Elsewhere in the Tribune this week we are carrying a letter to the editor from Billy Bruce Dollar who is stationed in South Vietnam. We were pleased to know that the Tribune goes so far afield and is so appreciated by the folks away from home. We cannot do much about the young man's yenfor a chocolate cake, but we suspect that good Mae Porter will look into that subject. Bruce, we are sorry about the action pictures of the basketball team, but our old and faithful Polaroid isn't up to that standard. Oh yes, the Lubbock Avalanche Journal was good enough to publish our article on Coach Vernon Scott and the Steer basketball boys, Another area paper lifted part of the story that was in the Lubbock AJ; so we did get some area publicity on this year's outstanding basketball record.

April 6 is the date of the Farwell city election that determines the members of the City Commission for another two years. There just doesn't seem to be much interest among the citizens of Farwell about the plans or platforms that the announced candidates are offering to support their bids for office. We have been concerned about the condition of the water system in Farwell and took the time to ask the candidates how they felt about the present condition of the system and what suggestions they might have in mind to improve the system. There seems to be a general awareness of the two main problems of sand in the water and low pressure in some areas, but there does not seem do a great deal to improve the situation.

Our understanding of the candidates' attitudes seems to be this: Elmer Hargrove, who is running for re-election as mayor, seems to feel that there is a need for improvement in the quality and quantity of Farwell water. Mayor Hargrove says that the City is presently awaiting the installation of a Billington Shop settling tank adjacent to the water well in the south part of Farwell. It is hoped that this will trap the sand that may be coming into the system from that well. Also, Mayor Hargrove said that some of the older sections of Farwell did have old, and in many cases, small lines that would need to be replaced, but that this would be quite a difficult task and one that would require study.

L. R. "Jelly" Vincent, who is running for re-election as a commissioner, says he expects the City Commission to look into the matter of more city paving, but that he would be against paving that was not accompanied by curbs and gutters. He would like to see a new city hall as a much-needed improvement. Vincentalso said that some parts of the city did have inadequate water pressure, but that study would be necessary before much could be done about alleviating the condition. Vincent also stressed the importance of the city's living within its means and getting the most benefit from its spending.

J. T. Ford said that he, too, was aware of the water problems, but did not have enough background knowledge to say what should or shouldn't be done. He did express a willingness to see a survey of the system along with some estimates on what it would cost to alleviate some of the problems. Ford also thought that the water department needs another employee to assist the present water superintendent and to have at least two persons who know the locations of the many lines all over town. Ford suggested that an extensive program of flushing the main lines might held the sand problem.

Lee Hutchins said his platform would include a look into or survey of the water system and thought that action should be taken to ease the sand in the lines. Hutchins also is in favor of additional paving but says that it should include curbs and gutters, Hutchins also mentioned that the 1956 model fire truck is the latest piece of fire fighting equipment the local fire department has and thought that the acquisition of newer fire fighting equipment should be on the City Commission's list of "things to do."

Fred Chandler did not have a specific platform and was not aware of any problems in the water distribution system and would rather not say anything until he can get more information on the matter.



Sevin, chlordane, lead arsenate or toxaphene will effectively control the bagworm. Directions for mixing and applying the materials are given on the label container and should be carefully followed.

The bagworm moth deposits from 500 to 1,000 eggs in a brown, tapered bag attached to a branch of the plant in September. The eggs hatch in March and the small worms immediately begin to feed on the plant's foliage and bark.

The young worms or caterpillars construct a small tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage. The bag turns a brown in color.

The bagworm protrudes its head and front feet from the bag as it moves about the plant feeding out will withdraw into the bag when disturbed. In late summer the bag is attached to a branch and the mature caterpillar pupates within

The feeding worms, when infestation is heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in the death of the plant or heavily damaged parts.

Good food sources for this vitamin are: whole milk, liver, egg yolk, salmon, tuna, and sardines.
