Friday is "Dog Day" in Littlefield, as declared by the City. On that day a mass vaccination program has been planned for all dogs living within the city limits.

Complete plans for the annual Littlefield Chamber of Commerce banquet were released Wednesday morning by Gene Garrison, manager. Tom Anderson, president and publisher of Farm and Ranch magazine, will be the featured speaker for the occasion. The banquet will be held in the Littlefield Sports Arena beginning at 7:30 p.m.

In addition to Anderson's talk, awards will be presented to the "Outstanding Farmer of 1961", the "Outstanding Junior and Senior FFA Students" and to the first place winner in the Stockin' Festival Christmas store front lighting contest.

Anderson is best known in the agricultural journalism field for his column "Straight Talk" which is probably the most quoted, most reprinted column in the farm field. More than 400 newspapers and magazines have requested permission to reproduce "Straight Talk" each month.

Garrison said the program for the evening will be kept simple, allowing Anderson plenty of time for his talk. Copies of the annual report have been sent to all members of the Chamber and will not be presented during the banquet, as usual.

## Osborn Will Not Seek Re-Election

The Littlefield Press received word Wednesday morning that Jesse Osborn will not be a candidate for re-election to the House of Representatives.

In his letter Osborn said "The people of the Ninety-sixth Legislative District have been very kind to me, and I certainly appreciate the honors they have bestowed upon me."

He continued, "I feel, for personal reasons, that I should not ask for re-election." "I will always feel deeply grateful that I have had the privilege of representing the finest people in the State of Texas," the letter concluded.

Osborn was contacted by phone in Austin Wednesday morning. He said that "although I have received many requests from friends and political leaders to seek re-election, I have definitely decided not to run."

## Proclamation

WHEREAS, under the laws of the State of Texas, all citizens desiring to vote in elections held in the year 1962 must qualify by paying the poll tax or obtaining a certificate of exemption from the poll tax by January 31, 1962, and

WHEREAS, it is the patriotic duty of every citizen to participate in the processes of self-government by meeting his obligation to his government and preparing himself to vote; and

WHEREAS, our right to vote is the most basic of our constitutional freedoms, secured in battle by our forefathers and defended in every generation by brave men willing to shed their blood to protect this right, which is the cornerstone of our liberties and is now under attack by a ruthless communistic society which has never permitted free elections; and

WHEREAS, the widest possible participation in elections is a proud sign of civic health and of a citizenry dedication to the defense and the exercise of our American way of life.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, as Mayor of the City of Littlefield, do hereby proclaim the week January 24 to January 31, 1962, as

QUALIFY TO VOTE WEEK IN LITTLEFIELD

and urge that all our citizens who are eligible to vote proceed promptly to pay their poll taxes or obtain their certificates of exemption in order that they may be qualified to vote. A people that does not exercise its rights stands in danger of losing them. I hope, therefore, that every eligible citizen of the City of Littlefield will be a qualified voter and will cast his vote in 1962.

# Philosopher Wonders What Would Happen If Congress Operated Like Bank

Editor's note: The Sandhills philosopher on his Johnson grass farm gets into a complicated financial discussion this week, and leaves it complicated.

Dear editor:

I'm not saying we need more bankers in Congress, but if we had more Congressmen as bankers, things would certainly ease up for me and a few others I could name.

What I'm talking about is an item I read in a newspaper last night about a request the Secretary of the Treasury has made to Congress. He said he

would like for Congress to increase the national debt limit by a couple of billion dollars right away, as the government will need more money to operate on.

Asked why, he said the government's income is uneven, it doesn't flow in steadily, and even if the budget is balanced on a 12-months basis, there are months when expenses far exceed income and the debt limit ought to be raised.

Only a few of us financial experts can understand this matter, but Congress indicated it would go along with the raise,

strictly on a temporary basis. Actually, the debt limit is 285 billion dollars, but Congress each session has raised it a little, temporarily only, till the government can work out of its financial difficulties, which takes a little time, and the limit has now been raised to 298 billion, with 2 more billion expected to be added shortly.

This is why I say I would like to see more Congressmen as bankers. The United States Treasury and my own financial situation are exactly alike. My income doesn't flow in steadily, it has its ups and downs, and

I don't want to go further into debt permanently, just temporarily. But it's hard to find a banker with Congressional ideas. When one of them fixes your debt limit, that's it until you increase your assets enough

to justify the increase. Sometimes it's hard for me and impossible for the government to operate on these terms.

Come to think of it, though, it's probably better like it is, with bankers running banks and

Congressmen running Congress. If you think there is a crisis in Berlin and Africa, think what kind there'd be in Washington if the Secretary of the Treasury had to confront a Congress run like a bank. On the other hand, think of how much fun I could have if I could find a bank run like Congress.

This is the second year that this method of fertilizer application has produced the top yield in the castor bean fertilizer tests conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation, Dr. Thomas C. Longnecker, Director and Chief Soil Scientist, stated in reviewing the report.

The nine fertilizer applications tested were compared with the non-fertilized yield of a surprising 2,447 pounds per acre. The highest yield was 2,796 pounds per acre.

The other fertilizer applications were: 50, 100 and 150 pounds of nitrogen applied preplant only; 50 preplant and 100 sidedressed; 50 preplant and two sidedressed applications of 50 pounds each; 25 preplant and

25 sidedressed; 50 pounds preplant and 50 sidedressed; 50 pounds nitrogen preplant and 75 pounds phosphate preplant with 100 pounds nitrogen sidedressed.

All the above applications were significantly below the nitrogen application of 100 pounds preplant and 50 pounds sidedressed.

In making the report to the Foundation supporters, Debra Langford, Associate Agronomist, gave the following information. "The new Hale variety was used in the test.

The beans were planted May 15, and harvested on December 20. They were irrigated with a preplant application of 4.8 inches in April; August 4 inches; and August 31 2 1/2 inches. The beans were suffered from lack of water

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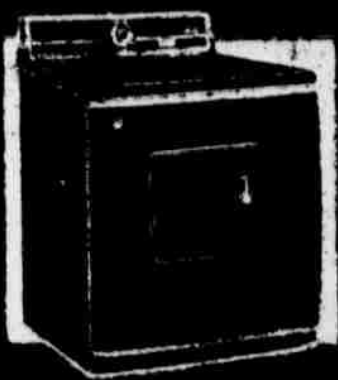

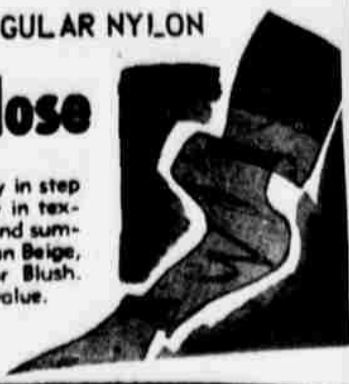
