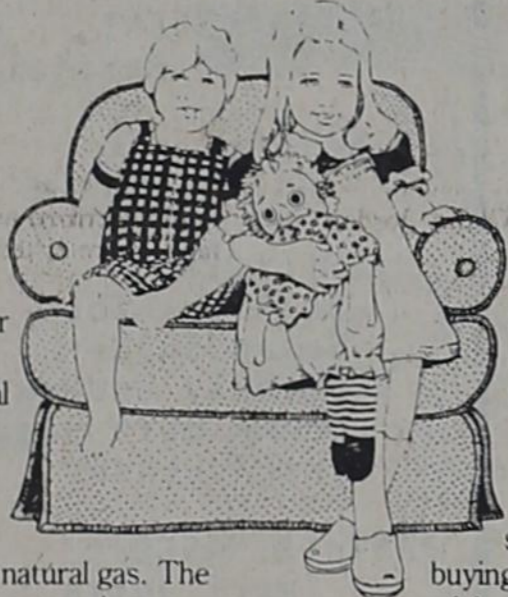
--Avoid passing stove pipe through a combustible wall or ceiling.

--Stove connector pipes and the chimney should be inspected by a professional at least once a year—and cleaned if necessary to avoid buildup of creosote, dust-like carbon deposits that may catch fire.

--Use dry, well-seasoned hardwood; this also reduces creosote buildup.

--When possible, use short, hot fires rather than long, smoldering ones. Don't leave the stove burning unattended overnight.

## 2 Eastlanders Inducted Into TESCO Quarter Century Club

Planning for the future is a tradition among Texas Electric employees - a tradition that continues to mean multi-million-dollar savings to its customers, TESCO President Bill Marquardt said yesterday.

This planning has brought about savings despite the many factors that are causing the price of electricity to increase, he said at the company's annual Quarter Century Club banquet honoring 25-year TESCO employees.

The banquet Tuesday night at Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria was in honor of Eastland area members of the Quarter Century Club.

"Inflation, higher operating and construction costs, costly federal regulations and rising fuel costs - all these things have increased what it costs us to provide good service to our customers," Marquardt said.

TESCO can't do much, he said, about inflation and the wastefulness of the federal bureaucracy, both of which have raised the company's operating and construction costs.

"We at TESCO, like all citizens, can only work through the political process to try to change the government policies that created these problems," he said.

But, Marquardt said, the company has been able to do something to lessen the effect of rising fuel costs on customers' bills.

"Our low-cost natural gas

contracts and our lignite coal have saved our customers more than \$1 billion so far," he said. "And our use of these two fuels is no accident. Long-range planning by dedicated employees 10, 20, and 30 years ago made this happen."

Marquardt noted the company's Old Ocean natural gas contract, which was signed 20 years ago and will expire at the end of this year.

When the contract expires, the amount of gas it supplied will have to be replaced with gas purchased at today's far higher prices, and the result will be higher bills to customers.

But, Marquardt said, "Because of Old Ocean, their bills have been substantially lower than they would have been. When that contract expires, it will have saved our customers more than \$700 million."

Even after Old Ocean expires, he added, customers' bills will not be as high as they would have been if it were not for another example of long-range planning - the acquisition of lignite coal reserves, beginning 30 years ago, and the construction during the late 1960s and '70s of new power plants to use it.

Through the end of 1979, customers saved about \$250 million because the company was able to use cheaper lignite instead of natural gas to produce part of their electricity, Marquardt said, and

those savings will continue through the life of the company's lignite-fueled power plants.

The Comanche Peak nuclear plant also "will provide a supply of electricity that people can count on," he said.

"The plant has been designed well. It's being built carefully, and it's going
