Chamber Of Commerce Banquet Big Success

Congressman Stenholm expressed confidence that Americans can and would solve problems facing the nation at home and abroad in a talk at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Farmer of the Year Award Banquet last Friday night in the High School Gym. "We have demonstrated many times in our 204 year history that we care enough for our country and our flag to accept and meet all challenges" Mr. Stenholm said. He admitted that he had made mistakes in the past in cutting our defense spending and we need to reinstate some programs to make our military stronger and at the same time he stated we would have a balanced budget and he as a member of Congress would do everything he could to make cuts in spending where ever possible, but that the government could not do it alone. We as Americans should start on individual bases and remember "we have it better than any other country in the World."

"We are going to have to for go the luxury of talking about what is wrong with our country, what is wrong with ourselves, what is wrong with other people and what is wrong with the church, what is wrong with other countries what is wrong with other segments of society and begin to devote all the talent we can possibly bring to bear on what is right with America."

He agrees that the farm program needs a turn around that we need to keep the farmers on the farm and to do, so they must make a profit on their production, and 64 per cent of parity is not enough to keep farmers in business and "this is tragic", Stenholm said.

He urges "as we face the future, we need to be mindful of waste, to be proud of our heritage, and offer no apologies for having the world's best country."

Stenholm was given a standing ovation at the conclusion of the address.

Charles Little was named Farmer of the Year for 1979. Little, 41, was born and reared in Eastland County. The son of Mamie Little and the late John Little. He graduated from Carbon High School in 1957 and served his country in the U. S. Army. He married Carolyn Collins in 1962. They have three children, Caye 16, Charla 12, and Alan 9.

Charles is a member of the Kokomo Baptist Church. He served as Sunday School superintendent and president of the Eastland County Livestock Association, Gorman Roping Club and County Committeeman.

He is a member of the Eastland County Livestock Association, County Committeeman, Assistant General Superintendent of Eastland County Livestock Show and is class president of his Sunday School Class.

He operates 1600 acres including 250 acres peanuts, cotton, maize, sudan, oats and wheat and a cow and calf operation of 75 mother cows.

He married Oma Dee Guy in 1936. They have three children and six grandchildren. A daughter Sue Nichols of Katy, a son Charles of Keller and a son, Jim Tom of Carbon.

He began his teaching career in 1936 in Carbon, and moved to Gorman in 1965 and was superintendent of schools from 65 to 73, when he retired. He is presently teaching part time in the Gorman Schools.

Garrett has served as the mayor of Gorman for two years and during that time he has helped start the Senior Citizens program and the Senior Citizens Building, which is not under construction, purchased a new pumper fire truck for the city, and re-built the water tower. He also is in charge of helping with the elderly income tax return and is instructor and trainee for Defensive Driving Course.

Charlie has been an active member of the community for many years and is a member of the First United


