THE GORDON SPOT

The nights continue to get cooler and we know a killing frost can't be too far away. Eastland County peanut growers are leaving the peanuts in the ground hoping they will mature a crop before that first frost. Some growers have reported that their peanuts are maturing better than expected while others have said maturity is coming slowly due to the cooler soil temperatures. Of course, some of the earlier peanuts have been harvested. Yields seem to vary from poor to good.

Pecans are hulling and falling now. Some of the early varieties are hulling on schedule. Because of the short crop of pecans the squirrels and birds are out getting their share. Growers are having to battle the wildlife for the few pecans that were produced this year.

Based on the current conditions, Texas pecan growers are expected to harvest 25 million pounds of pecans in 1980. That sounds like a lot, but is 73 percent below last year's crop. A little more than one half of that total will be natives and almost one half will be improved or paper-shell pecans.

The large pecan crop last year and the drought conditions this year have contributed to the light pecan crop.

The United States pecan crop is expected to be seven percent less than last year's. While most states are expecting a smaller crop this year, Georgia and Alabama are expecting much larger crops than last year.

Frost will be hitting the county before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three of four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

To be safe allow plant materials affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed.

Temple, Texas received \$837 million during fiscal year 1980 in loans and grants by the U. S. Department of Agriculture Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) supporting farms, home improvement and community development in rural areas. FmHA State Director, W. H. Pieratt, reports.

The agency's farm loan services, which supplement private credit available in rural areas, added \$524 million to Texas's resources for operation of farms during a year of emergency and commercial credit shortage for many farmers.

FmHA home loan programs accounted for \$134 million to build or improve 3,847 homes in town and countryside areas.

Loans and supplementary grants to improve rural community water, sewer, health, fire protection and other public facilities totaled 78 million for 164 projects throughout the state.

W. H. Pieratt said FmHA's improvement as a multi-purpose rural financial agency, service rural localities through county and district offices, has resulted in \$1.75 billion more farm credit and community development in rural Texas during the past two years.

The state director emphasized that FmHA has been given a lead responsibility in the system introduced this year to coordinate the Federal Government's rural development assistance with goals adopted in local and regional areas of the states.

"This action to implement the Rural Development Act has provided a clear channel of communication from localities, through their state development organizations, to highest levels of Washington for finding resources to meet the greatest needs of rural areas."

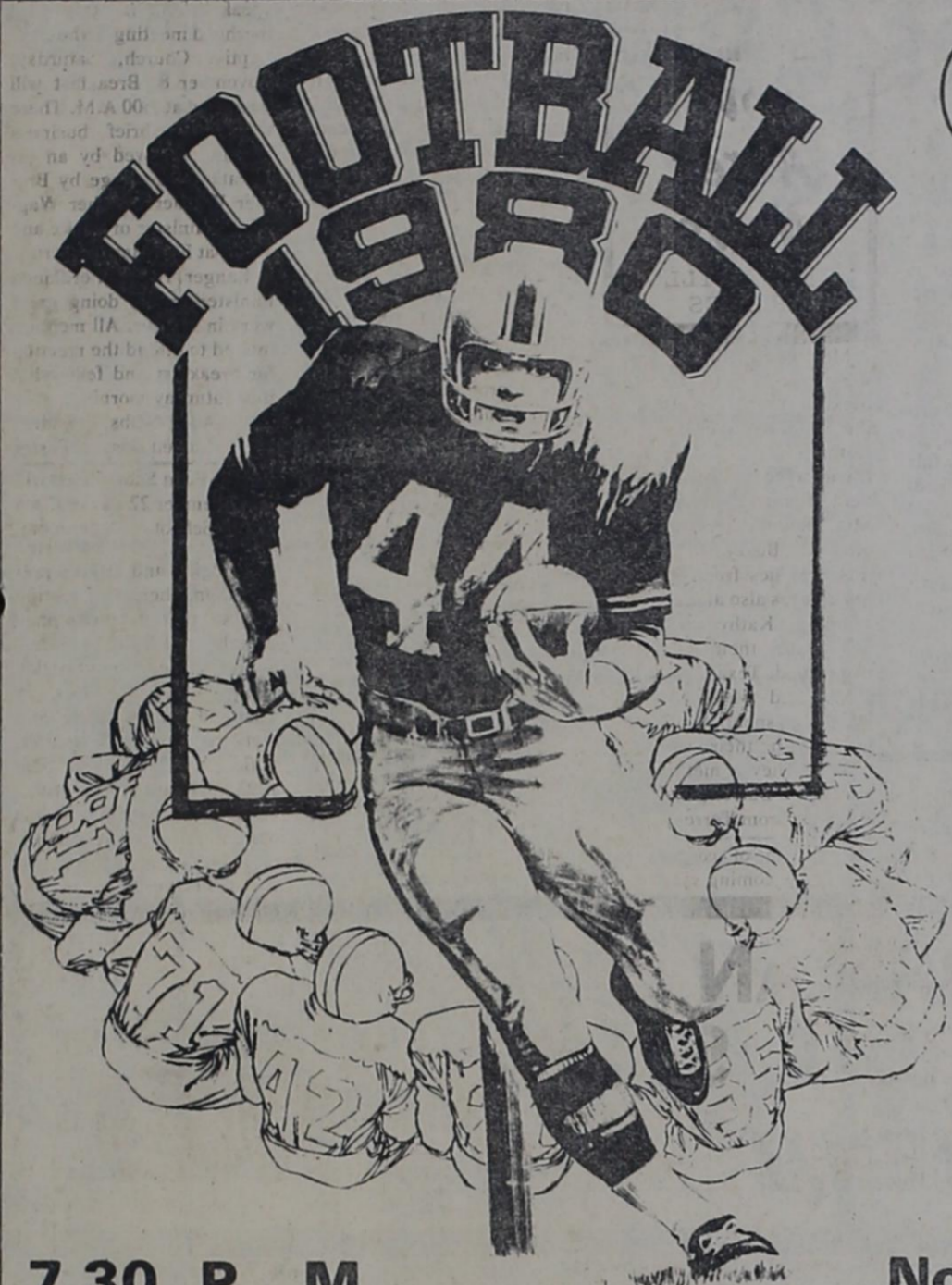

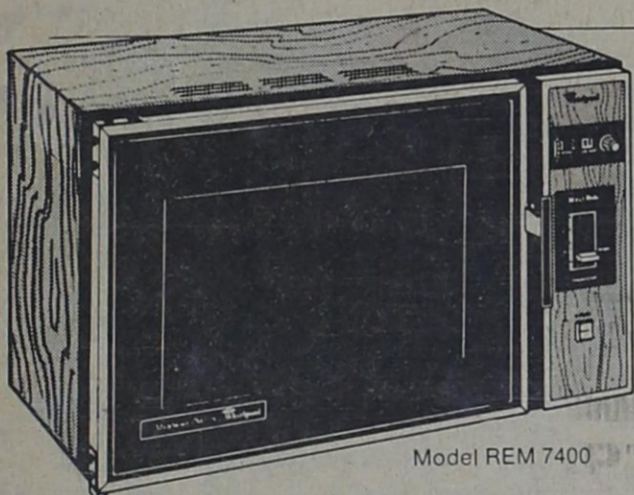
