Any child who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, of this year is eligible to attend Kindergarten. Any child who will be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1 of this year may attend Pre Kindergarten at Wheeler ISD.


The State of Texas requires these things for a child to be registered in public school:

1. Copy of Child's official state birth certificate.
2. Copy of Child's immunization record.

Wheeler ISD requires a copy of the child's social security card for record keeping purposes.

Registration packets for children who will be attending the Wheeler ISD Pre K or Kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

J. V. Calcote, 81, of Childress died Thursday, July 29, 2004 at Childress Regional Medical Center following an extended illness.

Funeral services were conducted at Johnson Funeral Home Chapel in Childress on Monday, August 2, 2004 at 10 A.M. by Rev. Norman Rushing, followed by burial and military rites in Amarillo at Llano Cemetery at 3:00 P.M. by Johnson Funeral Home of Childress.

Born in Wellington, Collingsworth County, Texas, August 13, 1922. Mr. Calcote was the oldest of eight children born to James Barksdale and Goldie Vee (Trimble) Calcote. His grandparents were William Sigger and Ora Belle (Mayo) Calcote and Plesie and Ada (Riggins) Trimble, all pioneer settlers of this area.

As a young child, he moved with his parents to Wheeler County, Texas in a covered wagon, where land was purchased and broke out. This land is still family owned.



Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

The following table compares taxes on an average home in this taxing unit last year to taxes proposed on the average home this year. Again, your individual taxes may be higher or lower, depending on the taxable value of your property.

Under this proposal, taxes on the average homestead would increase by \$27.48 or 24.26 percent compared with last year's taxes. Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would decrease by \$0.11120 per \$100 of taxable value or 20.62 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

Some of it is expected but somewhat impulsive based upon what is going on at that time: visiting hospitals or nursing homes, calling on someone in a time of tragedy, studying with a potential Christian.

In my nearly 20 years of work in the ministry, I have also done a number of funeral services. I don't have an accurate count, but I have done in the neighbor-

hood of about 150 funeral services. That may sound like a very high number to anyone except for Jim Wright or any other funeral director. Sometimes the funerals are done for people whom I knew very well and other times for someone whom I had never met. Admittedly, they are a bit easier when the funeral is performed for someone that I had a relationship with. Here is my little secret, though (and if you misunderstand this it might sound bad): I actually enjoy doing funeral services. That doesn't mean I am glad that the person has died. Rather, I recognize that deaths will happen and I also know that I will take seriously the funeral service. I always try to give my very best to the things said and the actions taken. I always try to make these moments appropriate and respectful to the deceased and the family. Working for this congregation and this community, I owe you my best, and I pray that I deliver my best when those moments arise.



7. Presentation by Beck Mercer—Miami Volunteer Emergency Service

Ms. Mercer discussed the difficulties that the MVEMS is having in keeping their service up and running. The volunteers own the service. They also own two trucks and the building that the EMS uses. There was discussion regarding the pros and cons of owning the ambulance service. Chairman Tipps thanked Ms. Mercer for her presentation and no action was taken at this time.

8. Policies and Procedures for Approval

The policies will be presented under Agenda Item #9.

9. Contract for Employee Drug

Testing

Ms. Fagan Cook reported that our liability insurance carrier had made a recommendation regarding two items. The first is that our employee handbook states that we will do drug testing on each employee at the time of hire and then randomly thereafter or for probable cause. This is not being done and the insurance carrier states that this should be done in today's work environment. There was also a concern that since we have the ambulance service and we have a number of employees who drive their own cars in their scope of work for the District, we should be doing a check of employees' driving records upon hire and annually thereafter. There

should also be an annual continuing education offering on safe driving for these employees. After much discussion Thomas Helton made the motion that we abide by the policy and have drug tests done as required and that the policies and procedures for this be approved. Jim Batton seconded the motion and the motion carried. Fagan-Cook will obtain a contract for Panhandle Employers Service to do the testing.

10. Administrator's Report:

A. Sealed bids for the wooden shelves were opened and Dave Britt made a motion to reject all bids. Sue Chandler seconded the motion and the motion passed. Discussion was held regarding the process of selling the shelves. Dave Britt made the motion to place an ad in the newspaper requesting sealed bids for the shelves with a minimum bid of \$100 each. Jim Batton seconded the motion and the motion passed.

B. Physical Therapy and Purchasing departments are in their new locations.

C. Preliminary work is being done on the budget for the coming year. We will need to designate funds specifically for Trauma. Ms. Fagan-Cook reported that we had received a settlement check for the June, 2002-September 2002, Medicaid cost report. The amount was \$10,035.00. She also stated that Ms. Stiles had received a grant for an additional \$29,000 for the 2nd year of the bioterrorism monies. This will be kept in a separate category because we have to account to the State for the expenditures.

11. Assisted Living Mission Statement

Ms. Fagan Cook presented the criteria for admission to our facility. Our original mission statement indicated that only those residents who meet the requirements would be allowed to live in the facility and that when their clinical situation no longer allowed them to meet criteria, the resident would be asked to move out. In the past we have had four residents who have been asked to move. Gale Ledbetter asked the Board if there was any way that this could be changed. After discussion with Sharon Brownlee, Manager, and Sue Stiles, RN, Nurse Consultant and much discussion among the board members, Jim Batton made the motion that we not change our mission statement and that we continue to abide by the criteria for admission and retention of residents. Thomas Helton seconded the motion. There were two members who voted yes, one member who voted no, and one member abstained. Motion carried.

12. Employee Handbook Revisions

The employee committee made the following recommendations for change:

Page 8, #7 Pay increases. Remove tenure salary increases. Add a 2% cost of living increase each year. Department managers are allowed to give merit raises with Administrative Approval after 90 days trial employment period and annually after performance evaluation.

Page 10 #1 Bereavement Leave. Regular full-time and part-time employees are eligible to take up to 5 days off with pay in the event of a death in the employee's immediate family. Immediate family is defined as: spouse, child, father and mother. Regular full-time and part-time employees are eligible to take up to 3 days off with pay in the event of a death in the employee's other family. Other family is defined as: sister, brother, grandparents, grandchildren, aunts, uncles or any individuals who have acquired these family relationships through marriage.

Page 10 #E Appearance and Dress. Leave as is but add "no one shall be permitted to wear rubber flip-flops".

Page 25 #1 Add If an employee uses three or more scheduled consecutive days of sick leave, the supervisor shall have the right to require a physician's statement or some other acceptable documentation of injury or illness.

Page 26 #2. Take this item out and add: Effective August 1, 2004 employees may use 5 of their sick days for family illness per calendar year.

Page 26 #3 Sick Leave: Change to "an employee may accrue up to 65 working days per calendar year for sick leave. Employees that have earned over 65 days will be allowed to keep those days, but may not accrue more sick time until their accrual drops below 65 days. Employees will be allowed to share sick days they have accrued with fellow employees in the case of a catastrophic illness.

Page 26 #C Holidays. Request that employees be given an additional paid holiday for their birthday.

Jim Batton made a motion to accept the recommended changes with the following exceptions:

Page 8 #7 Pay increases. Strike all and add: Pay increases will be given at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Page 26 #3 Sick Leave: Add: An Ad Hoc Committee composed of the Chief of Medical Staff, Director of Nursing Services and Administrator will decide what Constitutes a catastrophic illness.

Page 26 #C No additional holiday will be paid.

Thomas Helton seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Chairman Tipps declared the meeting adjourned at 8:15 p.m.


