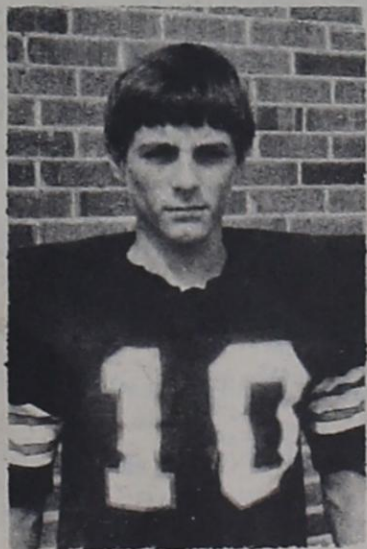

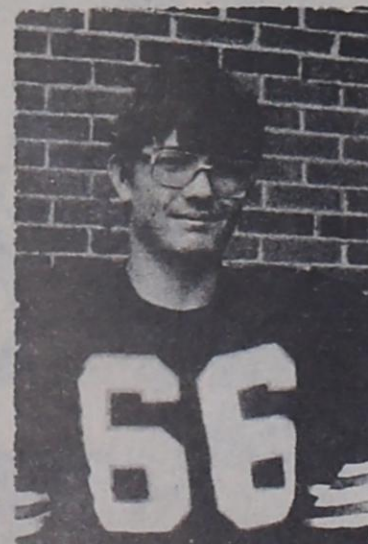

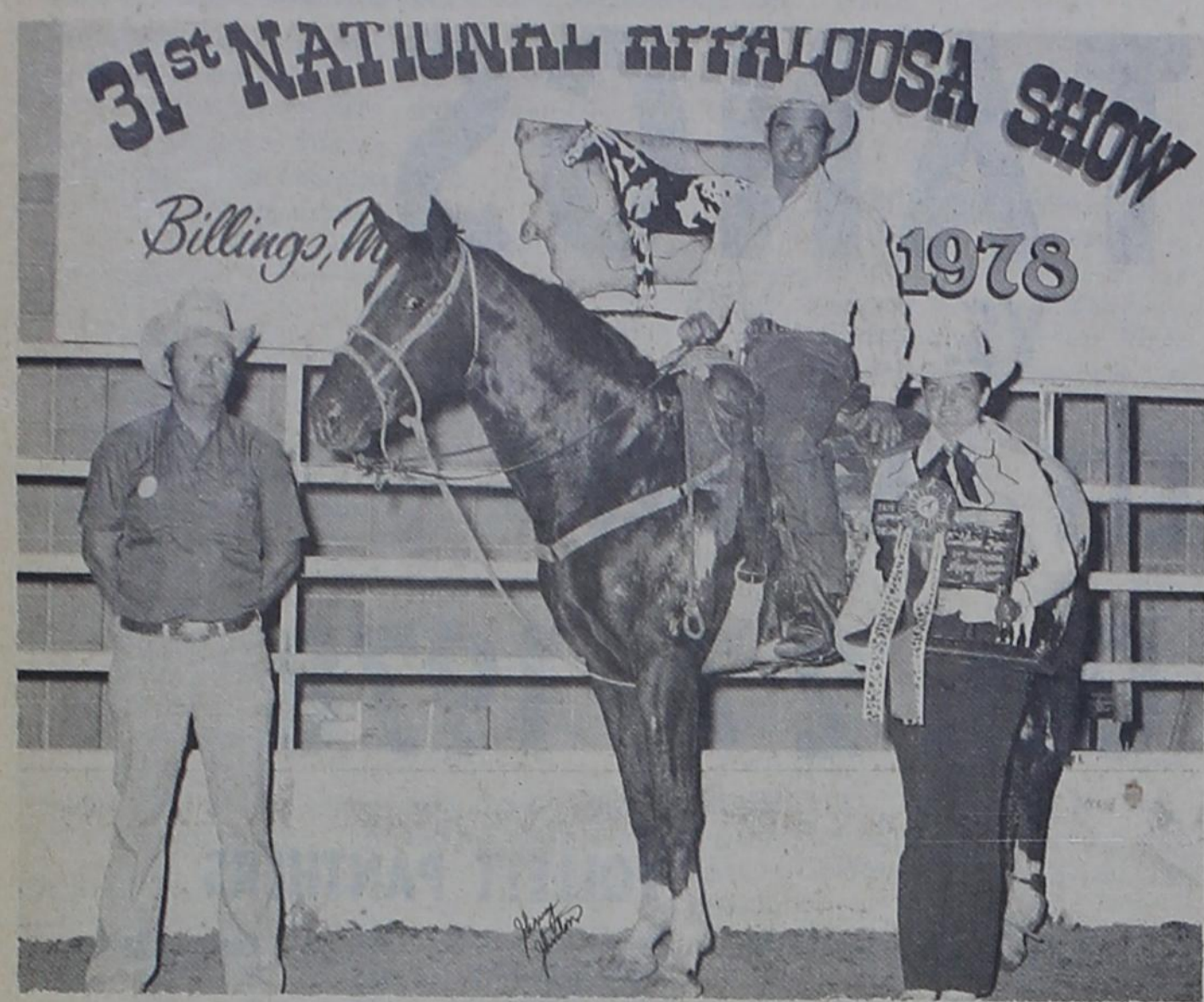

# Co'Che's War Heads To World Finals

It all started last October for Wendell Hinton and his horse, Co'Che's War. The three-year-old Appaloosa stallion was purchased at that time from Raymond Snel of Lefors, Texas.

"I used him in the winter as a roping horse to doctor calves," said Wendell, primarily a buyer and seller of cattle. "As I rode him more, I could tell he had a lot of ability. It was decided to train him for calf roping and heading and heeling competition. Mike Goad of Briscoe, a good trainer and calf roper, agreed to work with him."

Wendell Hinton has been around cattle and horses most of his life. He previously owned and trained horses, even before he and his wife, Kay, were married.

Since February of this year, the big seventeen hand, 1250 pound stallion, has been in either a show or roping competition an average of two times per month. Mike Goad rides and trains Co'Che's War while Wendell pays his expenses. The two men split the prize money.

By July, the Appaloosa stallion was considered by his owner and trainer good enough to enter the competition at the National Appaloosa Show in Billings, Montana. Over 2400 head of horses took part in the show in all events.

"We thought we had a pretty good chance to win the show in calf roping. Mike had tied several calves in other shows in

under ten seconds on Co'Che's War."

During the competition, each roper ropes one calf for time. The top fifteen times advance to the finals. In the finals each roper ropes another calf. His two times are averaged together. The cowboy with the least time wins the coveted championship and bronze medallion. Mike Goad and Co'Che's War had a combined time of 20.19 seconds to claim first place honors.

Wendell said, "They were using fresh Longhorn cross calves to rope. They weighed about 225 pounds and ran like a deer."

The owner and trainer will take Co'Che's War to the Waco

Roping Futurity this weekend. The horse will be entered in calf roping and heading and heeling competition. In November, the group will head for the World Finals which will be staged at the Oklahoma City Fair Ground Coliseum.

To qualify for the World Finals, a horse must win a State Club or Regional Club Championship. Co'Che's War has thus far won two regions in calf roping and one region in heading and heeling.

If successful at Waco this weekend and Oklahoma City in November, Co'Che's War will establish a standard never before accomplished by a three-year-old.

"His chances are excellent in calf roping and better that average in the team heading and heeling competition," stated Wendell.

An accident that rendered the horse virtually blind in one eye restricts his ability to some extent in heading and heeling.

"The accident occurred about two weeks after returning from Nationals," said Wendell. "From all we could figure, he touched his ear on a strand of electric fence wire, jerked his head sideways and caught his eye on some sharp wire below. The fence was high...he was apparently looking over at some other horses when he got into the electric charge."

The eye did not bother him too much however, at least in calf roping. Two weeks later, he won another show in his specialty.

After the World Finals in November, the Hinton plan to send the big stallion to Robert Read in Bovina, Texas for training to see if he is capable of racing. His legs are long and chances are good that he just might be able to run a particular distance race very well.

Wendell recently built a new barn and stable facility on his place west of town. Mike Goad will begin fulltime work in October and all the horses will be brought here, including Co'Che's War. Currently, fifteen mares are bred to him.

Co'Che's War is a fine animal. Hopefully, the Hinton, Mike Goad and the horse will enjoy much success in future years.

Mike will rope in Okla. City in World Finals November 9th and 10th.
