The Lometa Hornets really swarmed the Big Red defense on the opening kickoff and moved 70 yards in 5 plays for a touchdown with Marvin DuBose racing the final 35 yards for the score with 10:00 left in the quarter. A pass try for two points failed and Lometa led 6-0.

The Panthers woke up after the long drive by the Hornets and started one of their own following the kickoff, which took only 2 plays. Following a 1 yard run, Dane Gressett faked the ball rolled back and tossed a pass to Jimmy Johnson, who shook loose from the Lometa defenders and raced for 58 yards and a touchdown with 9:22 left on the clock. Jimmy added the two pointer on a run and Gorman led 8-6.

The Panthers held the Hornets on their next possession and got the ball at the Gorman 36 and scored again with 10:36 left in the second quarter, going the 64 yards in 16 plays with David Pettit getting the final 4 yards up the middle. Scotty Mauney caught a pass from Gressett for the two pointer and Gorman led 16-6.

Then with 3:15 left the Panthers added another TD when Scotty Mauney ran it in from 2 yards out. The pass try for points failed and Gorman led 22-6.

The only score in the last half came with 5:48 left in the third period with Joe Jasso going the final 2 yards on a quarterback sneak. The run for two points failed and the score was 22-12.

Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.

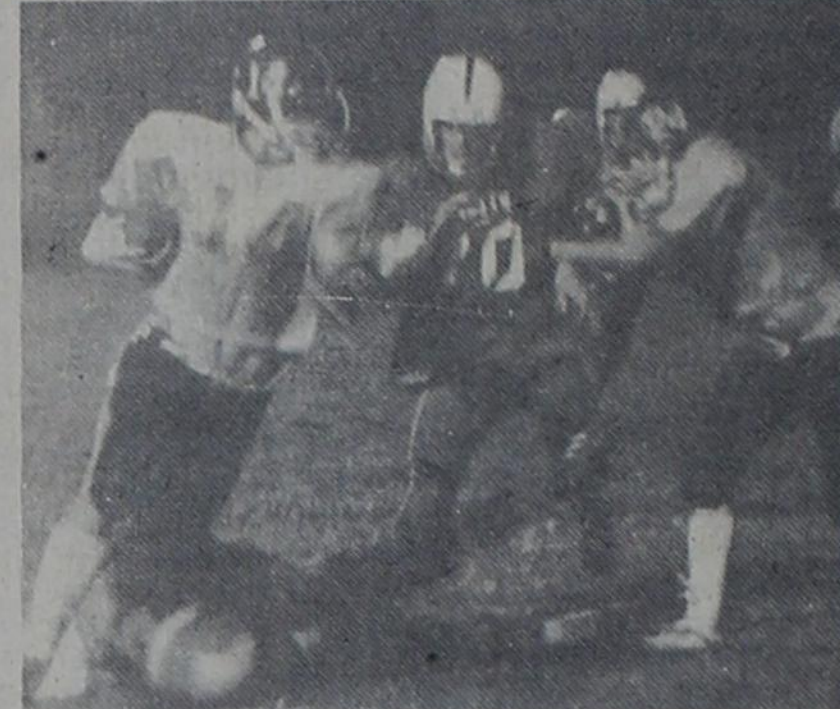

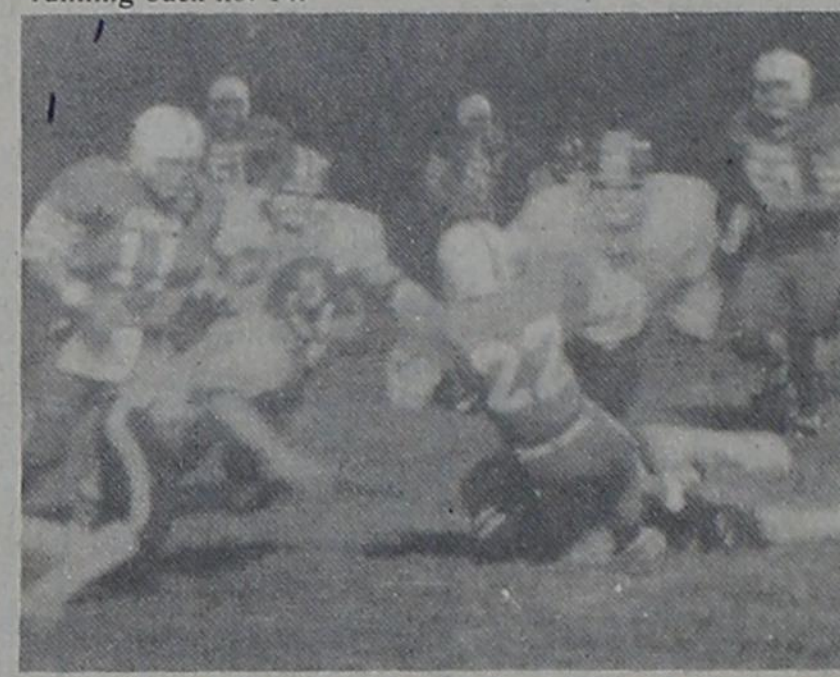

**CONGRESSMAN STENHOLM RECEIVES TREASURY AWARD**

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has been named to receive the National Associated Businessmen's (NAB) "Watchdog of the Treasury Award" for voting against unnecessary federal spending during the 96th Congress.

Stenholm scored 100 percent on NAB's "Economy Voting Record" (EVR), an index of congressional attitudes toward economy in government.

Thirty-five Senators and 179 Representatives (41 percent) qualified for the award, with only 62 Representatives scoring 100 percent.

Stenholm has also been awarded the National Federation of Independent Business' "Guardian of Small Businesses" award for his voting record on issues affecting the country's independent businessmen.

**Congressional Comment**

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The problems revolving around illegal aliens in this country continue to mount, but nothing is gained by burying our heads in the sand and pretending that those problems or the aliens themselves don't exist.

Such was the case in the U.S. House of Representatives recently, when an amendment was considered and passed which would prohibit the use of the 1980 census for the reapportionment of Congressional districts because the count allegedly included illegal aliens. Supporters of this amendment contended that the estimated 20 million illegal aliens — 5

million legally registered and an estimated 15 million undocumented — should not be included in the census.

I opposed this amendment on two basic grounds, one practical and the other Constitutional.

We are in the concluding stages of the decennial census of the U.S. and have spent over \$1 billion to arrive at this enumeration of our people. By barring the use of the census for the reapportionment of Congressional districts, this amendment will prevent the most effective use of the census. We will be repudiating an expensive effort that has already taken over one year and is not completed.

There was no question but that the Census Bureau did not check on a person's "alien" or "citizen" status while conducting this count and therefore they could not possibly identify how many aliens have been counted or where those per-

sons are, short of some type of "administrative adjustment" which is nothing more than manipulation of the figures to fit someone's predetermined beliefs.

A further point centers around the recent Federal Court opinion that a school district may not deny illegal alien children an equal educational opportunity. While I have reservations as to the propriety of that decision, I think it forces us to take a hard look at how best to live in the world as it is and not as we wished it were.

This is not to say that we can't continue trying to change the world, but the census will be used this year to allocate some \$50 million in federal funds, or over \$200 per person. That money is needed to assist localities impacted by that Federal Court mandate.

Some of the most persuasive arguments used in opposition to the amendment were Constitutional ones, involving the language of the directive for a national census in that document. The Constitution distinguishes between "persons" and "citizens" and also makes the distinction that those persons (Indians) not taxed are not to be counted.

In recognizing this distinction, the framers of the Constitution created a fundamental

right to be counted for representation that rests with all persons who are taxed. Aliens, while not citizens, are indeed persons and they are subject to taxation on any income earned in this country.



As long as we rely on the principals of Constitutional government and "no taxation without representation," it is of paramount importance that all persons be counted in order that their needs be represented.

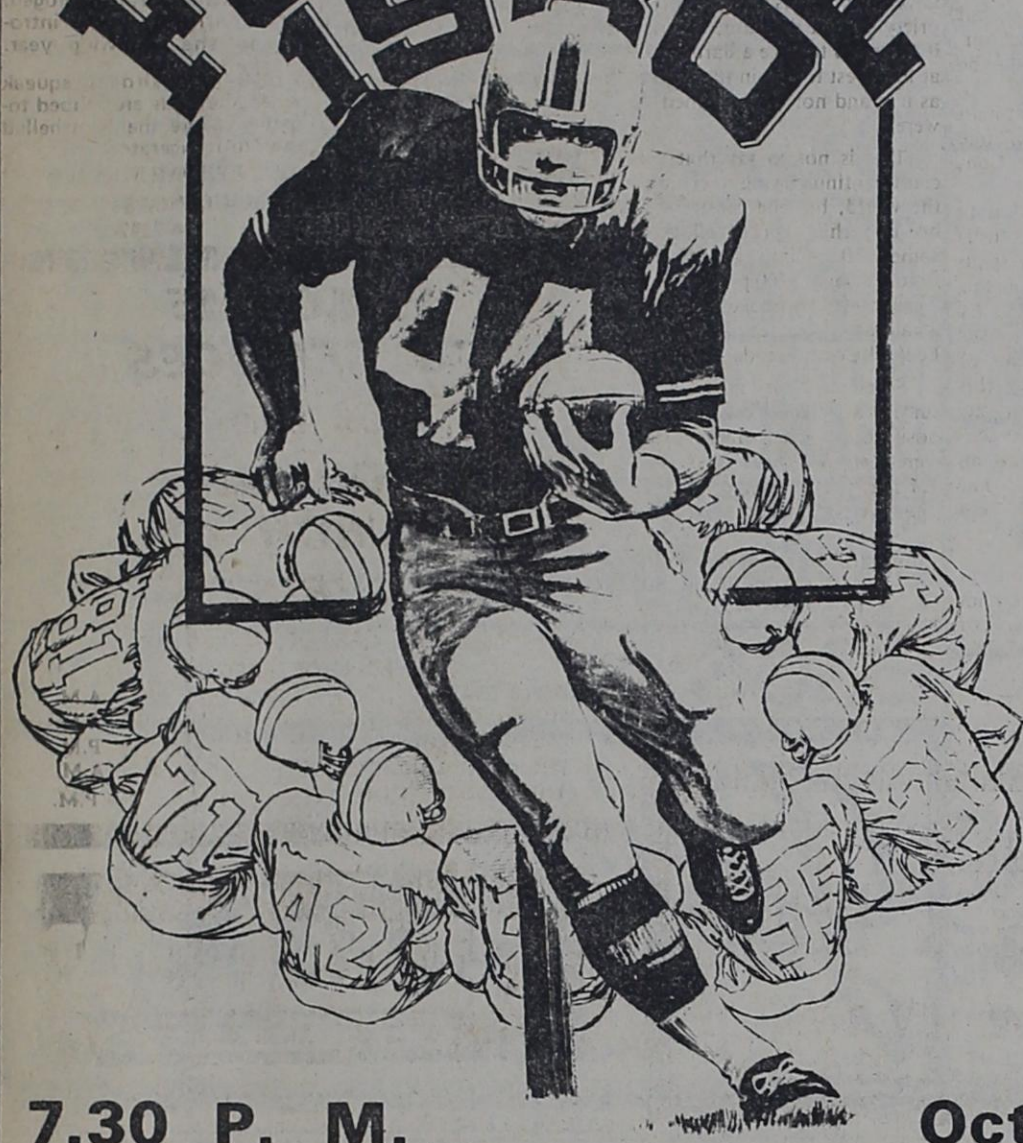
