

PURE SEED LAW TO BE ENFORCED NEXT YEAR BY STATE DEPARTM'T

A campaign against the "cotton seed bootlegger" will be undertaken next year under direcion of the State department of agriculture through regulation set forth in pure bred cotton seed law passed by the last legislature, according to officials of the state agriculture department.

Although the law is now effective it did not become operative early enough this season to permit examination of fields by the pure fred cotton seed board, which was created by the new act. The board will be named in the near future by the president of the Texas A. & M. college and the state commis ioner of agriculture.

Under the seed act the board is charged with the duty of passing upon the quantication of seed breeders and growers and to establish a state register for recording seed examinations. After being passed on by the board a breeder's seed is certified and he receives registered or certified tags for marking his product Before passing upon any seed the board make examinations of rieids, growing plants, gins, am: ther factors connected with cotton production and market-

"It is well known by those faniliar with cotton planting in fexas that there exists general y a fraudient practice of selling in-run and oil mill seed at ex orbitant prices under guarantees of varietal purity," a state ofneial poin ed out. Officials believe that the pure ed cotton seed law will enable reater protection to the grow rs of the state.
