School board members declined to take any immediate action on the request, however they set up plans for further investigation of the proposal.

The three men appearing before the board were the Rev. Walter Griffin, D. C. Stewart and H. B. McCarty. The Rev. Griffin acted as their spokesman.

He said the lack of a school in the Negro community is "working a hardship" on the people there. He added that he felt the community had "fallen off" since local schools were integrated and the Negro community was left without a school of its own.

"I think the lack of a school is degrading our community," the Rev. Griffin said.

School trustees asked if the Negro people were dissatisfied in any way with the treatment of their children in present schools.

"No," said the Rev. Griffin. "Everything is fine" in that respect. He pointed out that there has been no violence here since schools were integrated.

But he said that he had been watching the community as a minister and noticing how many children are going to school. A number of children not attending school now, would attend if they had a school in their community, the Rev. Griffin added.

In answer to a question, the Rev. Griffin said he believed 50 to 60 per cent of the children not now in school would attend in a building in their own community.

Neither he nor school board members were able to answer a question as to how many children in the Negro community are not attending school at present.

The Rev. Griffin's request was for a "school of our own."

He pointed out that Lubbock had recently opened a new high school for Negroes, and that Sudan has built a school for its Negro community. Neither school system is integrated.

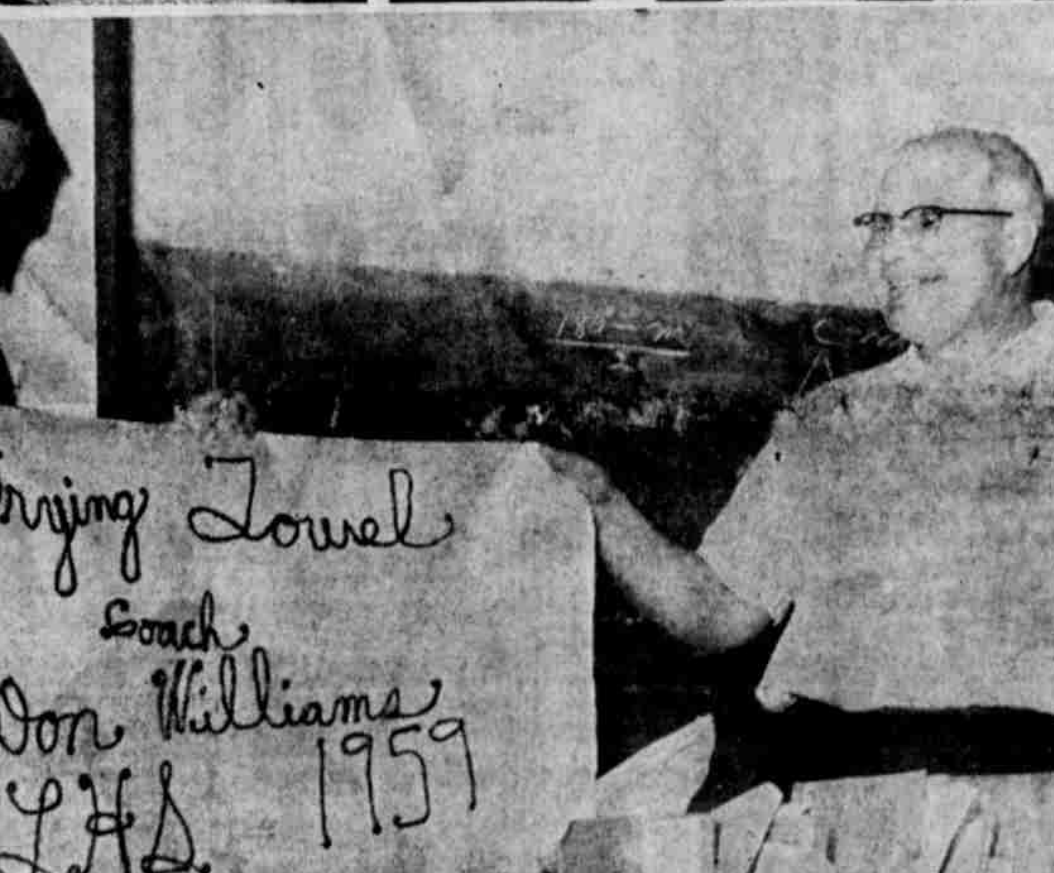
"We would like to get what others are getting - equal facilities," said the Rev. Griffin.

Board members said it would not be feasible financially to provide all 12 grades in a Negro school here, but they said it might be possible, as an example, for a separate school for the first eight grades.

"That would be fine," said the Rev. Griffin.

School board members then pointed out that the change-over for the children from a Negro school to an integrated school in (Continued on Page Five)

Cat Line - Up Gets Changes

The District 1-AAA race enters the stretch Friday night as the Dumas Demons play host to the district-leading Littlefield Wildcats in a "must" game for both teams.

Littlefield has a 2-0 conference record with wins over Phillips and Hereford. Dumas has 2-1 record in district play with wins over Phillips and Hereford and the Demons' only loss was to the pre-season district favorite, Levelland.

Both teams have suffered one loss each in the current season, with Littlefield having the most impressive record since Dumas was tied by Odessa Ector, 14-14.

Dumas, tied for second place with Levelland in the district race, is making plans to clinch a share of the district crown by trouncing the Wildcats. Dumas has not won a district title since 1934 and the Demons are hoping to close out the long drought by defeating Littlefield.

Coach Burl Bartlett, who is in his third year as head coach at Dumas, says his team is a "hard-playing bunch" with lots of "guts."

The northernmost member of District 1-AAA, Dumas, has a multiple offense that is extremely hard to defend against, according to the Wildcats' Coach Don Williams. He commented:

"We are going all out on defense this week in hopes of containing the Dumas attack. Naturally, our boys know that Dumas will be tough since Dumas needs this game to stay in the district race. However, we need this game too, and for the same reason."

Leading scorer for the Demons is Quarterback Quinton Eppinette, who runs like the fullback he was last year. Other outstanding backs for Dumas are fullback Dale Vick and halfbacks Charlie Dean and Ray Casas. Eppinette is a senior, Dean a junior, and Vick and Casas are sophomores.

Dumas has great reserve strength in backs Mike Boxwell and Gale French. The Demons are blessed with a tough line headed by tackles Bill Shaha and David McClellan.

Besides Eppinette, the Dumas line has been the Demons' strong point all season. Dumas linemen held Levelland's top scorer, Danny Tyler, to 13 yards in the Demons' 30-22 loss to the Lobos. The Demons also held Phillips' Tommy Carter to only 25 yards rushing in beating the Hawks, 24-22.

Littlefield senior tackle Ronnie McWilliams and Jerry Marsh had this to say about the game: "We are going up to Dumas with one desire - to win. Sure, Dumas has a good team - but so do we."

The Littlefield coaches are making changes in their lineup in hopes of overcoming the deficit caused by injuries to halfback (Continued on Page Five)

Levelland Tickets Nearly Gone

Littlefield pigskin fans are in for standing room only at the forthcoming Dumas game and the Levelland game.

Superintendent of schools Ralph Schilling reported Tuesday that Levelland fans had already bought every seat on the east side of the stadium and all of section "A" on the west side for the game in Littlefield Nov. 20 and they are still requesting more seats.

Littlefield fans have been slow in buying seats for the Dumas game, he said. Approximately 386 tickets were sent from Dumas originally. Dumas wired back on Tuesday that it was sold out and wanted some tickets back. Dr. Schilling returned 195.

At 11 o'clock Wednesday morning approximately 100 tickets were still available at Brittain Pharmacy for the Dumas game.

Tuesday morning Levelland fans lined up for three blocks to get Levelland - Littlefield tickets.

"It looks like last-minute ticket buyers for either game will be in for standing room only," Dr. Schilling concluded.

County Aid Is Offered On Rural Fire Protection

Financial help for city fire departments on rural fire calls in Lamb County was offered by county commissioners at a regular meeting here Monday.

The county agreed to pay \$25 for each such call by departments in Littlefield, Amherst, Sudan, Olton, Springlake and Earth.

County Judge Pat Boone Jr. said the move was made to encourage local departments to supply rural fire protection in the areas around each town.

The Springlake department has had such an arrangement with the county for several months and the county has paid Springlake for out-of-town calls on a couple of occasions, said the county judge.

The county also authorized payment to Littlefield for seven rural calls in October. The local fire department actually handled nine out-of-town calls, but two were out of the county.

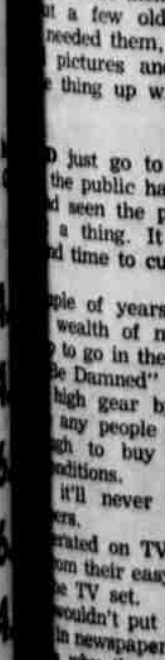

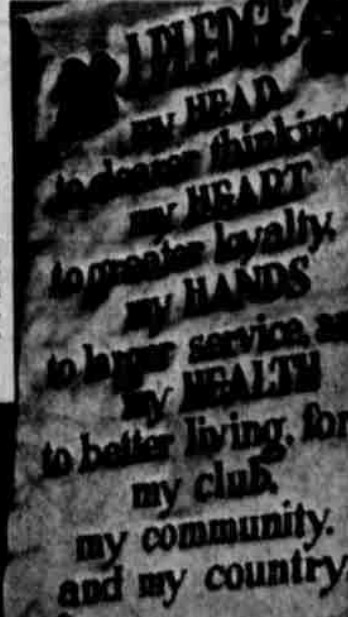

Trustees asked if "all the Negro children" would attend school in the Negro community, or if some of them still would prefer to go to present local schools. The trustees said that is some Negro students in the lower grades wanted to go to present schools, then "we could not tell them 'no' under the Supreme Court ruling." They added that if a school is built for the Negro community, then they felt that all the Negro students should attend it. The Rev. Griffin said he believed that almost all of the children would prefer to attend a school in "their own community." "We will talk with our people," he said, and "iron that out." Earlier, trustees had asked if the three men represented the whole Negro community. Rev. Griffin said they did, then McCarty added: "Well, 99 per cent of them, anyway."

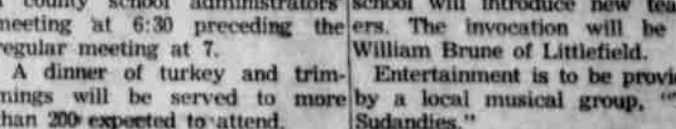

\$636,000 Paid Annually Here On Social Security

As of February, 1959, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits at the rate of \$636,000 a year in Lamb County are being paid nationally in the Lubbock District at the rate of nine million dollars a year, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security District Office.

"In February, social security benefits were being paid nationally at a rate of nearly 10 billion dollars annually." "Payments to a retired worker with no dependents, receiving benefits, averaged \$67.50 a month nationally in February, and to a retired couple - \$119.40 a month," Hutton said. The average for a widow with two young children was \$165. The maximum payment for a family is \$254.

"There were several reasons for the increase in beneficiaries over last year," Hutton said. The growth of the aged population and of the proportion of the aged population eligible for benefits are important factors in the continuing increase in the number of beneficiaries. Other reasons for the increase of beneficiaries are found in the provisions of the 1958 Amendments to the Social Security Act which now make it possible for the wife, dependent husband, and children of a disabled worker beneficiary to receive monthly payments. The amendments also provide for benefits to aged dependent parents of a deceased worker even though other survivors are entitled to payments.

Duck And Deer Seasons Set To Get Under Way

The white-tailed deer season will open in most counties in Texas Nov. 16. The mule deer season will open Dec. 1 west of the Pecos. There will be deer seasons in many other counties in Texas under regulatory control. It is advised that you check with your local game warden on these areas. The basic bag limit is on two bucks. However, doe shooting will be permitted in a number of Texas counties again this year, which will permit hunters to take either bucks or doe.

Shivers, long a conservative standard bearer, recommended development of a program for the general welfare rather than fighting isolated battles for business interests alone. He urged a coordinated Conservative program. 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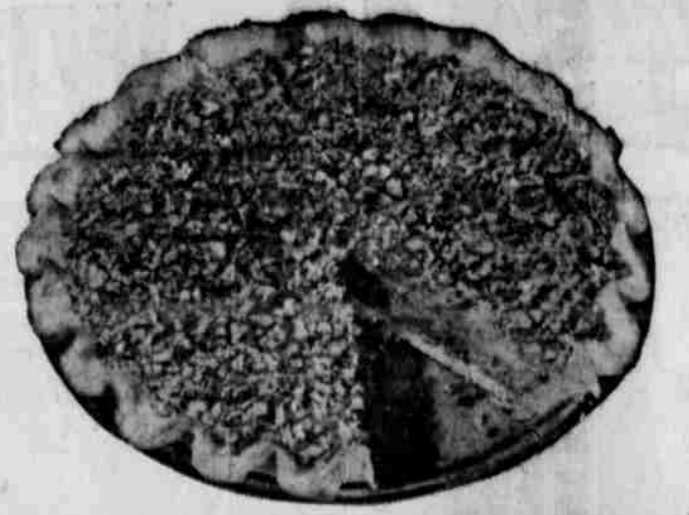

Battle Borders Texas, Oklahoma Once Had 'No Man's Land'

(Editor's Note: This is the fifth in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

Greer County lies at the base of the East side of the Texas Panhandle between the forks of Red River.

For many years people in that county did not know whether they were part of Texas or Oklahoma.

The trouble goes back to the treaty between the United States and Spain fixing Red River as boundary at a time when Texas Panhandle area was unexplored wild Indian territory.

In 1852, Captain R. B. Marcy discovered two forks of the river and attempted to locate on the ground the 100 meridian fixed in the old treaty as the northern boundary of Spanish territory.

Attorney General Will Wilson, currently fighting another boundary battle, that of the tideland suit before the U.S. Supreme Court pin-points the controversy.

The trustee how to distribute the trust property for income. The trustee will then manage and distribute the trust proceeds or the property in whatever manner the grantor desires.
A very common arrangement is to place the property in trust with directions to pay the income from the property to a wife for her life, and on her death the trust is to end and the property is to be distributed to the grantor's children.
An interesting type of trust is that which is sometimes called a spendthrift trust. This is an arrangement whereby one sets up a certain sum of money to be given out to another at a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.
This type of trust is generally used in wills where a person desires to leave money to an individual, but feels that the individual is not capable of properly caring for the money and that if left to them in full that the party receiving the money will spend and waste the money and not receive the maximum benefit from it.
Trust property quite often consists of securities. The law regulates the type of property in which trust funds may be invested. However, the grantor may designate the type of investments the trustee may make.
The effectiveness of a trust is dependent largely on its proper creation. To avoid the pitfalls and dangers of lawsuits and ineffective trust operations, a trust instrument should be properly prepared. A poorly planned or carelessly drawn trust instrument can not only defeat the objectives of its creator, but may prove costly as well.
You lawyer can advise you whether a trust arrangement will be advantageous in your particular situation, and is qualified by education and experience to prepare properly the legal papers necessary to set up a trust. If you have in mind some bank or trust company to act as trustee, that firm's trust officer will be glad to discuss the matter in a conference with you and your attorney.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

A public service from the State Bar of Texas
When property is placed in trust it is turned over to a trustee who will see to it that it is properly managed for the benefit of a person or persons you name as beneficiaries. It is a method of disposing of your property and may be used in conjunction with a will.
Trusts have many advantages. A trust may be used to provide income for persons unable to support themselves or to provide funds for a child's education, as a means of establishing an annuity, or to provide a gift for a charitable institution.
In these days of high taxes, a trust may be utilized to minimize the tax burden. If carefully planned, a trust may decrease income and inheritance taxes.
A trust arrangement works roughly in this manner. A person who desires to create a trust is called a grantor. The grantor chooses a trustee. The trustee may be a bank, an individual, or a trust company. The grantor through a trust instrument tells

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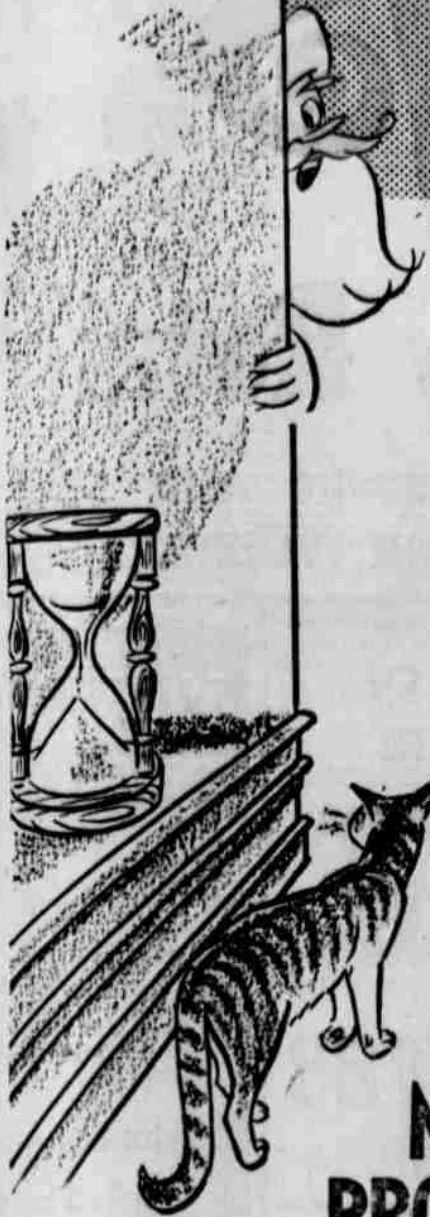
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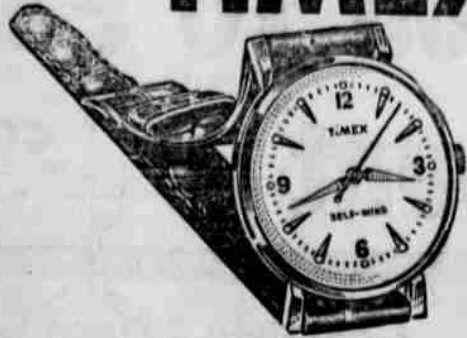
