

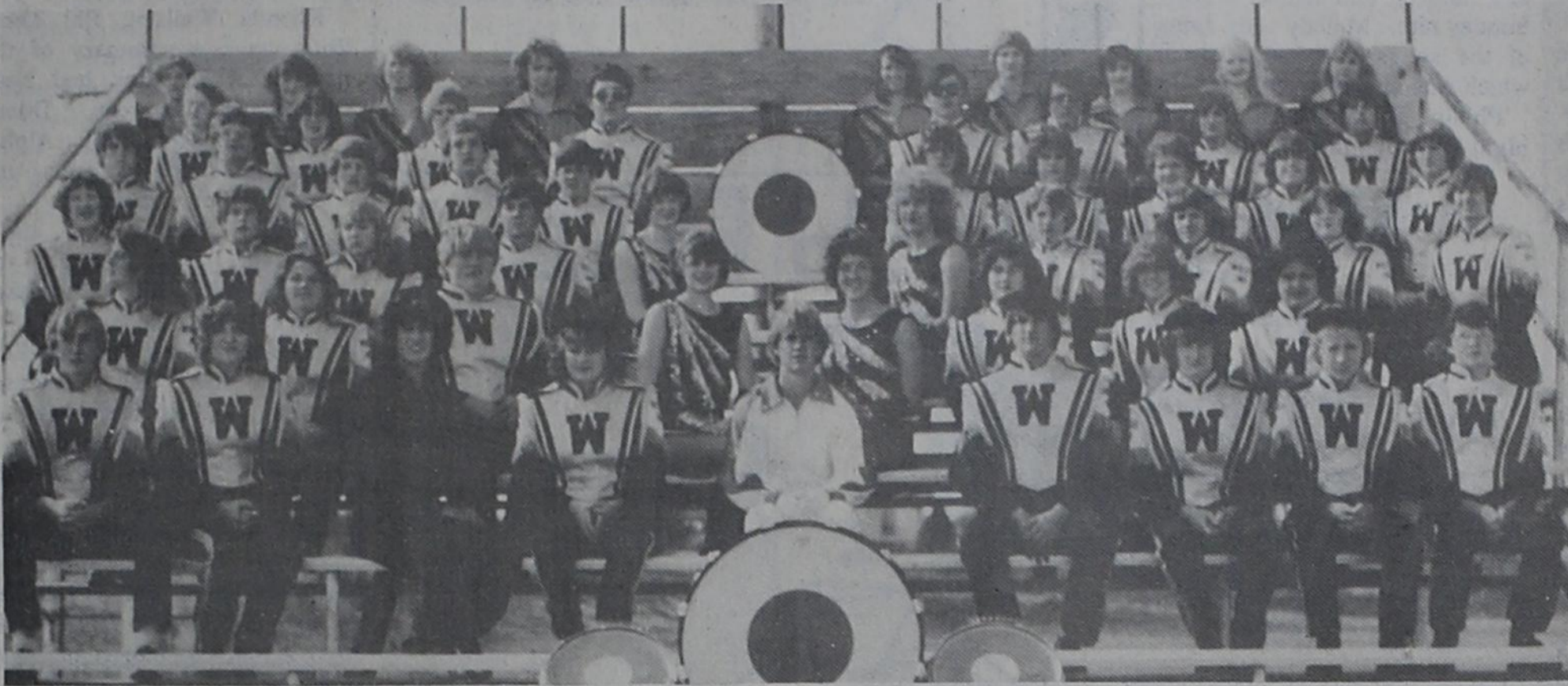

PIONEER IN CO. CONSERVATION

A reception was held on May 1 in the Copper and Coin Room of the First National Bank in Wheeler to honor Clarence Zybach as a pioneer in conservation in Wheeler County and to mark his upcoming anniversary which will complete 32 years of continuous service to the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. The District was chartered on April 6, 1948 with two Supervisors appointed by the state board. An election was held on May 29, 1948 to fill the other three positions. Zybach was elected at that time and has served continuously since that date. Zybach has the distinction of holding an elected office for the longest consecutive period of time for any current office-holder in Wheeler county. Lavon Williams, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service was Master of Ceremonies for the program and pointed out the many hours of unselfish devotion which Zybach has given to support conservation. A plaque commemorating this long service was presented from the other

Hope is the first legacy member that Wheeler has ever had. Her mother, Peggy, is a member of the Alpha Mu Alpha Chapter in Wheeler.

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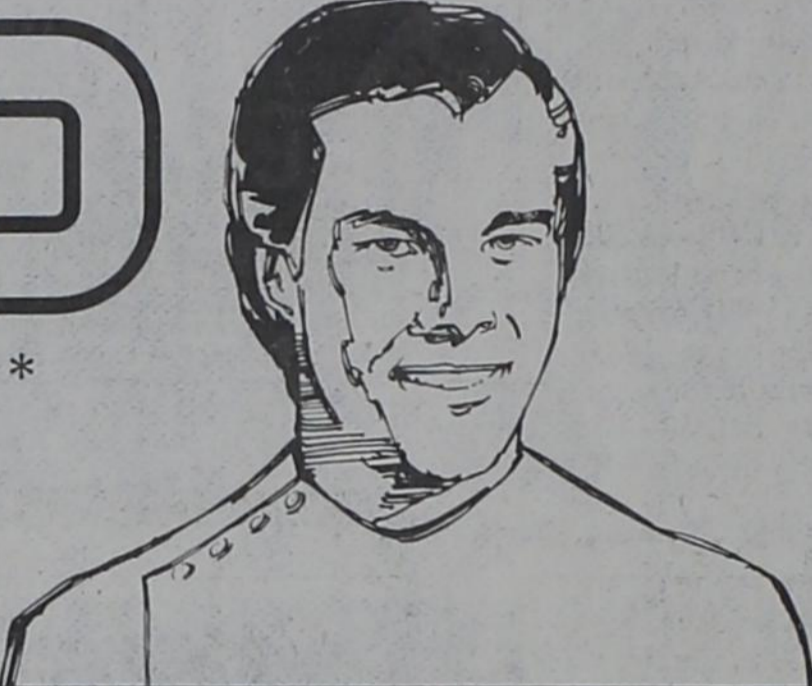

Flours—Try Something Different
See different flours, but don't know for sure if they'll work in your home-baked breads?

Read this, and then try something different!
Understanding flours is easy with just a few basic facts about each in mind:

What You Must Know
ALL-PURPOSE WHEAT FLOUR—is uniquely suited to bread-making because it contains enough gluten to form the delicate elastic framework of the finished product.
It's a mixture of hard and soft wheat flours usually.

However, it can be milled entirely from soft wheat—and, if so, it would not be suitable for bread making.

GENERAL GUIDELINES ABOUT FLOUR—Most of the flours and bakery products are enriched with thiamin, niacin, riboflavin and iron—to restore nutrients lost when the brans and germ were removed from the kernel during milling.

Whole-wheat flour is the exception here—enrichment of it isn't needed because whole-grain flours contain all nutrients naturally present in the grain.

Whole-grain flours and cereal grains provide fiber in the diet, so they're good for you.

Eating foods high in fiber tends to reduce symptoms of chronic constipation, diverticulosis and some types of "irritable bowel."

IMPORTANT NOTE—Also, remember you can use some flours along for bread-making, and you can use other only if you combine them with all-purpose flour. How to do this appears below in the section on "Combining Flours."

What Is Fun To Know
SELF-RISING FLOUR—is all-purpose flour with added leavening and salt. It is NOT suitable for yeast breads, but it is convenient for quick breads.

UNBLEACHED FLOUR—is all-purpose flour which has its natural whiteness. It's fine for bread-making, and its nutritional value and gluten content are similar to all-purpose flour.

In unbleached flour, simply, no bleaching agent was used to increase the degree of whiteness, and the difference between it and all-purpose flour in terms of whiteness is only slight.

CAKE FLOUR—is milled from soft wheat into a very fine and uniform flour especially suited to the tender, delicate character of caker.

Cake flour is NOT suited to bread-making due to the high percentage soft wheat used in it, and it is lower in protein than all purpose flour.

WHOLE-WHEAT FLOUR—is ground from the entire whee-

kernel and includes all the natural nutrients, as we mentioned above. You can use it along or in combination with all-purpose flour for bread-making. Alone, it will produce a firmer loaf.

GRAHAM FLOUR—is coarsely ground whole-wheat flour. It works alone or in combination with all-purpose flour. Alone, it will make a firmer loaf.

the endosperm, inner part of the rye kernel. Do not use it alone for bread-making.

PUMPERNICKEL RYE GRAHAM FLOUR—is a coarse-texture flour ground from the entire rye kernel. Do not use it alone for bread-making.

MASA FLOUR (tortilla flour)—is made from corn treated with lime water. Then it's ground and dehydrated. Do not use it for making yeast breads.

Combining Flours
It's exciting to combine different flours for different bread creations, but you must know how.

Here are some brief guidelines:
Whole-wheat and graham flours can be used interchangeable in recipes—substituting up to 60 percent of these flours in the place of all-purpose flour in the recipe. Or you can use them alone, as we said above.

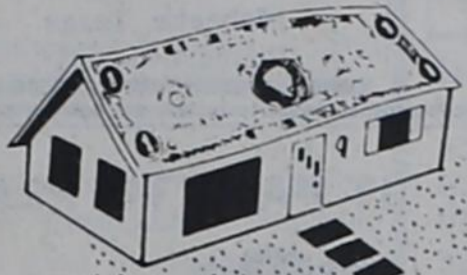
On the other hand, you must use some all-purpose flour in recipes that also call for other flours, cereal grains or meals—such as soy, rolled oats, cornmeal. To know exactly how these combinations work, use recipes that call SPECIFICALLY for the ingredients you want to use.

Now—try something different!

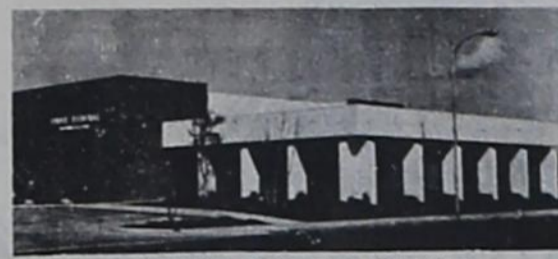

This column is directed to the grade school children. We have received the Texas Bluebonnet Award list and have 15 of the 20 books listed on our shelves. The others have been ordered but have not yet arrived.

Allow me to explain exactly what the Texas Bluebonnet Award list is all about. The Texas Bluebonnet Award, established in the spring of 1979, recognizes the reading preferences of children and also honors writers of creative and enjoyable books. Sponsored by the Texas Library Association's Children's Round Table and Texas Association of School Librarians, the award encourages Texas children to read more books, explore a variety of books, develop powers of discrimination, and to identify the author of their choice. The recipient of the award each year is determined by vote of the eligible children for their favorite book. A master list of 15 to 20 titles prepared annually by the Texas Bluebonnet Award Committee serves as the basis for the children's reading selections. The winning author is honored at the Texas Library Association's spring conference. At the time representative Texas children present a moment to the writer of the book which received the most votes.

Who can Vote
Any Texas student in grades 3 through 6 who has read or heard read aloud a minimum of 5 books from the Master List is eligible to vote. Children need to be encouraged to read as many of the titles on their reading level as possible. Teachers and parents are urged to read a least enough of a book to get the children interested. The Wheeler Public Library will supply the books and try to promote the award program. Lists and rules will be displayed in the Library for your own information.

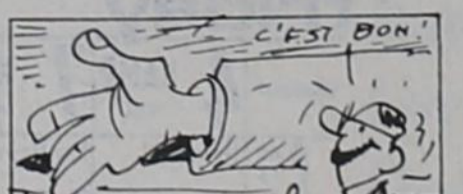

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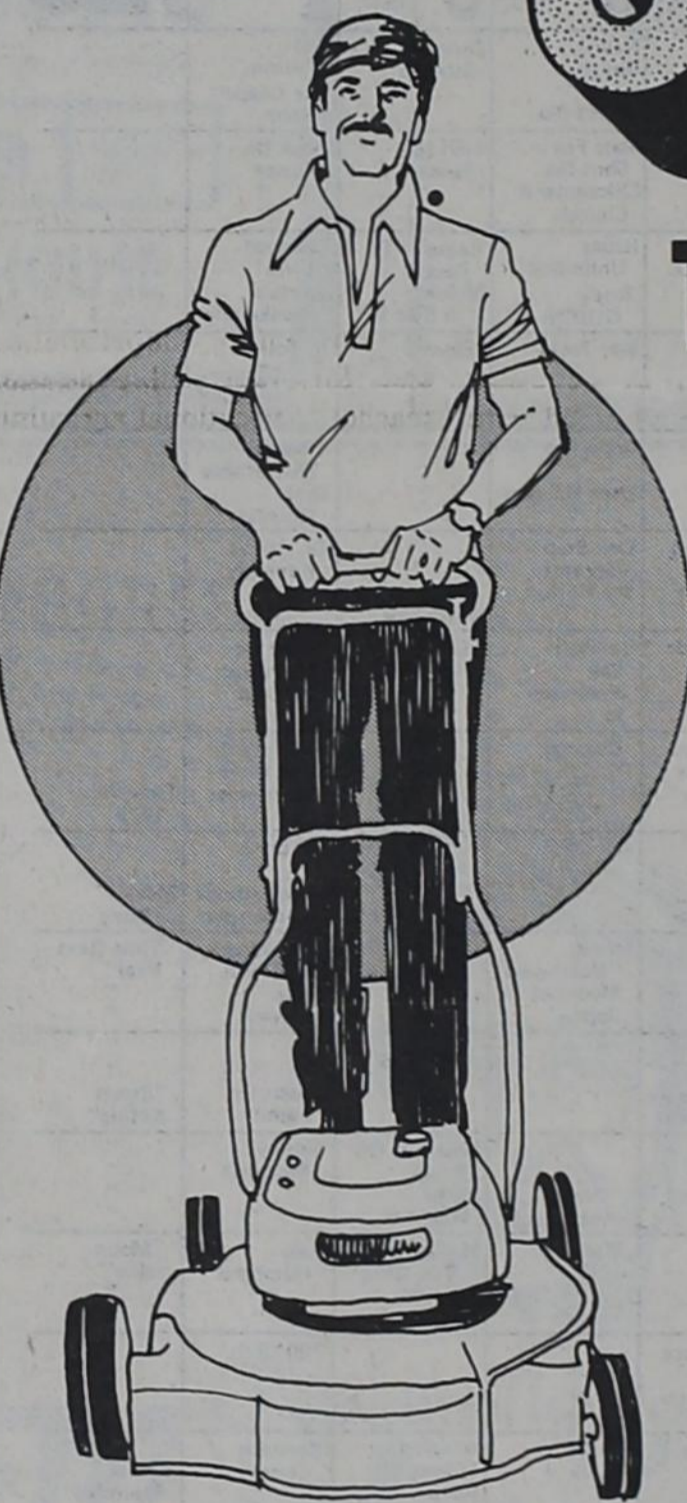

Around and around the house the coyote went with the dogs only a few yards behind; the moon was shining real bright, and I still remember their tongues honking out. Our old collie dog, Ring, was under the corner of the house and would run out ever time the coyote came by and snap at it, then run back before the hounds got there. After awhile we heard the baying dogs heading for the barn, and we never heard such a commotion of sounds in our lives; cows were bellowing, calves bawling, mules snorting, and pigs squealing, all mixed with the baying of the hounds and our own collie dog barking his head off under the house. But the squealing of those hogs, sounded as if they were screaming for help. Daddy only listened a second and began lighting the kerosene lantern.

"That thing is in the pig pen," he stated, as he grabbed his shotgun. He always kept it loaded with buck shot. Mama opened the kitchen door for him. Holding the lantern high in his left hand and the shotgun in his right, he headed for the barnyard. He was gone only a few minutes when we heard the loud boom of the shotgun, then it was strangely silent, Mom hurried to the barnyard to be sure daddy was alright. They soon returned and Daddy told us he had shot the coyote in the pig pen, but we would have to wait till morning to see it. He said that when he arrived at the pen the hounds were ringed around it and the cornered beast was snapping at ever pig that got near. When it saw him with the light, it made a wild lunge toward him and hit the fence before he shot it. Early the next morning we children went to see it. Daddy had moved it out of the pen the night before. The dew was sparkling on its soft fur and I thought it was very pretty.

The years went by and my only contact with the coyotes were catching a glimpse of them as they sneaked around the barnyard trying to catch a chicken and always that heartbreaking cry at night.

We had to go several miles through a large pasture, Tip was busy chasing rabbits; about sundown we saw Tip running faster than he ever ran after a rabbit back to the wagon with two coyotes close at his heels. The dog reached the wagon and the coyotes stayed out in the sage-brush about fifty feet from us, always staying even with us. We began to watch and saw other coyotes on the other side of the wagon. Tip trotted along close to the horses. I worried about our dog because it would be night when we returned home, but my young husband reassured me, saying Tip would take care of himself, for me to just watch. So watch I did when we hit the road through the pasture. Tip was always under the wagon and ever now and then we would hear a low growl deep in his throat. Straining our eyes in the darkness we could see the coyotes only a few feet from the wagon, trotting along by our side.

I could well understand what my young son meant, when he said, "You know it's kind of hard to shoot one looking at its eyes like that." But we know how many calves and chickens they kill for us and our neighbors. So our sympathy can not rule.

Winter is here and the hills are all covered with snow and as I stepped to the back door early this morning, looking across the draw on the side of the hill I saw two coyotes trotting along. One leaned over and got a bite of snow without breaking stride. They had gone only a few feet farther when a jackrabbit jumped from behind a bush and started to run. One coyote started after it, while the other one stayed where it was. I wondered if it was hurt or sick, but I didn't wonder long, as I soon saw that the rabbit was running in a wide circle and was going to come back by the coyote, as it waited to catch the rabbit as it came close by. It was almost like watching a movie. The white snowy hillside was a perfect screen.

Night has fallen and again I listen to the mournful call of the coyotes on the surrounding hills.

Welding Class Set

An Oxy-Acetylene Welding Short Course for adult farmers will be held May 12-15th under the sponsorship of the Wheeler High School Vocational Agriculture Dept., according to Mr. Bynum Smith, Superintendent and Mr. Terry McCasland, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Charles Yeates, Welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should call or write the superintendent of schools, Mr. Bynum Smith, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Terry McCasland. An entry fee of \$15 will be charged. Oxy-Acetylene Welding short course certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Yeates stated that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in handling and using oxygen and acetylene, proper flame types, cutting and welding mild steel, brazing and welding cast iron, hardfacing, and welding aluminum.

Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University. This cooperative program is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of the public schools.

Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people.

Specialists are now available in the fields of Beef Production, Farm Wiring and Safety, Swine Production, Tractor Maintenance Farm Arc Welding, Oxy-Acetylene Welding, Pasture Improvement, and Horticulture.

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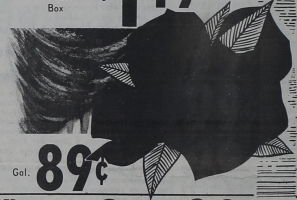

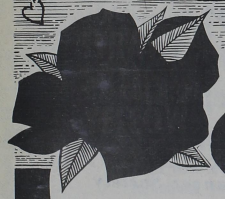
