People in America are "flag conscious" these days, but perhaps many of us have forgotten the correct display and respect of the "Living Symbol of Our Great Republic.

Here is an item of interest from a little magazine called "Crosswords and Contest News," that mighty few people in Texas know. This article appeared recently in which will be presented at the the Iola Register, a newspaper published in southeastern Kansas.

"Down in Cherryvale about 40 years ago an elderly teacher in the public schools decided to offer a small prize to the boy or girl in her school room who could compose the most appropriate pledge of allegiance to the American flag.

"The youngster who won the prize was named Frank Bellamy and what he wrote was this: 'I pledge allegiance to the flag of the Unitied States and to the Republic for which it stands-one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.'

"Short of the Lord's Prayer there probably isn't a sentence in the English language that can be quoted verbatim by more Americans than this one-yet it seems that author never did rise above obscurity. He was a soldier in the Spanish-American War and died shortly thereafter of tubercu-He is buried in the Cherryvale, Kansas cemetery, and for some unexplainable reason, there is not even a marker on his grave.

"This information, according to the magazine article, has only this year come to the attention of the American Legion, which is now making arrangements to place an appropriate memorial at his grave."

The United States flag is the third oldest of the national standards of the world; older than the Union Jack of Canada and the tricolor of France.

The flag was first authorized by Congress June 14, 1777. This date


