Nona Bond Celebrates 99th Birthday On Aug. 10th



On August 10th, Mrs. Nona Bond will celebrate her 99th birthday surrounded by her family and friends.

Nona was born August 10, 1895 south of Gorman, to Jim and Habie Echols. She had 4 brothers and 6 sisters. At age 3 her father bought his father's place near Greenwood, Arkansas. The trip was made by train and horse and wagon. Her memories of the homeplace include a large apple orchard where neighbors would come to gather apples and a hand-cranked cider mill resembling an old washing machine with a large crank. Berries grew wild on the

place. She also remembers they had no fruit jars for canning until about 1900. She remembers there were virtually no conveniences that we take for granted today. Nona began school at age 4 learning her ABC's and after becoming bored with that, she learned them backwards and still remembers them today.

In November of 1901 the family moved back to Texas and settled on a farm north of Gorman, near Staff. The trip was made in a covered wagon and took 21 days. Between 1901 and 1919 the family lived in the Indian Mountain and the Leon Communities, both near Gorman.

In 1919 she married D. L. Bond, a widower who had 5 daughters, Ola Hirst, Lula Gooden, Florence Richardson, Verna Watson and Bea O'Neal, ages 5 to 14. They subsequently had another daughter, Doris Bryan. Doris and Bea both live in Gorman. Her husband passed away in 1959. She currently resides in the Gorman Hotel Apartments where she has lived for the past 19 years. Her family has grown to include 7 grandchildren, 18 great-grandchildren and 14 great-great-grandchildren. She has family photographs which include 5 generations.

Through the years her hobbies have been gardening, tating and crocheting.

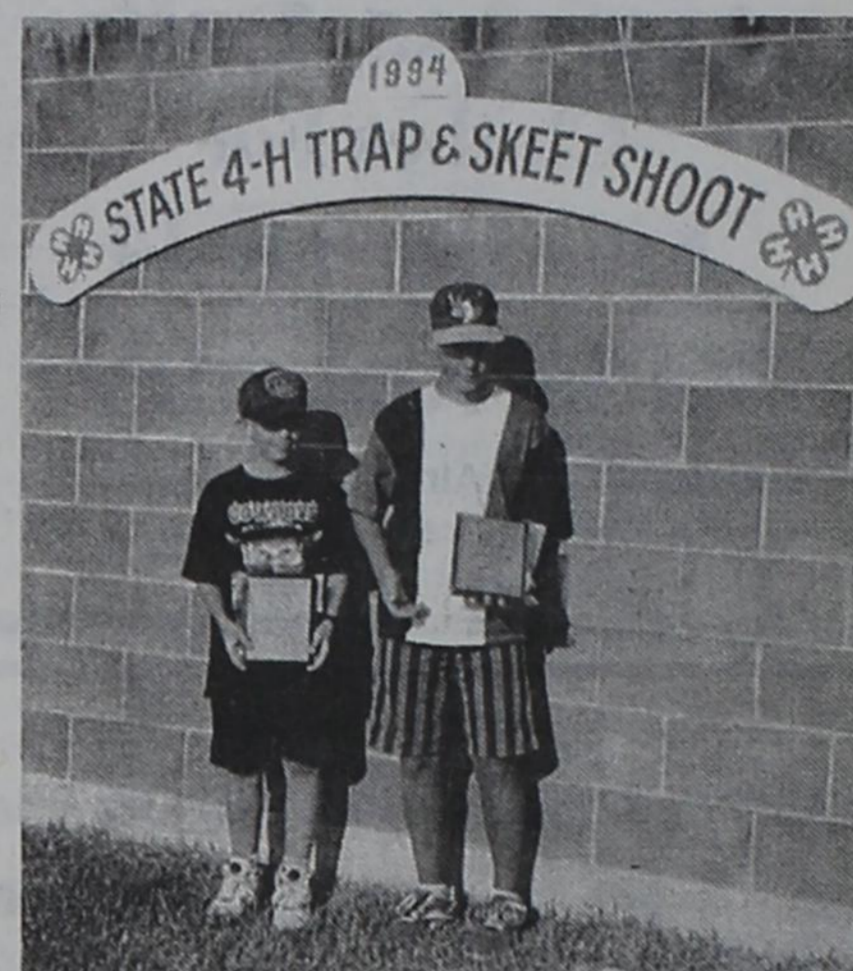

Stenholm Urges Interior Dept. To Consider Private Property Rights

Washington D.C. — Congressman Charles Stenholm has contacted Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt to express concern with the proposed critical habitat designation for the golden-cheeked warbler. The current proposal by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service would designate parts of 33 Texas counties that cover 20.5 million acres as critical habitat for this bird.

"This proposal will strip people of their private property rights, cause economic hardship for thousands of farmers, ranchers, developers and landowners, and result in unrealistic and burdensome government regulation," Stenholm said in a letter signed by other Members of the Texas Delegation.

After pointing out that Congress has increasingly demonstrated a desire to protect private property rights and to curb the regulatory appetite of the federal government, Stenholm called on Secretary Babbitt to "reconsider the decision to designate such an excessive amount of land for habitat."

Stenholm also requested Secretary Babbitt to hold public hearings. "The people who live in the counties affected by the proposal deserve straight answers to their questions, and I intend to hold timely meetings in an effort to make the people's voice heard," Stenholm said.

In a separate letter, Stenholm and his colleagues challenged the Interior Department's efforts to use the U. S. Court System to expand the scope of the Endangered Species Act beyond the authority of the current law.

PECANS

The annual Eastland-Callahan Bi-County Pecan Field Day will be held on Monday, August 15th beginning at 9:30 a. m. The event will take place on the John Gerhardt farm, 8 miles south of Cisco on Hwy. 183, then 1 mile east on FM 2526 (follow signs).

Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist from Vernon, will be on hand to discuss weevil emergence, scouting and control measures as well as shuckworm and casebearer management. Mr. Boring is very knowledgeable on pecans and is one of the top educators in the entomology field.

Dr. Chip Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist from Stephenville, will highlight some areas of disease management in particular Scab, which is effecting most trees in the county now.

A market outlook on the prospects of the '94 crop value will be given by Shawn Oliver of Oliver Pecan Co. on San Saba.

Representative from Texas Department of Agriculture will be on hand to discuss private applicator recertification and CEU's.

Two (2) CEU's will be given to all private applicators in attendance.

A noon fish fry will conclude the meeting. The meal is being sponsored by affiliated Agri-Industries and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

PRUSSIC ACID

I had many questions over the last week about Prussic Acid poisoning in sorghum related grasses. First thing a producer needs to understand is that, though the possibility of hydrocyanic (prussic) acid build up exists,

it is very rare. This is not to say that you should not be aware of its existence, but you should not be alarmed. Most likely, lightning will destroy more livestock in your production history than will prussic acid.

Although there is no effective test for the acid build up, there are instances that can be recorded as higher potential danger periods. These include:

1. Grazing sorghum less than 15

inches tall.
2. Grazing plants that have been in stress, and have received rains and rapid new growth has occurred.

3. Grazing after a one-killing frost (2 weeks).

4. Grazing after a killing frost before plant material is dry.

5. Grazing severely drought stressed plants.

Use some common sense in determining these factors and when making decisions on grazing sorghum.

I suggest that before you turn the herd in to a field of sorghum, turn that cow you really don't like in for tester - better to lose one than the whole herd.

LETTER TO HOUSEHOLDS (Multi-Child) NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Parent/Guardian:

The Gorman school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for \$.80. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

Gramm Blasts

'Clinton Lite'

WASHINGTON (SPL) - Texas Sen. Phil Gramm, issuing a blistering condemnation of the Democrats' Clinton-style health care plan, says he will draw the line at allowing government to take greater control of the system.

"I want to reform the health care system and build on its strengths," he said. "I'll fight any effort to get government deeper into our health care and deeper into our pockets."

The Democrat proposal to place a 9.5 percent payroll tax on employers to help cover their employees' insurance plans would "shear off the bottom rung of the economic ladder," said Gramm.

The payroll tax would also cost millions of Americans their jobs, he said.

Specifics of a health care reform plan Gramm says he would endorse include making health insurance portable, which means people wouldn't lose their coverage if they leave their jobs.

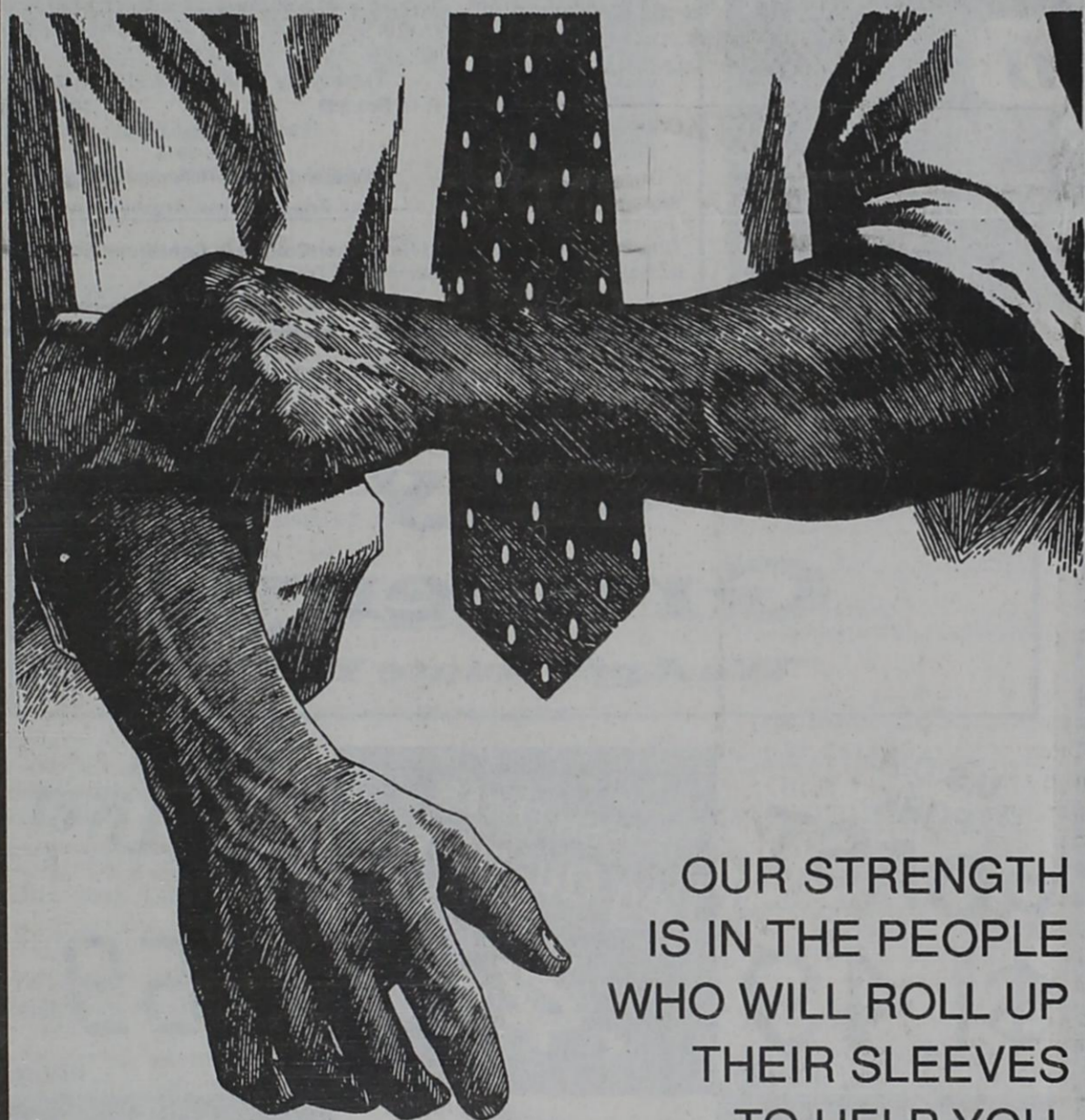
