AUSTIN—The Committee on Higher Education Financing in Texas is conducting one of the most important studies of the interim at this time.

The Committee was formed by Senate Concurrent Resolution 101 of the 66th Legislature and is composed of three appointees of the Governor, three appointees of the Lieutenant Governor, and three appointees of the Speaker of the House with the Lieutenant Governor serving as chairman and the Speaker as vice-chairman.

The Committee is charged with the responsibility of investigating all aspects of funding the State's colleges and universities, specifically

facility financing, tuition and fees, state funding, formulas, and other related matters.

The Committee has obtained a large quantity of data dealing with enrollment projections, tuition policies, revenue needs, trends. Decisions as to what is realistically needed for the future well-being of higher education must be made.

With limited revenue projections, the State must look at means of promoting the efficient operation of its colleges and universities. Cost controls must be em-

phasized, and a determination of how much construction is actually needed must be made.

It is my belief that a proper method of insuring adequate space and academic excellence is achievable without creating a burden on the taxpayers. With a redirection of funds and emphasis on efficiency, higher education should improve and serve the needs of the State for years to come.

GRAPEFRUIT PIE

- 1 9-in. baked pie shell
- 32 marshmallows, regular size - 1 1/2 C.
- 1/2 C. grapefruit juice
- 1 C. heavy cream
- 2 1/2 C. fresh grapefruit sections
- 1/4 C. coconut, shredded

Cut marshmallows in quarters and melt them in 1/4 cup grapefruit juice. Cool to room temperature. Add remaining 1/4 cup juice to sections. Whip cream. Fold cooled marshmallows, grapefruit and cream together. Pour into cooled pie shell. Allow to set about 3 hours. Sprinkle coconut over pie just before serving. Note: Add 2-3 drops of red food coloring to make pie a nice pink color.

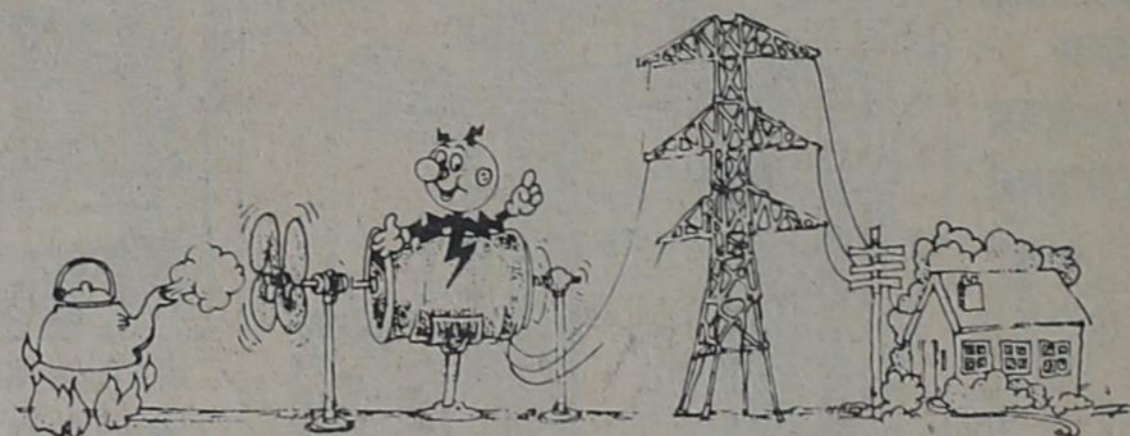
