

Are Pensions All?

Since the income tax (which was the ancestor of the New Deal) no person has been secure in his person or his goods to work to accumulate for himself or his family.

The New Deal has taught a generation of Americans to believe "There is only one possible solution: force. There's only one way of providing for old people: force other to do it. Alternative? What alternative? Force is the only way."

Young people under thirty can scarcely remember the America that existed before the New Deal. Education for Socialism has taught young people that the world owes them an education, a hot lunch, free medicine, unemployment compensation, full employment, and so on. We can't blame young people too much for thinking that the government owes them "security."

But the old people who remember the America of their youth, who can recall the America we lost whose motto was opportunity - we wonder if they will sell their birthright for that bribing pottage known as pensions.

Suppose a candidate was an avowed Socialist who believed in condemning private property to divide it up among the have-nots - but he offered you a bigger pension - would you vote for him?

Suppose he campaigned on the issue of admitting Red China to the United Nations or sending Marshall Plan Aid to Russia — but offered you a bigger pension would you vote for him?

Is your pension the only issue in the next election? Is there an America to be saved to leave as your heritage for your children and grandchildren that is more important than your pension?

We Never Learn

Perhaps some day our government will learn that one can never trust a communist. Let's hope the lesson will not be too late.

Now comes one Josef Broz (Marshal Tito to you) who has been the big pal of numerous of our public officials and who has been the recipient of whole shiploads of American cash and munitions on the ground that he was a "good" communist and on the side of the West.

The dictator of Yugoslavia was admitted to the fold of free nations solely on the premise that he was in the bad graces of the masters of the Kremlin. He always frankly admitted that he was and is a communist.

Now that he has received all the cash and cannon that is likely to come his way at the expense of the American taxpayers he is busy putting himself back into his real camo.

We are too anti-communist to suit him. Tito said. His declaration that he is with us in opposing aggression is just so much hog wash. Soviet Russia carefully avoids any advances where it can be occused directly of aggression. Somebody else - the Chinese Reds, for instance - always makes the aggressive move.

Tito's anti-aggression stand also is a hedge against the possibility that his Russian ex-pals may pull another double cross and send one of the satellites against his Yugoslavia. Tito knows better than to trust a communist -and nobody better because he is one of them.

But Secretary Dulles and the Administration in Washington never learn, so we can expect them to offer some more of our dollars to appease the little Yugoslav dictator.

Measures Of Intervention

A tree is known by its fruits. serve as rough measures of the interventionist policy:

(1) Do the common people of the world enjoy as much liberty, righteousness, justice and opportunity today as they did before the year 1917 when American global intervention was initiated?

(2) If its thirty - seven years of "accomplishments" bear little resemblance to the promises made for the interventionist policy, what is the credible evidence that more global intervention will bring better results in the future?

(3) if past efforts have failed, how much more American blood and property must be sacrificed, before advocates of global intervention will be willing to renounce the policy as either beyond our or an unworkable capacity scheme?

Those of us who now ask such questions unfortunately get the 'smother or smear' treatment. That means we have to appraise global interventionism without the benefit of a straightforward defense by its advocates. Moreover, in carrying out our appraisal, we have to surmount the psychical roadblocks of the past fifteen years of mass indoctrination under in-

terventionism's banner.
(But let's bear in mind that the government was not wholly responsible for the erection of these mental obstacles. Partially guilty have been the propaganda drums of business and labor interests whose profits and power depend on American intervention in foreign lands.)

To commence, now, our appraisal of American global interventionism, let us go back to beginnings. While our war with Spain in 1898 caused us to intervene in trans - Pacific affairs, the extent of that involvement was relatively minor. It would seem fairer and more moderate to move the date of first major entanglement up to 1917, when we crossed the ocean in force to multiply a European war into World War I.




