Snider, Barnes win seats on commission

The eastern side of Curry County will be well represented on the Curry County Commission. Both David Snider, of Texico, and Paul Barnes, of Pleasant Hill, were winners.

Snider, a Democrat, defeated Bobby D. Light, 726 to 643. Snider waged a strong door-to-door campaign to defeat the incumbent. And Barnes, also a Democrat, turned back George Patterson, 1,629 to 1,380.

In Texico, Snider won 135 to 108. In Pleasant Hill, Barnes won 51 to 5.

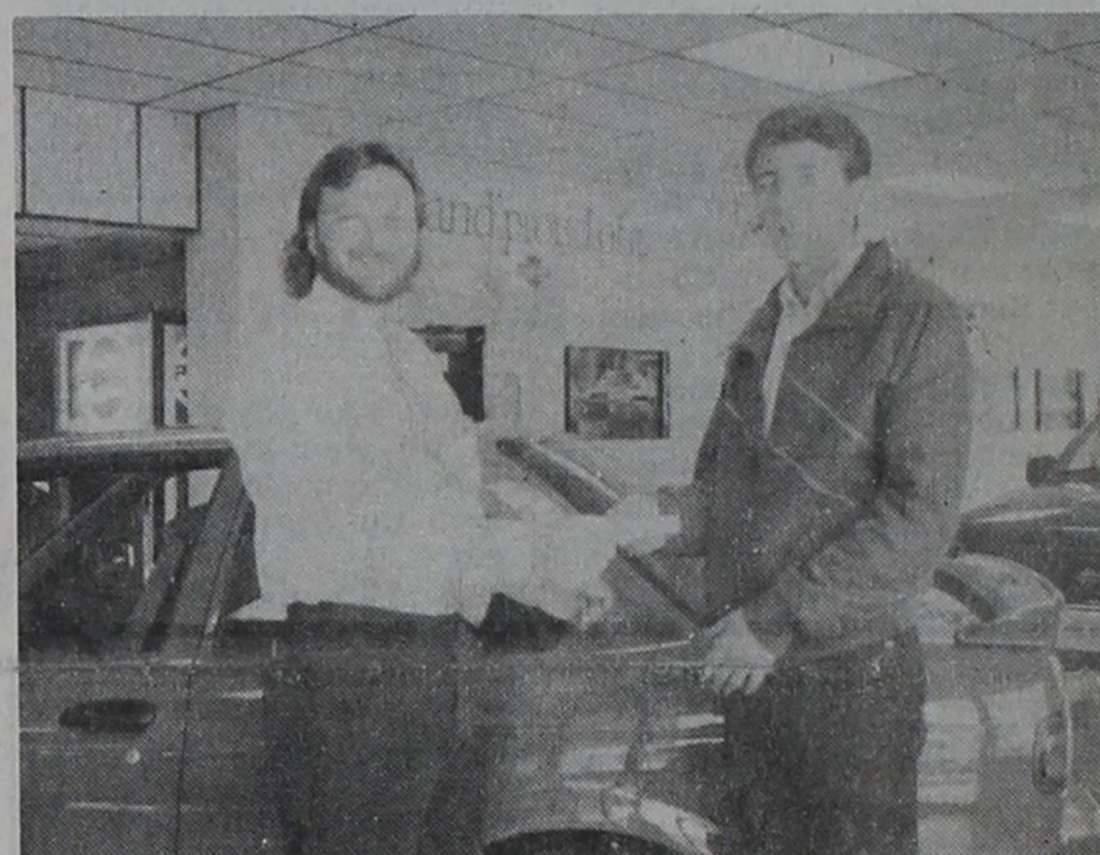

Texico down to one well

The Texico City Council received some bad news at a special meeting Tuesday night: one of its wells is contaminated.

Brown Edwards, a field environmentalist with the state Environmental Improvement Division, said samples taken at the KKR Park well show particles of carbon tetrachloride, a cleaning agent for metals. It's a carcinogen, which means it is possibly cancer-causing.

The sample taken showed 7 parts per billion for carbon tetrachloride.

Edwards reported to the city Monday about the contamination and the well was disconnected immediately.

But it means that Texico has only one functioning well - at the Tower Park. A third well, on the old Santa Fe property - has shut down due to lack of water there.

This means that if a problem occurs at the Tower Park well, the city will be without water.

Samples taken by the EID at the Tower Park well indicated no problem there. The Tower Park well is the one in regular use. The KKR Park well has been a standby well, but has been used from time to time.

Edwards outlined several ways the well can be treated to reduce the carbon tetrachloride level. He also indicated state funds may be available to pay for a new well. Two years ago, the state provided funds for Texico for a new well when an emergency occurred.

Edwards also said the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency will investigate the Texico situation to try to determine where the contaminant is coming from. It could be coming from the ground surface. Edwards said traces of another carcinogen also were found in the KKR Park sample, but were low enough not to cause a concern.

The reason carbon tetrachloride was found now was because the EID is using new tests. Edwards said carbon

tetrachloride could have been in the well for 20 years - or just one day. There was no way of telling.

Edwards said a drip oil has been used on the KKR Park pump and that may be illegal. He said a mineral or vegetable oil is recommended. For example, Clovis uses water-lubricated pumps or submersible pumps.

The drip oil is not supposed to have carbon tetrachloride in it, said one person.

The council took several actions:

- Asked Edwards to find out where portable pumps are available so that if the Tower Park well goes down (with normal repairs usually taking at least a week), then a portable unit could be put in place quickly.

- Will check on filter systems as a stop-gap measure.

- Will contact the state about possible grant funds to build a new well. The cost for the last one was about \$50,000 (including engineer, etc.).

- Hired Vane Doshier to clean the KKR Park well pump to see if that's causing the problem. After the cleaning, samples will be taken. If the contaminant is still found, a new pump and-or well likely would be needed.

- Decided to take a sample at a nearby private well to see if any contaminants are found there.

- Decided to take a sample from the oil used to lubricate the KKR Park well to see if contaminants are found in it.

In other business, the council addressed the question raised recently over whether the city should expand its boundaries. Several residents of areas just outside the city limits were again present.

Mayor Doyal LaRue reported that Curry County Commissioner John Wright said that the county and city of Clovis have reached an agreement to expand Clovis' territorial limits to Texico's city limits.

To what part of Texico's city limits this expansion would be wasn't known. Also, city officials weren't sure of what "territorial limits" entail.

The agreement is expected to be voted upon at 2 p.m. Nov. 29 at the Curry County Courthouse.

LaRue said the other governmental bodies would like Texico to enter into a joint powers pact with them. This probably will be discussed at the council meeting next week after more information is learned.

Texico is unable to have "territorial limits" because its population is too small. New Mexico law says a city has to have at least 1,500 residents to qualify for a zone.

In discussing why Clovis wants these extra limits, it was stated that it's being done at the request of the county in order to better regulate the planned construction of dairies in the area.

It was said that a dairy is planned for a site 1 mile from the airport and proposals have been made for 2 other dairies in this area.

Undefeated Steers look forward to 'state'

The Farwell Steers clinched a state playoff berth and tied for the District 2-1A championship by routing the Happy Cowboys at home last Friday, 48-6.

The 8-0 Steers are 4-0 in district as they end the regular season in an away game against Vega tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m.

The winner of the Nazareth-Bovina game tonight will determine the other team from District 2-1A to enter the state playoffs.

Farwell has cruised through district play so far, winning no games by less than 33 points.

The game opened with Farwell kicking off. Happy got a first down on 4th and inches when the Steers were offside. But Michael Arce had a big tackle and Monty Delgado got a quarterback sack, stopping Happy.

Shawn Stewart took the punt at the Farwell 45 and returned it 25 yards. Runs by Stewart and Joel Smith got the ball quickly to the 6, with Stewart scoring the TD from there. Darren Haseloff kicked the point after and Farwell led 7-0 at 6:54.

Haseloff continued his string of kickoffs into the end zone through much of the game. On defense, Ruben Lucio had a quarterback sack. Happy's punt attempt failed when the punter fumbled the ball and kicked it off the side of his foot. Michael Loera recovered in the end zone for the TD. The Haseloff kick made it 14-0 at 5:34.

Once again, Happy was stopped cold, and punted to Stewart who returned to the Happy 41. Greg Actkinson then hit Haseloff with a 14-yard pass, followed by a 49-yard bomb to Haseloff for the TD. The Haseloff kick made it 21-0 at 2:51.

Delgado recovered a Happy fumble at the Cowboy 27. A pass from Actkinson to Billingsley picked up 16. Then Stewart covered the final 11 yards for his 2nd TD. The Haseloff kick made it 28-0 at 1:30.

Still in the first quarter, after a QB sack, Delgado recovered a fumble at the Happy 10. But a pass was intercepted at the 2. Happy managed its first drive of the game, moving to its 45 before punting to the Steer 23.

Smith had good runs of 10 and 11 yards, before Farwell lost a fumble at the Cowboy 44. Happy again moved the ball well, getting to the Steer 15. On 4th and 11, Brad Atwell sacked the quarterback at the Steer 18.

Late in the second quarter, Farwell was on the move again. Actkinson hit Smith with a 23-yard pass. Stewart galloped for 28 yards. A penalty moved the ball to the Cowboy 27. The drive culminated with just 2 seconds left on the clock as Actkinson hit Stewart with a 12-yard TD pass. The kick failed and it was 34-0.

The third quarter was mostly a defensive struggle as neither team scored. Arce had a good tackle on defense. Smith, who ran hard and showed good quickness throughout the game, had a 19-yard run. Stewart had an 8-yard run that put him over 1,000 rushing yards for the season.

In the 4th quarter, it was Delgado's turn to excel. First, aided by the wind, he punted 50 yards to the Happy 5. Happy was held and punted to its 47. Delgado then had a 21-yard run to the 26. He gained 15 more yards to the 11. He got another 5 yards to the 6. A penalty against Happy put the ball on the 3. After plunging for 1 yard, Delgado scored from the 2. Actkinson ran in the extra points and it was 42-0 at 5:50.

Coach Rex Cumpston began freely substituting at this point. Happy recovered a Steer fumble at the Farwell 30. A pass was completed at the 6. Happy scored with 1:20 left in the game. The run for extra points was stopped by a tackle by Victor Andriani, the foreign exchange student from Argentina.

With 6 seconds left, quarterback Chad Byrd ran wide and moved down the sidelines for a 70-yard TD romp. The run for extra points failed and it was 48-6.

Cumpston commented: "We continue to execute pretty well on offense. We are not getting a lot of snaps but we are averaging high yardage per snap. We averaged over 8.5 yards per snap Friday night. We were able to get our throwing game going a little bit more, which we will need to do in the playoffs. Our offensive line is back on track and blocking well. We have clinched the No. 1 seed in the playoffs so we are real excited about that. The team feels they have a great shot at doing well in the playoffs."

Individual statistics were: Rushing - Stewart, 8 for 82 yards; Smith, 9 for 69; Delgado, 8 for 55; Ray Haseloff, 3 for 2; Byrd, 3 for 80; Actkinson, 4 for 17. Receiving - Stewart, 2 catches for 62 yards; Darren Haseloff, 1 for 15; Roger Billingsley, 1 for 17; Smith, 2 for 31.

Team statistics were: Rushing - Farwell, 34 attempts for 305 yards; Happy, 42 for 109. Passing - Farwell, 6 for 14 and 125 yards; Happy, 2 for 10 and 13 yards. First downs - Farwell 19, Happy 10. Penalties - Farwell, 7 for 70 yards; Happy, 1 for 5. Punts - Farwell, 3 for 33 yard average; Happy, 8 for 21 yard average.

In area statistics kept by the Lubbock newspaper, Farwell ranks 2nd in team offense with 381.9 yards a game, and 2nd in team defense, allowing 147.6 yards a game. Stewart is 2nd among the rushers with 1,040 yards - 130 yards a game. Actkinson is 4th among the passers with 38 completions in 87 tries for 865 yards. Darren Haseloff is 5th among receivers with 18 catches for 429 yards. Stewart ranks 2nd among the scorers with 164 points.

By the way, KSEL Radio called this week to tell us they are broadcasting Texico's playoff games.

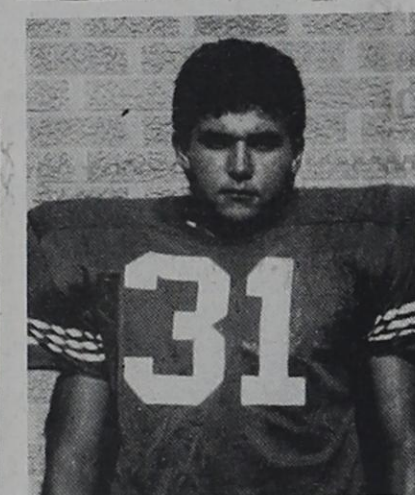

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Here's how to really get ready for the holidays

Several Farwell residents were asked to share some of the things they do to make the holidays more pleasant and less stressful.

Planning ahead for a successful holiday season is the unanimous advice of everyone. Below are some of the tips they shared.

Shopping for Gifts

"I make my girls sit down with the catalogs and pick out the things they really want before Thanksgiving. They also have to tell me the one thing they really want the most from the list, because they know they can't have everything," said Leigh Ann Woods.

Extension Home Economist Rochelle White suggests, "Shop early; don't exceed your budget, and don't charge unless you have to."

Tanya Chadwick notes that she tries to purchase the same number of presents for each of her boys and she tries to keep the presents within the same value range. This makes shopping much more difficult, yet more equitable in the long run.

Rhonda Grissom suggested that working women who work might be able to use vacation days to shop or plan for the holidays.

Another person suggested that friends trade babysitting time so that moms could shop without the children. Or, pay a teen to take the kids to a movie or roller skating during the shopping season.

Eva Dean Stephens suggested making lists and delegating the shopping chores. There is no reason why mom needs to do all of the shopping when dads and teen age family members could stand in check out lines just as easily.

Katherine White suggested buying small items throughout the year and keeping a list of them so that they would be on hand for last minute remembrances or stocking stuffers.

Rev. Larry Heacock noted that at the holiday season we need to plan extra time to do all of the usual tasks because everything seems to take longer than we plan.

Maureen Caywood said that now that her children are grown she is unable to see all of them each Christmas. She sometimes sends money to her grandchildren so that they can go shopping after Christmas for the item of their choice.

Some other easy gifts to mail might be: gift certificates from a national chain store, gift certificates from a fast food restaurant, a subscription to a newspaper or magazine, an "I.O.U." good for lunch or a movie or a special day's outing with the giver at a time after Christmas.

Plan to eat at a restaurant when you are making a full day of shopping with the family. If some family members will be left at home while mom is shopping, the rest of the family might enjoy a chicken or pizza from a carry out restaurant, a crock-pot cooked meal made ahead for them, sandwiches, or simple microwaved meals.

Homemade Gifts

Homemade gifts take more planning than purchased gifts, but often they are the gifts which are most cherished. Below are just a few suggestions for holiday gift giving.

- Make a file of your favorite recipes for a newlywed or a college student.

- Older children can assemble the ingredients for bean soup mix, or batches of bread, brownie or cookie mixes which can be given to friends along with the recipes. These may be packaged in homemade cloth bags, plastic bags, or jars.

- Grandmothers love any homemade item from grandchildren.

- Anne Norton has sometimes made jams or jellies or breads ahead of time for quick holiday gifts.

- Some years Marjorie Watkins has quilted items as gifts for those on her list.

- Katherine White has been known to sew dresses or blouses as gifts for her children and grandchildren.

- Lynne Mahaney has painted T-shirts for those on her gift list. Sometimes she has also painted pictures for them.

- Maureen Caywood notes that many senior citizens have been busily working on ceramics projects as gifts for their loved ones.

- Baked goods were mentioned by many people. They noted that cookies, candies, and loaves of nut bread make wonderful little gifts. Many of these things can be made ahead of time and tucked away.

- Copies of old family photographs in an album make cherished gifts.

- Frame a piece of needlework or crocheted item made by a loved one for a special heirloom.

- Jewelry and decorative barrettes are popular gift items this year.

Holiday Entertainment Planning

To plan ahead for the unexpected, it is good to have some staples on hand. Some suggestions include:

- Buy soft drinks by the case.
- Have chips, dips, pretzels, popcorn, or nuts on hand.
- Bake cookies, sweetbreads or pies ahead of time and

tuck them into the freezer for quick holiday entertaining.

- Cook double batches of food and freeze part of what you make so that it will be on hand in the freezer for a quick meal.

- If you don't have time to bake or cook, purchase ready made items at the grocery store or deli.

- Rochelle White suggests that you plan menus ahead so that all of the grocery shopping may be done ahead of time.

- Leigh Ann Woods suggests watching for sales and buying the holiday staples ahead of time over several weeks so that the grocery budget stays in line.

- Anne Norton makes the base for a holiday fruit punch ahead of time and puts it into her freezer. When guests arrive, the frozen slush is mixed with ginger ale or 7-Up for a quick party drink. She also starts many of her holiday dishes such as scalloped potatoes or other casseroles in the microwave for quick cooking and finishes them in the oven.

- Marjorie Watkins prepares cookie dough ahead of time and freezes it in rolls that can be sliced and baked in a short time. She also tries to prepare pies and desserts ahead of time for her freezer. "I just cook, cook, cook," she laughed.

- Make as many parts of holiday meals ahead of time as possible. Desserts, breads, dressing, gelatin salads, and other holiday favorites may be made ahead of time so that the hostess can be free to enjoy the company of her guests.

- Several families noted that they divide the cooking chores for holiday meals up. Several different people each bring their favorite foods, so the hostess is responsible only for turkey or other main course.

Even small families can divide the divide the chores, "We cook dinner together as a family, we start early and cook all day," said Maribel Estrada. Her husband, Ector and son Joey all pitch in to make the meal a special holiday endeavor.

- Dorothy Quicquel noted that cooking the turkey ahead of time and slicing and preparing the gravy ahead of time and freezing it makes holiday entertaining less stressful at her house.

- Jeannie Heacock makes her dressing and homemade breads ahead of time to simplify the holiday preparation.

Interpersonal Relations

The holiday season between Thanksgiving and New Years Day is the most stressful period of time of all the year for some people. There are more outbursts of family violence, more suicides, and more children abandoned during this time of year than any other time of the year. It is also one of the highest times of the year for alcohol related traffic accidents.

What should be the happiest time of the year often isn't. Here are some things people here do to make the holidays more enjoyable.

"If I don't have time, I just forget it," says Bonnie Warren-

Howard.

"I don't do a lot of the things I used to do. For instance, I don't make candy like I used to. It's just not good for us, so I don't do it."

Anne Norton noted that "Some things that used to be important are not as important as they used to be."

She talked about the joy she gets from spending time with her grandchildren "It's not the quantity of time, it's the quality," she said. "Our children are our future."

She noted that holidays can have a spirit "that doesn't exist the rest of the year, we are more aware of our fortunes and privileges and blessings." Sharing this spirit with her family means a lot to her.

Dardanella Helton noted that the holidays are more fun for her now that she spends them with her grandkids.

Lena Cole suggests taking one item at a time. Worrying is often a source of stress.

Several people noted that going to someone else's house for holiday meals relieves much of the stress involved with holiday meal preparation.

Sometimes deciding which family to spend the holiday with can be a source of stress.

Lambert to get new trial

Travis Gene Lambert will receive a new trial. Lambert was found guilty in December in the shooting of then-Bovina Police Chief Gary Coleman in July 1989. Lambert received the maximum sentence: 99 yards in prison and a \$10,000 fine. However, he appealed the decision because he had been denied a change of venue. The state court of appeals overturned the verdict for that reason, said Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams. Williams said Lambert is expected to go on trial again in mid-December in Muleshoe. The charge is attempted capitol murder with a deadly weapon. Lambert, 25, of De Soto, Mo., was stopped by Coleman because the vehicle he was driving had only one headlight working. A check of the license plate showed an irregularity. After Lambert sat in the back of the police patrol car, he shot Coleman in the face. Coleman shot Lambert in the leg as he fled. Lambert was apprehended atop a building in Bovina.

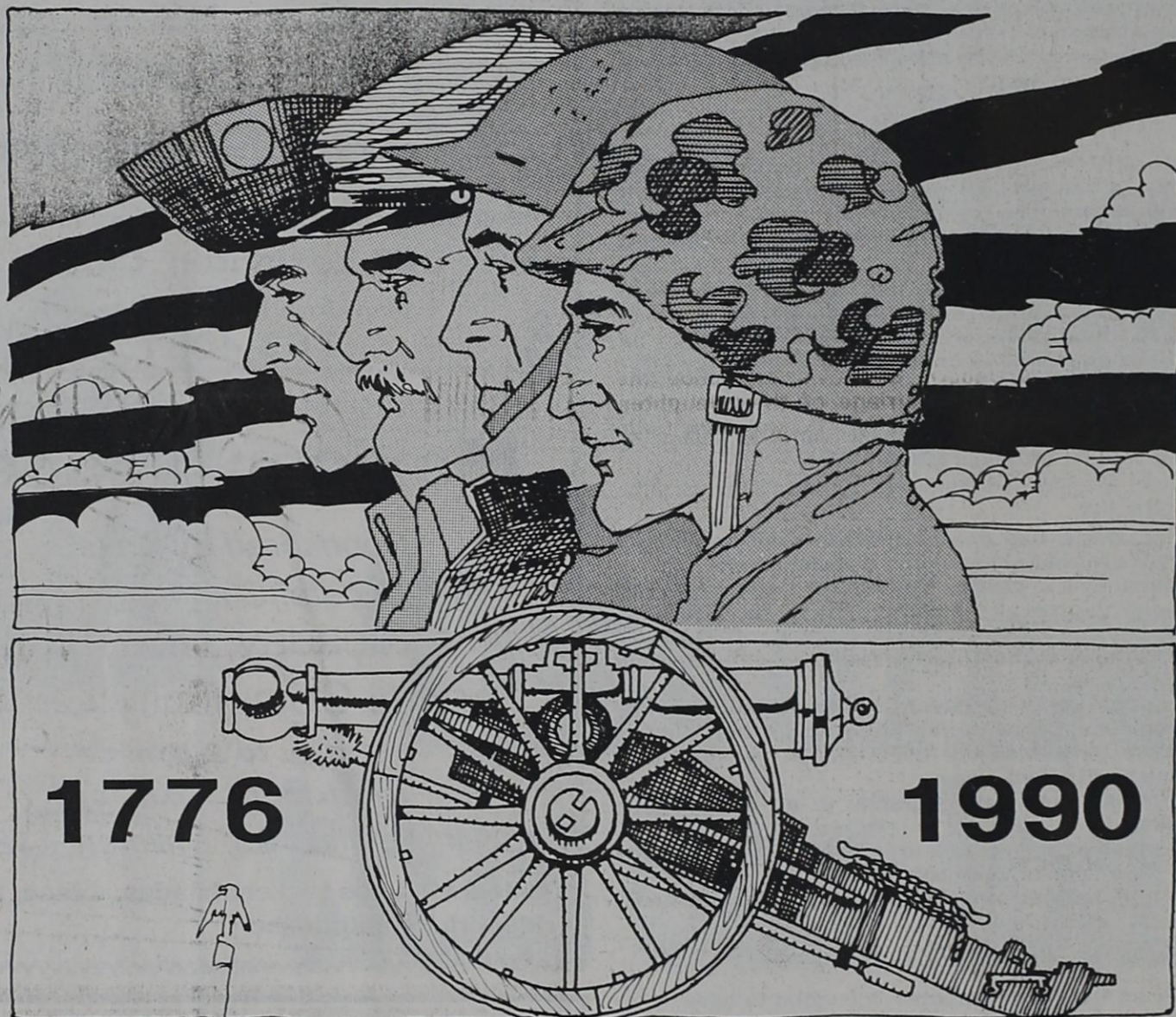

That was a surprise snow storm that shot through the Twin Cities Saturday. First some rain, then snow blowing white stuff.

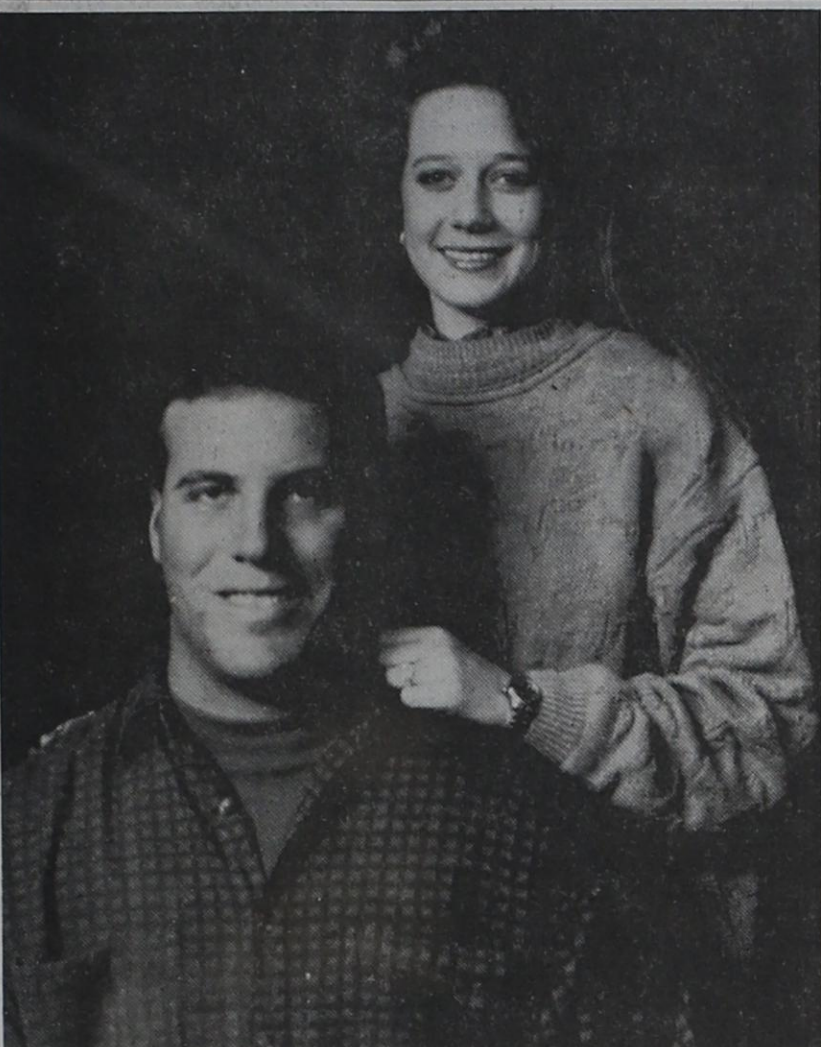

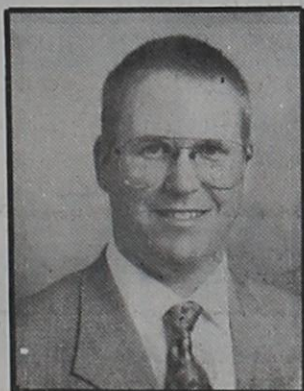

Recipe of Week

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
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
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Lady Spikers lose to Dora in district playoffs

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Wolverines, 9-1, enter state semi-finals

The Texico Wolverines won their district championship by routing Ft. Sumner 34-0 last Friday in a game called at halftime due to severe lightning in the area.

The victory boosted the Wolverines to 9-1 as they enter the state playoffs. They host Carrizozo Saturday at 7 p.m. mdt. Tickets will cost \$3 for students and \$4 for adults; the prices are set by the New Mexico Activity Association.

Carrizozo was a runnerup to Loving in District 1-A. Loving faces Hagerman, District 2-A runnerup, in the other semi final match at Loving Saturday night.

Texico kicked off to Ft. Sumner and Rusty Foreman stopped the kick returner at the 20. Then Foreman and Tom Derouin held them to short yardage. Other stops were made by Josh Autrey, Josefre Gonzales and Billy Rogers. As the Foxes' drive continued, good tackles were made by Dwayne Hamilton, Anthony Garcia, Foreman and Matthew Williams. Kenny Shaw broke through for a good tackle, forcing a 4th and 4 situation. Ft. Sumner went for it but came out short.

On offense, Texico moved quickly. Josh Autrey broke loose on the first possession and ran for a TD - the first of 5 he would get on the night. Hector Orozco's kick was good and Texico led 7-0 with 4:50 left in the first quarter.

Ft. Sumner took over on its 30. Hamilton, Warren Martin and Greg Akers held them to only a yard, and Shaw and Akers stopped the 3rd down play just short of a first down. Ft. Sumner punted.

Shaw had a good run. Then Orozco plunged to the 48. Autrey picked up a first down. Then Autrey broke through the middle for good yardage as the first quarter ended. On a 4th down try, the Wolverines were stopped.

Lilo Montano made a super tackle, forcing a 2-yard loss. Garcia's tackle then forced a fumble, which Orozco recovered. Akers carried for a first down. Autrey then broke loose around end for another TD with 9:21 left in the half. Orozco's kick was good and it was 14-0.

Back on defense, Orozco and Steven Horner made good tackles. Ft. Sumner fumbled again, recovered by Derouin. Orozco made good yardage. Shaw, at quarterback (giving Benjy McDaniel some time off), hit Freddy Chavez with a 13-yard aerial. Then it was time for Autrey around end again, for his 3rd score. Orozco's kick made it 21-0.

It wasn't long before Texico took possession again and Autrey raced right up the middle for TD No. 4. The kick failed and it was 27-0.

Ft. Sumner couldn't move the ball again and Autrey took the punt all the way in. The TD was nullified due to a clipping call and Texico took over at the 19. Orozco made the first

down, then picked up another 4. Autrey got the ball, broke loose from 2 tacklers and scored TD No. 5. Orozco's kick made it 34-0.

Texico kicked off and the Ft. Sumner receiver fumbled the ball but regained control just as the Wolverines arrived en masse. The half ended - and the game was called.

Coach Bruce Scroggins commented: "Ft. Sumner came out with a whole new offense and we had to prepare for it once we saw what was going on. They had a good first drive before we got used to it. Offensively, we scored every time but one."

"I'm really proud of what our kids accomplished so far. They have grown so much since the Bovina scrimmage to where they are now. We haven't had a tight game in awhile but hopefully we will fight well against Carrizozo. Carrizozo

is a fundamentally strong team. They have an 8-2 record. They lost to Loving 14-6 in the last minutes of their game. They will be a true test.

"If we lose the game, we turn our stuff in Monday and it's the end of the line. People remember your last game the most. We want to make sure they will remember a victory."

Total yards gained - Texico, 277; Ft. Sumner, 86. Passes intercepted by - Texico 1 (Akers), Ft. Sumner 0. Penalties - Texico, 3 for 45 yards; Ft. Sumner, 0.

In New Mexico area statistics kept by the Lubbock newspaper, Texico ranks 3rd in team offense with 319.9 yards a game, and 1st in team defense, allowing 131 yards a game. Autrey - who was named Player of the Week by the Avalanche Journal for the second time this season - leads individual rushers with 1,705 yards - 170.5 yards a game, and 26 TDs. The TDs give Autrey 160 points - also leading this category. McDaniel is 9th among the passers with 26 completions in 52 attempts for 353 yards.

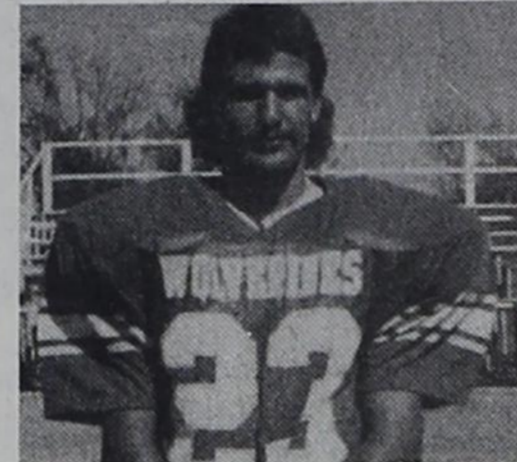

Longhorns keep playoff hopes alive

The Lazbuddie Longhorns kept alive their hopes for a state playoff berth by defeating the Amherst Bulldogs in an away game last Friday, 43-32.

Lazbuddie is now 3-1 in district and 6-3 overall. Coach C. W. Williams' team hosts Silverton tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m.

Silverton has tied for the district title with a 4-0 record so far. The Longhorns currently are tied for second with Three Way at 3-1.

Jesko is 3rd among the rushers, with 1,309 yards - 145 yards a game. Williams is 4th among the passers, with 78 completions in 170 attempts for 1,186 yards. Cozbey is 7th among receivers, with 26 catches for 426 yards, and Barnes is 8th, with 22 grabs for 396 yards.

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
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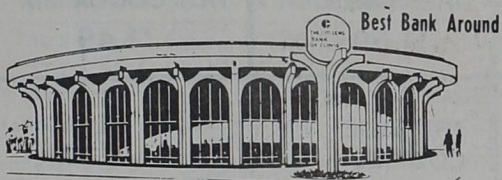
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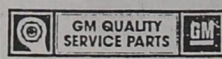
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
