## Mexican Labor

The President has signed the new immigration bill which paves the way for the opening of negotiations between the United States and Mexico for a new contract for the importation of Mexican agricultural laborers into this country.

Texas farmers and ranchers, big users of the labor from south of the border, hope for a better agreement this year than the one under which they had to operate tast year and under which they still are op-

The agricultural interests of Texas and Mexico recently have agreed on the need for a simple and workable program.

The agreements of the past few years have been smothered in red tape, making it almost impossible to hire the needed labor and the farmers have had

The days of illegal Mexican labor, the "wetbacks," are over. Farmers and ranchers realize that, and they want to proceed in a legal manner, but they don't want to be hamstrung by a law.

Since the farm leaders of the two countries have agreed as to what will be needed, it should not be asking too much to have their ideas included in the negotiations for the new contract.

After all, the laborers are coming from farms in Mexico to work on farms in Texas and the farm leaders from Texas and Mexico should be well qualified to determine what kind of agreement will work best both for the worker and the farmer who depends on the Mexicans to help him harvest his crops.

A—No single finish is best for every species of wood and for all kinds of furniture pieces. If there is a rule to follow it is that a natural-looking finish is always desirable. The only reasons for finishing furniture are to enhance the natural beauty of the wood and to protect it from dirt, grease, liquid stains, and heat. Thick or extra shiny finishes should be avoided.

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
