



> Whole-wheat flour is the exception here-enrichment of it isn't needed because whole-grain flours contain all nutrients naturally present in the grain.

Whole-grain flours and cereal grains provide fiber in the diet, so they're good for you.

Eating foods high in fiber tends to reduce symptoms of choronic constipation, diverticulosis and some types of "irritable

What Is Fun To Know SELF-RISING FLOUR-is allpurpose flour with added leavening and salt. It is NOT suitable for yeast breads, but it is convenient for quick breads.

UNBLEACHED FLOUR—is all-purpose flour which has its natural whiteness. It's fine for bread-making, and its nutritional value and gluten content are

similar to all-purpose flour. In unbleached flour, simply, no bleaching agent was used to increase the degree of whiteness, and the difference between it and all-purpose flour in terms of

whiteness in only slight. CAKE FLOUR—is milled from soft wheat into a very fine and uniform flour especially sutied to the tender, delicate character of

Cake flour is NOT suited to bread-making due to the high percentage soft wheat used in it, and it is lower in protein than all purpose flour.

Grass Seeding In Wheeler County

May is a busy time of the year for most farmers and ranchers in Wheeler County. Many are considering planting grass to be used for grazing purposes or as hayland. These grass plantings may range from a native grass mixture to an improved grass such as weeping lovegrass.

The seeding of grass is a conservation practice that can be applied to many acres of land in Wheeler County. This seeding may be done on old fields or on rangeland that has deteriorated to grasses with poor grazing value and shinnery. Most areas of this type are being seeded to a strain of lovegrass such as weeping, morpha, or ermelo.





BIBLE STUDY

It is a failure to make an intelligent study of the Bible that causes many to think that instrumental music is right in Christian worship just because David used it. Thus, you can see that it is not enough that we make an honest study of the Bible, but our study must be an intelligent one. We must rightly divide the Bible if we study it intelligently.

I believe the sadest and lonliest sound I ever heard is the howl of the coyote. The crying of a child lost in the darkness, the whimpering of a hurt puppy, or just take all the sad and lonely sounds you've ever heard, mix them all together and maybe you have the coyote's howl. I don't think there is anything that can imitate it. I've heard dogs try. I've heard coyotes all my life, yet I still feel a tug at my heart strings when I hear their haunting cry in the dark of the night.

The first recollection I have of a coyote is when I was a very very small girl. I never forgot it, neither did any other member of the family. I was awakened in the middle of the night by the sound of baying hounds, for a moment I was terrified, then I heard Mama and Daddy talking: in the next room.

"What is it?" I asked. "It's hounds after a coyote!"

Mom answered. "Run to the window and watch; they're going around the house." "But don't open that door."

Dad called quickly, knowing the fear crazed coyote would dart in to any hole it saw to excape the hounds, baying at its heels. We kids quickly crowed around the window. Around and around the house the covote went with the dogs only a few yards behind; the moon was shining real bright, and I still remember their tongues honging out. Our old collie dog, Ring, was under the corner of the house and would run out ever time the coyote came by and snap at it, then run back before the hounds got there. After awhile we heard the baying dogs heading for the barn, and we never heard such a commotion of sounds in our lives; cows were bellowing, calves bawling, mules snorting, and pigs squealing, all mixed with the baying of the hounds and our own collie dog barking his head off under the house. But the squealing of those hogs, sounded as if they were screaming for help. Daddy only listened a second and began lighting the kerosene lantern.

he stated, as he grabbed his shotgun. He always kept it loaded with buck shot. Mama opened the kitchen door for him. Holding the lantern high in his left hand and the shotgun in his right, he headed for the barnyard. He was gone only a few minutes when we heard the loud boom of the shotgun, then it was strangly silent, Mom hurried to the barnyard to be sure daddy was alright. They soon returned and Daddy told us he had shot the coyote in the pig pen, but we would have to wait till morning to see it. He said that when he arrived at the pen the hounds were ringed around it and the cornored beast was snapping at ever pig that got near. When it saw him with the light, it made a wild lunge toward him and hit the fence before he shot it. Early the next morning we children went to see it. Daddy had moved it out of the pen the night before. The dew was sparkling on its soft fur and I thought it was very pretty.

"That thing is in the pig pen."

The years went by and my only contact with the coyotes were catching a glimpse of them as they sneaked around the barnyard trying to catch a chicken and always that heartbreaking cry at
