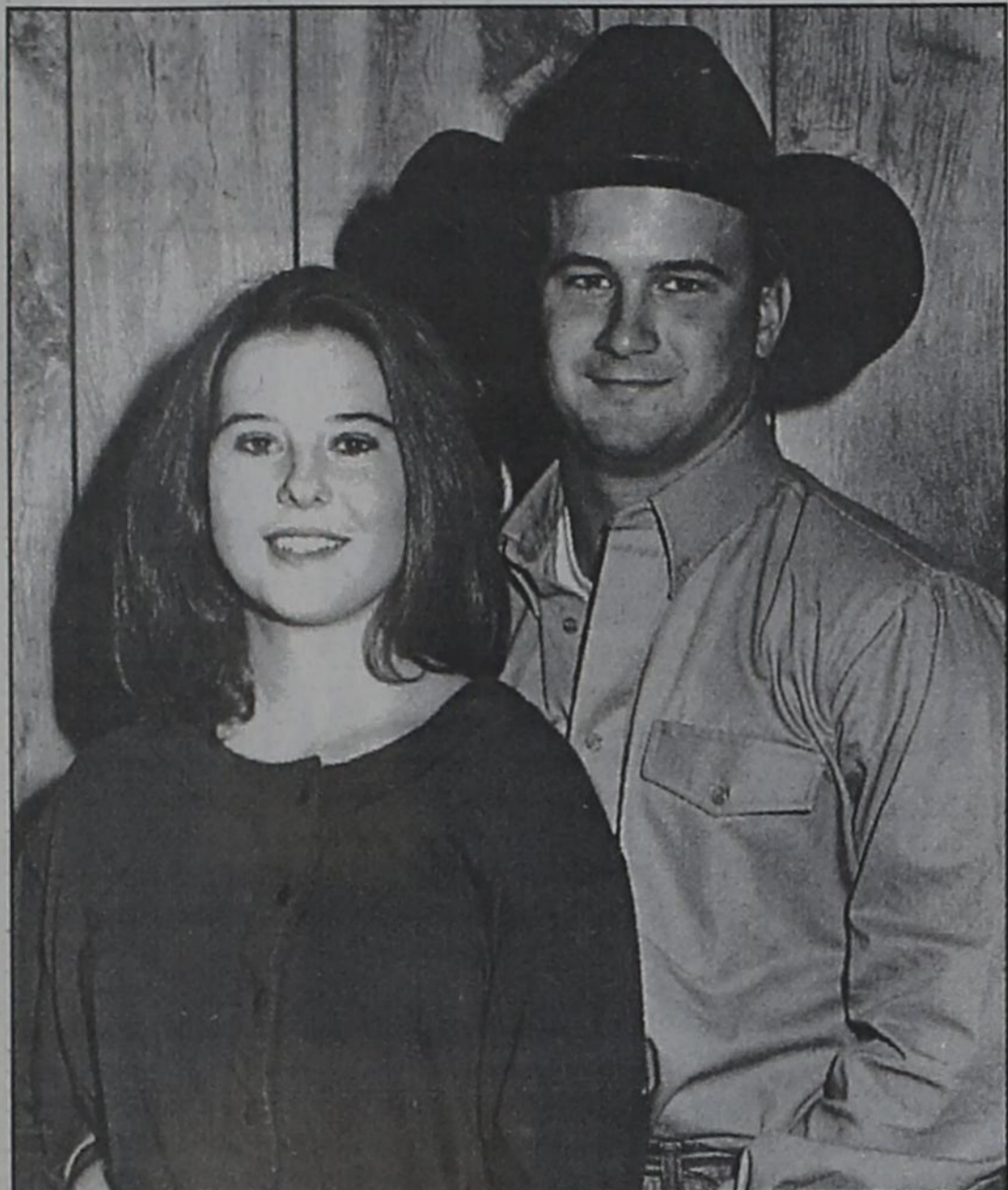


Scitern and Sparger To Exchange Vows

Notice To Potential Peanut Parade Participants

If you plan to ride a horse in the Peanut Parade on September 13, 1997, you will need to have that animal tested for Coggins and have that certificate on your person. This test takes about 7 days and without it you cannot participate.

The Texas Animal Health Commission rule ALL horses participating in shows, rodeos, parades and other public events must have a negative Coggins test. This ruling became mandatory July 1st.

6) First, Second, Third and Fourth place ribbons will be awarded.

7) Rosettes will be given to: Most outstanding, Most Original, Most Creative, Best of Show.

8) Categories are: Wall hangings up to 40" X 50", 1st quilt done, applique, baby quilts any size, twin 65" X 90", regular 80" X 90", Queen 85" X 90", King 108" X 90", Oldest quilt. Each of the categories will be divided according to whether the quilt is hand pieced or machine pieced and/or hand quilted and machine quilted. Also, they will be divided by age, children, adults, and 75 years and over. There will also be a professional category for

those who taught or teach quilting classes.

9) For each quilt entered please provide following information: Pattern, made by, age category, size of quilt, year made, name of person entering quilt (if different from who made quilt), Pieced and quilted by hand and/or machine.

This information on each quilt will make check in go more quickly.

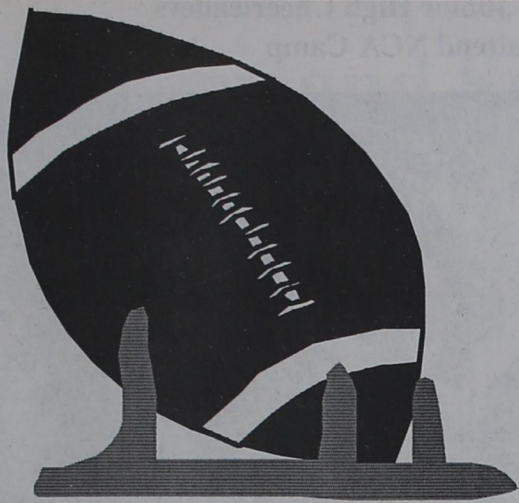

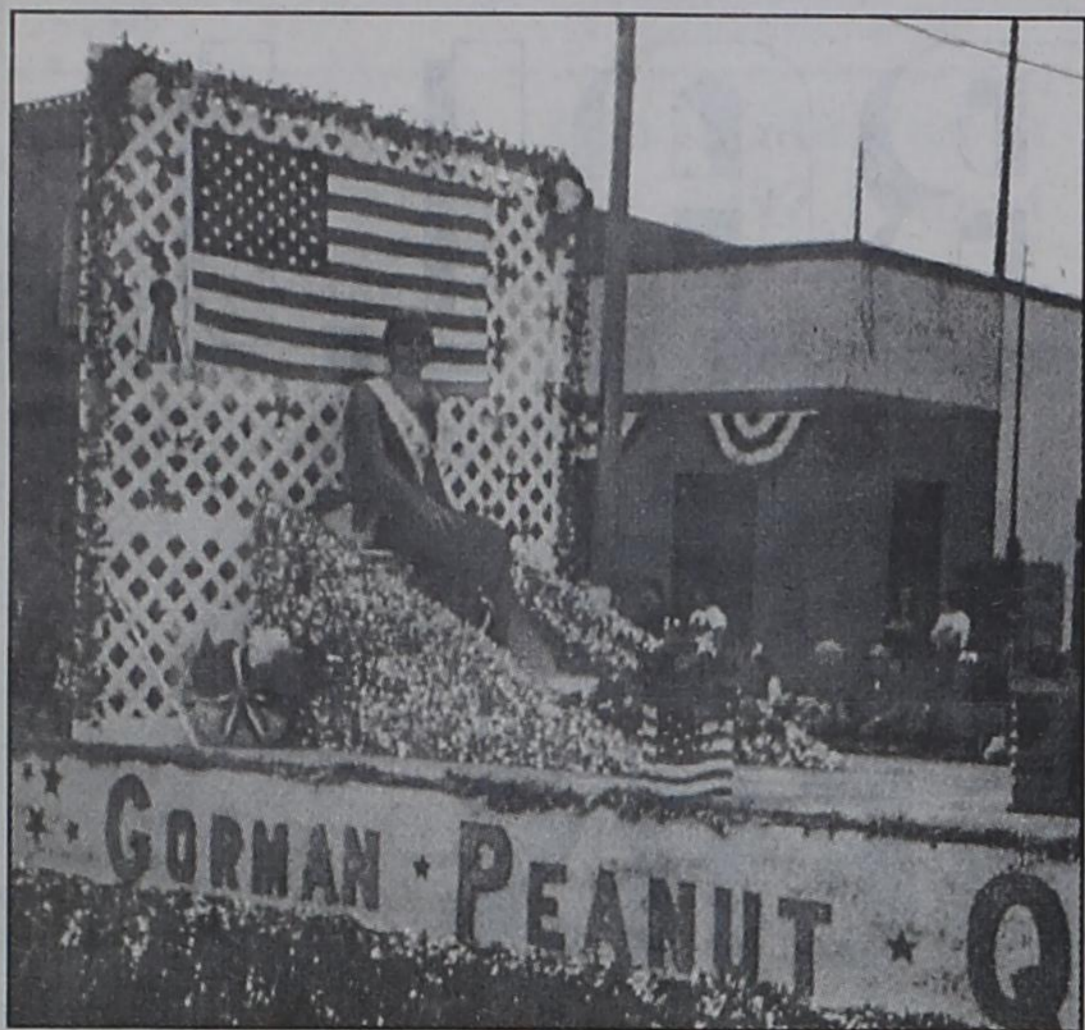

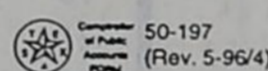

COLLEGE STATION — Former participants in Even Start family literacy programs in 10 Texas communities indicate parents are making significant education gains, follow-up research reveals.

Of the 296 former participants surveyed, 33.8 percent have acquired their GED certificates and 29.2 percent have enrolled in further training.

These are a portion of the preliminary findings Texas A&M University professor Don Seaman and research coordinator Ann Martinez reported at a national conference.

Speaking at the 1997 Commission on Adult Basic Education Conference in Detroit, Mich., Seaman and Martinez said the results from the survey of the 10 programs indicate that educational gains for parents have translated into more parental interaction with their children's education and better pay at work.

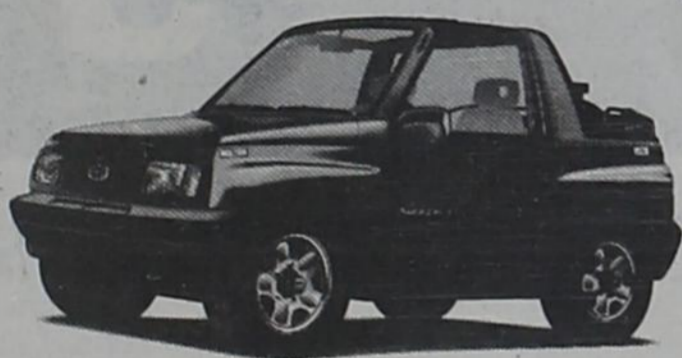

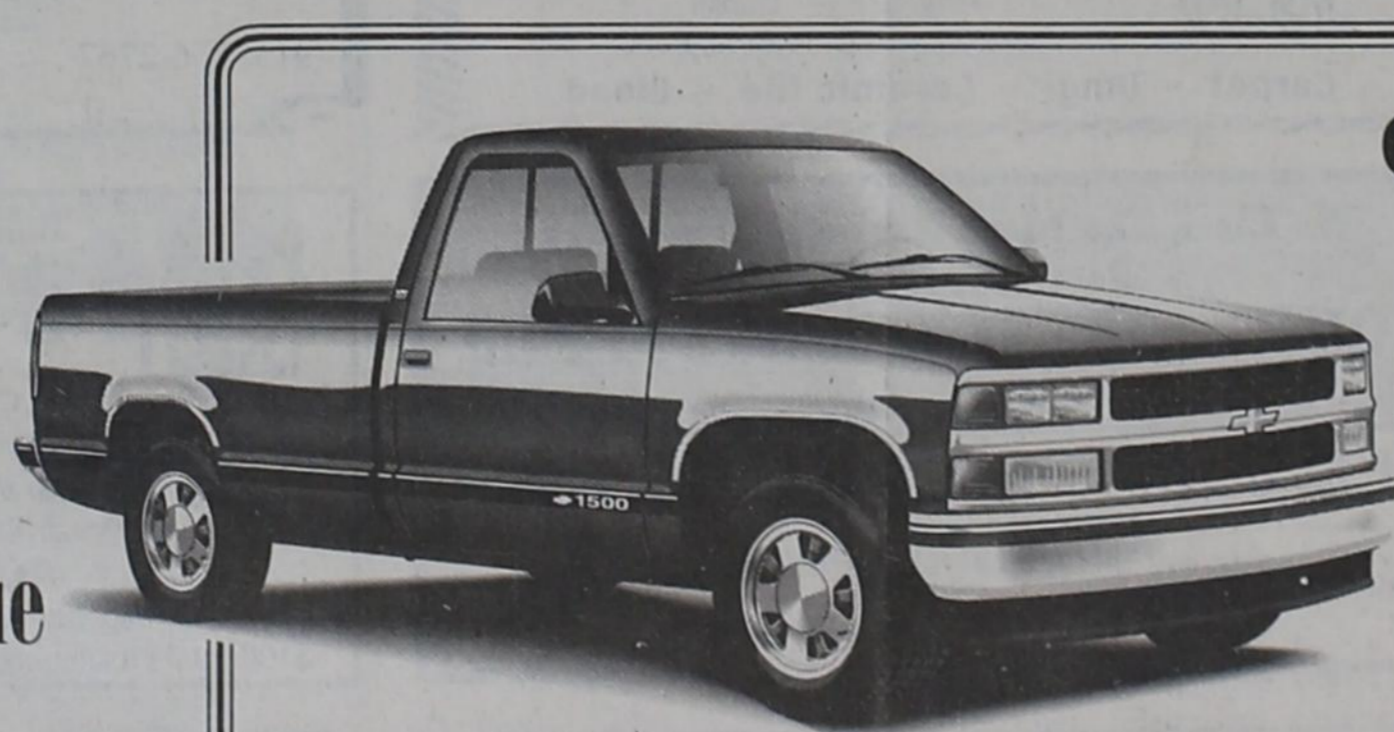
