

On November 2, folks in Texas will go to the polls to vote on another six proposed constitutional amendments. Everytime we turn around in Texas, we are voting on a change in the constitution. That's the way it is in the Lone Star State.

We feel as if the vast majority of voters go to the polls with only a vague idea of what they will vote on in regard to amendments. We confess we often are at a loss to really know the proper way to mark the ballot. This go around is no exception.

Proposition No. 1 does four things. It repeals the 10 cents per \$100 assessed statewide property tax supporting construction at state universities. It validates the already enacted statutory "repeal" of that tax effective Jan. 1, 1980. It prohibits the state from levying ever again a statewide property tax. It authorizes the legislature to make direct appropriations for construction at 17 named universities.

This amendment seems to have grown out of a series of mess ups by the state legislature dating back to at least 1979. But willie nilly, it looks to us to be a good thing to pass at this time. It solves more problems than it creates, but

Proposition No. 2 asks for a welfare ceiling increase. Currently, the state constitution limits state appropriations for cash assistance programs to \$80 million per year or \$160 million per biennium. If this amendment is passed, the limit would be one percent of the state budget. This "One percent" translates into a potential spending of \$320 million in the 1984-85 biennium. This doubles the potential welfare

Nothing in the proposed amendment would require the legislature to appropriate at this level. But did you ever see a government arm not spend to the maximum amount pos-

Proposition No. 3 would exempt from property taxation "implements of husbandry" used in the production of farm and ranch products. In effect, this means farm machinery such as tractors and combines, but it does not mean items such as barns and silos.

If enacted, all farm machinery and equipment will be exempt from local property taxes regardless of value or type of ownership.

Proposition No. 4 authorizes the legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of certain water districts and reclamation dis-

Proposition No. 5 abolishes the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties. These counties want to turn over to their county auditor the duties of the county treasurer. They believe that the treasurer's office is a duplication of functions with the county auditor and want to eliminate

the treasurer office.

The office of county auditor is statutory rather than constitutional and is filled by appointment of the district judge or judges with jurisdiction in the county. The office is mandatory in the largest counties and optional in others. Parmer does not have such an

We will probably help Bee and Tarrant counties see if they can do without a county treasurer. Maybe they will come back later and want the office reinstituted, and again maybe not.

Proposition No. 6 will increase the maximum interest rate payable on state general obligation bonds from 6 percent to 12 percent. If the state is going to float bonds, it must be competitive in the interest field. Of course if it fails, the state might not be able to float any bonds. This could be bad or good — depending on your outlook.





The students learned that the native Americans migrated from Asia centuries ago across the Bering Strait. The students gave reports on the various animals these early people were probably hunting when they arrived in North America.



Water Conservation Topic For Study Club Meeting

GFWC Farwell Study Club met October 18 in the home of Carrie Christian. After the opening prayer by Hattie Coffer, a supper of quiche, tossed salad, fruit salad, and pumpkin pie was served by hostesses Carrie Christian and Ophell McDonald.

The program, "Conservation - Water, Our Precious Resource," was given by Patricia Bruno of Lubbock. Mrs. Bruno is editor of "The Cross Section," a publication of the High Plains Underground Water District No. 1. The district is comprised of all or part of 15 Panhandle counties. It became active in 1953 for the purpose of giving permits on new underground wells, and to keep track of water reserves. The speaker presented a slide and lecture program, first showing the location and formation of the Ogallala Formation.

Mrs. Bruno stated that agriculture uses 85 percent of

Ogallala Formation and there are 70,000 irrigation wells in

She told the club the High Plains Underground Water District offers free services to the farmers. One is the Field Water Conservation Mobile Lab which goes out into the field and helps farmers measure the efficiency of their irrigation system. Other services include the Moisture Monitor, which reads the soil profile, and helps the farmer set up the Furrow Dike system, a method of keeping water in the furrows and preventing runoff.

She also told of their different phases of research looking for more drought resistant crop varieties, plant growth regulators, and studies on water evaporation; and most exciting, secondary recovery of water from underground. "In these days of steadily rising costs, Deaf Smith REC is fortunate to wait this long before implementing a rate increase," stated Board member Donald Wright of Dimmitt.

The new rate will consist of a 42% average increase over the previous rate. This does not indicate all rates have increased 42%, but rather an THE STATE OF TEXAS average of all services combined on our system will increase about 42% based on 1981 usage.

The wholesale power contract which our power suppliers have been governed by the past 10 years expires this month. In addition to increases in the wholesale power, normal operating expenses have continued to increase due to inflation. These two items are responsible for the proposed rate adjustment.

Deaf Smith Electric has postponed this rate increase as long as possible. Now more than ever before, fixed expenses account for the largest portion ever, of the total cost of service. For example, wholesale power cost, depreciation, interest, and taxes alone amount to 89 percent of the total cost of electric service. These are expenses that are completely beyond the control of cooperative management and the Board of Directors, say members of the

Wright explained, "We realize people of this area share the concern over the rising cost of production which includes cost of electricity, and trust you understand our plight and efforts to minimize these inevitable rate increases."
