1982 In Review

The year 1982 started out nationwide with two I's being very impressive — that of inflation and interest rates.

Inflation caused people to become irritated and resentful as it had been accelerating for at least 15 years. The rate of inflation is a national problem that stemmed down to each individual no matter where their place of abode.

The strategy of disinflation,

we have been told, involves sacrifice by businesses as well as by individuals. The question is as to how should the sacrifices be allocated.

Another problem that is prevalent is how fast to reduce the monetary expansion in order to slow the rate of inflation. All of these things seem to be a manner of trial and error, which seem frustrating for such a well-educated society.

Interest rates have been the thorn in the side of Paul Volcker and other members of the Federal Reserve Board, as well as to any businessman borrowing operating capital. Toward the end of '82, the rates have come down and seem to be leveled off and more in line with the economy. Everyone's hopes pend on the Federal Reserve Board finding a method of monetary expansion that could lead to a reduction in the rate of inflation, as well as leading to a low and sustained level of unemployment.

Unemployment - that item marched in about mid-year to become the public's number one concern. Unemployment is now presently at its highest level in 40 years.

Since Parmer County is an agriculture-dependent area, the subject of the price of farm commodities plays a major role in the financial stability of the local area. It has truly

been a different market for commodities as the government loan program has been higher than has the cash market for the farm commodities.

Agriculture Secretary John Block is presently trying to put together a farm program called Payment In Kind, PIK. The PIK program is a stock reduction tool that should serve to enhance the price of the farm commodities.

Press releases from Washington indicate that the agriculture program should be announced sometime between January 3 and January 10. At that time, the farmer and all farm-related businesses will find out what the year 1983 holds in store for them.

The year 1982 saw many items of fantasy enter the consumer's market. Movies such as E.T. caused people to imagine as well as exercising their thought processes. This was not the only thing to come from the movie, but the markets were flooded with the snaky looking creature being sold in all sorts of merchandise items. Television series about space as well as series about the ultra-rich held onto very good ratings.

Music seemed to be playing to a slower beat with the country and western still as popular as the wearing apparel of boots, western hats, and jeans. The ladies' fashions turned to softer, fuller styles with skirts and dresses being worn more often.

The home video games held a back seat to the personal computer as sales skyrocketed and prices dropped within the range of the average person. One magazine announced that there was no man of the year as the computer had won that honor.

The automobile industry also gained momentum toward the end of the year with the industry's introduction of automobiles with flashy lines that will make heads turn and take notice.

Most everyone has just finished celebrating the greatest story ever told but after the feasting and exchanging of

gifts, we seem to see this as the end of the year. Let us look at 1983 as one with a fresh start eagerly anticipating all the new year has in store for us.

JANUARY

January blew into the Twin Cities area at the rate of 35-50 miles-per-hour. The strong southwest winds produced balmy temperatures.

County candidates began announcing their intentions to seek offices which were slated to be filled in the primary elections.

Texico's David Lynn was selected as UPI Coach of the Year with a 13-7 record for the Texico Wolverines.

Ten members of the Farwell High School Band were named to the all-region band.

Texico celebrated its basketball homecoming with a "Good Times" theme. Jeff Dunsworth and Tracy Dobbs were crowned king and queen.

Concern was expressed by 35-40 persons gathered to hear state highway representatives from both Texas and New Mexico present refined proposals for the Highway 60-70 construction improvement project.

Last of January saw the Twin Cities reaching a high of a mere 10 degrees as a thin blanket of snow covered the area. The next day saw the area enjoy an unseasonable temperature of 70 degrees.

Voters in the Texico school district approved a \$320,000.00 school bond, as well as a two mill levy to help fund construction of a proposed multi-purpose room and class room facility.

Oklahoma Lane 4-H'ers had their Junior Livestock Show with over 75 persons in attendance.

Texico basketball girls won EPAC, with the Texico boys capturing second place in the EPAC tourney.

Parmer County Commissioners Court approved a new precinct re-districting plan whereby each county commissioner will have an equal amount of constituents to represent. Two new polling places came out of the re-districting plan.

FEBRUARY

The month of February was greeted by up to six inches of the white stuff, with drifts three to four feet high in some areas.

Farwell city fathers approved an average 5.8 percent rate hike for Southern Union Gas Company.

The annual Rock n' Roll Jamboree was sponsored by residents of Farwell Convalescent Center, with \$300 raised for the American Heart Association.

Texico and Farwell FFA clubs observed national FFA week, with each group planning special programs to mark the observance.

Texico basketball girls captured the district title after winning 19 straight games on their home court, and Farwell Steerettes earned the district crown with a 9-1 district slate.

A car caravan was organized from Muleshoe to meet Agriculture Secretary Block as he spoke in Lubbock at the Municipal Coliseum at Texas Tech.

MARCH

Students of Farwell Elementary raised \$1,156.00 for St. Jude's Children's Hospital during their recent Math-a-thon.

Texico basketball girls lost the state title to Melrose in a heart-breaking game with the final score, 43-30.

Farwell Country Club Ladies Association reorganized, with plans to "renovate" the country club building and clean up around the pool in preparation for the upcoming golf and swimming season.

Parmer County 4-H'ers earned top money at the Houston Stock Show, with 24 exhibitors participating.

Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet featured a musical presentation with selections taken from "The Sound of Music." Robin Gregory and Johnny Atkinson were named the Chamber's Woman and Man of the Year.

Texico Wolverine boys entered state roundball competition in Albuquerque for the first time in 22 years, but did not make it to the finals.

Burger Barn in Texico was gutted by an early morning fire, resulting in \$15,000 worth of damage.

The High Plains area showed a moisture deficit from 2-8 inches before planting time.

APRIL

Senator Harrison Schmitt was the featured speaker at the Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet, with the Woman and Man of the Year being Tonnie Snodgrass and John R. Hadley.

Farwell voters turned down the legalization of bingo in the city limits by a lopsided margin of 105-42.

Farwell golfing Steerettes once again won the district title, and the Farwell Steers also captured the district golfing crown.

Farwell was represented at the clean-up following the tornado in Paris, Texas, by three youth and their director from Farwell First Baptist Church.

After 26 years of service at the Texico post office, Postmaster Louis Ingram retired.

Farwell High School students Doug Cole and Alan Eubank were district doubles tennis champs.

Wolverine boys won the EPAC track and field meet, while the Wolverine girls placed third.

Jeff Day and Tracy Dobbs were named Mr. and Miss Texico High School at the school's annual variety show, "On the Air."

Moisture fell in the Twin Cities, but only measured 2.3 inches.

MAY

Parmer County Democratic and Republican primary elections on May 1 kicked off activities for the month.

Graduation exercises were held for Farwell, Texico, and Lazbuddie schools, and honor students were named.

Karen Magness was valedictorian at Farwell, Tracy Dobbs was Texico's valedictorian, and Terry Jesko was valedictorian at Lazbuddie. Named as salutatorians were Dana Hukill at Farwell, Craig Horne at Texico, and Cynthia Everett at Lazbuddie. Historians were Doug Cole at Farwell, Lisa Crooks at Texico, and Gay Elliott at Lazbuddie.

Athletic awards banquet was held at Farwell, and an awards assembly took place at Texico; and outstanding athletes were recognized.

Ruth Scott, Kent Harding, and Todd Gerles were named Best All-Around Athletes at Texico High School, and receiving the Sportsmanship awards were Lisa Crooks and Craig Horne.

Steer and Steerette of the year at Farwell High School were Rocky Ford and Janene Berry. Karen Magness received

the Farwell Chamber of Commerce Sportsmanship Award, and Miss Magness and Doug Cole were joint recipients of the principal's award for the highest scholastic average. Jointly receiving the Student Council Sportsmanship award were Sharon Kalbas and Alan Eubank.

Final school bells rang the middle of May, and area schools were dismissed for the summer, with the Farwell graduates leaving for their senior trip graduation night.

Devastation swept across Parmer, Curry, and Bailey counties in late May in the form of thunderstorms, high winds, and golf ball size hail. Crops were destroyed and homes and vehicles were damaged. Area grain men said it was the worst thing to have happened here since 1959.

A new ethanol plant located four miles west and one mile north of Texico hosted a grand opening and conducted tours of its new facility on May 22. It was the first commercial ethanol products system in New Mexico, and its projection calls for yearly consumption of from 28 to 39 million bushels of local grain.

JUNE

Vacation Church Schools began in area churches during June, and Texico-Farwell Little League and Pee Wee League baseball season was well underway. Many area boys and girls are participating, as well as many parents handling the umpiring, coaching, scorekeeping, and concession duties.

New Mexico and Curry County voters went to the polls in the primary elections to decide statewide and county races.

The 1982 Border Town Days Beard Contest got underway the first week in June, as all participants had to be clean shaven on May 29; and "shave permits" went on sale for those men who did not wish to grow a beard.

Plans for this year's Border Town Days celebration were well underway, due to the efforts of the BTD Committee which has been meeting monthly since April. The committee is made up of representatives of all civic and social groups in the Twin Cities.

Farwell graduates returned from their senior trip to Houston and Galveston, with 27 seniors and eight parents making the journey.

On June 10, the second devastating storm of the season ravaged crops and property across the local area, with heavy rain, hail, and high winds. In addition to the crop damage, the storm caused a flash flood north of Oklahoma Lane, drowning hundreds of cattle at Bovina Feeders.

Parmer County USDA Emergency Board estimated that 25 percent of the crops in the county were adversely affected or destroyed by the severe weather, and County Judge Porter Roberts requested that the county be declared a disaster area. He asked Governor Clements to take necessary action required to secure low interest emergency financing.

The total loss in invested dollars was estimated at \$1.5 million, while the total loss in gross income was estimated at \$4 million.

For the second consecutive year, Texico Future Farmers of America chapter received a Superior Chapter Award at the state convention in Las Cruces.

The law offices of Aldridge, Harding, Aycock, and Atkinson, observed its 50th anniversary, as well as the formation of the newly-created 287th Judicial District, with a gathering on June 19, with several special guest speakers present

who were former judicial officials in the area.

To round out the month of June, area farmers faced another devastating setback as one more in a long line of hailstorms swept across much of the area, destroying more crops and damaging other property.

JULY

Construction of a new educational complex at Texico Schools will become a reality as the school system was granted \$923,000 from capital outlay funding from the state of New Mexico.

A task force from the United States Department of Agriculture visited Parmer and Curry counties in July to assess local crop damage caused by the recent hailstorms, and to decide whether or not local farmers will be eligible for disaster aid.

The summer baseball program in Texico-Farwell was reported to be a great success, with some 180 youngsters from throughout the Twin Cities area participating in Pee Wee and Little League games.

Over 30 area businesses, under the leadership of Benny Haney of Capitol Foods, initiated a Border Town Days Sales Event to increase attendance at the BTD park activities. Registration was conducted at each business for three weeks prior to the big event, and those persons registering were eligible for the many prizes given away by the merchants.

Local students, Polly Turner of Farwell and Jesse Orozco of Texico, played with the New Mexico Lions Band at the Lions International Convention in Atlanta, Ga. They were sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club.

The 16th annual Border Town Days in the twin Cities on July 31 was hailed as "the best ever." Perfect weather welcomed an estimated 1500 to 1600 persons who gathered in Farwell City Park following the BTD parade, with over 1000 persons enjoying the Rotary Club barbecue and the many park events.

Jennifer Williams of Farwell was crowned the 1982 BTD Queen, and the Farwell Study Club float won first place in the parade, with the Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens float taking second place honors. Steve Jones won first place in the old car category, with Duane McDaniel taking second.

Winners of the beard growing contest were Robert White, Mike Scott, and Otis McMillan, and winning first in the fiddlers contest was Turner Paine.

AUGUST

The Pleasant Hill Community reunion was held on August 8 at the Community building, with some 400 persons coming from near and far to enjoy the bountiful meal at noon and an afternoon of visiting.

School bells rang for area students as Texico Schools began classes on August 18 and Farwell and Lazbuddie schools classes started on August 23. Enrollment at Farwell was down a bit over the previous year, with enrollment at Texico showing a slight increase.

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance of Texas announced that West Texas corn and grain sorghum farmers will receive higher disaster payments than originally announced by the USDA.

Texico, Farwell, and Lazbuddie gridiron hopefuls donned their pads and began scrimmages in preparation for the upcoming football season.

Farwell Booster Club hosted an ice cream social for players, parents, and fans; while Texico Booster Club hosted a watermelon feast for their players, parents, and fans.

SEPTEMBER

Farwell Jaycees manned their annual Labor Day highway rest stop, as well as assisting with the annual Muscular Dystrophy Jerry Lewis Telethon.

State Line Tribune's 24th annual Merchant's Football Contest kicked off September 3 with the Grand Prize being two tickets to the Dallas Cowboy-New Orleans Saints football game.

Prentice Mills, who was Executive Director of Parmer County ASCS in Farwell for 26 years, retired and was replaced by Martin Chandler, a former Farwellite, who has had many years experience in ASCS work.

Wolverine Boosters, Steer Boosters, and Lazbuddie Boosters planned their seasonal activities to boost the spirit and activities of the sporting events taking place in each school system.

Farwell Chamber of Commerce met to formulate long-range plans for the beautification of the city of Farwell.

Texico booths on display at the Curry County Fair took top honors as the FFA, FHA, 4-H, and school booths placed in the top four of their individual classes.

With the retirement of local freight agent, Tony Mendoza, Santa Fe officials announced that the Texico freight operations would be consolidated with the Clovis Regional Freight Office. The historical old freight depot that served the Twin Cities for several generations stands idle.

Jesse Orozco and Audrey McCauley, Texico Band members, were among the seven high school musicians from the Texas Panhandle and Eastern New Mexico who were nominated to the 1982 McDonald's All American Band.

The Twin Cities were treated to an afternoon rain that brought from .3 inch to one-half inch of moisture to the area.

Benny Haney of Capitol Foods received plaques of ap-

Many 4-H achievers were honored at the Parmer County 4-H banquet, with Maureen Jesko of Lazbuddie and Kevin Owen of Farwell named as 1982 Gold Star Girl and Gold Star Boy.

Groundbreaking took place for Texico's new \$266,000 water improvement project. The spadework marked the beginning of construction of a new 250,000 gallon water storage tank and replacement of more than half of the community's municipal water distribution.

Area corn harvest got underway with the yields averaging from 2500 to 12,000 lbs. per acre. The severe hail damage caused the low yields, with the fields that received little or no hail damage reporting good yields.

Dana Ralston, Farwell 4-H'er, exhibited the Grand Champion Barrow at the Panhandle South Plains Fair in Lubbock.

Spoons and Goblets were in evidence on Halloween with Farwell Student Council spon-

soring a Halloween Carnival, Lazbuddie School staged a carnival in the gym, and several interested Texico parents sponsored a party for junior high and high school students.

Area farmers beat a path to the Parmer County ASCS office in order to participate in the federal loan program as the loan rate for farm commodities was higher than the cash market. As of mid-October, payments to farmers in Parmer County totaled \$555,112.52 with another 20 percent due to be receiving payments, making the total about one-quarter million dollars. These payments were received because Parmer County, along with 75 other Texas counties, was designated as being eligible to participate in the disaster program.

Mid-way in the season, New Mexico's number one Class A Texico Wolverines racked up a 7-0 record with a 3-0 mark in district. The Farwell Steers record was 4-4 for the season with a district record of 3-0, while the Lazbuddie Longhorns carried a 3-1 district record with a 4-3 season record.

Texico School Band members traveled to Roswell to play for President Reagan as he visited Roswell, from an invitation extended by U.S. Senator Harrison Schmitt.

Area clocks received their corrections as most of the nation reverted to Standard Time.

NOVEMBER

Parmer County and Curry County voters did not go along with the rest of the voters in their respective states in the general election. The projected state winners were not the

ones chosen by area voters. Interest rates for loan programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farmers Home Administration were dropped the first of November from 13.25 percent down to 11.5 percent.

Texico Wolverines won their district football title as had been predicted, but the Farwell Steers made a surprising achievement in bringing home the district football crown. Both teams lost in the playoffs ending their quest for state championships. The Lazbuddie Longhorns ended their season with an even 5-5 mark.

Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens held their first Christmas Fair which included a quilt show, home crafted items, and concessions. At least 300 visitors made an appearance at the fair.

Southwestern Public Service Company opened its coal-fired Tolk Station Unit No. 1 plant near Muleshoe to visitors. The plant generator can produce 561,000 kilowatts - enough electricity for 225,000 people.

Dr. J.R. Ivins of the Farwell Clinic was awarded the Public Health Achievement Medal presented to only six health care professionals out of 230 eligible for the prestigious award.

Area grain harvest neared completion as cotton harvest

got into full swing.

Thanksgiving services and fellowship meals were planned by area churches in celebration of the Thanksgiving holidays.

The area at long last received a new doctor and his family as residents of Farwell. Dr. William Lewis is associated with the Farwell Clinic facility, specializing in family practice and associated with the Clovis High Plains Hospital in Clovis.

Texico Wolverines and Farwell Steers stole the show on all-district teams, with Steer Coach Bruce Dollar being named Coach of the Year for Class 5-AA and Player of the Year being Alan Eubank, Steer quarterback. Eleven members of the Steer team were named to the all-district team. Wolverine Coach, David Lynn, received the honor of Coach of the Year in New Mexico Class 2-A, with ten Wolverines named to the mythical all-district team.

Twin Cities roundballers were warming up and getting an eye for the hoop in preparation of the upcoming basketball contest.

T.J. Kittrell of Farwell won the State Line Tribune's football contest sponsored by area merchants. This was the second time for T.J. to win the

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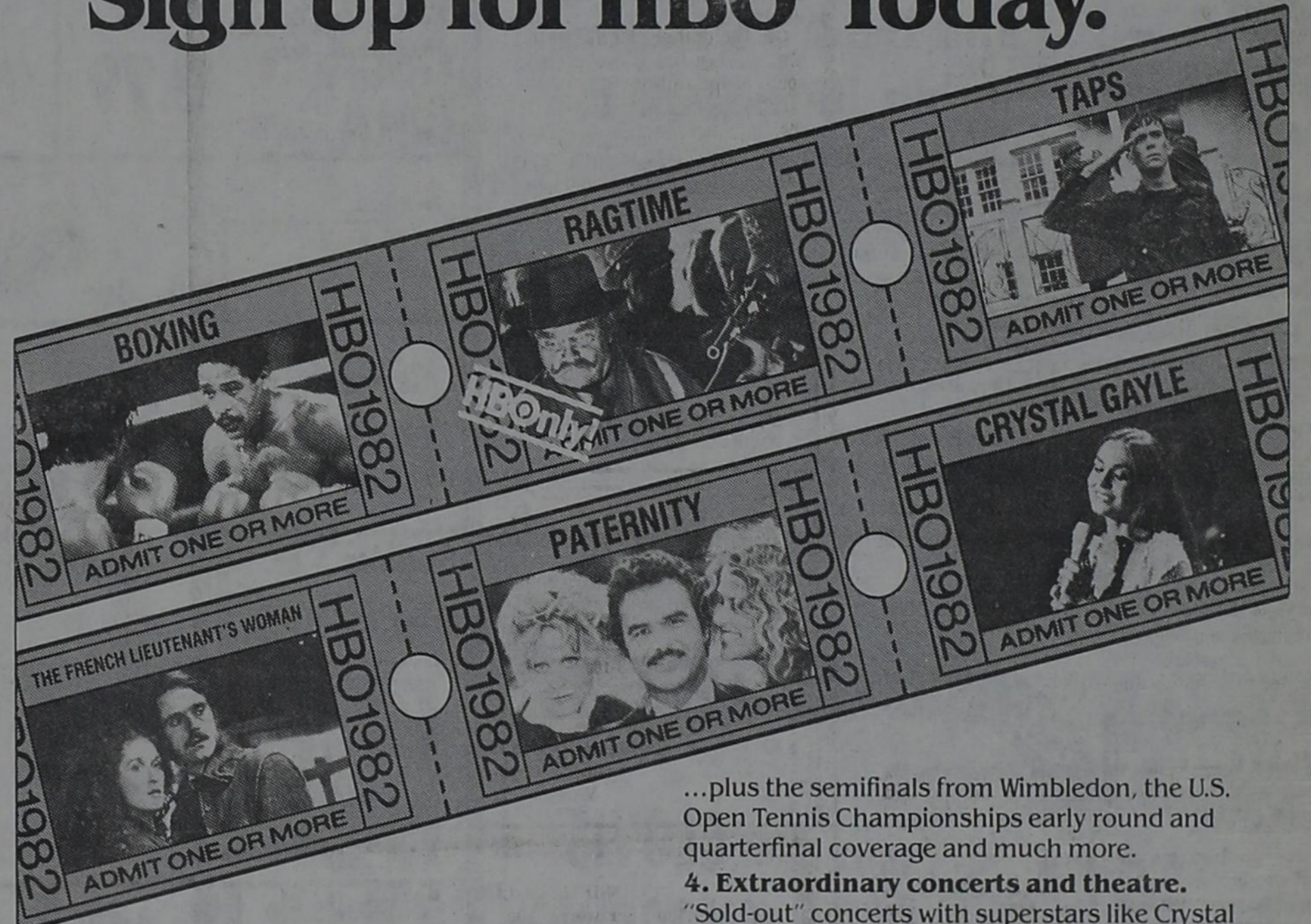

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Friona Man Charged With Christmas Shooting

Parmer County law enforcement officials arrested Thomas Satelo, 19, of Friona, on December 27 and charged him with involuntary manslaughter in the 2 a.m. Christmas morning shooting death of Innocencia Luna Camarillo, 47, of Friona.

According to the police report, Camarillo was shot in the right side of the stomach in his residence at the Saratoga Apartments in Friona. He was transported to Parmer County Community Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival by the attending physician.

Justice of the Peace Frances Euler ordered an autopsy which was performed at Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home in Friona. Dr. Erdman, pathologist,

determined Camarillo's death due to a gunshot wound. Satelo appeared before Justice of the Peace Albert Smith in Farwell, and is in Parmer County jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond pending an appearance before the Grand Jury.

On December 25, Tommy Leal, 21, of Bovina was arrested by the Bovina Police Department officials and charged with DWI. He pled not guilty and was released on \$300 bond by County Judge Porter Roberts.

On December 21, Lawrence May of Farwell reported that seven speakers, an amplifier, and clock had been taken from his pickup while parked at his residence. No estimate of loss was given for the items.

Lazbuddie Dump Ground Discussed By Comm. Court

Dr. Henry C. Moritz, Jr., Regional Director for the Texas Department of Health, met with Parmer County Commissioners on Wednesday, Dec. 22, to explain some of the requirements and needs for the dump ground at Lazbuddie.

The Commissioners stated that before they would accept the responsibility of maintaining the dump ground, they would have to know how much work and expense would be incurred to meet the requirements of the Department of Health. Dr. Moritz agreed to have an engineer meet with the Court on January 24 to work out details with the commissioners.

The District Judge's office is in need of a typewriter. Since this machine will be needed only at various times, the Court decided to try to get a good used machine for this office.

The matter of an Outreach office for MH/MR at Friona was tabled pending the working out of some details.

The Commissioners approved and ratified a resolution to become a member of a Job

Training Consortium in order to get the same delivery of services as with the CETA program. The new Job Training Partnership Act (Public Law 97-300) replaces the current CETA program that will end late in 1983.

Land Bank To Reduce Interest Rates Jan. 1

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11.25 percent on farm loans and to 11.75 percent on farm-related business and rural residence loans, said Bill Liles, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe.

These rates become effective January 1, 1983.

"The Land Bank's objective is to provide credit to Texas agriculture at the lowest possible cost, consistent with sound business practices," said Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas in Austin.

"For over two years the

Bank's average cost of funds consistently has been higher than the loan rate," Benson continued. "However, for the past four months, we have begun to see a decline in bond costs.

"As a result of this decline, we are able to reduce the Bank's loan interest rate," he said. "We hope that the decline in the bond interest rates will continue, allowing us to make further reductions in the loan rate."

The Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe makes long-term real estate loans on farm and rural residence property in the counties of Bailey and Parmer.

SWCD News

If you are troubled by the chilling effects of cold winter winds it may be worth while to look into a system of windbreak trees. A planned row of trees can have many benefits, such as: 1) reduction of home energy costs; 2) protection to buildings and farmsteads; 3) control of wind erosion; 4) cover for livestock and wildlife; and 5) beautification of the farmstead.

Planning a windbreak ahead of time is necessary so that you are ready to plant when the trees are received this spring. The trees are ordered from the Colorado State Forest Service.

Now is the time to get in touch with personnel at the Friona Field Office of the Soil Conservation Service at 1306 W. 9th, or call 247-2220. They have information on ordering trees and planning a windbreak system. Also, information is available on trickle irrigation systems, which increases the survival of young trees.

Remember, the sooner a windbreak is started, the sooner you'll have protection for your home, farm, and livestock from the cold winter winds that are a part of the Texas Panhandle.




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
