In our own mind, we have no idea why in the name of Amerigo Vespucci, Congress for all its lapses of sanity designated a National Holiday for him. It is said with some justification that Columbus didn't know where he was going, didn't know where he was when he got there, and didn't know where he'd been when he got back, and did it on borrowed money.

We haven't studied the fuzz on a caterpillar this fall but have felt that an early fall was due. But, inasmuch as procrastination is the thief of time, our planter box was not prepared for the nip in the air Saturday night. We wonder if anybody else's foliage felt the chill of the unseasonable cold.

We have no idea at this time about the situation surrounding the placement of the MX missile system. However, a reasonable assessment of the criteria for the placement of the system indicates that this area must be high on the planner's list of possible sites. We also think that the final decision is not in the hands of any local or even State authority; therefore, the engendering of intense antagonisms among the local population is counter-productive. Whether it comes or not, those of us with our roots here will have to live with each other, and it is better to live as friends rather than with fester-

ing animosities. With or without the MX, the area of our Twin Cities is a place of great potential growth. The High Plains in general and the area of Clovis, Texico and Farwell in particular has the natural attributes that will foister such future expansion. The story of this area just has not been widely enough adver-

We read a column the other day by an area publisher enumerating all the pluses in his area. We think we have his town beaten in a number of significant ways.

Our particular community is the hub of one of the very best transportation networks in the entire Southwest. Industry and commerce thrives on transportation, and we have it. We are extremely well situated in regard to energy. Of an immediate nature, Southwestern Public Service Company has two large plants within a stone's throw and has plans for even more generating capacity. It has industrial power to spare. Natural gas is available to us in quantities not possible in other parts of the country. Even the more exotic forms of energy such as solar and wind are inexhaustible local resources. We have a climate which will allow industry to not only invest less in plant properties but spend less in both utilities and long term

Equally important, this climate will allow the employees to get to work and go home 99.99 percent of the time without loss of plant productiv-

Also of prime importance is the hard to define but always sought after thing known as "quality of life." This "quality" right now is bringing more and more people to the Southwest and our immediate

So with or without the MX, we envision a bright future for the Twin Cities. Let us not spoil this future with arguing between ourselves over something we very probably will have no voice in anyway.

We have long ago discovered that there are three things about writing a column. One is what you meant to say, two is what you actually said, and three is what somebody else understands you to say. We (Continued on Page 2)





1 tsp. vanilla 11/2 cups whipped cream 1 cup slivered almonds 1/4 cup sugar

Spread softened ice cream in cooled pie shell; place in freezer. Mix pumpkin with sugar, spices and vanilla; fold in 1 cup whipped cream. Pour filling over ice cream. Cover with foil; freeze about 4 hours. Combine nuts and 1/4 cup sugar in small skillet. Stir constantly and rapidly as the sugar begins to turn color. Remove from heat when almonds are caramel-colored and spread on greased cookie sheet. Break apart when crisp. Garnish pie with remaining whipped cream and carmelized almonds. Yields one 10-inch pie.

Each day, Mrs. Kaltwasser's group took a one-hour train ride to the town of Cabo where they would be doing most of their work. The missionary work done by these volunteers was an attempt to spread Christianity and to build new congregations and strengthen existing congregations.

The goal set for the volunteers was one million conversions by the Centennial. Explaining the Centennial, Mrs. Kaltwasser said, "A hundred years ago, three men chose to be missionaries. One of these men went to Brazil and established the first Baptist Missionary Church. October will be the Centennial, and our hope is to gain one million people for the church. I believe we're coming close to that, but it's hard to count faith. There have been volunteers from churches all over the country going to Brazil for four years

While in Brazil, several team members toured some of the open market places, Rio de Janeiro which is some 200 miles away, and the founding missionary's grave where they laid a wreath. Also, they viewed a neighborhood house for child care and instruction,

seminaries in the world. On the grounds of the seminary is Seccy, a school for girls, teaching them to be teachers and missionaries to their people, reports Mrs. Kaltwas-Some of the students at

Seccy assisted two of the volunteer missionaries by traveling with them to the interior of the country, returning with news of over 400 conversions. "I've never seen so many young people so hungry for the gospel and so eager to learn. Many of them attend school in the mornings and work in the evenings," said Mrs. Kaltwas-

In Cabo, the group attended church services every day in the missionary church there. "They had to have the windows open because of the heat. The ministers had to overcome quite a bit just to get their message across. There were several churches all positioned together, and each was playing a different music. It was all very loud. Some of the politicians would bring people in from the interior of the country for the services, and then park their trucks with loudspeakers outside the windows with their political annoucements blaring," Mrs. Kaltwasser said.

"I was most impressed by the children. They were all so well cared for and loved. Every child there was clean and well dressed, and the adults took such good care of them. If a child needed something, someone, whether or not it was their mother, would take care of them. There was so much love among those people," said Mrs. Kaltwasser.

At the end of the eight-day visit, the group started home. Mrs. Kaltwasser returned to Farwell on September 21.

Dear John, Just read your editorial in last week's paper; and concerning your comments on the railroaders, it hit pretty close to home as I am a brakemanconductor for the Santa Fe Railroad.

It seems that you are of the opinion that we are grossly overpaid. Granted we do have a good paying job; but there are a lot of drawbacks to make it worth it. All other people see are the paycheck, the end result; not what it takes to make that check what it is. For example:

1. You are on call 24 hours a day so you sit by the phone quite a bit. You never can plan anything in advance because you don't have set days or hours to work.

2. You are away from home as much as 70% of the time. You miss most of your kids' activities and their important

3. Away from home expenses take a hunk out of each paycheck. The railroad only pays a small part of what it takes to just get by. On outside jobs, you are responsible for travel expenses as well as motel rooms and meals. And everytime our one meal every 8 hours allowance is increased, the places that the rails frequent increases their prices double that.

4. You work seven days a week - holidays and all - as trains don't stop for Christmas, etc. We receive no additional compensation for working holidays; and "no" they won't let you lay off to be home with the family. Best I can remember, I've spent 2 of the last 9 Christmases with my family.

5. We are just like the mail, rain, sleet or snow the trains must go through. No sitting in county clerk. the coffee shop if its too wet, or everyone else (farmers included) are all snuggled up in bed or in front of the fireplace, it's blowing 50 mph and sleeting

and chill factor 20 below 0°, we are out switching and running trains getting those new cars, tractors, furniture and other goods across country. And, oh yeah, we haul just a "little bit" of grain for the farmers.

6. The railroad occupation is listed as being the second most dangerous in the U.S. today. Second only to jet test pilots. We must work with and around all kinds of toxic chemicals, explosives and flammable liquids, along with the heavy equipment. How many railroaders are injured or killed! each year in performance of

their job? Something else, just for the record; If the railroad business is slow one year and we get cut off or don't make our miles each month, the government doesn't give us a low interest loan or disaster plan or pay my wages until things get better. We work for everything

Everyone chooses their own way of making a living according to how much he wants to get paid and what he is willing to put up with to get it. Believe me, it all balances out in the end. And really, we had more back 15 years ago when I worked for \$250 a month ranch wages. Just check and see how many of your rails are moonlighting

These are just a few things that we do and tolerate to keep that "overpaid" job. A man should know a few more facts before he comments.


