The poor old taxpayer is getting it in the pocketbook once again. We have been following the stories about John Hinckley and Charles Rumbaugh. The medical profession is going to heroic lengths to keep these fellows alive after they took the steps to end their own tenure on earth. This is just fine, except that the public till will very probably be tapped for enormous sums to pay the assorted bills.

It is rather ironic that the system will go to such great lengths to provide the finest medical service to that ilk while the public pays. Were we to suffer some massive medical expense, we would just be bankrupt.

The program prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service includes a review of certain questions relating to the information presented. The program will require approximately 3 hours. Those attending and seeking certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a Request for Private Applicator Certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for issuance of certification.

As an alternative to partici-

"The March 11 PIK deadline will not be extended," reports Martin L. Chandler, Parmer County ASCS Executive Director. Farmers have only a few days left to sign up for the payment-in-kind program. The sign up period ends Friday, March 11, and will not be ex-

tended, according to Chandler. The ASCS official also says that the whole base bids will be open in the county ASCS office in Farwell beginning at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, March 8, and that all sign up information will be available from Washington, D.C., on March 22.

"Farmers will not have the minds and sign up after this March 11 deadline. However, those who have already enrol-

led and those who enroll before March 11 will have the option of withdrawing or changing their enrollment without penalty provided it is done before enrollment ends," Chandler

Severe weather conditions may have caused some problems for farmers around the country. However, recurring storms or any other problems will not change the signup deadline, he said.

The PIK program is designed to bring supplies more in line with demand to improve the farm economy. Rosemary Gilleland, a former Peace Corps Volunteer, is the new resource teacher in her first year at Farwell Elementary School.

The much-traveled lady was reared in Glenwood, Colo., and graduated from the University of Colorado at Greely, with a BA in special education and elementary education.

Her teaching experiences include 18 months as a Peace Corps volunteer in the West Indies, and after returning to the United States, she taught for three years in South Carolina.

She lives at Cannon Air Force Base with her husband, Calvin, and their three daughters, Miranda, 41/2, Jocelyn, 21/2, and Jessica, 18 months, and says they plan to be in the Clovis-Farwell area at least for the next four years.

The Gillelands met and married while she was in the Peace Corps in St. John's, Antigua, in the West Indies.

She had joined the Peace Corps after graduating from college, and was sent to the West Indies with two other persons. Only two of them actually got to the Indies, Mrs. Gilleland said, explaining that

"While almost all of the natives lived on a poverty level, everyone and everything was always neat and clean," reported Mrs. Gilleland.

The people used a lot of rice and pumpkin in their cooking. "Their breads were heavier. It was a very starchy diet, so we all gained weight. They made a dish called goat water - it's a goat meat stew, and the only way I could eat goat. I became almost a vegetarian while I was over there," said the local teacher. She went on to explain that while the diet was starchy, there were very few cars on the island so most people walked or rode mules to their destinations, and the exercise helped to balance out the gained weight.

"My time on St. John's did more for me than I did for the people," said Mrs. Gilleland in remembering her tenure there.


