Gorman Volunteer Fire Department men held a fire extinguisher demonstration at Blackwell Hospital on Monday afternoon.

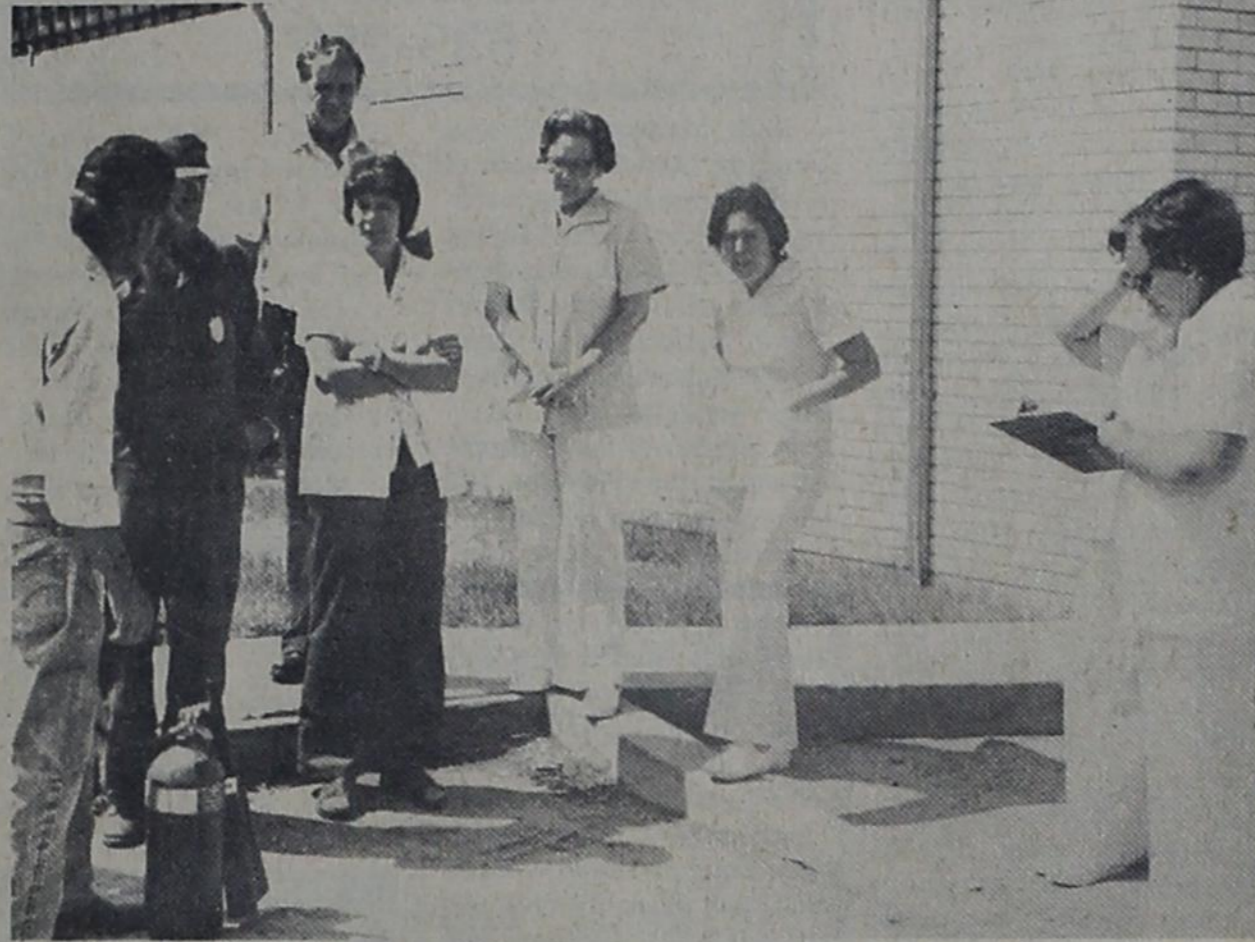
Mr. Charles Tarear, formerly with the Odessa Fire Department and now of Gorman, made the demonstration for the nurses, and

other personell at Blackwell Hospital.

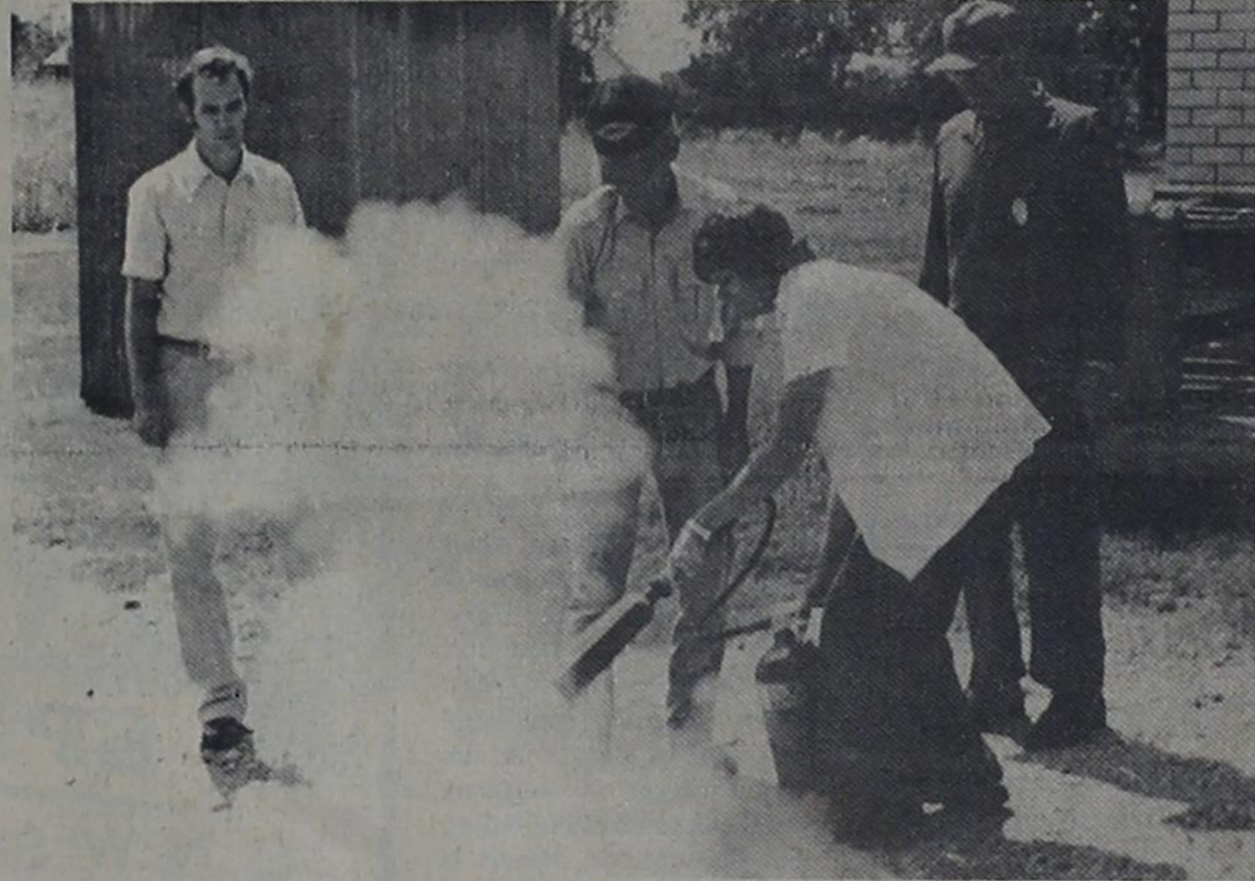
With the extinguishes and the knowledge to use them, it could be a great help in preventing a small fire from spreading into major ones.

The Gorman Panthers and the Dublin Lions really had a battle at Brogdon Field on Friday night with both teams scoring four touchdowns. The only thing wrong was that the Panthers couldn't manage to score any extra points in the game and came out on the short end of a 30 to 24 score. The Lions scored two quick td's on Gorman, one coming after an onside kick, and the Big Red just couldn't seem to get enough momentum to catch up. Both teams are to be congratulated for their fine play in this game. Neither team should feel bad about the way they played, for both played their hearts out.

Dublin scored first on their third possession when they took the ball on their own 18 and moved the distance in 7 plays with D. L. Funderburg getting the score from 5 yards out on a fine run with 4:42 left in the second quarter. A pass to Blake Bryant scored the 2 pointer and the score was 8-0.

Then lightning struck again as the Lions recovered an onside kick on the kickoff at the Gorman 48 and scored in 5 plays with Sammy Taylor catching a 15 yard pass from Bill Boy Bryant for the TD with 4:42 left in the period. Bryant kicked the PAT and Dublin led 15 to 0.

It didn't take Gorman long to come back though as Dublin refused to kick deep on the kickoffs and the Panthers took the ball on their own 40 and it took only one blink of the eye for Gorman to score as Jimmy Johnson took the handoff and raced 60 yards for the score with 4:30 left. The run for

points failed and the score was 15-6.

And just as quick Dublin extended its lead as Bill Boy Bryant took the kickoff, was hit by a defender, shook free and raced down the sideline for 65 yards with 4:16 left in the half. Bryant booted the PAT and the score was 22-6.

The Panthers were not through for the first half, however, as they took the ball on their own 47 and moved the distance in 11 plays with Jimmy Johnson getting the score from 3 yards out with 13 seconds left in the period. Again the run for points failed and the score at half time stood at 22-12.

Following the intermission the Panthers came right out smoking and took the ball on their own 47 and scored in 8 plays featuring a 22 yard run by Johnson. Dane Gressett got the touchdown on a 1 yard quarterback sneak with 8:43 left on the clock in the third. The pass try for 2 points failed and Dublin led 22-18.

The Lions wasted little time though getting another score as they took the ball on their own 42 and scored in 8 plays with Funderburg get-

ting the final 3 yards on a run with 5:30 left in the period. Bryant ran for the two points and the score rose to 30-18.

The Panthers were stopped on their next two possessions and then came back on their final possession going 52 yards in 6 plays featuring a 13 yard run by Johnson and a 12 yard pass to David Pettit. Johnson got the score on a 10 yard run with 30 seconds left in the game. The run for points failed and the score read 30 to 24 in Dublin's favor.

The Lions then took the kickoff and ran out the clock to seal the victory.

This was a hard loss for the Panthers, but they have no reason to feel bad as they played a great game despite the injuries and the fact that several of the boys had been sick most all week. But the Big Red fans showed their support for the Panthers with a standing ovation following the game for the fine performance of the Panthers.

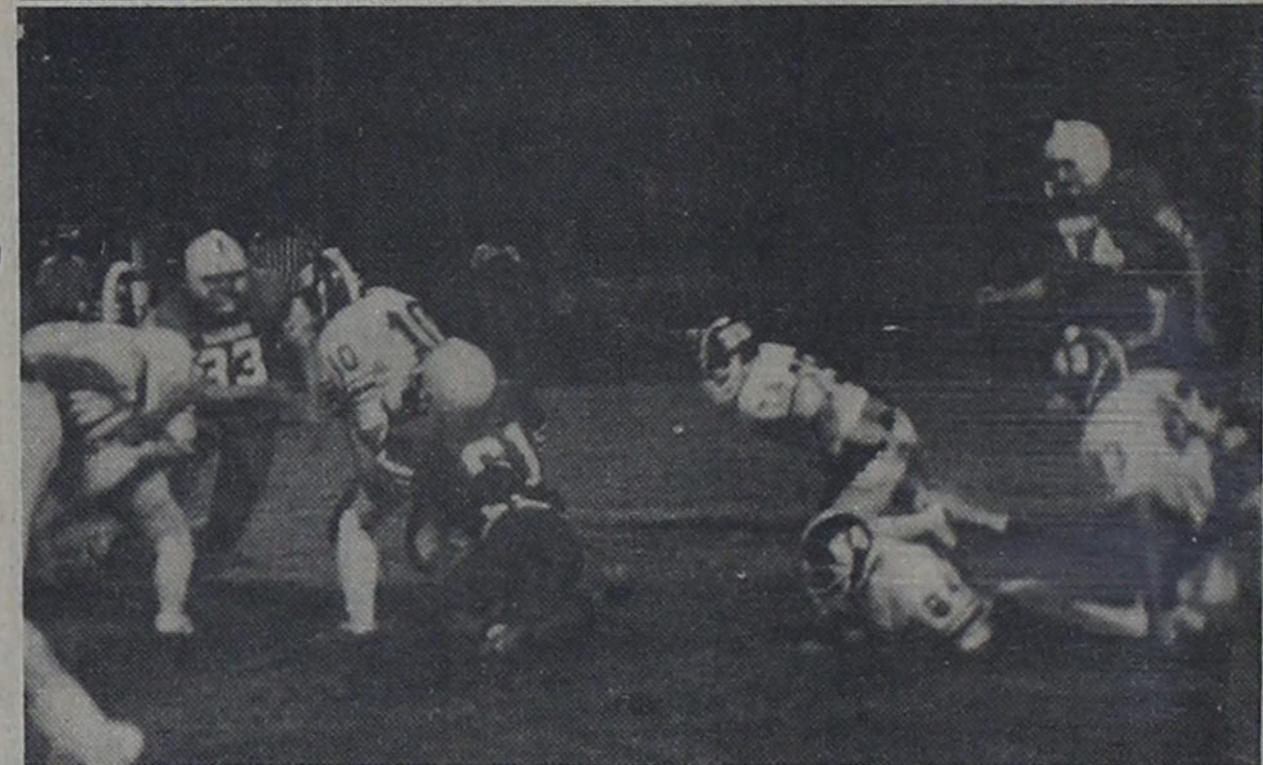
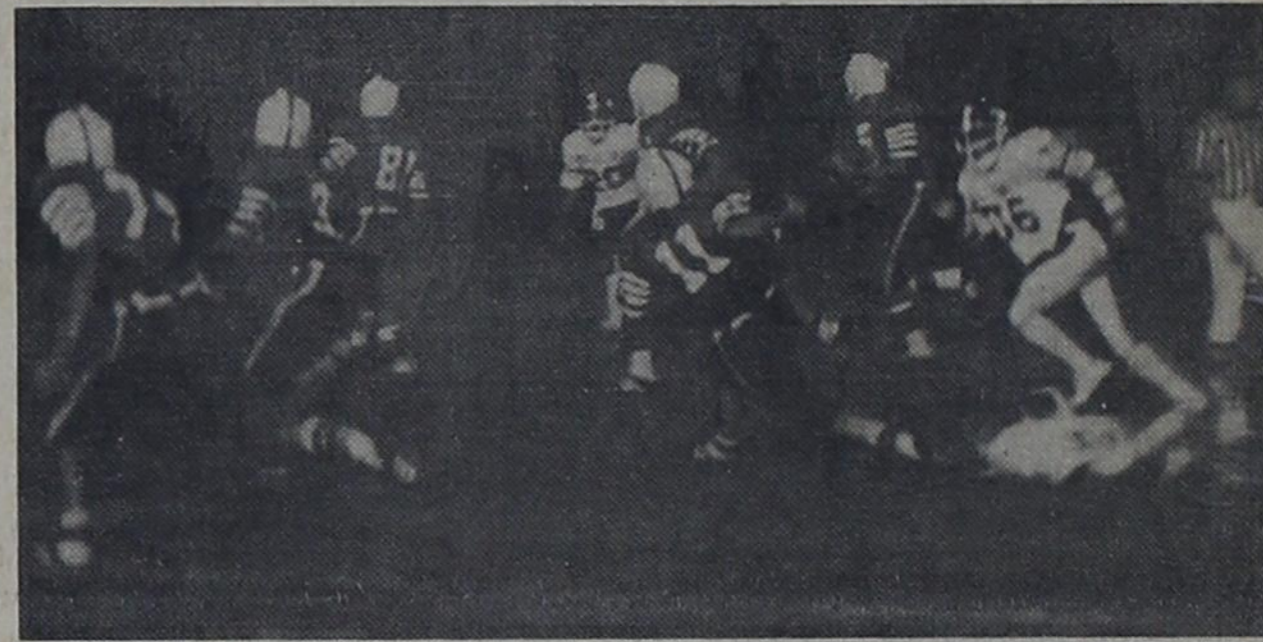

had 6 yards on 2 trips, Greg Skiles had 2 on 1 carry. David Pettit had 2 on 1 try and Toofer Bond had 1 on 2 tries. Toofer was injured in the first half and did not play the last half. It is not known if he will be able to play Friday night at De Leon, but it is doubtful. Scotty Mauney was also out because of an appendectomy and was sorely missed and will be out for several weeks yet.

This was a hard fought game and we wouldn't dare pick an outstanding defensive player as the whole bunch were great considering the outstanding team they were playing. The fans were so proud of all the Panthers.

This week's game will be another hum-dinger for the Panthers as they must travel to De Leon to take on the Bearcats in an annual battle which always proves to be a dandy. Lets all follow the Big Red to De Leon and back them to victory over the Bearcats. The Bearcats also have a 1 and 1 record on the season and are expected to be up for this annual battle. 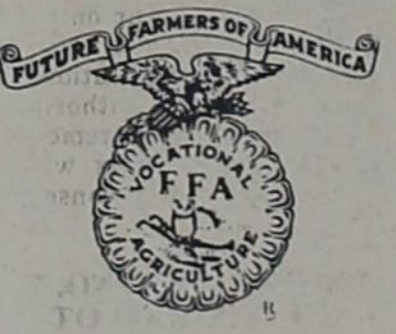

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

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House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

Eastland Lawmen Enjoying New County Jail Facility

By DAVID BURCH Staff Writer

EASTLAND — Most everyone concerned with the new \$800,000-plus county jail here agrees that conditions for prisoners have improved since the new facility opened — or closed — its cell doors early this month.

But office conditions for the sheriff, his secretary and deputies and the county jailers also have improved since the sheriff's department moved from the courthouse to the new jail facility.

John Mackey, one of three Eastland County jailers who work 24-hour shifts inside the modern, electrically controlled facility, proudly showed off the new jail Friday afternoon. He demonstrated the jail's electrically controlled locks system and pointed out backup security systems.

"Everything is modern and a lot better here" than in the old jail, he said. "It's a pretty good place to work."

However, he said he's "lucky to get two or three hours' sleep" during a 24-hour shift. The jailers sleep on an old, metal-framed bed fitted tightly between the wall and some shelves in an oblong storage room adjacent to the glass-enclosed control booth.

And, although the jailers have a private shower within the

confines of the booth, Mackey said, "we have to use cell (outside the booth) for the restroom."

"There's never anyone in that cell for very long, said, "so it works out pretty good."

That particular cell is not needed, the jailer said. The facility contains 12 four-man cells, an eight-man four juvenile units which can double as adult holding cells. Currently, 18 people are incarcerated in the new figure Sheriff Johnnie Morren said is causing daily statistical averages to double.

"We've jumped from an average of seven prisoners on any given day to 14 or 15 a day," Morren said for the increase, he said, include crowded court dock a lot of hard work" tracking down and arresting suspects.

Construction on the facility began last September and the sheriff began using the facility "the 1st of August."

"It's a pretty good place," Morren said. "We like better than the old place."

The old jail, which is attached to the new facility short passageway, will be used for storage, and the dilapidated building can be refurbished "and (prisoner) overflow" in future years.

"Sooner or later," he said, "it'll come to that."

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pre-trial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
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PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

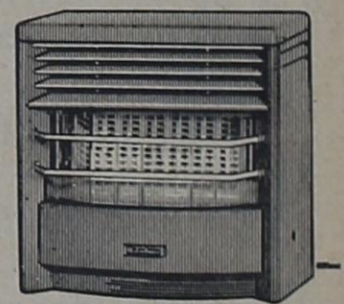
