SOME OF THE ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF YOUR PRESENT CITY COM-MISSION COMPOSED OF A. C. CHESHER, MAYOR, L. C. HEWITT AND LON CAMPBELL, COMMISSIONERS DURING THE LAST FIVE YEARS.

WATER DEPARTMENT

75,050 feet of water mains bought and installed in 2 to 16 inch sizes.

55 fire hydrants were bought and installed.

750 new water connections were made.

50 close connections were made between the new water system and the old one.

2 new water wells were drilled and put into production.

1 new booster pump and electrical apparatus incidental thereto including two connections to underground reservoir has been installed.

1 new posting and billing machine bought and put into service.

8 men have obtained water operators licenses and two men have obtained both water and sewer licenses.

SEWER DEPARTMENT

Approximately 800 new connections have been made by the sewer department, eliminating many out-door toilets.

About 25,000 feet of sewer mains have been laid in six to eight inch sizes.

Over 80 manholes have been constructed.

Old Sewer system was cleaned out with about 50 tons of sand, dirt, rocks, and trash being removed—thereby increasing carrying capacity by about 20 percent.

3 pumps have been installed in the lift station in the park, and one pump installed at the disposal plant.

STREETS DEPARTMENT

170 blocks of new paving has been done and 200 blocks of seal coating was applied.

No low places or water holes have shown up in this new paving.

1 used Oliver tractor has been purchased.

Le Roi tractor loader has been purchased.
 6.000-gallon asphalt tank bought.

1 new Austin-Western street sweeper bought and put into pperation.

Cracks in old cement paving have been filled.

New maintainer bought, and this equipment has been put to good use.

Southwestern Public Service Company has installed new mercury vapor street lights, and placed additional street lighting in other parts of town.

Over 1,000 loads of dirt and caliche have been hauled to streets that have been low.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

3 new police cars have been bought and in operation.
Parking meters installed and are helping with the cost of operation of the City. It is interesting to note that Littlefield kept their over-parking charges at 25c, whereas other towns and cities in the area are charging much more.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Wrecked fire truck repaired and back into operation.

A used truck has been converted and made into a fire truck to service rural fires.

Recreational building for firemen has been erected in the City Park.

PARK DEPARTMENT

Three (3) thousand feet of irrigation water lines were bought and the department has been charged for 1,000 feet of sprinkler system.

New lawn mower has been bought and put into operation.

2 rest rooms have been installed.

The park has been brought from a waste area to one of real beauty.

GARBAGE DEPARTMENT

Daily garbage service in the business part of town and weekly garbage service in the residential part of town has been in operation since 1948. Six men were added to this staff and the department is now using the third set of trucks for the garbage squad.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

A part-time sanitarian has been added; fogging machine bought and in use; and this department has conducted periodic clean-up campaigns each year.

WAREHOUSE DEPT.

The warehouse department is now equipped with a tank and pump to issue gasoline to City owned vehicles, and has purchased an army surplus barracks building for warehouse use. Savings have been effected by this department in buying oil by the barrel and dispensing their own gas and fuel oil.

The new construction work listed above could not have been done without the services of an engineering firm or a city engineer. Since Littlefield had a city engineer, this work was done by city employees at a much lower cost than it could have been done if it had been let to contractors and private engineering firms.

TAXES

The tax rate has been increased from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per \$100 assessed valuation, based on approximately 33 per cent of of present day value of the property. This is below the average for cities of comparable size in this area, as published by the League of Texas Municipalities.

Our assessed valuation is low because of the court order under which the city has to operate. In the late 30's the town was on the verge of bankruptcy and the courts established the tax rate necessary to retire the bonds. This amount has been reduced twice and we are now in shape to receive another reduction. But, due to the order, it is necessary to keep the valuation fairly low and have a higher tax rate. A comparison of taxes paid: In Hereford, a piece of property with a present day value of \$50,000—the assessed valuation would be about 75 percent or \$37,500. With their tax rate of \$1.35, the total tax paid would be \$504.25. In Littlefield, the assessed valuation of this same property would be no more than \$16.000 and at our rate of \$2.00, the total taxes paid would be \$320.00, or difference of \$184.25.

Water rates were raised once to take care of \$1.00 per meter for Garbage service and once in 1951 to offset the higher costs of operation.

Of course, some towns that have not grown and expanded still have lower rates than Littlefield, but who wants to live in a town that does not grow?

THE CITY of LITTLEFIELD HAS ACCOMPLISHED ALL OF THIS EXPANSION and ADVANCEMENT WITH ONLY A SLIGHT INCREASE IN BONDED INDEBTEDNESS and the CITY HAS LESS THAN \$7,000 OUTSTANDING WARRANTS OUT AT THIS TIME AND THESE WARRANTS WERE IS-SUED FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AT A LOWER RATE OF INTEREST THAN THE CITY IS PAYING ON ITS BONDS. SOME \$200,000 WORTH OF NEW CONSTRUCTION HAS BEEN DONE OUT OF CURRENT FUNDS IN ADDITION TO PAYING ALL OPERATING and MAINTENANCE EXPENSES DURING THE TIME. THE CITY IS IN BETTER FINANCIAL SHAPE NOW THAN IT HAS BEEN IN MANY YEARS. PROOF OF THIS FACT IS THAT THE CITY DID NOT FIND IT NECES-SARY TO BORROW LOCAL FUNDS DURING THE PAST YEAR and THAT YEAR WAS the FIRST IN WHICH LOCAL FUNDS HAVE NOT BEEN NEEDED FOR MANY YEARS.

The minutes of the City reflect a remarkable achievement. According to the official minutes, there has been only one issue acted upon by this commission in which there was a division of votes between the two commissioners with the Mayor having to cast the tie breaking vote. On all other issues passed by the Commission, the vote has been unanimous. Much of the advancement made by this city during the past five years has been due to planning made previously and to the times. However each member of this commission is entitled to a share in the credit for this outstanding success. The fact that the Mayor has been required to vote only once in over five years indicates the oneness of purpose and the cooperation necessary for these achievements.

Much has been said recently about a supposed rift in this Commission. It has been rumored that one commissioner has been opposed to several projects and issues attempted by the City and that he had been outvoted on them. The minutes of the City fail to reflect that this is the case.

It's all because of a new development in which specially treated inedible animal fats and vegetables olls can be used as plasticizing agents in the manufacture of new plastic products. Hence, the garden vegetables of today may be the garden hose of tomorrow. Or today's farm animals can be tomorrow's farm implements.

Sounds fantastic? It's really very simple, according to Dr. G. E. Hilbert, industrial chemist of Philadelphia. The acid portion of the inedible fat is treated with hydrogen peroxide in such a way that a specially oxidized oil results. This is used as a softening agent in plastic manufacturing.

Some of the final products of this research are plastic floor tile, drapes, tablecloths, table place mats, upholstery material and refrigerator gaskets. In some cases, this new product is superior to a new lease on life. Reincarnation, so to speak.

These great officers or state were the king's rghti hand men in the days as reigned.

In two cases—the constable and the steward-the posts became too important and were abolished by prudent monarchs.

In two mare cases—the earl marshall and the great chemberlainthe posts have been whittled down to a fraction of their former import-

At one time the earl marshall was the lord high stedard's deputy, responsible for intrenal law and order. Today, his duties are purely ceremonial and concerned managing coro mainly with stage nations and royal funerals and with running the royal college of heralds, where armorial bearings and family trees are kept.

The office, first created in the 14th century, has been held for the last 300 years or so by the Dukes of Norfolk.

The office of lord great chamberlain dates back to Norman times. In those days the lord great chamberlain used to be the monarch's financial wizard, responsible for keeping the royal coffers filled.

His duties gradually fell to his deputy, the lord chamberlain-in these days the man who runs the monarch's household. Today, the lord great chamberlain's job consists mainly of looking after the royal palace of Westminster-the official name for the Houses of Parliament-and making the arrange ments when the sovereign formally opens the parliamentary session

every year. In the old days, the lord great chamberlain was responsible for dressing the sovereign on the morning of his coronation, and could claim as his fees the royal bed and night clothes.

This job came to an abrupt halt in the days of Queen Anne, who was reportedly extremely annoyed when the lord great chamberlain of the day arrived in her bedroom on coronation morn and announced his nitention of dressing her.

Nominally, the office is hereditary, but is claimed equally by Lords Lancaster, Cholmondeley and Carrington.

To save undignified squabbles, the three families agreed some years ago to take the job in turn. For this reign, the 70-year-old Lord Cholmondeley is lord great chamberlain.

The lord high chancellor is the only great officer of state still retaining his political powers.

He represents law, justice—is keeper of the king's conscience" and is the monarch's chief legal

advisor. His office is a political appointment carrying a 28,000 dollars a year salary, plus a palatial apartment in the palace of Westminster. He acts as speaker of the house of Lords and presides over the Lords when they sit as the country's highest appeal court.



Dimmitt Hospital Bond Issue Carries

City officials have announced that the \$80,000 hospital bond election held at Dimmitt Saturday appeared to have been passed by a comfortable margin.

All but one of the 14 boxes had been counted late Saturday, with the totals standing at 482 votes for the bond, 360 against. The one outstanding box is believed to

contain no more than 25 votes. Passage of the bond provides for the purchase or erection of a new hospital in Dimmitt. About 50 per cent of the city's eligible voters cast their ballots.

The bond election was on March 4, at which time a petition signed by 10 per cent of the city's qualified voters sented to the city.


