You Can Help Prepare **Before Tornado Comes**

What will you do when you are warned of an approaching tornado? It may depend on where you are at the

No real protection against tornadoes has been devised except going underground, either in a storm cellar or well-supported

But some protective measures can be basement.

Tornadoes usually travel along the ground at a rate less than 20 m.p.h., although winds within them may be 500 m.p.h. So an automobile can easly outrun

Tornadoes travel in a general southwest them. to northwest direction, although they may change directions often while moving in a generally northeasterly direction. Persons caught in the open should lie

flat in the nearest low place.

Weathermen say the safest place in a building is the southwest corner. This is because debris from a tornado running true to form would be blown away from a person in the southwest corner if the house

Persons in a tornado's path should not try to seal their home or office bulding. The tornado acts like a tremendous vacuum pump and a house can be literally expleded outward by the inside pressure when the tornado reduces the outside pressure. All these are things you can do if you

have ample warning. What will you do after a tornado has struck? Property damage willbe extensive. Com-

munications will be out. There may be many injured persons. Some may die. Your help and co-operation will be needed. Aspects of both "before" and "after" a tornado will be discussed at a county-wide meeting here Friday night.
