Dr. Cox urges people to follow the simple rule of reading the label before using anything from a carton or bottle, either as food or as medicine. In brief, his advice to the public is: "Be sure you know what you are taking, and when in doubt DON'T TAKE IT!"

A minimum of 36 feet of hopper space per 100 hens should be allowed.





### Ten Gallons of Milk?

COLLEGE STATION-How much feed does it take to produce enough from Lubbock. milk to fill a ten-gallon can? That ist. If it takes six cows to fill the 24-tfc can, they will need about 85 pounds of hay and 30 pounds of concentrates. Three cows would need half as much hay, and about the same amount of concentrates. The big difference is that only three cows have to be milked and cared for. That's why is means more money to have the right number of good cows than a lot full of poor milkers. The four sources of feed for cows during a twelve-month period are grass, hays, silage and concentrates.

Knee deep in good green grass is the way dairymen like to see their cows. Lots of green grass means lots of milk, and lots of milk means more money to the dairyman, Gibson soys. But there isn't good green grass through all the year, so the dairy farmer has to turn to plenty of good hmay and silage, most of them are feeding concentrates too, but the whole job can't be done with concentrates.

There is only about a fifth as much milk produced in the winter as in the summer time, Gibson says. A good many dairymen see the value of having hay and silage on hand when the pastures are gone. When the cows have lots of good grass. they won't eat nearly as much hay and silage. But there isn't a yearround supply of grass available.

Enough feed for the cows all through the year and more fall freshening cows will go along toward a more stable milk production. The number of good cows on a farm that can be properly fed and managed means more milk at less cost, says Gibson, and goes a long way toward a program of balanced dairy-

000,000 in February, according to 1947, food sales were down 1 pe. preliminary tabulations of the Uni- cent. to the seasonal pattern. However, February sales were 4 per cent above a year earlier.

February sales of durable goods stores decreased 13 per cent, while non-durable goods stores sales slipped 5 per cent from January.

Family clothing stores registered the sharpest monthly decline as sales fell 19 per cent. Men's and boy's clothing stores sales ran second, with 17 per cent; and other apparel stores, 16 per cent. 
