CHRISTIAN CENTER CLEARED OF MISUSING CHURCH FUNDS

Approximately 1 year ago, Pastor Ricky Pfeil was accused of using church funds in endorsement of political candidates. The Articles of Incorporation of Christian Center state that no substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of political propaganda or attempting to influence legislation or involvement in a political campaign. A complaint was filed with the Attorney General and the Internal Revenue Service. The Attorney General's office reportedly told the Amarillo Globe News that pursuance of the matter was not continuing from their office, that considerable documentation of proper use of funds was provided.

On Thursday of last week (November 17), an Internal Revenue Service agent com-

pleted his investigation into the activities of Christian Center and determined that no illegal activity had been engaged in by the church or by Ricky Pfeil. Political advertisements in this newspaper and on radio station KBYP in Shamrock were paid for by Ricky Pfeil personally. Christian Center has never endorsed a political candidate. The non-exempt status of the church will remain intact.

Emergency FHA Loans

U. S. Senator John Tower announced today that the U. S. Department of Agriculture has approved Farmer's Home Administration emergency loans to farmers in 11 drought-stricken areas in West Texas.

"I am pleased the administration has made this determination combined with the hard economic problems that have been plaguing these farmers. This severe drought has proved to be the last straw for many farmers in these 11 counties. It is important that we do everything feasible to assist those who have been hurt by this devastating drought," stated Tower.

Counties included are: Borden, Cochran, Cattle, Garza Texas, Kimble, King, Oldham Runnes, Sterling, and Wheeler.

The Nazareth Swifts put an end to the playoff hopes of the Wheeler Mustangs last Friday night in Memphis with a 20-14 victory that kept the fans on their feet until the final seconds ticked off the clock.

Led by a couple of big defensive plays, the Swifts advanced into the area game this week against Knox City.

The bi-district clash was one of ups and downs by both teams and each team had opportunities that could have really changed the final score.

Having fought back from a 7-0 lead by the Swifts, the Mustangs had scored twice and led by 14-7 and appeared

to be on their way to a touchdown that might have put the game on ice but on second and 2 deep in Swift territory, the Mustangs were thrown back 8 yards and the drive fizzled and the Swifts had blunted the Mustangs momentum.

Nazareth took the opening kickoff and drove 59 yards for the game's opening score in 10 plays and Eric Wilhelm broke off his right tackle for the final 27 yards.

Wheeler scored twice in less than two minutes in the second quarter to take their only lead of the game.

Mr. Hays is a former farmer and has also run a dairy. Presently, he preaches at the Primitive Baptist Church here in Wheeler.

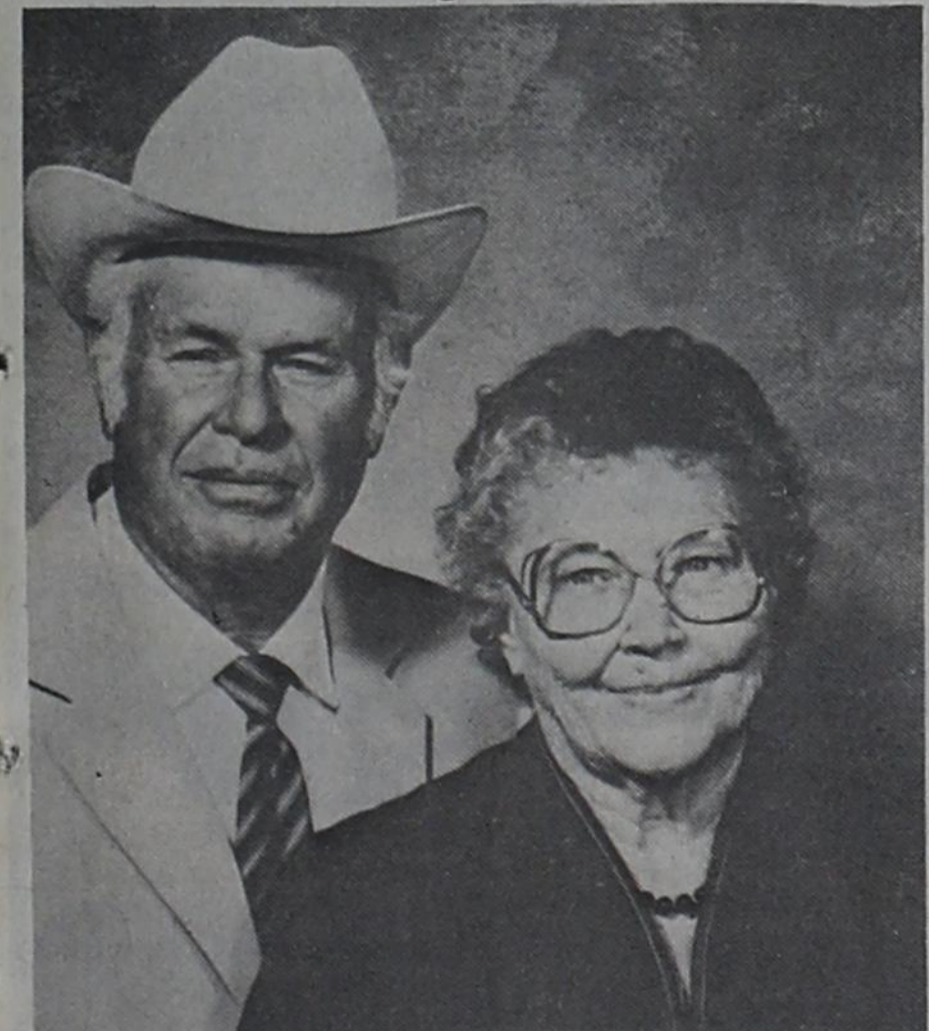
The couple has five children: Jerry of Dumas; Duane of

James and Amy Morris came to see him Thursday bringing a beautiful flowering plant from a group of Mobeetie students. Others called or sent cards. Several parents came to visit and wish him well too. He enjoyed the cards from the family, and the "Michigan" sweatshirt Kathy sent. (She said that was to remind him of all the people up there who love him).

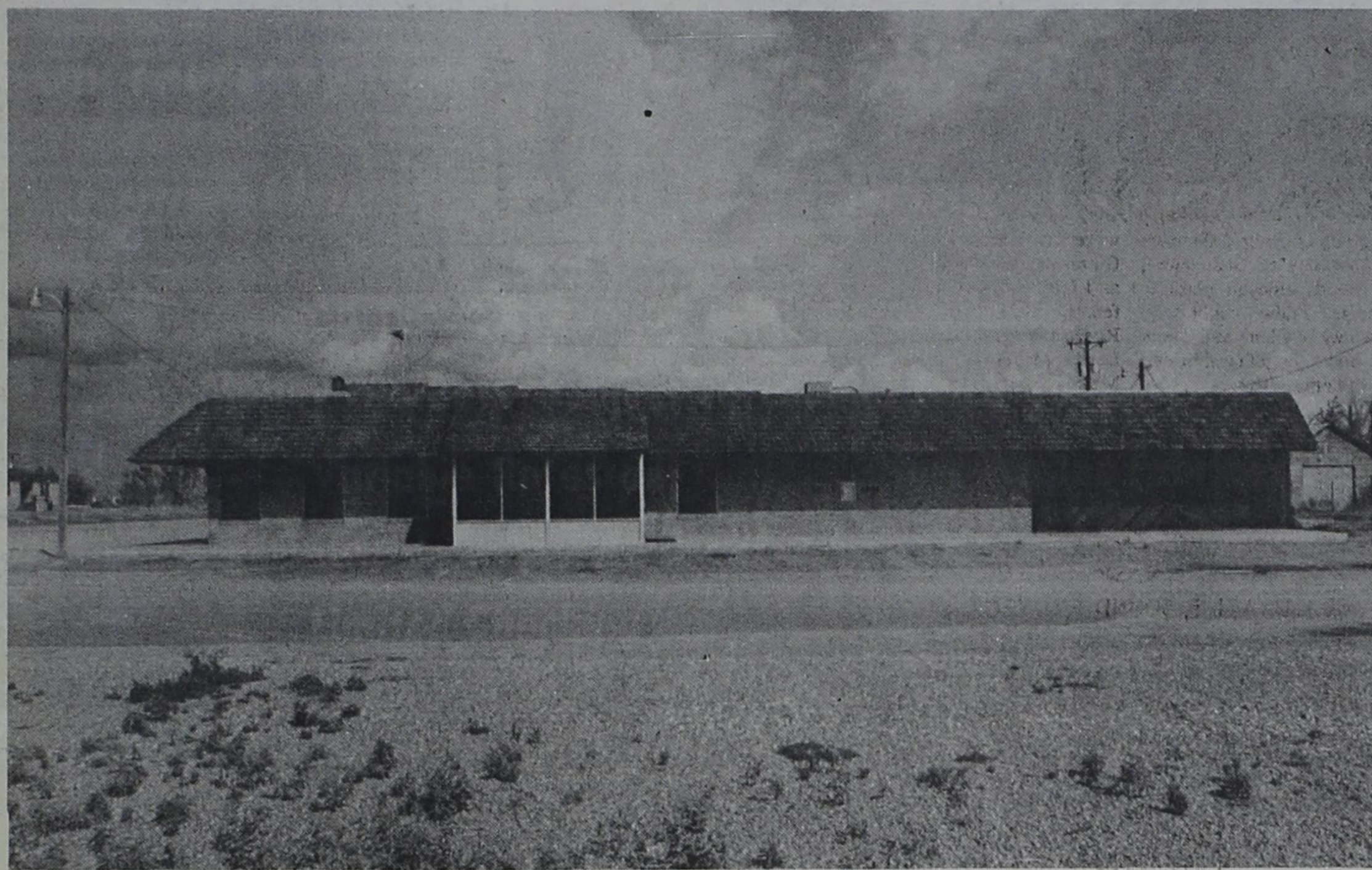
We could hardly stand to leave him there at the hospital. Friday night, the other five of us had gone to see him. We smuggled Andy in, passing him off as a 10-year old. We watched T.V. and joked around, and then it was time to go. We all joined hands, and our six heads bowed as we prayed for Brad. It was especially hard to leave him that night, but Andy made us all laugh as he bumbled along giggling, blowing kisses to his big brother.

All that time spent in the hospital brought back memories of last year at this time. Jon and I had flown from Ohio to Houston, leaving the boys far behind, as we sought the treatment he needed. I had never flown, never been West of St. Louis, never left my children for any length of time. Jon had never been in a hospital, and knew only that some strange glob of cells was threatening his body, and his life. But, we had each other, and we had our Faith. We were absolutely calm during the testing, the surgery, and our 3-week stay at the hospital. Our friends and family had lifted us up in prayer, and the strength it gave us was amazing. The doctors and nurses would say they could just feel it in the room—the presence, the power.

Our Thanksgiving Dinner was served on hospital trays in our room, with comical pom-pom turkey nutcups, and homemade pumpkin pie courtesy of a young surgical technician. He came from a close-knit family of 4 boys, and it touched his heart that we were

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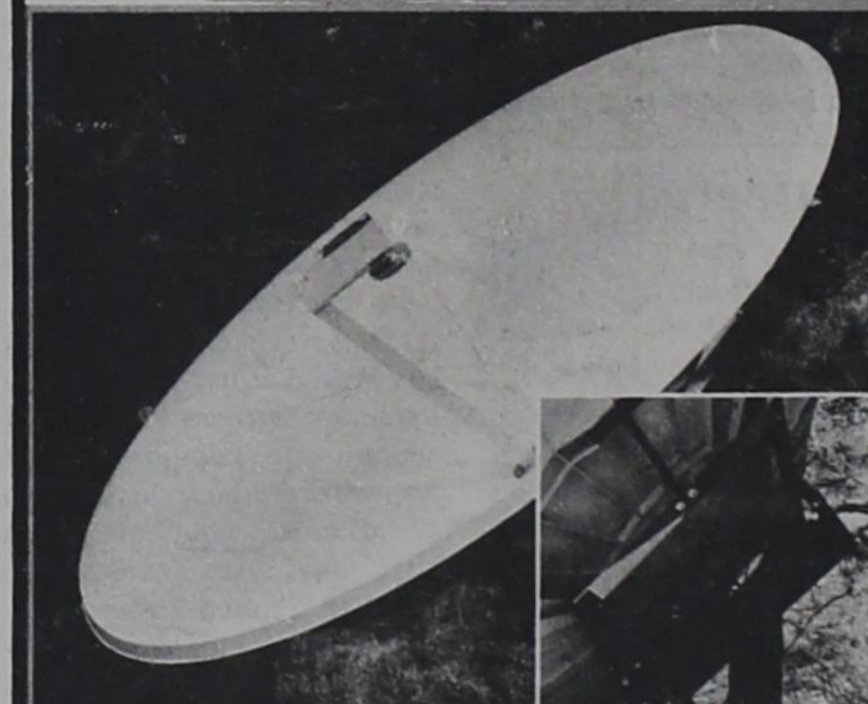
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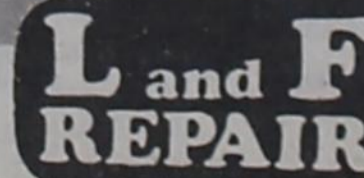

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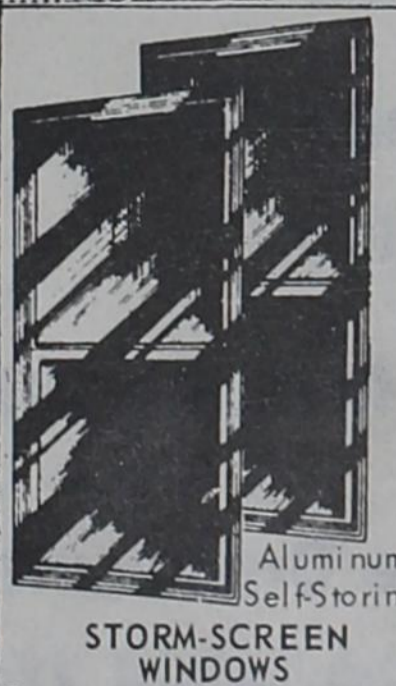

He said that if America wanted to be like Russia, we'd have to rip up 14 of every 15 miles of paved highway, scrap 19 of every 20 automobiles, cut our standard of living by three-fourths, destroy 7 of every 10 houses, have only one bathroom for every seven families, and put 60 million people back on the farm.

The state senator said he was concerned about the decline in American family life as evidenced by an increasing divorce rate, our lack of support for our churches, an increasing crime rate and other problems. But he said we are fortunate to have organizations such as 4-H Clubs, celebrating their 75th anniversary this year, to give youngsters the opportunity to learn by doing and develop leadership skills.

He told of hearing former President Lyndon B. Johnson tell a group of youths visiting Washington to dream dreams and then make those dreams come true. "I realized that was the purpose of America," Sarpaulis said, to provide a place where that can happen.

"When things get tough," he told the youngsters, "stick your chin out and dream a little harder."

Colie never looked at me or saw my head hit the windshield. He jumped out of our pickup, ran to the other car, said, "Are you guys hurt?" The one on the right said, "I am not, are you all hurt?" Colie said, "No, we are okay." There I sat. I lay my hand on my aching head. This front part of my head just below the hairline and above was rising up the size of my entire palm in my hand. My head flew back when I hit the windshield between my shoulders I felt like my neck was about broken also, my backbone. The back of my neck was hurting terribly. Someone every now and then waved and asked if we were hurt. Colie would say that we were all right. Just a very few seconds later, a nurse was standing by my door. She asked if I were okay. I said that my head and neck were hurting.

She flashed a light in my eyes, felt my bumped head, and advised me to go for a check-up. She was on her way to the hospital for work. She said that she was due then, but her duties were to help at a wreck if she came upon one or was called. I don't know who called the ambulance, maybe she did. The cops asked Colie what happened. He said he didn't rightly know. Then 2 or 3 asked me if I knew what happened. I said, "I sure do. I saw it all. We were coming through this yellow light. This other guy was going south, and then decided to go east. We were in their way. They plowed into us. I just sat and watched the driver in the other car. He got out and was holding his mouth. I asked this nurse how bad the other guy was hurt, that he was holding his mouth. She said that he was in bad condition and winked. She held her voice down. I said that I hoped not. Then I looked up and cops were putting handcuffs on him. Another cop jerked the other guy out on the right side, putting handcuffs on him. I asked why they were putting handcuffs on those guys. One reason we are in Perryton, Weldon Parker. The Doctor said he would call Diana to come get us. I asked if he knew Diana, and he said yes. He was Weldon's doctor. All the nurses were busy, so the doctor told some cop standing by the phone to call Weldon to come to the emergency room (Weldon or Diana) Weldon asked if there had been a wreck. He thought someone was pulling a prank on him. He came walking in and there I sat in the wheelchair. I was shocked. He asked what was wrong. I said we had had a wreck. He asked when, where, and how, so I began to blurt it out, cops, nurses, and doctors all listening. We got back to Weldon's room. Here came a cop with Colie who had a hurt knee. I advise you to have it exrayed so in a wheelchair Colie went to the X-ray room. He had his knee exrayed, and the next day it was worse. The doctor put a brace on it and gave him a big bottle of pain pills. This they did not do for me. Anyway I'd say stay out of Perryton, if you don't have collision, hospitalization, and burial. Because they exrayed these drunk guys. One was 51, put them in jail for a night, fine them \$50 and let them out the next morning to go to their jobs. One was a cook at a cafe. Cops said they had trouble with them before. So there will

be more alcohol for them to get more lives and cars in danger. The only way to stop such is to get it off the market. None to buy. These guys are very valuable to the country and cops they buy it, pay that \$50 every now and then, brings in a lot of money to the country. I still had rather be in my shoes than theirs.
