County fund balance grows

The Parmer County annual financial "report card" came back with a very high grade on Monday from CPA

The annual audit by Kirkland, Kirkland & Co., of Farwell, was approved by the county commissioners.

The key figure involved the overall amount of money the county has. And Parmer County ended the last fiscal year (on Dec. 31, 2002) with \$3,182,937. This total was up by \$483,848 over the previous fiscal year end.

"The commissioners did a very good job of controlling their expenses by using current revenues, and not using their fund balances," explained Kirkland. "And now their fund balances are at a very secure level for the county."

Kirkland also credited the Parmer County Appraisal District with doing an efficient job of collecting tax revenues. He called this a very significant factor in bringing about the much higher fund balance.

Here's a breakdown on how each precinct spent during the year:

Pct. 1 (Friona): Total spent was \$221,063 -- \$90,458 less than budgeted.

Pct. 2 (Bovina): Total spent was \$226,998 -- \$94,076 less than budgeted.

Pct. 3 (Farwell): Total spent was \$308,725 -- \$27,098 less than budgeted.

Pct. 4 (Lazbuddie): Total spent was \$187,382 --\$148,756 less than budgeted (commissioner Elvis Powell didn't purchase some equipment he had budgeted

Also included in the audit was the amount of fees collected by the county's three Justices of the Peace. These totals were:

Pct. 1 -(Friona) - \$1,911.

Pct. 2 (Bovina) -- \$173,798.

Pct. 3 (Farwell) -- \$62,171.

The reason Friona was so little and Bovina so large was due to the illness of past Friona JP Frances Euler. The Bovina JP, Vi Hutto, handled much of her-work, explained Kirkland.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Renewed the Parmer County Law Enforcement liability insurance.

-- Renewed the \$10 road and bridge fee for each vehicle registered in the county.

-- Discussed construction progress on the new county law enforcement center.


The report says that by doing this, it will result in a net payment capability increase of 25 to 50 percent of the total funds generated by the tax in-







Peanut harvest to decrease here

Farmers across eastern New Mexico's peanut country are anticipating this year's harvest will be cut almost in half because of a dry summer and elimination of a quota system in last year's farm bill, New Mexico State University experts said.

Until this season, New Mexico's peanut producers grew more than 80 percent of the nation's Valencia peanuts, the kind popular for eating right out of the shell.

Valencias, sometimes called ballpark nuts, account for less than 1 percent of US peanut production, but they've been a financial mainstay for many farmers here for more than five decades.

Known for their sweetness, Valencias usually have three or more kernels per pod. Well suited to the eastern New Mexico region, the red-skinned peanuts have a shorter growing season then the three other market types: runner, Virginia and Spanish peanuts.

"In our country alone we're down to about 8,000 acres," said Floyd McAlister, Roosevelt County agricultural agent with NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service.

"It wasn't that many years ago that we were producing 15,000 acres. Peanuts are a breakeven crop now at best and that sure takes the fun out of it."

The 2002 Farm Bill signaled the end of an era for New Mexico's peanut producers, said Rhonda Skaggs, an agricultural economist with NMSU. The law calls for the government to buy out farmers' peanut quotas over five years, replacing the quota program with a policy similar to those for grains in past years, she said.

The changes have shelled production in New Mexico where the peanut crop has dropped from 22,000 acres valued at \$17.5 million in 2001 to 18,000 acres valued at \$10 million last year. The price support under the old farm bill was \$630 a ton, but under the current version it fill to \$330 a ton, barely enough to cover production costs, McAlister said. In addition, some producers are getting cash from a US Department of Agriculture peanut buyout program, which replaced the peanut quota

Valencia peanuts have been an almost perfect niche crop for eastern New Mexico, particularly Roosevelt, Curry and Lea counties, said Naveen Puppala, a peanut breeder with NMSU's 164 acre Agricultural Science Center at Clovis. Valencias do so well in the Clovis-Portales area because they face much less disease pressure than in other states, he said. Valencias also thrive in the area's sandy soils.

In eastern New Mexico, only 4,800 acres of the peanuts were grown under quota. But farm program stability and demand for Valencias kept prices up as eastern New Mexico farmers struggled with drought and low grain and cotton prices. "Raising peanuts has kept the irrigated producer in business," McAlister said.



Economic losses estimated

From Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.: By Shawn Wade

Oh what a difference 30 days in June can make. Following a pleasant Memorial Day weekend, highlighted by beneficial rainfall across much of the region, June promised to be just what the doctor ordered for the High Plains crop.

Unfortunately, the history books will recount June 2003 as a month that put an entirely different spin on the fate of the region's 3.6 million acre cotton crop.

During the month, High Plains cotton fields were blown, drowned, and pummeled by wave after wave of June thunderstorms, an adversary that has not been a regular visitor to the region for several years. So far, some 1.2 million acres, of predominantly irrigated cotton in the region's northern tier counties, are estimated to have been lost.

Based on recent history, that lost acreage can be credited for nearly 50 percent of all High Plains production over the past couple of years.

By using the most recent 5-year averages for acreage and yield a conservative estimate of what the loss of these acres actually means in economic terms can be derived. Using the 1998-2002 numbers, the region's 2003 Farm Level economic loss is estimated to top \$320 Million as a direct result of June

Fortunately, every cloud does have a silver lining. Extended areas of the dryland production region south of Lubbock carry a slightly delayed, but makeable, crop into the month of July for the first time in several years.

Dryland acres have been a piece of the High Plains production puzzle all but missing for several years due to drought. Should they continue to progress, they will help make up at least a part of the area's lost production potential.

Remaining irrigated and dryland acres, for the most part, are anywhere from significantly to only slightly behind based on the calendar. Either way, producers have a complicated set of management decisions to work through in order to maximize the production potential on every acre that is left.

Producers wanting tips on managing late cotton, can request the latest version of the Texas Cooperative Extension's "Managing Late Cotton" publication. This valuable guide should help growers avoid management pitfalls associated with a late cotton crop. It is currently being





LIVE CATTLE: This market was on a wild ride this week with prices moving up the 150 limit on Monday. up another 50 points on Tuesday, then falling almost limit down on Wednesday before showing some stabilization? The USDA report was termed negative, but prices rallied after opening lower. Odds

are good harvest pressure is almost over. COTTON: Prices have not been able to move above old contract highs at the \$62.75 area basis the December contract. The USDA report showed a drop in ending stocks from 5.6 million bales to 3.2 million bales, but prices had little reaction. A close to new contract highs should project a long term target up around the \$69 level. Otherwise, a close below \$61 would mean lower.
