

Bi-District Play At Hereford - -

Steers Are District Champs! Take On New Deal Thursday



Farwell Steers are district champs! And Thursday night they will be trying to add bi-district champ to that honor when they take on New Deal at Hereford.

It was a long dry spell for the Farwell Steer football team and their backers, waging the gridiron battles for 13 years before bringing home the district trophy once again.

Back in 1969, when Toby Booth and Vernon Scott coached the Blue and White, was the last time that the Steers put a district football trophy in the school case. The last one prior to that was in 1963. In 1969, Farwell was a part of District 3-A and Bovina, Vega, and Sudan were the school's biggest rivals. Now this year's win is from the newly-aligned District 5-AA tribe which no longer contains the Vega Longhorns or the Sudan Hornets. The 1969 team fell in bi-district play to the Petersburg

Buffaloes. But the 1982 edition of the Steers won the district title in convincing fashion, shutting out Springlake-Earth 48-0 in the regular season finale, remaining unbeaten in district play and posting a 6-4 overall mark.

The coaches guiding the Blue and White to the 1982 district championship were Bruce Dolar, second year head coach

and athletic director; veterans Mike Martin and Vester Joiner; and two newcomers to the Farwell fieldhouse offices, Rex Cumpton and Lupe Valdez.

And now the plot really thickens. The Steers play for bi-district honors Thursday night, Nov. 11, at the Hereford High field in Hereford across from the LaPlata Junior High just off the Vega Highway.

They will be facing one of the top-rated teams in the state, the New Deal Lions, runners-up in their district with an 8-1-1 season mark. They were defeated by Shallowater, another state contender in Class AA, last Friday night to decide which team would represent their district as Number One.

Game time is 8 p.m. and Farwell will be the visitors at

the game, entering the stadium at the south gate. Admission will be \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

All Steer fans, friends, and boosters are especially urged to make the trip to Hereford to help the Steers know the town is behind them all the way.

Everyone is also encouraged to attend the pep rally Thursday at 3:15 at the school gym.

At the Texico City Council meeting Tuesday, Nov. 9, at the Texico City Hall, council members discussed construction of seven park shelters, six small shelters and one large shelter, for the KKR park. The city will pay for five shelters from Revenue Sharing Funds with donations from the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary, and Texico Fire Department paying for the other two shelters. A cost quote of \$1730.00 is for construction only and does not include installation of the shelters.

Council members approved a maintenance agreement with Motorola for fire department pagers and radios.

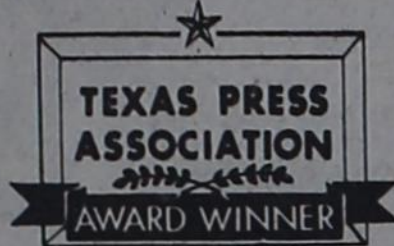
Unauthorized burning at the landfill was discussed with the council stating that the Envir-

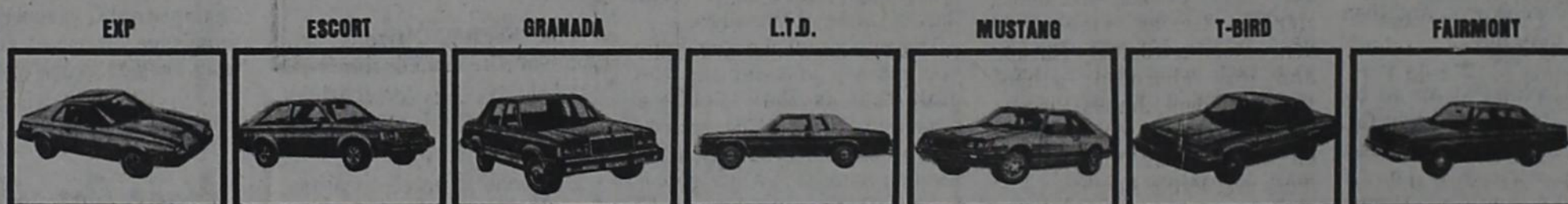

Three Tied For Lead - -

Contestants Falter In Upsets

In a weekend of upset football games, contestants in the Tribune's Merchants Football Contest averaged only 49 percent or 5.93 correct picks in last week's 12 contest games.

Leaders in the top five places in the overall contest bested the average contestant by picking 58 percent or 7.08 correct picks - not a great achievement but good enough to maintain their top ranking.

Tied for first place with 88 total points in the overall contest are Diane Dannheim, Roy King, and T.J. Kittrell. King was the sole leader the week before, but last week he picked only six correct games while Mrs. Dannheim and Kittrell got seven each.

In second place with 87 total points are Don Gerles and Teresa King, who were tied for third place the week before.

C.L. Mahaney and Billy Roberts, who were in sixth and fifth places, respectively, the week before, are in third place with 86 total points. Mahaney picked nine correct games and Roberts got eight to gain on the leaders.

Kim Telshaw, Texico High School student, was the only contestant in last week's contest to pick 10 correct games. For her effort, she was awarded the weekly prize of \$7.50.

Larry Gregory was one of eight contestants to pick nine games correctly, but was closer to the tiebreaker game score to claim the second place weekly check of \$5.00. He was 17 points off on the tiebreaker picking Farwell over Springlake-Earth, 51 to 14. Farwell won, 48-0.

Others calling nine correct games were Jesse Garcia, 27 points off; Linda Gerles, also 27 points off; Earlene Porter, 28 points; C.L. Mahaney, 29 points; E.A. Walker, 33 points; Sherri Merrill, 34 points; and Bert Williams, 52 points.

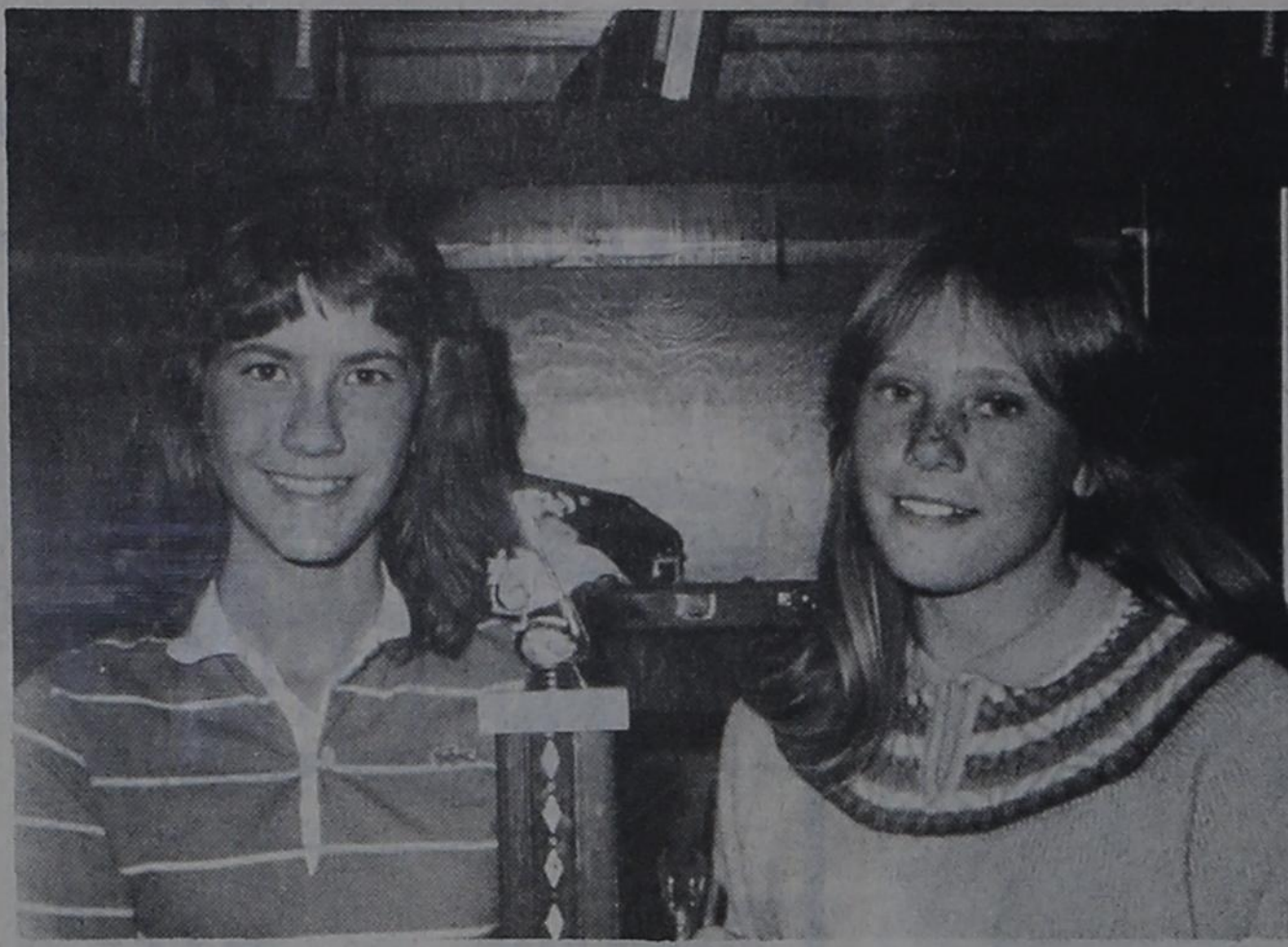
This is an opportunity for you to save yourself the work and time involved in selecting greeting cards and at the same time say "Merry Christmas" all year long to 227 children of the elementary school.

Community property is becoming such a familiar word to so many people. It's important for us all to have more knowledge about it and to know how to use this knowledge. Guest Marcia Driggers, an attorney from Las Cruces, will discuss when and where

Agency Offers Help To Disabled Worker

Texas Rehabilitation Commission is the state's principal authority on matters relating to the vocational rehabilitation of the handicapped. It is one of the largest agencies in the state government but one of the youngest (it became independent from the Texas Education Agency in 1969).

The commission's main mission is to assist vocationally handicapped people to enter or return to the work force to become productive, taxpaying citizens.

During the fiscal year ending September 30, 1981, a total of 52 disabled persons in Parmer County were provided services by the Texas Rehabilitation Commission.

John Snyder is the TRC counselor serving Parmer County. He may be contacted at 3428 Avenue H, Lubbock, Texas 79404, or telephone 806/747-1625 for additional information, and to refer disabled persons who may be in need of assistance.

Snyder is also in Farwell weekly or bi-weekly, and will contact all referred persons individually.

The disabled population of Texas, some 1.6 million strong, is a diverse group of people with sometimes complex needs. To meet the varied needs of this group, Texas Rehabilitation Commission offers a variety of services.

Most people, whether they realize it or not, are disabled in some way. Some have relatively minor disabilities, such as nearsightedness or a speech impediment. Others have more severe disabilities, such as paralysis, an amputated limb, or deafness.

People with relatively minor disabilities, such as nearsight-

edness, can generally find a simple solution to overcome the disability, such as eye-glasses. Some people have disabilities that interfere with their lives to a greater extent. For instance, some disabled people find it difficult to maintain employment because of their disabilities. They are the people the Vocational Rehabilitation Division serves.

A person must meet two requirements to be eligible for Vocational Rehabilitation Division services: (1) he must have a physical or mental disability which results in a substantial handicap to employment, and (2) there must be a reasonable expectation that rehabilitation services will result in gainful employment.

Not all disabled people are candidates for vocational rehabilitation services. A lawyer who becomes a paraplegic can probably continue in a legal practice. The lawyer is disabled, but not vocationally handicapped. A professional ski instructor who becomes a paraplegic probably cannot continue in that profession. He is disabled and vocationally handicapped.

Not all cases are as cut and dried as these examples. That's why eligibility for vocational rehabilitation services is determined on an individual basis.

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission counselor is responsible for making the determination. The counselor works to assess the client's needs, develop a vocational rehabilitation plan and follow up the client's success.

It might be that the client's only need is something as simple as a wheelchair or other assistive device to help

him or her overcome the disability and enter the work force. In other cases, a client may require more assistance such as medical treatment, surgery, or therapy to lessen the disability.

A client may need training to prepare for a job. These and other services are available to all clients. All of the services are aimed at one goal — to get the disabled person into the work force.

Without employers who are willing to hire disabled workers, all of the training and preparation might be wasted. Fortunately, many Texas employers do hire disabled workers. Most employers find that their disabled employees are as good or better than other workers.

Vocational rehabilitation also benefits the taxpayer. Before receiving vocational rehabilitation services, many disabled people must rely on public assistance to meet their financial needs. Once a disabled person enters the work force he becomes a taxpayer, instead of a tax-user.

National studies indicate that for every dollar spent on vocational rehabilitation, nine dollars are returned to the economy in taxes. Vocational rehabilitation is not a handout program. It is one of the few government programs actually returning money to the public coffers through its successfully rehabilitated clients.

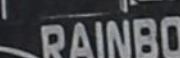
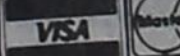

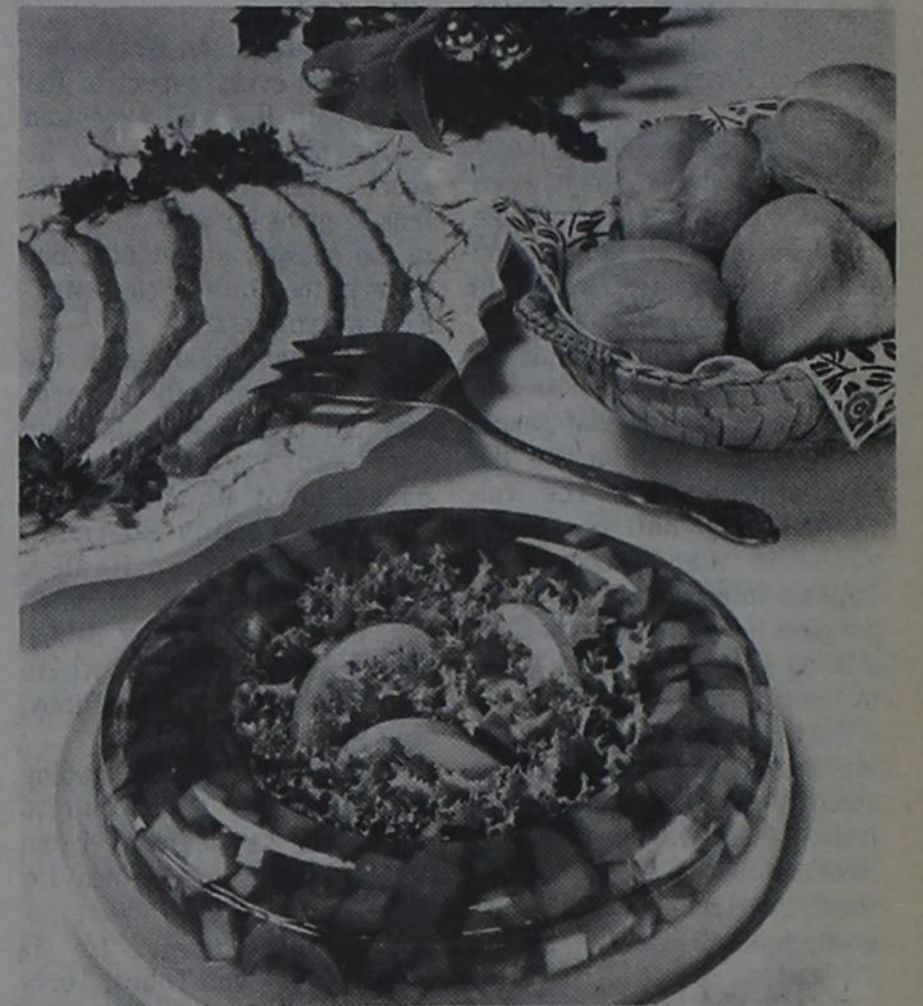
Lemon flavor gelatin is the basis for another two-layer ring mold that honors turkey. Cranberry-Apple Salad offers whole berry cranberry sauce, diced oranges and apple in fruit flavor gelatin layers. To make it even creamier tasting, thawed frozen whipped topping is blended into one of the fruit mixtures.

CRANBERRY-APPLE SALAD
1 pkg. (3 oz.) lemon flavor gelatin
1 cup boiling water
¾ cup cold water
1 can (8 oz.) whole berry cranberry sauce
2 oranges
¼ cup mayonnaise
1 container (4 oz.) non-dairy whipped topping, thawed
1 diced unpeeled apple

ring mold. Chill until set but not firm.

Meanwhile, grate 1 teaspoon rind from 1 of the oranges. Section the oranges. Reserve a few for garnish, if desired, and dice remaining sections. Add rind to measured gelatin and chill until slightly thickened. Blend in mayonnaise; then blend in whipped topping. Add diced oranges and apple.

Spoon into mold. Chill until firm, at least 4 hours or overnight. Unmold. Garnish with reserved orange sections. Makes about 5 cups or 10 servings.



Apple-Cheese Salad Mold

To complement the turkey [hot or cold], serve an impressive two-layer Apple-Cheese Salad Mold, easily prepared with raspberry flavor gelatin. Sliced

apples and diced celery are suspended in a layer of fruit flavor gelatin; softened cream cheese is combined in a gelatin mixture in another layer.

APPLE-CHEESE SALAD MOLD

2 pkgs. (3 oz. each) raspberry flavor gelatin
1¾ cups boiling water
2 cups ice cubes
1 medium apple, chopped (about 1 cup)
¼ cup diced or sliced celery (optional)
¾ cup cold water
1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

Dissolve 1 package gelatin in ¾ cup of the boiling water. Add ice cubes and stir constantly until gelatin begins to thicken, 3 to 5 minutes. Remove any unmelted ice. Add apples and celery and pour into 5-cup ring mold. Chill until set but not firm.

Dissolve remaining gelatin in remaining boiling water; add cold water. Then blend gradually into cream cheese, stirring until smooth. Pour into mold over clear gelatin. Chill until firm, about 3 hours. Unmold. Serve with crisp salad greens and mayonnaise, and garnish with apple wedges, if desired. Makes about 4½ cups or 8 or 9 servings.

Note: Salad may be chilled in nine individual molds or eight 6-ounce custard cups; increase boiling water in clear layer to 1 cup.

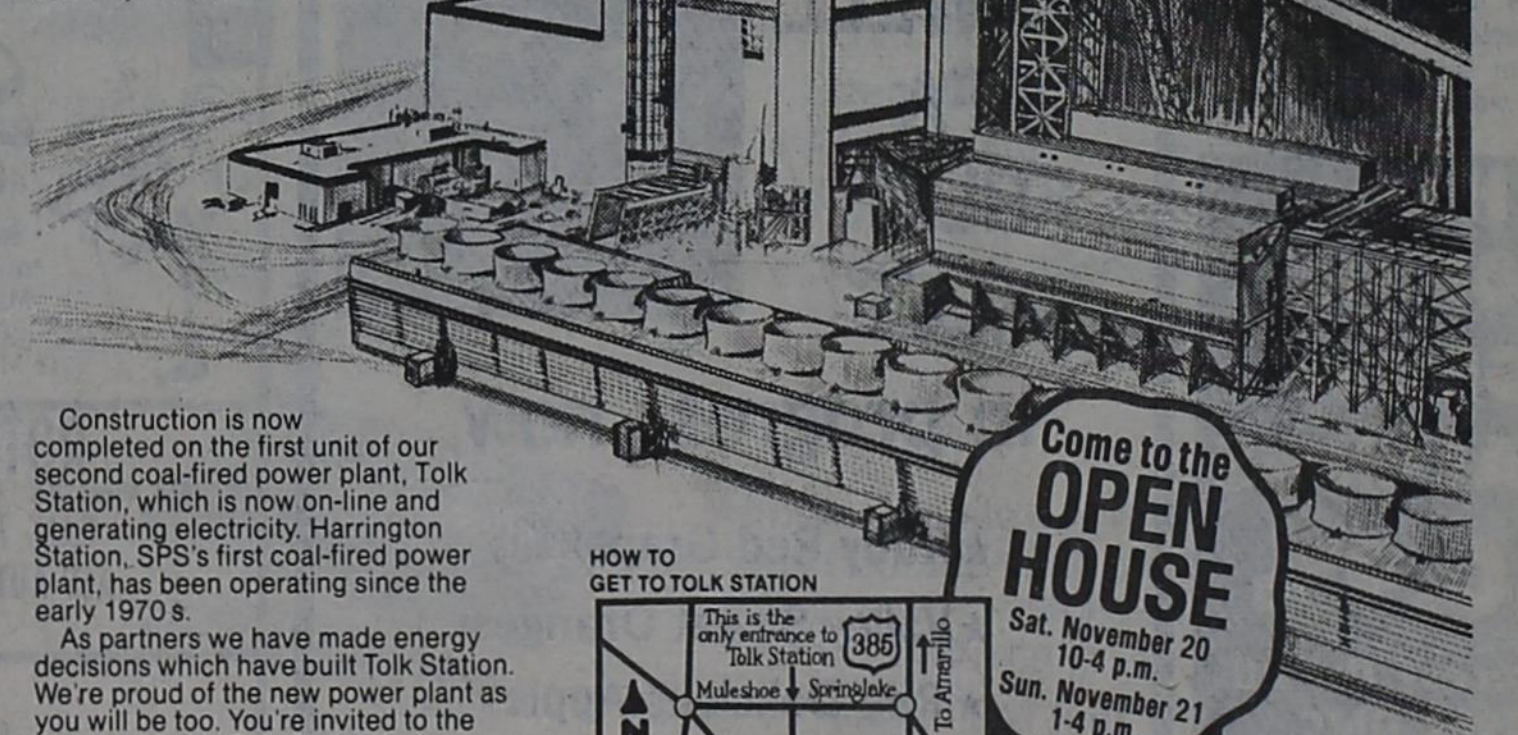

Have 8-1 Season - -

Capitan Topples Wolverines Ending Texico Playoff Hopes

The Texico Wolverines' quest for their first-ever state championship ended when they were toppled by the visiting Capitan Tigers 7-2 Friday night in Texico. The loss dropped the Wolverines to a third place tie in Class A rankings and ended a victory-studded season. Last year the Green and White finished as state runners-up, losing to Reserve in the state finals.

Capitan received the ball and four plays later they were forced to punt. Texico's offense could not generate any action and they were also forced to punt. Neither team could break the defensive spell through the first and most of the second quarter until late in that period when Texico drove inside the Capitan 20-yard line. The Wolverines' first half campaign ended in that situation as Capitan intercepted a Wolverine pass to end the only serious scoring threat by either team in the first half.

During the second half Capitan finally broke the offensive struggle on a 23-yard pass play from Dewey Keller to David Beavers with 9:23 left in the third quarter. The PAT was good, making Capitan hold a 7-0 lead.

Texico took over and once again failed to gain any ground and were forced to punt. The Tigers were faced with the same offensive problems deep in their own territory but finally drove to their own 40-yard line before Wolverine Brad Steward intercepted a pass and ran it back to the Capitan eight-yard line.

A clipping penalty backed the Wolverines up to Capitan's 23-yard line, but strong running efforts by Earl Bibbs and Brad Steward brought the ball to the Capitan 10 with first and goal to go. The drive ended as Capitan recovered a loose fumble to end the Texico thrust.

Capitan took over and the "No Respect Defense" held to their title and forced Capitan into punting. Texico took over at the 35-yard line of Capitan and moved out to the 31-yard line with the third quarter ended.

Texico was again forced to punt but another unsuccessful drive by Capitan put Texico in good field position with just over six minutes left in the contest. A 30-yard pass reception by Kevin West gave the Wolverines a first and goal situation with the ball on the 10-yard stripe. A couple of strong runs by Wolverine Earl Bibbs brought Texico to the three-yard line with Texico facing a fourth down situation.

An offside penalty cost the Wolverines five yards and put them in a fourth down and goal situation with the ball resting on the eight-yard line.

Texico attempted a pass, but when Steward could not find a receiver in the end zone, he ran almost the eight yards but was knocked out of bounds at the Capitan eight-inch line.

Capitan took over and ran the clock down to just over two minutes in the contest when they decided to give up the two-point safety knowing that Texico would once again beat

on the door, and the Tigers wanted that free kick out of their own back yard. Texico took the free kick on Capitan's 38-yard line, but it was not meant to be as Texico ran out of downs giving Capitan the ball with little time in the game. Capitan sat on the ball to run out the clock and ended the season for Texico with a bitter 7-2 loss.

For the night, the Wolverines dominated every aspect of the game with the sole exception of the most crucial one, the score. The "No Respect Defense" gave up only 25 points in the season, a feat no other team in the state of New Mexico can truly claim.

In the semi-final game the defense allowed only 52 yards and did not allow a Capitan first down. The defensive unit consisted of linemen Lloyd Williams, Tommy Boardman, Jeff Holland, Allan Hadley, and Ronnie Galvan; linebackers, Lynn Tubbs, Billy Bibbs, and a secondary of Kevin West, Joe Steward, Earl Bibbs, and Brad Steward.

Earl Bibbs was the leading rusher for the night with 75 yards on 21 carries. Lynn Tubbs rushed four times for four yards. Kevin West received three passes for 52 yards while Lynn Tubbs, Terry Tubbs, and Joe Steward each caught a pass for 11, nine, and

eight yards, respectively.

Brad Steward put the ball up in the air 19 times for six completions with two interceptions.

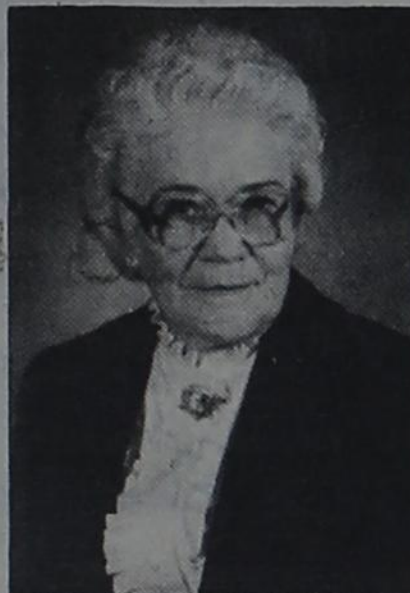
Capitan will now play Reserve, the defending state champion. The two teams will battle for the state championship Friday in Socorro. The loss for the Wolverines dropped their season record to 8-1 and finished off their bid for a state championship.

In commenting about the game Coach David Lynn said, "We should have won the game but we did not — we did win statistically but not the game and that is the most important, the thing that counts."

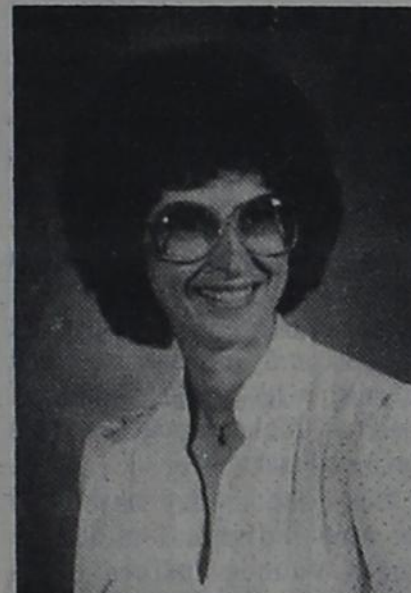
Lynn went on to say that Capitan deserves a lot of credit. It was a hard-fought game and we had opportunities but we just did not capitalize on the opportunities we had.

Mrs. Sylvia Burgett and Mrs. Paula Leighton were honored as Teachers-of-the-Month for November by the Texico Student Council.

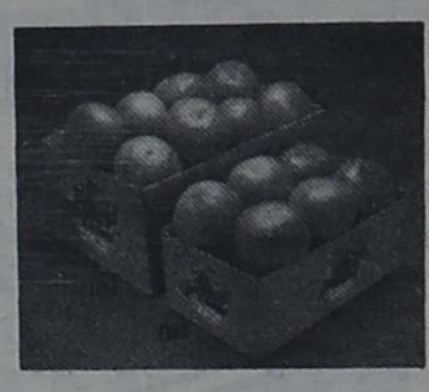

Unbeaten In District - -

Steers Take District Title, Storm By Wolverines 48-0

The 1982 edition of the Farwell Steers became the sole owner of the District 5AA Football championship Friday night after winning their fifth straight district game, shutting out the Springlake-Earth Wolverines 48-0 at Springlake. This is the first Steer team to win the district title since 1969.

The Blue and White warriors of Coach Bruce Dollar took the top honor as the only undefeated team in the district with a 6-4 overall record. Runner-up who will also advance to the playoffs from the district are the Kress Kangaroos.

In Friday's clash, the Steers were led by quarterback Alan Eubank who threw three touchdown passes and ran for one more. Adding to the attack was the running of Santiago Lucio who accounted for over 200 yards and one touchdown.

Farwell started their total domination of the game early in the first quarter on the third play from scrimmage when Santiago Lucio ran 40 yards down to the 12-yard line. Fulcher and Eubank ran the ball to the one where Eubank carried it across for the first score of the evening. Sierra kicked the extra point to give the Steers a 7-0 lead only two minutes into the game.

The Wolverines were given a chance to work the football downfield, but were foiled on third down by Raymond Sierra on what seemed a perfectly executed screen pass. The Wolverines were then forced to punt on fourth and 15.

The Steers began another four play scoring drive on the 40-yard line that began with 11 and 12 yard runs from Lucio. On Farwell's first pass of the game from the 30-yard line, Eubank connected with receiver Roger Robertson for a 30-yard touchdown and 14-0 lead. The first quarter of play ended at the same score.

In the second quarter the Wolverines tried again to score but were stopped on a fumble recovery by Steer Frank Cantu. As a result of the recovered fumble the Steers drove down with several short runs and a Lucio 20-yard run to the nine. On the next play, Kevin Owen, on his first carry of the game, ran nine yards around the left side of the offensive line for the touchdown. Sierra kicked his third straight PAT to make the score 21-0 at halftime.

In the third quarter after a series of possessions, the

Steers came up with another big play. This time Lucio blocked a punt to give the Steers the ball on the Wolverine 31-yard line.

Farwell's offense then scored on a drive which included a 15-yard run by Lucio and was finished with a TD pass, this time to Manuel Cantu for 20 yards and a 28-0 lead for the unstoppable Steers.

The Farwell defense proved just as devastating on the next drive, holding the Wolverines at the same place they started, forcing a punt that gave Farwell the ball on the 39. From there Lucio executed runs of 10, 9, and 51 yards for the touchdown. Sierra kicked the PAT to make the score 35-0.

Later in the fourth quarter, Manuel Cantu intercepted the first of his two passes to stop a drive by the Wolverines and give the Steers the ball. This drive included runs by Paul Fulcher and a 30-yard pass completion to Robertson that brought the ball down to the ten-yard line. Eubank completed his third TD pass, this time to Steer receiver Jimmy Bernal.

On Springlake-Earth's next set of downs they were again stopped motionless by the tough Steer defense.

Farwell offense then took control of the pigskin, and on the third play of the drive, Paul Fulcher ran 51 yards for the touchdown, giving Farwell a 48-0 lead.

The Wolverines' hope of stopping a shut-out vanished with good defensive plays by Raymond Sierra, and a quarterback sack for a 10-yard loss by Johnny Daniel and Frank Cantu. Another interception by Manuel Cantu gave Farwell the ball. Cantu returned the ball 30 yards to the 30-yard line after the interception.

Farwell's last drive, behind runs by Robby Armstrong and Alan Eubank, and a 22-yard touchdown run by Paul Fulcher was killed by a penalty. The Steers then ran the clock out on regular season play by beating the Springlake-Earth Wolverines 48-0.

Farwell ended district play with a 5-0 record and a 6-4 season record. The Steers will play the New Deal Lions at Hereford, Thursday night at 8 p.m. for the Bi-District championship.

In commenting on the game, Coach Bruce Dollar said, "The Steers played pretty good, but I did not think Springlake-

Earth played as good as they were capable of playing. I was most pleased with the passing game as it was better than it had been as we hit seven out of 13 passes. Another thing is that no one was hurt."

The Steers will play the New Deal Lions on Thursday at 8:00 p.m. at the Hereford High School Football field. It is located adjacent to LaPlata Junior High, west of the Vega Highway. The Steers are the visiting team and supporters will enter through the south gate. Tickets are \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for students.

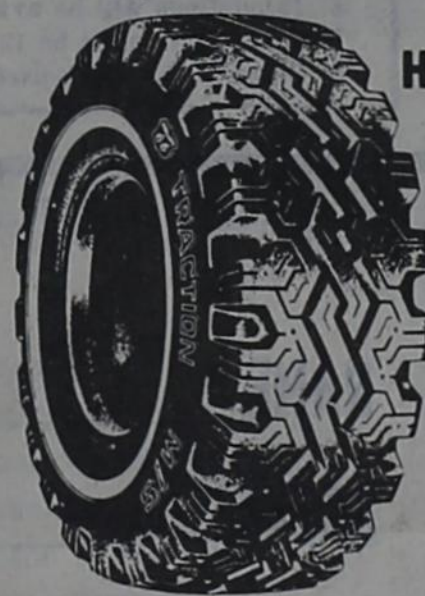

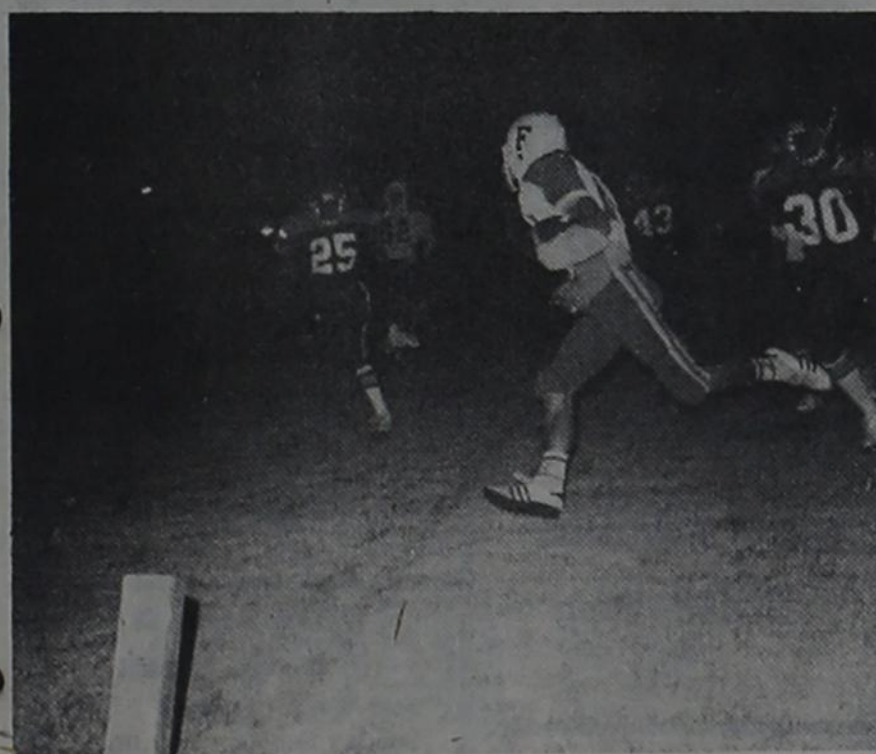

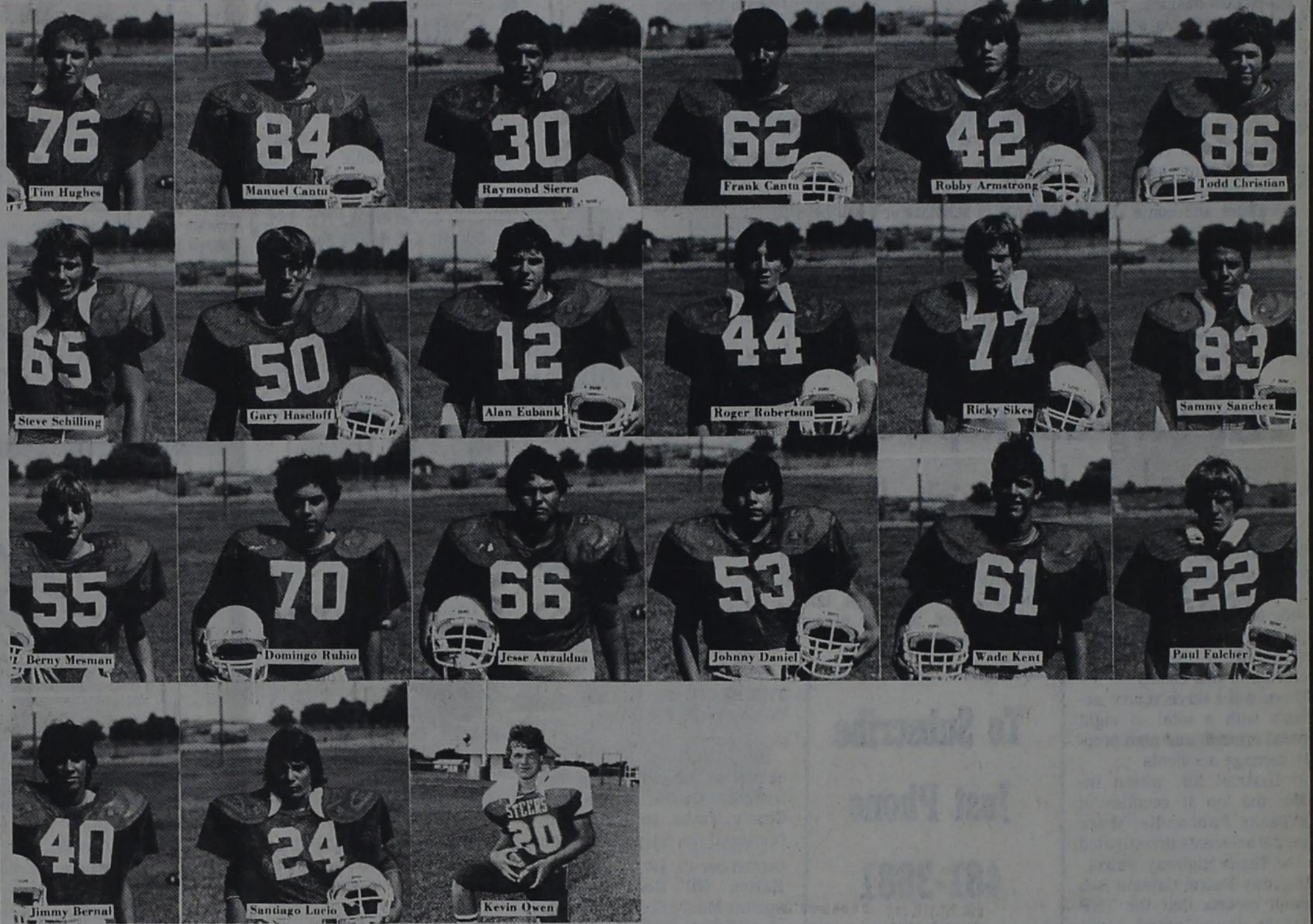

On The Farm In Parmer County

Pioneer Hi-Bred International has established a \$4,000 scholarship with the Texas 4-H program, effective June 1, 1983.

The scholarship will be managed through the Texas 4-H Foundation, said H.T. Davison, the foundation's executive director and 4-H youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. It will be available to 4-H members who are graduating high school seniors.

Candidates for this scholarship must be planning to major in agriculture or home economics and must attend a Texas college or university, Davison said. A major objective for the scholarship is to encourage competent young people to study and remain in the fields of agriculture and home economics.

Clarence Kerns of Plainview, spokesman for Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Southern Region Division, said the initial scholarship to be presented in 1983 will be the first

in a series of four to be awarded in consecutive years.

"We are pleased that Pioneer Hi-Bred International has elected to fund a 4-H scholarship in Texas," said Dr. John Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader with the Extension Service. "Even though scholarship standards are high, several hundred young people compete annually for more than 70 scholarships available through the Texas 4-H Foundation."

The Texas 4-H Foundation is a non-profit educational organization which works cooperatively with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to develop private sector support in behalf of 4-H programs, he said.

Davison said that about \$350,000 in scholarships will be available to graduating 4-H members in 1982. The 4-H members may apply for these scholarships by securing an application from their local county Extension office after January 1, 1983.

How much, I wonder, do the Christian parents among our readers show their children their love for the Word, for Christ, and for the souls for whom He died?

For many years I worked with my father, first full-time, then part-time, as a city missionary in Paterson, N. J. All during these first years Dad and I walked to work together each morning—a little over a mile.

Do you know how we invariably occupied ourselves on the way? By quoting Scripture passages on some particular subject. use to deal with a blaspheming unbeliever?" Or "a self-righteous person," or "one who rejects Christ on intellectual grounds?"

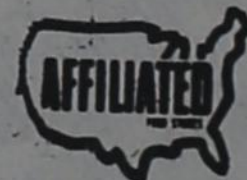

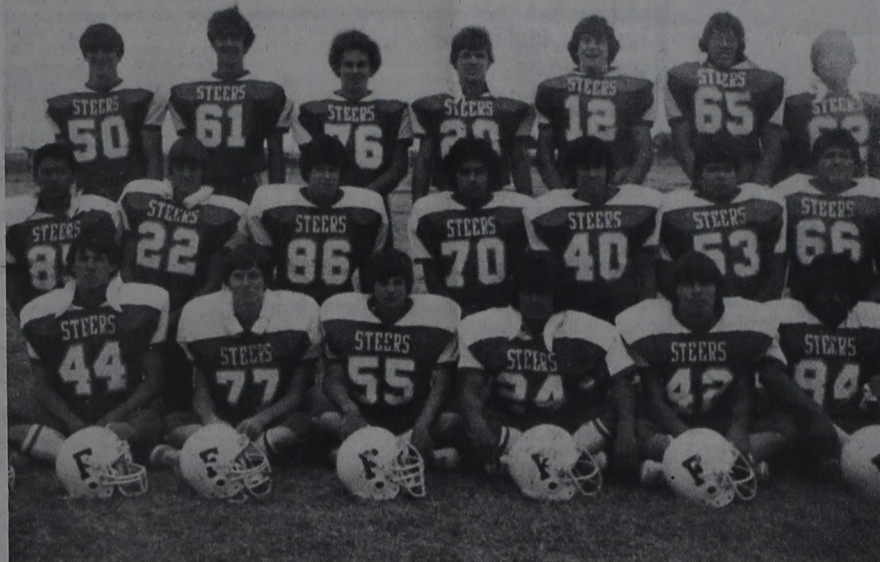


